I have carefully considered your letter of June 25 on the crisis in Lebanon.

The current situation in Lebanon is indeed tragic and calls for the most urgent action on the part of all parties to end the bloodshed. This has been a central objective of the United States since the beginning of the crisis: we will continue to do everything in our power to promote the cause of peace. Indeed, the diplomatic efforts of the United States have been a decisive factor in keeping alive the possibility of a ceasefire in a political framework able to ensure a stable and peaceful future in Lebanon and the region.

I must therefore reject the suggestion in your letter that the United States has not actively taken advantage of every available opportunity, including the recent visit to Washington of Prime Minister Begin, to exert its influence for peace. I must also point out that your expressions of concern for the suffering of the people of Lebanon cannot but appear ironic in view of the fact that the Soviet Union has provided immense quantities of weapons to elements which have actively worked to undermine the political stability of Lebanon and provoked Israeli retaliation by attacking Israel's northern territories.

Mr. President, it is evident that we are at a watershed in the Lebanese crisis, originally precipitated in the 1970s by the influx of armed PLO forces into Lebanon. It should be

obvious that peace in that war-torn country will be established on a secure basis only when the armed forces of all the foreign powers and movements are withdrawn and the Government of Lebanon is once again able to extend its effective authority throughout the country. This, in our view, is the central issue of the present crisis. In this context we will insist on the withdrawal of Israeli troops. We are not in favor of an extended Israeli occupation; neither, as we are assured by the Government of Israel, does it intend to maintain such a presence. It should be apparent, however, that there will be no return to a situation in which Israel's northern regions are subject to military aggression from Lebanese territory. This is a reality which those who have been responsible for such aggression must come to recognize.

Mr. President, it is now escential that all the parties involved take the hard decisions necessary to reach and implement such arrangements in order to end this tragic conflict. I will continue to use my personal influence to that end and expect that you will press a similar course on those forces with which the Soviet Union enjoys influence. Any other course of action would be inconsistent with the responsibilities of our two countries at this critical period.

Dear President Reagan,

With reference to our letter of July 6th and to the continued critical situation in Lebanon, we reiterate our request that you do everything in your power to provide for a withdrawal of foreign forces from Lebanon and to strengthen the powers of the central Lebanese government.

We are appalled about the steady loss of lives by artillery bombardments and air attacks in West Beirut and hope that you will use your considerable influence with Israel to prevent a massive tank and infantry assault on West Beirut.

We understand that water and elecricity services have been turned off by the Israeli military to West Beirut for three days. On humanitarian and public health grounds alone we are hoping for your intervention to have the services restored to the Lebanese population of West Beirut.

Representing many heritage groups whose nations of origin are also struggling for national self-determination within the Soviet Empire we have sympathies for the Palestinan people's quest for a homeland. We hope that you will insist upon the resumption of of autonomy talks with Palestinian participation after an Israeli and Syrian withd4rawal from Lebanon. Without a solution of the Palestinian problem no peace and /or tranquility can return to the Middle East.

Your very kind words on the successful resolution of the West Beirut crisis, and our recent initiative on the Middle East are most welcome. I, too, am extremely pleased and proud that Ambassador Habib's skill and patience have resulted in the evacuation of the PLO from West Beirut.

With the completion of the evacuation of the PLO from West Beirut, we will turn our attention to negotiating arrangements for the withdrawal of PLO, Syrian, Israeli and remaining forces from Lebanon. We will continue to work closely on such issues with the Lebanese government, as we encourage it to exert maximum effort to strengthen its institutions, expand its authority throughout its sovereign territory and promote a genuine reconciliation among Lebanon's many communities.

It is generally agreed that certain international peacekeeping arrangements in an extensive area of southern Lebanon will have to become part of a general solution. In this context there can be no return to the situation in which southern Lebanon can be used as a staging area for military attacks against Israel. Again, we will be working closely with the Lebanese government on issues such as these, particularly as they relate to the restoration of the government's control over all of its sovereign territory.

Australia's contribution to the reconstruction of Lebanon is welcome, indeed. The United States continues to be determined to exert every possible effort to alleviate the enormous human and material

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losses which the Lebanese people and other innocent inhabitants of Lebanon have sustained. We hope the World Bank will take the lead in coordinating international reconstruction efforts for Lebanon.

In addition, I wanted to tell you how much I appreciate your recent statement of support on our Middle East initiative. I firmly believe that the Arab states and Israel have a unique opportunity at this moment to further the cause of peace, an opportunity in which the United States can play a major role, in seeking to expand the negotiations to include the Palestinians and Arab states prepared to pursue the cause of peace through negotiations. Most significantly, I concluded that the United States could no longer remain silent on the critical issues involved, if we are to inject a fresh start in the peace process. It is my fervent hope that we will succeed in resurrecting the spirit of peace and hope for a just solution for the Palestinian problem in all of its aspects. I welcome your support and counsel as we pursue these goals.

In closing, let me say I am most pleased that Bob Cotton is here as your new Ambassador. He is an obviously able representative and more importantly an old friend of yours.

As I have already stated publicly, I share the revulsion of the entire American people for the deplorable events which have recently occurred in Beirut, including the murder of President-elect Bashir Gemayel and the appalling massacre of Palestinian refugees. These outrages are links in a tragic chain of events which has its source in the destruction of Lebanese national integrity in the 1970s. You will recall that, in a previous communication to you, I noted that, while the U.S. and Israel enjoy close and friendly relations, Israel is a sovereign state. I must, therefore, categorically reject as inappropriate in a communication between us your allegations concerning Israeli conduct in Lebanon and your implied accusation that my government was in a position to prevent the recent massacre in Beirut but failed to do so. Soviet Government has representations to make concerning Israeli conduct, it should communicate directly with the Government of Israel. As I had occasion to inform you previously, the United States has done and continues to do all in its power to put an end to the civil war and foreign military intervention in Lebanon. Together with the Governments of Italy and France, the United States has agreed to reconstitute the Multinational Force in Beirut. The task of this force is to help the Lebanese Government reestablish its authority. The force will be withdrawn when its mission in support of the Government of Lebanon has been completed. 09201555

The cause of peace in Lebanon is not advanced by groundless accusations. The immensely complex and volatile situation in that country requires that the level of rhetoric be scaled down. If the Soviet Union wishes to contribute to the restoration of peace in Lebanon, it can do so best by seeking to reconcile the parties involved rather than making ill-founded and inflammatory public charges.

LEDANESE ELECTIONS -

BEIRUT, LEBANON (AP) -- BASHIR GEMAYEL, 34-YEAR-OLD COMMANDER OF THE ISRAELI-ALLIED CHRISTIAN MILITIA ALLIANCE, WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF LEBANON TODAY BY THE COUNTRY'S PARLIAMENT.

HE WILL SUCCEED PRESIDENT ELIAS SARKIS, WHO LEAVES OFFICE SEPT. 23, TO BECOME THE SEVEN PRESIDENT OF LEBANON SINCE THE NATION'S INDEPENDENCE IN 1943.

GEMAYEL WAS THE ONLY ANNOUNCED CANDIDATE, AND WAS ELECTED ON A VOTE OF 57-0 WITH FIVE ABSTENTIONS. THE ELECTION CAME ON THE SECOND BALLOT. GEMAYEL FELL FOUR VOTES SHORT OF BEING ELECTED ON A FIRST-ROUND BALLOT, BUT THE STRONG SHOWING INDICATED IT WAS CERTAIN THERE WOULD BE NO ATTEMPT TO COME UP WITH A COMPROMISE CANDIDATE.

HIS CANDIDACY WAS OPPOSED BY LEADING MOSLEM AND LEFTIST POLITICIANS OBJECTING TO HIS MILITIA'S CLOSE TIES TO THE ARMY OF ISRAEL, WHICH INVADED LEBANON ON JUNE TO ROUT PALESTINE LIBERATION ORGANIZATION GUERRILLAS. MANY OF THE MOSLEMS AND LEFTISTS BOYCOTTED THE SESSION, BUT THE MECESSARY QUORUM OF 62 WAS REACHED, ALLOWING THE NOTE TO PROCEED.

NONETHELESS, GEMAYEL WAS CONSIDERED BY HIS INTENSELY LOYAL FOLLOWERS TO BE A FORCEFUL LEADER WHO WOULD TRY TO FORM A STRONG GOVERNMENT FOR LEBANON, TORN BY SECTARIAN FEUDING SINCE THE 1975-76 CIVIL WAR BETWEEN CHRISTIANS AND AN ALLIANCE OF LEFTISTS AND MOSLEMS.

PARLIAMENT DEPUTIES LOUDLY APPLAUDED THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE RESULTS, AND IMMEDIATELY ADJOURNED, WHILE SUPPORTERS OF GEMAYEL IN THE EASTERN SECTOR FIRED VOLLEYS OF GUNFIRE IN CELEBRATION.

EARLIER TODAY, A ROCKET EXPLODED TODAY ABOUT 100 YARDS FROM THE HILITARY ACADEMY WHERE PARLIAMENT HELD THE SPECIAL SESSION.

THERE WERE NO REPORTED INJURIES IN THE ROCKET ATTACK: WHICH OCCURRED ABOUT TWO HOURS BEFORE THE SESSION: AND NO INDICATION OF WHO FIRED IT.

MEANWHILE, ISRAELI JETS FLEW OVER THE MOSLEM SECTOR OF BEIRUT APPARENTLY ON RECONNAISSANCE MISSIONS, DRAWING ANTI-AIRCRAFT FIRE FROM PALESTINIAN BATTERIES.

THE STATE RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORTED THAT 56 DEPUTIES HAD SHOWN UP AT THE ACADEMY, INCLUDING 14 SUNNI AND SHIITE MOSLEMS, DESPITE CALLS FOR A BOYCOTT OF THE SESSION TO PREVENT THE NECESSARY THO-THIRDS QUORUM OF 62 FOR A VOTE.

FORMER PRESIDENT CAMILLE CHAMOUN, LEADER OF THE CHRISTIAN POLITICAL ALLIANCE CALLED THE LEBANESE FRONT, SAT IN ONE OF THE FRONT ROWS OF THE ACADEMY'S CONFERENCE HALL, WEARING DARK GLASSES AND FILING HIS FINGER WAILS. HE SAT NEXT TO PIERRE GENAYEL, FATHER OF THE ONLY CANDIDATE, BASHIR GENAYEL, AND FOUNDER OF THE PHALANGE PARTY. AP-WX-08-23-82,0849EDT

THE PRESIDENT: Our talks have covered a full range of issues with particular focus on our shared objective of prompt withdrawal of all foreign forces from Lebanon.

We also discussed Lebanon's goals in restoring authority and control of central government in all parts of the country. In this regard I reaffirmed the United States support for the sovereignty, unity, territorial integrity, and freedom of Lebanon. And I am pleased to have had the opportunity to establish a close working dialogue with President Gemayel who deserves all of our support as he and the people of Lebanon work to rebuild their nation.

President Gemayel can rely upon the help of the United States. It is my hope that our mutual efforts will lead to restored peace and prosperity for all the people of Lebanon and indeed all the Middle East.

He has been most welcome here and we are pleased to have had him with us.

PRESIDENT GEMAYAL: I am honored to be the first President of Lebanon to make an official visit to the United States. The Lebanese people deeply appreciate and will never forget your gracious and decisive efforts to help bring an end to the suffering of my country. American commitment to the sovereignty and territorial integrity of a free democracy in Lebanon has been fundamental to our survival. We see the U.S. role as the indispensable ingredient to bring peace not only to Lebanon but also to the whole region as well. We firmly believe that President Reagan's initiative has created unprecedented opportunities for peace.

We in Lebanon intend to be active in the search for peace with all nations of the region. The relation between the United States and Lebanon is not only between our two governments; it is between our two peoples who share the same heritage and adhere to the same values and principles of democracy and liberty.

The two and a half million Lebanese have almost equal number of close relatives in the United States. We value enormously the unique tie provided by these American Lebanese,

among the most loyal of all Americans and we believe they have a leading role in keeping our two countries together. Lebanon has been the most recent, and for us, the most painful example of the assault upon free men by the forces of darkness and occupation. We have fought to retain our freedom and the strength of our resistance has earned for us not only a restated pride in ourselves but also a re-entry into the ranks of the free world.

With equal resolve, I together with my people am committed to the immediate removal of all foreign forces from our soil and to work hand in hand with all sectors of Lebanese society to build a nation in which all citizens have equal privileges, rights, and responsibilities.

The historic U.S.-Lebanon relationship is the cornerstone of building this new Lebanon. America's friendship and assistance not only in peacekeeping and peacemaking but also in reconstruction and rebuilding our armed forces are vital.

We, on our part, intend to carry our share of the responsibility of this partnership by a full and reciprocal contribution to all U.S. goals in its many noble endeavors as the leader of the Free World.
