BACKGROUND AND TALKING POINTS

Mrs. Reagan's Tea for Mrs. Craxi Thursday, October 20, 1983 - 4:00 p.m.

Background:

The Craxi's have a close family life. He and his wife met when they were both 18 years old and have similar political and social ideas, although Craxi has publicly described his wife as the moderate wing of the family. Until recently, she remained at the family's home in Milan and he commuted there from Rome to spend every week-end with his family, avoiding any commitments which might prevent this. Craxi has said that his daughter, Stefania, takes after him more than his son, Vittorio. He has joked that she, therefore, causes less problems. Bettino Craxi is reputed to play the guitar and plays popular Italian songs while at home.

Talking Points:

- -- We have genuinely been looking forward to meeting you. The Prime Minister is known in this country for his dynamism and his fresh approach to Italian politics.
- -- We feel particularly close to Italy because of many shared ties that our countries have. Just last week, the President attended a luncheon at Ambassador Petrignani's residence to celebrate Columbus Day, which was attended by a large number of prominent Italian-Americans.
- -- We will never forget your country's grand performance in liberating General Dozier.
- -- In 1981, Mr. Craxi told an Italian magazine he firmly intended to increase the participation of women in his party. What is the status of women in the Socialist Party and in Italy in general?
- -- We keep hearing that Italian society is becoming more secularized. What does this mean in family terms?
- -- As you may know, I have spent a great deal of my time concerned with the terrible problem caused by drugs in our society. I am pleased to learn that our husbands are establishing a bilateral working group to study ways to get at the roots of the narcotics problem as it affects our two countries.

The Craxis have a close family life. Bettino Craxi is reputed to play the guitar and sing popular Italian songs while at home. He is also said to have a weakness for pasta.

Craxi and his wife, the former Anna Moncini, met when they were both 18 years of age. They have similar political and social ideas. Craxi has publicly described her as the "moderate" wing of the family. Until recently, she remained at the family's home in Milan and he commuted there from Rome to spend every weekend with his family, avoiding any commitment which might prevent this.

Craxi has said that his daughter, Stefania, takes after him more than his son, Vittorio. He has quipped that she therefore causes "less problems." Vittorio has a family nickname, Bobo.

-- We keep hearing that Italian society is becoming more "secularized." What does this mean in family terms?

-- As you may know, I have spent a great deal of my time concerned with the terrible problem caused by drugs in our society. I have been pleased to learn that our husbands are agreeing to establish a bilateral working group to study ways to get at the roots of the narcotics problem as it affects our two countries.

DEPARTURE STATEMENT

Prime Minister Craxi visits Washington as the leader of one of America's closest allies. Italy has, in recent years, taken its rightful place among the principal nations of the Western Alliance. We admire Italy for its many contributions, and have been impressed by the dynamic and statesmanlike leadership provided by the new Italian Government in its short time in office. We are particularly pleased by this opportunity to deepen our consultations and broaden our cooperation with our trusted Italian friends.

Italy has played a crucial role in the NATO effort to correct the imbalance in nuclear forces in Europe. Prime Minister Craxi and I reviewed the INF negotiations between the U.S. and the Soviet Union in Geneva where we seek an equitable, verifiable agreement. We still seek an agreement by the end of the year. If an agreement is not reached in time, we agreed that NATO would deploy U.S. missiles on schedule beginning at the end of this year, as decided in 1979. We remain committed to continuing negotiations even after the beginning of deployments -- indeed, negotiations have been going on for two years while the Soviets have been deploying far greater numbers of systems. In addition to our discussion of INF, the Prime Minister and I reviewed developments in other arms control fields. The U.S. and Italy share a common approach to the Conference on Disarmament in Europe, where we will be working to reduce the risk of surprise attack in Europe by improving observation and understanding of military forces and activities. We are also working together in the MBFR talks in Vienna to achieve parity in ground forces in Central Europe.

I expressed to the Prime Minister our appreciation for the very positive contribution Italy is making to Mediterranean security and to the search for peace in the Middle East. Italy was among the first nations to step forward to provide forces in the Sinai to help implement the historic agreement reached between Egypt and Israel at Camp David. Italian and American soldiers now are standing shoulder to shoulder in Lebanon where our two nations are bearing the difficult burdens of peacekeeping. We are cooperating not only in keeping the peace, but in making peace as well. The Prime Minister and I had a chance to review our common efforts to promote genuine political reconciliation within Lebanon and to work toward the restoration of Lebanese sovereignty throughout that troubled nation. We reviewed the outlook for the global economy and exchanged views on our respective efforts to deal with common economic difficulties. I expressed our understanding of the dimmensions of the economic problems Italy presently faces and our support for the tough, but essential measures the Italian Government is taking to restore balanced and non-inflationary growth. I explained that the U.S. economy had turned the corner, and expressed the hope that our own strong recovery would help Italy lift itself out if its present recession.

I have been especially impressed by Prime Minister Craxi's commitment to an effective attack on organized crime and narcotics trafficking. Quite obviously we share a crucial interest in efforts to control the international traffic in narcotics. Accordingly, the Prime Minister and I have directed our officials to intensify cooperation in the fight against narcotics production and smuggling.

Prime Minister Craxi comes to our shores as an especially welcome guest. In international affairs, where the element of personal trust is so essential, such meetings as this are

invaluable. I am delighted to say that the Prime Minister and I have laid the basis today for continuing the open, cooperative and mutually-helpful relationship which has been traditional between our two governments and their leaders.

SUBJECT: Treaty on Extradition Between the United States and Italy

Issue

To transmit to the Senate for advice and consent to ratification, the Treaty on Extradition between the United States and Italy.

Facts

The Treaty, signed at Rome on October 13, 1983, will facilitate United States efforts to prosecute narcotics conspiracies by expressly providing that conspiracies and attempts to commit extraditable offenses constitute extraditable offenses. The Treaty also provides a legal basis for temporarily surrendering prisoners to stand trial for crimes which occurred in the requesting State.

The Treaty follows generally the form and content of extradition treaties recently concluded by this Government. Upon entry into force, it will terminate and supersede the existing extradition treaty between the United States and Italy.

Discussion

This Treaty will make a significant contribution to international cooperation in law enforcement. I recommend that it be immediately forwarded to the Senate for its early and favorable consideration of the Treaty and its advice and consent to ratification.

TO THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES:

With a view to receiving the advice and consent of the Senate to ratification, I transmit herewith the Treaty on Extradition between the United States of America and Italy, signed at Rome on October 13, 1983.

I transmit also, for the information of the Senate, the Report of the Department of State with respect to the Treaty.

The Treaty will facilitate United States efforts to prosecute narcotics conspiracies by expressly providing that conspiracies and attempts to commit extraditable offenses constitute extraditable offenses. The Treaty also provides a legal basis for temporarily surrendering prisoners to stand trial for crimes which occurred in the requesting State.

The Treaty follows generally the form and content of extradition treaties recently concluded by this Government. Upon entry into force, it will terminate and supersede the existing extradition treaty between the United States and Italy.

This Treaty will make a significant contribution to international cooperation in law enforcement. I recommend that the Senate give early and favorable consideration to the Treaty and give its advice and consent to ratification.

The President,

I have the honor to submit to you the Treaty on Extradition between the United States of America and Italy, signed at Rome on October 13, 1983. I recommend that the Treaty be transmitted to the Senate for advice and consent to ratification.

The Treaty follows generally the form and content of extradition treaties recently concluded by this Government.

Article 1 obligates each State to extradite to the other, in accordance with the terms of the Treaty, any persons charged with or convicted of an extraditable offense by the requesting State. (Extradition shall also be granted, Article 2 explains, for attempts to commit, participation in the commission of, and conspiracy to commit extraditable offenses.)

Article 2 permits extradition for any offense punishable under the laws of both States by imprisonment for more than one year. Instead of listing each offense for which extradition may be granted, as was United States practice until recently, this Treaty adopts the modern practice of permitting extradition for any crime punishable under the laws of both contracting Parties for

a minimum period. This obviates the need to renegotiate or supplement the Treaty should both States pass laws covering new types of criminal activity, such as computer-related crimes.

Article 2 also follows the practice of recent United States extradition treaties in indicating that the dual criminality standard should be interpreted liberally in order to effectuate the intent of the Parties that fugitives be brought to justice. Article 2 further provides that, if extradition is granted for an extraditable offense, it may also be granted for offenses which are punishable by less than a year's imprisonment.

Article 3 provides that extradition may be granted for an offense committed outside the territory of the requesting State, provided that such an offense is punishable under the laws of the requested State or that the person sought is a national of the requesting State.

Article 4 provides that extradition shall not be denied on the ground that the person sought is a national of the requested State.

Articles 5, 6, 8 and 9 state mandatory grounds for refusal of extradition. Article 5 provides that extradition shall be denied when the offense for which extradition is requested is a political or military offense. Article 6 provides that extradition shall be denied when the person sought has been in jeopardy in the requested State for the same offense. Article 8 provides that extradition shall, be denied where the requesting State's statute of limitation bars prosecution or enforcement of the penalty. Article 9 provides that extradition shall be denied when the offense is punishable by death in the requesting, but not the requested, State, unless satisfactory assurances are received that the death penalty, if imposed, will not be carried out.

Article 7 states a discretionary ground for refusal of extradition. It provides that extradition may be refused when the person sought is being proceeded against by the requested State for the same act.

Articles 10-13 set out procedures which are similar to those found in other modern United States extradition treaties. In particular, Article 10 clarifies the form and content of the documentation required to demonstrate to a United States court probable cause to believe that the crime for which extradition is sought was committed and that the person sought committed it.

Article 14 provides that if the person sought is being proceeded against or is serving a sentence in the requested State for a different offense, that State may either (a) defer surrender until the proceedings are concluded or the sentence has been served, or (b) temporarily surrender the person solely for the purpose of prosecution. Temporary surrender is an innovative feature found in recent United States extradition treaties (Costa Rica, The Netherlands and Sweden).

Article 15 sets forth a non-exclusive list of factors to be considered by the requested Party in determining to

which country to surrender a person sought by more than one State.

Article 16 expressly incorporates into the Treaty the rule of specialty. This article provides, subject to specified exceptions, that a person extradited under the Treaty may not be tried, punished or detained for an offense other than that for which extradition has been granted.

Article 17 permits surrender without formal proceedings where the person sought agrees in writing to surrender after having been advised by a competent judicial authority of his or her right to a formal proceeding and to the protections afforded by the Treaty.

Article 18 provides for the seizure and surrender to the requesting State of all property related to the offense for which extradition is requested. This obligation is subject to the rights of third parties.

Article 19 governs transit through the territory of one of the contracting Parties of a person being surrendered to the other Party by a third country.

Article 20 provides that the requested State shall represent the requesting State in any proceedings in the requested State arising out of a request for extradition.

Article 21 governs expenses in a manner similar to other recent United States extradition treaties.

Article 22, like the parallel provision of almost all recent United States extradition treaties, stipulates that the Treaty is retroactive, in the sense that it applies to

offenses committed before as well as after its entry into force.

Article 23 provides for termination of the Treaty by either Party upon six months written notice to the other.

Article 24 provides that the Treaty will enter into force immediately upon the exchange of the instruments of ratification. Upon entry into force, this Treaty will terminate and supersede the Treaty on Extradition between the United States and Italy signed on January 18, 1973. The prior Treaty shall govern pending extradition proceedings except that Article 2 of this Treaty shall apply to those proceedings, and Article 14 shall also apply to those found extraditable under the prior Treaty.

The Department of Justice joins the Department of State in favoring approval of this Treaty by the Senate at an early date.
