

Visit of Emilio Colombo. Foreign Minister of Italy, Wednesday, February 17

I. SETTING AND OBJECTIVES

Foreign Minister <u>Colombo will be in Washington to deliver</u> an address at <u>Georgetown</u> University on "The Current State of European/American Relations." The Italian view is that, while there are areas of tension between Europe and America, <u>U.S./Italian</u> relations are at a high point. The optimum relations are based on <u>common interests</u>, on <u>Italy's more active role</u> in the alliance and on our recognition of Italy's support on major issues.

The Government of Prime Minister Spadolini is a five party coalition. Tensions among the partners are expected to increase in the next few months as the Socialists press for a new government led by their dynamic and aggressive leader, Bettino Craxi. The Christian Democrats which polled over 38 percent of the vote in the last election to the Socialists 10 percent may resist; in that event Craxi might force elections. The situation is complicated by political machinations in the aftermath of the Italian Communist Party's bitter polemic with Moscow.


<u>Colombo will use the meeting with the Vice President</u> to symbolize Italy's role as a key partner of the United States. It will demonstrate as well U.S. recognition of <u>Christian Democratic leader Colombo and his party</u>, a party that lost the Prime Ministry in 1981 for the first time in 36 years and which views a string of visits by Socialist government ministers to Washington with some misgivings. <u>Colombo met with the Vice President</u> one year ago. <u>He is</u> favorably disposed toward the U.S.

The Vice President's meeting with Colombo demonstrates appreciation for Italy's enhanced role and support on key issues. The meeting precedes Colombo's talk with the Secretary and accents important areas of concern. Objectives of the meeting are:

- 1. To reiterate our appreciation in the Dozier case.
- 2. To convince the Italians to send observers to elections in El Salvador.
- 3. To underline our position on the Siberian pipeline.
- 4. To <u>underscore Italian support</u> on intermediate nuclear forces and the Multinational Force in the Sinai.

1. To reiterate our appreciation in Dozier case.

Talking Point

-- General Dozier is back in the U.S. after the brilliant and daring rescue by Italian police. With his release and the series of recent arrests of Red Brigade terrorists, Italy has struck a major blow against terrorism. Again thanks and appreciation to you, your Government and those involved in freeing Dozier.

2. El Salvador

We need to convince the Italians to send official observers to monitor the March 28 election in El Salvador. The Italian Government is sympathetic to our position in El Salvador as is Colombo's Christian Democratic Party. However, there is strong opposition in Parliament to the idea of sending observers.

Talking Points

-- The future of democracy is at stake in Central America. El Salvador elections are a crucial part of the effort to defeat antidemocratic extremism.

-- Elections provide the most legitimate means of establishing representative government.

-- It is essential that Western democracies support democratic process. Italy can best show support by sending election observers.

3. To underline our position on the Siberian pipeline.

Despite the Italian Government's "pause" in their gas contract negotiations with the Soviets, <u>ENI (the</u> national gas company) reached an accord with the Soviets on gas supply and price. The Government has told us

that this "technical agreement" is not a final commitment and does not change the "pause for reflection." However, it is a matter for concern.

Talking Points

-- We have welcomed your Government's "pause for reflection" in gas supply negotiations with the Soviets, but we are concerned by a reported agreement between ENI and the USSR counterpart. We hope the technical agreement does not become a fait accompli ending the "pause."

-- We recognize our sanctions could affect some European contracts for the pipeline. We welcome the resolve of others not to undermine these sanctions and will be discussing this in further detail.

4. Underscore Italian Support on key issues

In spite of an impressive round of "peace" demonstrations in Italian cities last fall, the <u>government remains firm in its</u> <u>support for intermediate nuclear force modernization</u>. The Italians selected Comiso, Sicily as the cruise missile base. Italy also <u>worked diligently to secure European participation</u> in the <u>Multinational Force (MFO)</u> in the Sinai. We are negotiating with the Italians on their contribution.

Talking Points

-- We recognize and appreciate Italy's steadfast efforts to get European participation in the MFO. We need to make it an acceptable and effective force.

-- Italy has been firm in its support on the missiles. That has been essential for the maintenance of Western resolve.

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

ARRIVAL CEREMONY: PRESIDENT PERTINI OF ITALY MARCH 25, 1982

President Pertini, today all America welcomes you with an open heart. This, I understand, is your first visit to the United States. We consider it an honor to have with us as a friend one who has sacrificed so much for the cause of freedom.

Mr. President, Italy and the United States stand shoulder to shoulder in the defense of democratic government and human freedom. In these perilous times, both our peoples may find comfort in the partnership that has developed between our nations.

The great Roman orator Cicero once said: "Friendship makes prosperity more brilliant, and lightens adversity by dividing and sharing it."

Well, whether it be good times or bad, our two peoples have demonstrated beyond any doubt that Italy and the United States are, and will be, friends.

This bond is not due solely to the magnificent contributions Americans of Italian descent have made to this land. Certainly, all Americans are aware of these contributions -- in the arts, in business and industry and in government. They are monuments of which we are rightfully proud.

Our brotherhood is one of soul as well as blood. If there had never been a migration from your country, we would still be kindred spirits because of our common ideals.

Today, these ideals are threatened, but it is heartening to see how they draw us closer together. Your unwavering support of the Western alliance, your willingness to do your part and more for the protection of freedom are much appreciated by the people of the United States.

It is said that actions speak louder than words; if that be true, certainly all the world has heard your message. Your country was one of the first major powers to step forward to participate in the Sinai peace-keeping force. Just as vital to peace was your willingness to provide the Alliance the means of maintaining a credible nuclear deterrent as a counterbalance to a massive Soviet buildup. And you were quick to support the oppressed peoples of Afghanistan and Poland. These commitments to peace and freedom demonstrate that Italv is no passive ally or fair-weather friend, but instead is an indispensable partner.

One would expect nothing less from a people that produced men like Giuseppe Garibaldi, in whose heart burned a flame that united all of Italy.

In recent years the Italian people have fought a grim battle against a foe every bit as threatening to freedom and independence as foreign tanks or nuclear missiles. A gang of brutal and inhuman thugs, aided and abetted by foreign powers, sought to destroy Italy's democracy by acts of sheer terror. You, Mr. President, know better than most what the consequences of submitting to such gangs could mean.

The fight against these terrorists has been costly. Aldo Moro and many, many others --- men and women who had much to

contribute, who still had much to live for -- were cut down. It takes a special kind of strength to face such an adversary while maintaining democratic institutions. All those who love liberty have prayed for your success. Today, I congratulate you and the Italian people for your fortitude. It appears that you are on your way to victory over these cowardly criminals. I extend to you now, on behalf of all Americans, our thanks for everything that was done to free General James Dozier. This triumph over evil has inspired good and decent people everywhere.

Mr. President, the world is entering a new era of human history. The time commonly known as the postwar period has come to a close. Human freedom faces tremendous challenges; its future rests upon the shoulders of the citizens of a small number of democratic nations. This heavy weight must be carried or it will be lost for generations, as Rome with all her glory was destroyed by the barbarians and then engulfed by the Dark Ages. The preservation of freedom is not a task for the weak. We have confidence that the Italian people, rich in heritage and strong in character, like the people of the United States, will meet the historic responsibility before us. Garibaldi said it well over 100 years ago: ". . it is the duty of every free man to fight for freedom wherever it is attecked by tyranny, without distinction between land and proples, because freedom is the patrimony of all humanity."

Today, Mr. President, marks the 25th anniversary of the Treaty of Rome which created the Common Market -- an agreement that has demonstrated, even to the most skeptical, that free and

independent nations can successfully and effectively work together for mutual benefit. Today, let us, the representatives of two powerful forces for decency and freedom, agree that we will face the challenges of the future together, and that in times of prosperity and adversity, our friendship will stand.

Mr. President, I look forward to visiting your country in June and I welcome you now to the United States. May the ties between us be always as strong as they are today.

STATE DINNER: PRESIDENT PERTINI OF ITALY MARCH 25, 1982

President Pertini, distinguished guests:

While looking over President Pertini's schedule, I noted that, consistent with his interest in the arts, he will be attending the theater while in San Francisco.

Mr. President, if I could be so bold as to make a personal suggestion. In a few years, when your term in office is coming to a close, you might consider making the theater a second career. For a young and energetic man like yourself, there are interesting opportunities. I might add, in the crossovers work of the second to a close and theater, there have been a few real success stories.

Seriously, though, all of us wish you a wonderful tour of this country. We only regret that we have had to wait so long to be your host.

Tonight we honor a man who, had he never become President of his country, would still inspire awe from those who meet him. The overwhelming respect of his fellow countrymen resulted in his election in 1978 by an unprecedented margin -- 832 of 995 votes cast in the Electoral Assembly.

This tribute was due to the recognition by all Italians of his courage and integrity. And he has not let his people down.

President Pertini has always been a man-of the democratic left: But he has also been second to none in upholding those principles of political freedom which bind all who love liberty.

Shortly after his election, he said: "If someone offered me, who has always been a socialist, the most radical social reform at the expense of freedom, I would refuse because freedom must never be bartered away."

My political ties are obviously not of the left; but I must say that such commitment to freedom, found in decent people of both left and right, offers us all hope for a better tomorrow.

All of his life President Pertini has tried to remain true to these ideals. As a young man he fought the onslaught of fascism then threatening humanity. He was imprisoned for his opposition to Mussolini and later was sentenced to death by the Nazis. This kind of brutal experience turned many in those days away from democracy and towards totalitarianism. President Pertini never wavered from his democratic ideals.

As it was for many nations, the last decade was a trying time for Italy. Italy, however, faced a sinister challenge that shook its system to the roots. Like fascists and Nazis, Red terrorists sought to undermine faith in democracy by demoralizing the people. The Italian people needed a symbol of strength and a Four ATHEN SYMPOLIAL

One of his first actions was to protest the trials of Soviet dissidents in Moscow. Few western leaders have expressed such sincere moral outrage over Soviet oppression in Afghanistan and Poland.

Perhaps tonight we should realize that the solidarity that unites all those devoted to freedom far transcends the limited differences between the democratic right and the democratic left. Page 3

President Pertini, we are in a unique position to prove to the world that freedom works, that people with different domestic policies can work together if liberty is threatened. I have enjoyed our meetings today and I thank you for honoring us with this visit. And now I ask all of you to join me in toasting to President Pertini and to the Jtalian people.



The Director of the National Gallery of Art, J. Carter Brown, has just returned today from Italy. It seems that there are two very, very rare 5th century Italian bronzes which are very close to President Pertini's heart. He dearly wishes to share them with the President. The idea was to have the President and Mrs. Reagan go to the National Gallery of Art to see the bronzes. I have recommended, on the other hand, that perhaps we let the bronzes be exhibited in the Grand Foyer during the morning of March 25 and have a picture taken with President Pertini and President and Mrs. Reagan with the bronzes in the Grand Foyer, then the National Gallery will remove them by lunch time. The President of Italy will be happy, his constituents at home will be delighted, and the President of the United States will not have to leave the confines of the White House on that hectic day.
