The Reagan administration is struggling determinedly to get all foreign troops out of Lebanon and restore that country's sovereignty, but it may be overlooking a useful tool: the United Nations.

: So far the United States-brokered agreement between Beirut and Jerusalem for the withdrawal of Israeli troops has been stymied by Syria's stubborn refusal to pull out its forces. President Reagan's special envoy, Bobert McFarlane, has shuttled among Israel, Lebanon, Syria, Saudi Arabia and Jordan without making noticeable progress in getting Syrian dictator Hafez Assad to withdraw his army.

It is unacceptable that Assad should have a veto over peace between Israel and Lebanon and over President Amin Gemayel's efforts to govern his own country.

Instead of sending McFarlane back

for another hat-in-hand visit to Damascus, Reagan should urge Gemayel formally to request Syria to remove its forces, and the United States should back the move openly.

When Assad refuses, as he will, Lebanon and the United States should ask the U.N. Security Council to brand Syria as an occupying power in Lebanon and demand its departure.

The Soviet Union might veto such a resolution on behalf of its Syrian client, but that wouldn't end the matter. The case could then be made in the General Assembly, where there is no veto and much sympathy for Lebanon.

The General Assembly might put enough pressure on Assad to convince him that his ambitions in Lebanon are not worth their price in international opprobrium. It is a strategy that deserves a try. 3

Dear Senator Byrd:

I have been asked to reply to your earlier letter to the President concerning the application of the War Powers Resolution to the continued presence of United States Armed Forces in Lebanon

We believe that the Administration has, throughout the period of the deployment of our forces in Lebanon, acted in a manner fully consistent with the War Powers Resolution. The President reported in writing to the Congress, consistent with Section 4 of the Resolution, on September 29, 1982 when our forces were first introduced, and again on August 30 of this year when the recent round of fighting began. We have consulted frequently with the Congress, and kept the Congress fully informed on this situation as it has developed.

We hope that the adoption of the Multinational Force in Lebanon Resolution, together with the recently concluded ceasefire and the initiation of the process of national political reconciliation, will now make it possible for us to make progress toward the achievement of the goals shared by Congress and the Administration with respect to Lebanon.

Dear Mr. President:

Your report to the Congress yesterday concerning this week's tragic events in Lebanon gives cause for grave concern. These events are redefining the role of the multinational peacekeeping force, and United States participation in that effort. Sectarian violence in that sad country now threatens to rekindle total civil war. The continued presence of Syrian troops further undermines the prospects for peace and stability. In your letter to the Senate of September 29, 1982, you expressed the belief that American Armed Forces "will be needed only for a limited period." Nearly a year later, I am convinced that the increased violence and danger to American personnel require a reassessment of the situation.

American forces are clearly involved in hostilities within the meaning of Section 4(a)(l) of the War Powers Resolution. Accordingly, I urge that you re-submit notification pursuant to that provision. This will assure the fullest possible cooperation between the Legislative and Executive branches in this important area of international security. As I said in my letter to you of July 14, 1982, we must have a very clear understanding about the nature of United States involvement and the limitations on that involvement.

Your letter does not contain any information about whether or not there is any probability that additional U.S. combat personnel may be needed in the future to augment our present military commitment. To assure that Members of Congress participate in the foreign policy responsibilities assigned by the Constitution, I call your attention to the need for full and timely consultation, as required by Section 3 of the War Powers Resolution. These consultations must not be restricted to notice and reportage, but should involve the Congress in the difficult and crucial decisions that must be made when American Armed Forces are exposed to hazards of war. Any decision to supplement the American contingent in Lebanon requires seeking the advice of Congress to assure the support of the Congress and of the American people. I know you share my concern and sadness at the recent turn of events in Lebanon. I remain hopeful that the United States may play a role in achieving a lasting and stable peace in that country, and in the region.

Dear Mr. President:

Last June, I introduced House Joint Resolution 298, which would in effect require a review of the United States military commitment in Lebanon. It was clear to me that sooner or later, our forces would be subject to attack, and that it would be best for the national interest either that Congress would assent to the mission of the Marines in Lebanon, or that those forces be removed before any combat took place. The situation then plainly was subject to the War Powers Resolution, and now, given recent events, application of the Resolution cannot any longer be evaded.

The Resolution specifies that when in the absence of a declaration of war, members of the United States Armed Forces are introduced into hostilities, or even if such forces enter a foreign territory "equipped for combat" (except for training purposes), or if existing commitments are enlarged, such deployments are limited to 60 days, unless Congress declares war or grants an extension of time.

The facts are that our Marines are in a hostile area; they are not only subject to attack, but have been attacked. Our forces are equipped for combat; and you have just ordered substantial additional forces to stand by off the coast of Lebanon. These circumstances each fit precisely the letter and intent of Section 4 of the War Powers Resolution. The semantic evasions of the Secretary of State do not change the facts, nor relieve the Administration of its clear obligation to comply with the Resolution. The President Page 2

Thoughtful observers throughout the country are calling for a fresh evaluation of the Lebanon adventure. Not only is it clear that the passage of a year's military presence has failed to secure peace in that troubled country, the situation now is more tangled than ever. Syria is intransigent; Israel is consolidating its positions in Lebanon; United States mediation efforts are rebuffed; and renewed fighting by Lebanese factions shows that their arms supply is replenished, their ardor to kill other Lebanese undiminished. In these conditions, it is not only prudent, but absolutely necessary, to ask what the further risk of our young men can accomplish, what our interests are, and whether or not change in policy are warranted. Your compliance with the War Powers Resolution would make such a needed evaluation possible.

The purpose of the Resolution is to preserve the Constitutional prerogative of Congress with respect to the war power. But it is also to ensure that this country does not become entangled in endless, hopeless military adventures that cost vast amounts of life and treasure in causes that American people neither understand nor support. It may well be that there is a case for the continuing the mission of our forces in Lebanon; but that case has yet to be made, and the need for review is urgent. That is why I asked for a review of the situation, through consideration of House Resolution 298, even before blood was spilled. Any fair reading of the law now makes clear that such a review is mandatory, and I urge that you cease the evasions of the past few days, and make a straightforward report to the Congress as required by law, so that the American people can have a fair opportunity to know what our forces are doing, what their mission is, what the cost may be, and whether there is credible evidence to support continuation of existing policy in light of events and circumstances that have transpired in the months since the Marines landed in Lebanon. The law is clear on this matter, and your compliance with it would be the best course for the country

Dear Mr. Merhi:

I am replying to your mailgram to President Reagan regarding Lebanon's Druze community. We understand your concerns in this issue. I regret the delay in this response.

As you know, the main objectives of U.S. policy toward Lebanon are the departure of all external forces and Lebanese Government recovery of full authority over its entire territory. To these ends we participated in negotiations for the departure of Israeli forces from Lebanon and we are supporting Lebanese authorities in their efforts to arrange for the departure of Syrian and Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) forces. We believe this policy offers the best hope for peace in Lebanon and of security, justice, and equality for all Lebanese citizens.

Nothing could be more destructive of Lebanon and Lebanese hope for the future than continued sectarian strife, as typified by that in the Shouf area. For this reason, we have consistently deplored intercommunal violence and continually urged all Lebanese parties to engage in a process of national reconciliation.

We believe that our efforts, together with those of friendly governments, to help Lebanon rid itself of foreign forces and establish its authority, hold the best hope for the future security and welfare of the various communities which make up Lebanon, including the Druze. Please be assured that we will continue to follow the situation closely.

Dear Mr. Dick:

I am replying to your telegram to President Reagan concerning U.S. policy toward Lebanon.

The main objectives of U.S. policy are the departure of all external forces and Lebanese Government recovery of full control over its entire territory. To these ends we participated in negotiations for the departure of Israeli forces from Lebanon and we are working with the Lebanese authorities to arrange for the departure of Syrian and Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) forces.

In order to help make the Lebanese Government capable of exercising authority over the whole country, including territory to be evacuated by external forces, the United States is contributing to an accelerated effort to expand, equip, and train the Lebanese Armed Forces. While this task is underway, U.S. Marines and forces from France, Italy, and Great Britain are stationed in the Beirut area as a Multinational Force (MNF). This international military presence is to contribute to Lebanon's stability and thereby facilitate the establishment of effective central government control where it had previously been lacking.

The Administration is concerned by the heavy Soviet rearming of the Syrians, and we have made our views known to both the Syrian and Soviet Governments, particularly with regard to the introduction of the Soviet SA-5 surface-to-air missile into Syria. This long range weapon, which could hit airborne targets over Jordan, Israel, Lebanon, and the eastern Mediterranean, where our own military aircraft operate in support of the U.S. Marine contingent of the MNF, represents a new and destabilizing element in an already volatile military situation. We have also warned Syria of the dangers inherent in provocative movements or reinforcements of their forces in Lebanon.

The United States has remained deeply committed to Israel's security and well-being since the creation of Israel in 1948, in which the United States played a key supporting role. President Reagan is aware of the danger posed to Israel by increasing Soviet arms supplies to Syria, and has committed the United States to maintaining Israel's qualitative edge in the regional military balance. The President's decision to release technology for the Lavi Fighter and to notify Congress of our intent to go



ahead with with the sale of F-16s to Israel was a reaffirmation of this policy. Our substantial economic and technological assi-tance to Israel further strengthens its position in the Middle East and underscores the breadth and depth of our relationship.

The tragic sequence of events in Lebanon highlights the urgency of resolving the larger Arab-Israeli conflict. On September 1, 1982, President Reagan outlined an initiative which recognizes the legitimate rights and just requirements of the Palestinian people and ensures the security of Israel. The United States can play a major role in seeking to expand negotiations under the Camp David framework to include the Palestinians and those Arab states prepared to pursue the cause of peace through negotiations. Support for the President's initiative will be important as we work to end the cycle of violence in the Middle East.

Dear Mr. Schieber:

Your recent mailgram to the President urging, inter alia, that the United States exert pressure on Israel to withdraw its forces from Lebanon has been referred to this office for reply.

The main objectives of U.S. policy with regard to Lebanon are the departure of all external forces and Lebanese Government recovery of full control over its entire territory. To these ends we participated in negotiating the May 17 agreement between Israel and Lebanon that provides for the withdrawal of Israeli troops. As you no doubt are aware, it was envisaged that such a move on Israel's part would be reciprocated in the same timeframe by the other parties concerned. Unfortunately, Syria, for its part, has made it clear that it has no intention of following through on its earlier public indications to remove its forces along with Israel's.

The President is determined to resolve the situation in Lebanon as a matter of the greatest urgency. His personal Middle East envoy, Ambassador McFarlane, is now in the region working on a negotiated settlement. It remains our hope that a way can be found to faciliate the withdrawal of all foreign forces -- those belonging to Syria and the PLO as well as Israel -- so that Lebanese sovereignty can be fully restored.

Dear Archbishop Saliba:

I am replying to your message to Ms. Whittlesey concerning U.S. policy toward Lebanon. I regret the delay in this response.

Nothing could be more destructive of Lebanon and Lebanese hope for the future than continued sectarian strife, as typified by that in the Shouf area. For this reason, we have consistently deplored intercommunal violence and continually urged all Lebanese parties to engage in a process of national reconciliation.

We believe that our efforts, together with those of friendly governments, to help Lebanon rid itself of foreign forces and establish its authority, hold the best hope for the future security and welfare of the various communities which make up Lebanon, including the Druze. Please be assured that we will continue to follow the situation closely.

The United States can be justly proud of our forces and the important role they are playing to achieve security for the Lebanese people. The role of the U.S. Marines concerns us too, and it is important to remember they are part of a larger multinational force (MNF). Our allies in the MNF the British, French, and Italians - share our fundamental goals in Lebanon. Committed to a strong Lebanon, we are supporting the constitutionally elected government.

In order to help make the Lebanese Government capable of exercising authority over the whole country, including territory to be evacuated by external forces, the United States is contributing to an accelerated effort to expand, equip, and train the Lebanese Armed Forces. While this task is underway, at Lebanon's request, the MNF is stationed in the Beirut area. This international military presence contributes to Lebanon's stability and thereby facilitates the establishment of effective central government control where it had previously been lacking. The MNF provides great psychological support for the Lebanese Government and its armed forces, besides contributing to the greater security of Beirut.

Archbishop Philip Saliba, Primate, Antiochian Orthodox Christian, Archdiocese of North America, 358 Mountain Road, Englewood, New Jersey #7631. The decision to respond positively to the Lebanese request for U.S. forces was not made lightly. Nowever, the United States has a clear interest in achieving peace in the Middle East, and a sovereign, unified Lebanon, free of external forces, is part of the equation. Because the restoration and reconstruction of Lebanon is important for the future of the Middle East, the premise under which the MNF was deployed to Beirut remains valid. President Reagan is determined to take every possible measure to defend our contingent. We increased our offshore number of Maval and Marine forces in the area, and the former have taken direct action to protect our forces in Beirut.

While saddened by the casualties suffered by our Marines and the other MNF forces, we also recognize that their presence in Lebanon has been the crucial factor in providing an opportunity for the return to normality for that strife-torn land. The Lebanese Armed Forces are performing better than some had predicted. The rebuilt Lebanese Armed Forces have successfully carried out their duties in defending the national government, which is an important development and may mean that at long last the Lebanese can begin the process of national reconciliation.

Lebanon thrived for many years because political rivalries were overcome and a delicate balance was maintained. We hope to work constructively with all the Lebanese to make a better future.
