ALL OF A SUDDEN, THE DEMOCRATIC EDIFICE THAT WAS LEBANON

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FREE - AND EVEN LAX - THAT IT BECAME THE STAGE FOR ONE OF THE BLOODIEST WARS IN RECENT TIMES. 

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Thank you for your request of June 22 for the Department's comments on House Concurrent Resolution 359.

As you know, the United States voted for and fully supports U.N. Security Council Resolution 509. Ambassador Habib has been working diligently with all of the parties concerned to arrive at a practical means of bringing about the implementation of this resolution in a context of a negotiated solution to the conflict which will support the territorial integrity, sovereignty, and political independence of Lebanon within its internationally recognized borders. The President has reaffirmed our commitment to this objective repeatedly, and to this end has urged that all foreign combat forces be withdrawn from Lebanon. This, of course, is a key aspect of the delicate negotiations which Ambassador Habib is now conducting.

With respect to those portions of the resolution relating to the use of U.S. military equipment in the region, the Department has communicated on two occasions recently with the Congress concerning both the question of possible violations of the conditions under which U.S. equipment was furnished, and action taken by the President to suspend further deliveries of certain types of munitions in light of our concerns regarding their use in the recent fighting. The Administration takes very seriously the obligations of both the President and the Congress under the Arms Export Control Act to encourage observance of agreements concerning the use of U.S. furnished items by foreign countries. However, we believe that to attempt to deal with this subject in a resolution focused on achieving a negotiated solution to the overall political and military crisis in Lebanon would be inappropriate. particular, it could be misinterpreted by one or more of the parties at a time when delicate negotiations are under way. As the Department has made clear in its various communications

with the Congress concerning the use of U.S. equipment in the recent fighting, we will continue to consult with the Congress on this as well as other aspects of the Lebanon situation.

The proposed resolution also calls for an effective cease-fire by all parties. The U.S. has repeatedly supported calls for a cease-fire and cessation of hostilities.

Ambassador Habib had brought about a comprehensive cease-fire in southern Lebanon which remained in effect for almost 11 months prior to the latest major outbreak of violence, and the United States was instrumental in achieving a cease-fire among the various contending forces in Lebanon soon after these hostilities were initiated. Unfortunately, the cease-fire has repeatedly broken down. The United States has taken urgent diplomatic action in each case to restore the cease-fire, in order that Ambassador Habib's negotiations may proceed to a successful conclusion. We believe that the record of the United States on this matter is clear.

The adoption by the Congress of a resolution would serve to further manifest U.S. concern that an effective cease-fire is necessary to permit negotiators to achieve their purpose. At the same time, however, such a resolution could be misinterpreted by one or more parties to the conflict and might thus further complicate the delicate negotiations now under way. Accordingly, we would urge that action on Concurrent Resolution 359 be withheld pending the conclusion of Ambassador Habib's efforts to bring about a solution to the immediate problem in Beirut. The utility of such a resolution could then be considered as we move on to the next stages of negotiations looking toward a withdrawal of all foreign forces from Lebanon and other actions necessary to make effective the territorial integrity, sovereignty and political independence of Lebanon.

SUBJECT:

U.S. Private Sector Initiatives for Lebanon

DISCUSSION: Diverse private sector individuals and organizations have become involved in helping with the U.S. efforts for relief and rehabilitation in Lebanon. Considerable money, supplies, technical services, etc., have already been raised by these groups and reached Lebanon. With the formation of two new groups, it is anticipated that further significant U.S. resources will be leveraged for Lebanon.

THE GROUP'S PURPOSES:

Voluntary Agencies: The private and voluntary groups, such as Save the Children, Catholic Relief Service, etc., which were already on the ground when fighting broke out, have substantially contributed to the relief effort in their dispersement of food, medical supplies, etc. At the request of AID these groups have formed a clearinghouse of information in the U.S. to funnel donations to those voluntary agencies in Lebanon.

American/Lebanon Private Sector Cooperation, Inc. (ALPSCI): A newly formed organization composed of U.S. businessmen who plan to provide a rapid dispersal system for U.S. companies that want to give financial or in-kind contributions to rebuild Lebanon. It is ALPSCI's intent to form a counter-part group in Lebanon composed of Lebanese private businesses. All resources, including office space, are donated. John M. Nugent, Vice President, Timmons & Company, is the Chairman of the Board.

U.S. Business Commission on Lebanon: Formed at the suggestion of AID, this group will be composed of approximately 20 CEO's of major U.S. companies. The group would determine potential for U.S. private sector participation in Lebanon. Also, this group will act as the Honorary Board of Directors of ALPSCI. Lew Preston, CEO of J. P. Morgan and Company, is chairing this group.

Ralph Davidson, President of Time, Inc. orchestrated the raising of over \$1M from 27 U.S. companies for relief in Lebanon. Much of that money has already been dispersed through voluntary agencies and to the University of Beirut. No further involvement is planned.

OPERATIONS: All of the above named groups are cooperating with each other. All will receive active support by the U.S. Government but are expected to determine their own agenda, terms of reference, and much, if not all, of their own funding.

REQUEST: The positive aspects of these ventures are numerous. It is consistent with the President's initiative in private volunteerism. It will complement A.I.D. efforts.

SCENARIO: The Rose Garden would be preset with a large set of risers, enough to accommodate 40 people. All private sector representatives will be seated behind the podium. Standing will be M. Peter McPherson, AID Administrator, Lewis Preston, John Nugent, Ralph Davidson, and one representative from the voluntary agencies.

The President would come to the podium and make brief remarks (suggested remarks attached). He introduces McPherson, Preston, Nugent, Davidson, and one representative from the voluntary agencies to answer questions from the media. The President would leave the podium after his remarks.

McPherson would give a brief explanation of the Private Sector efforts and their relationship to the U.S. Government. The media would then be allowed questions of McPherson, Preston, Nugent, Davidson, and one representative from the voluntary agencies.

Good morning (afternoon). I am happy to welcome here today these fine people who have assembled non-profit private business organizations to help in the difficult task of rebuilding war-torn Lebanon.

As the people of Lebanon begin to rebuild their nation, the United States stands behind their efforts. These people represent organizations created out of the selfless American principles of helping our friends in a time of need. They also exhibit confidence in the resiliency of the Lebanese private sector and its ability to restore a strong Lebanese economy.

I am pleased that we could bring you all here today as evidence that Americans are caring and compassionate people. Certainly the spirit of volunteerism that your organizations reflect is a remarkable tribute to the altruism found in America.

As requested, we are submitting herewith a brief summary of the findings and accomplishments of the delegation of 18 U.S. contractors which I led to Beirut, Lebanon. Winton "Red" Blount served as Co-Chairman of this special task force of American businessmen.

BACKGROUND

In part as a response to President Amin Gemayel's visit to the U.S. on October 18 - 19, and in part as a desire of the Administration to demonstrate its support of Lebanon in its challenge to rebuild Beirut, OPIC was asked to lead a delegation of American senior executives from the construction contracting industy. Construction companies represented included: Bechtel, Raymond International, Perini, Brown & Root, Morrison/Knudsen, (see attached list).

The primary focus of this special trip was to deliver professional executives from the American private sector who would interface directly with their counterparts in the Lebanese private sector. The Association of Lebanese General Contractors served as hosts for the American delegation during the $2\frac{1}{2}$ -day visit.

FINDINGS

1. As anticipated, destruction of buildings, harbor facilities, etc. was widespread. However, the majority of damage appeared to be related to the civil strife of the 1975 - 1976

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era; destruction caused by the Israelis was far less than expected (and was confined largely to middle-class housing projects located exclusively in West Beirut).

- 2. Most roads had been cleared and were passable. Almost no damage to the airport was noted and it seemed to be fully functional.
- 3. Evidence of the re-emergence of Lebanon seemed widespread: small retail shops had recently opened; fruit and vegetable stands were springing up on street corners all over the city; roads were beginning to be repaired and repaved with asphalt; "luxury" cars, which apparently had been kept off the roads by their owners, were once again in evidence, etc.
- 4. There was a strong presence of entrepreneurship within the Lebanese private sector. The reputation of the resource-fulness and resilience of the Lebanese businessmen seemed to be well founded. The business community provided an extremely warm welcome to the U.S. delegation, and every businessman we met was highly enthusiastic over Lebanon's future and its re-emergence as a center of commerce and banking.
- 5. The subject of money was hardly mentioned (contrary to warnings by our Embassy). In fact, the Lebanese businessmen seemed anxious to point out that adequate capital was available within the private sector to finance most of their projects. Representatives from the public sector, however, admitted to a need for substantial outside funds but did not suggest or assume that the U.S. would provide a disproportionate share.
- 6. All Lebanese agreed that before rebuilding could move ahead in earnest, clear and demonstrable signs of stability must return to Lebanon (i.e., a stable central government must emerge). The Lebanese (private sector and government) all agreed that the number one obstacle to stability was the presence of Palestinians and Syrians. They also felt the solution to this problem was more U.S. troops (and other multinational forces) and not a question of strengthening their own Lebanese army. (The Israeli presence in South Lebanon was hardly ever mentioned one way or another.)

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. As the U.S. Embassy reported by cable after the mission had departed:

"a review of the media here and conversations with Lebanese businessmen after you left indicate that the visit of the mission was an unqualified success."

- 2. Lebanese businessmen seemed eager to get input from U.S. businessmen on a wide range of subjects related to reconstruction of Beirut (i.e., priority of projects; advice on trying to restore certain structures versus total demolition and rebuilding; identification of specific areas where there could be a transfer of new U.S. construction techniques, management systems, training programs, etc.).
- 3. Although the principal purpose of the American mission was to observe the situation and advise the Lebanese on how best to plan an overall reconstruction program, it soon became apparent that the Lebanese businessmen were approaching individual American businessmen on specific proposals for joint venture projects; some of these were in advanced stages of discussion by the end of the 2½-day mission and a number of American businessmen had made plans to return to Beirut to continue and/or finalize agreements. (OPIC is aware of several of these projects (i.e., a major project for the manufacturing of certain construction materials, city water system reconstruction, agricultural irrigation systems, etc.).
- 4. There was broad and highly favorable press coverage of the American visit by local media on each day. Examples: "Le Reveil," a leading French newspaper stated:

"The presence of the (American) team in Lebanon is a sign of U.S. faith in the future of the country and of the faith of Lebanese businessmen in Lebanon and their willingness to rebuild it."

"Al-Anwar," a leading Arabic newspaper said:

"In a pragmatic reaction to President Gemayel's visit to Washington, a specialized U.S. mission came to Beirut to participate in reconstruction development."

(Copies of several of the newspaper articles are attached; a complete collection of all coverage is being pouched by the Embassy.)

5. During a ceremony toward the end of the visit, the Lebanese Chamber of Commerce and Industry sponsored a special event to formally express their gratitude to the American delegation for their visit to Beirut. At the conclusion, we were presented with a silver plate on which was inscribed:

"In rememberance of your friendly visit to the Beirut Chamber of Commerce and Industry as first American delegation since 1975." Dr. Norman A. Bailey

At this presentation, the President of the Lebanese Chamber made a special point of stating that not only was our group the first visit of Americans since 1975, but also the "first group of businessmen to visit Lebanon from any foreign nation since the start of the Israeli crisis 6 months ago," thereby underscoring the importance to which the Lebanese attached to the timeliness of this special White House mission.



Dear Bill:

I thought you might be interested to know that the new President of Lebanon is a close friend of Senator Samir Zakhem. President Gemayel asked Senator Zakhem to come to see him while he is in Washington. Their families are old friends.

Senator Zakhem has a doctorate in Political Science. He was a professor of Political Science at the University of Colorado and the University of Denver. As the person who directed his graduate work at the University of Colorado, I would like to suggest that Senator Zakhem's talents could be used at this stage in Lebanon. He originally came from Lebanon and knows all the top officials of that country. Because of his close relationship with President Gemayel, Senator Zakhem could be at least as helpful as Ambassador Habib. He is a very patriotic American citizen. Furthermore, Senator Zakhem literally did more campaigning for President Reagan in Colorado than anybody else with the possible exception of Joe Coors. I think it would be appropriate to invite Senator Zakhem to a dinner for President Gemayel.
