SUBJECT: Soviet Response on Maritime Boundary and Other Issues

On the margins of Assistant Secretary Burt's lunch January 11 for the Soviet CBM delegation, Soviet Minister-Counselor Isakov gave us a non-paper in which the Soviets agreed to our proposal "to conduct negotiations" on the 1867 Convention Line in the Bering Sea. The Soviets proposed that technical-level negotiations begin in Washington following the conclusion January 27 of a previously-scheduled working-group meeting on Antarctic resources. Regarding the substance of the U.S. proposal for a 50-50 split of the area of difference, Isakov stated informally that the U.S. proposal seemed the only way to go and that if the Soviet side had accepted negotiations, it was not in order to make difficulties.

We will inform the Soviet Embassy very shortly of our acceptance of their proposal. At the negotiations, we intend to present a detailed proposal to the Soviet side on how we undertake to split the difference in the area of our overlapping claims, which we will coordinate with other concerned agencies.

During the lunch Ambassador Dobrynin mentioned that he believed Gromyko would be able to give the Secretary a concrete answer on resuming MBFR talks and the implication was that the answer would be yes. On START, he was more ambiguous and on INF, he took the standard Soviet stance that our present position provides no basis for a return to negotiations. While saying that there is a foul mood in Moscow, Dobrynin strongly asserted that the Soviets are prepared to respond to serious proposals in START or other arms control areas.

Subject: Letter From Avital Shcharanskiy to the President

Avital Shcharanskiy, Anatoliy Shcharanskiy's wife, has written to President Reagan to urge that he consider exchanging her husband for a recently captured East German counter-intelligence The letter came to us via Chaim Herzog and the Israeli Ambassador to the United States.

As you will recall, the White House recently approved our request that Ambassador Hartman be authorized to respond verbally to a letter from Anatoliy's mother to the President (Tab A). concern was that the President not go on record in a letter that might become public and we have the same reservation in this case. We suggest that instead of a written response, we call Avital and suggest that she meet with Deputy Assistant Secretary Mark Palmer, who has met with her a number of times (most recently in Stockholm), the next time she is in Washington.

In fact, the ideas which Mrs. Shcharanskiy raised in her letter to the President written on November 11, 1983 were discussed in her meeting with Mr. Palmer on January 18th. satisfied that our approach is the correct one. If you approve of this course of action, we suggest that we inform the Israeli Embassy of our latest conversation with Mrs. Shcharanskiy and that we will remain in close touch with her.

Ida Milgrom, the mother of Soviet prisoner of conscience Anatoliy Shcharanskiy, has written to President Reagan to express her shock at what she perceives as our having reneged on our commitment to secure the release of her son before agreeing to the Madrid Concluding Document. In her letter, which was transmitted telegraphically from Moscow (copy attached), she asks for the President's continued help to secure her son's release. She has made a similar appeal to the CDE delegation in Helsinki.

In two separate meetings over the summer between the Secretary and Anatoliy Shcharanskiy's wife, Avital, and between Under Secretary Eagleburger and Mrs. Shcharanskiy, she was told that in the context of the Madrid meetings we were putting pressure on the Soviet Government to release a number of political prisoners, including her husband. She was told that the Soviets had responded that they might consider releasing Shcharanskiy if he applied for a reduced sentence on grounds of ill health, but the Secretary cautioned Avital against becoming overly-optimistic. In July, several weeks before we agreed to the Madrid Concluding Document, Anatoliy decided against requesting an early release. Now the Soviets are saying that we either never had such an understanding, or that the conversations about an early release which took place between our Madrid negotiator and theirs were not authorized by the Soviet Government.

An attempt should be made to correct Mrs. Milgrom's apparent misunderstanding regarding the Madrid Accords, but because her concerns focus on the Kampelman-Kondrashev conversations in Madrid, we feel that it is preferable not to go on record in a letter that might become public. We suggest instead that Ambassador Hartman be instructed to meet with Mrs. Milgrom to assure her that the President remains committed to obtaining her son's release. Since Mrs. Milgrom has just had one of her infrequent meetings with Anatoliy, such a meeting would be particularly timely and would enable us to get her first-hand impressions of his situation.

The Secretary has approved this course of action.

Ida Milgrom, mother of Anatoly Shcharansky, has written the President to express her shock at what she perceives as our having reneged on a promise not to conclude the Madrid review conference on the CSCE without agreement for the release of her son. (There was no such commitment, of course.)

State believes that Mrs. Milgrom's letter should be answered verbally by Ambassador Hartman, so that there not be a letter which could become public. Accordingly, a message will be sent to Embassy Moscow with appropriate instructions.

I believe that the State recommendation represents an appropriate course of action. State's Memo and the message containing Mrs. Milgrom's letter is at Tab I.

Subject: Ida Milgrom's Appeal to the President

Ida Milgrom, the mother of Soviet prisoner of conscience Anatoliy Shcharanskiy, has written to President Reagan to express her shock at what she perceives as our having reneged on our commitment to secure the release of her son before agreeing to the Madrid Concluding Document. In her letter, which was transmitted telegraphically from Moscow (copy attached), she asks for the President's continued help to secure her son's release. She has made a similar appeal to the CDE delegation in Helsinki.

In two separate meetings over the summer between the Secretary and Anatoliy Shcharanskiy's wife, Avital, and between Under Secretary Eagleburger and Mrs. Shcharanskiy, she was told that in the context of the Madrid meetings we were putting pressure on the Soviet Government to release a number of political prisoners, including her husband. She was told that the Soviets had responded that they might consider releasing Shcharanskiy if he applied for a reduced sentence on grounds of ill health, but the Secretary cautioned Avital against becoming overly-optimistic. In July, several weeks before we agreed to the Madrid Concluding Document, Anatoliy decided against requesting an early release. Now the Soviets are saying that we either never had such an understanding, or that the conversations about an early release which took place between our Madrid negotiator and theirs were not authorized by the Soviet Government.

An attempt should be made to correct Mrs. Milgrom's apparent misunderstanding regarding the Madrid Accords, but because her concerns focus on the Kampelman-Kondrashev conversations in Madrid, we feel that it is preferable not to go on record in a letter that might become public. We suggest instead that Ambassador Hartman be instructed to meet with Mrs. Milgrom to assure her that the President remains committed to obtaining her son's release. Since Mrs. Milgrom has just had one of her infrequent meetings with Anatoliy, such a meeting would be particularly timely and would enable us to get her first-hand impressions of his situation.

The Secretary has approved this course of action.

1. S - ENTIRE TEXT.

AMBASSADOR REQUESTED SEEK APPOINTMENT AT APPROPRIATE LEVEL AT MFA TO DISCUSS PRESENT SITUATION IN SOUTHERN AFRICA. (FYI ONLY: YOU SHOULD BE AWARE THAT SOVIETS HAVE APPROACHED SOUTH AFRICA DIRECTLY ON ANGOLA, AND THAT WE SEE ADVANTAGE TO RENEWING BILATERAL CONTACT ON SOUTHERN AFRICA FOR THIS AND OTHER REASONS. ZIHT TA POINT, WE INTEND THAT THE SECRETARY OFFER GROMYKO JANUARY 18 AT STOCKHOLM THE POSSIBILITY OF A SUBSEQUENT IN-DEPTH MEETING BETWEEN AF ASSISTANT SECRETARY CROCKER AND APPROPRIATE SOVIET INTERLOCUTOR ON SOUTHERN AFRICA. SUCH A SESSION WOULD BE IN THE SERIES OF 1982 NEW YORK (JUNE) . GENEVA (SEPTEMBER) . AND MOSCOW (DECEMBER) MEETINGS ON THAT TOPIC: WE WOULD INTEND IT TO BE AN EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION ON POSITIONS AND PROBE OF SOVIET STATE OF THINKING IN CURRENT CONTEXT OF HEIGHTENED VIOLENCE. WHICH MAY BE MAKING SOVIETS LESS COMPLACENT ... IN REALITY, WHATEVER THEIR DOCTRINAL-DIPLOMATIC SMUG--MESS IN NEW YORK. YOUR APPROACH WOULD BE THE OPENING AGUND OF THIS EXCHANGE AND PROBE. END FYI) SUGGESTED ---TALKING POINTS FOLLOW.

A. AS YOU ARE AWARE, ON DECEMBER 15 SOUTH AFRICA MADE TO THE UN SECRETARY GENERAL AN OFFER TO WITHDRAW ITS FORCES FROM ANGOLA SWHICH HAVE BEEN PRESENT THERE SINCE 1981) FOR THIRTY DAYS BEGINNING JANUARY 31 ON THE CONDITION THAT SWAPO, CUBAN, AND ANGOLAN FORCES NOT TALE ADVANTAGE OF THAT WITHDRAWAL SREF A3.

E. ALTHOUGH SOUTH AFRICA MADE THIS OFFER FOR ITS OWN REASONS, AS IT IS INCLINED TO DO, IT IS NONETHELESS TRUE THAT WE HAD URGED IT TO TAKE THIS ACTION AT A MEETING ASSISTANT SECRETARY CROCKER HAD WITH SOUTH AFRICAN FOREIGN MINISTER PIK BOTHA IN ROME DECEMBER 5.

C. WE HAD ENCOURAGED SOUTH AFRICA TO TAKE THIS STEP IN AN EFFORT TO MOVE FORWARD THE NEGOTIATIONS TOWARD NAMIBIAN INDEPENDENCE THROUGH IMPLEMENTATION OF UNSCR.

D. WE HAD ENCOURAGED SOUTH AFRICA TO DO SO ALSO MINDFUL OF THE POINTS OF CONCERN SET OUT BY ANGOLAN PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS IN HIS SPEECH OF AUGUST 26. THOSE POINTS INCLUDED SOUTH AFRICAN WITHDRAWAL FROM ANGOLA. IMPLEMENTATION OF 435, AN END OF AID TO UNITA, AND A CESSATION OF SOUTH AFRICAN AGGRESSION AGAINST ANGOLA.

E. ANGOLA HAS RESPONDED TO THE SOUTH AFRICAN OFFER IN A LETTER FROM PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS TO UN SECRETARY GENERAL PEREZ DE CUELLAR OF DECEMBER 31 {REF B}.

F. THE SOUTH AFRICAN AND ANGOLAN MESSAGES INDICATE TO US WILLINGNESS ON THE PART OF BOTH SIDES TO ADDRESS THEMSELVES CONSTRUCTIVELY TO THE ISSUES RAISED IN THE AUGUST 26 SPEECH.

G. AS WE READ PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS' RESPONSE, IT APPEARS TO US THAT ANGOLA ALSO ACCEPTS A DISENGAGEMENT OF FORCES BEGINNING JANUARY 31 PROVIDED THAT (1) THE SECRETARY GENERAL CAN OBTAIN THE AGREEMENT OF SWAPO, (2) SOUTH AFRICA ACTUALLY DOES WITHDRAW ITS FORCES FROM ANGOLA, AND (3) SOUTH AFRICA PROMISES TO INITIATE IMPLEMENTATION OF UNSCR 435 WITHIN FIFTEEN DAYS AFTER THE INITIAL 30-DAY TRUCE TO BEGIN FEBRUARY 1, I.E., BY

LEVELOPMENTS THERE HAS GROWN PROPORTIONATELY.

HE HAVE TAKEN NOTE OF SEVERAL SOVIET ACTIONS WITH HE SPECT TO RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA WHICH LEAD TO AN OVERALL IMPRESSION THAT WE HAVE OF SOVIET FOLICY IN THAT REGION. WE HAVE NOTED THE MESSAGE YOU SELIVERED TO THE SOUTH AFRICAN GOVERNMENT IN NEW YORK. WE HAVE BEEN MADE AWARE OF THE INCREASE BOTH IN THE AMOUNT AND SUPPLISTICATION OF WEAPONS THAT YOU HAVE SUPPLIED TO THE MPLA GOVERNMENT IN ANGOLA OVER THE PAST YEAR. WE ASSUME THAT YOUR INFLUENCE OVER MILITARY

I. WHAT WE ARE WONDERING NOW IS IF THAT IS THE ONLY CONTRIBUTION THAT THE SOVIET UNION IS ABLE AND WILLING TO MAKE TO DEVELOPMENTS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA. WHAT IS THE SOVIET UNION PREPARED TO CONTRIBUTE TOWARD ACHIEVING A REDUCTION OF TENSION IN THE REGION? IS IT FOULT THAT THE SOVIET UNION COULD USE ITS OBVIOUSLY CONSIDERABLE INFLUENCE WITH SWAPO AND THE MPLA GOVERNMENT TO BRING ABOUT MILITARY RESTRAINT UNDER CONDITIONS THAT WOULD PROTECT THE LEGITIMATE INTERESTS OF ALL THE PARTIES? 5. SOVIET POINT: SOUTH AFRICA FOLLOWED UP ITS DECEMBER 15 PROPOSAL BY STEPPING UP ITS MILITARY ACTIVITY WITHIN ANGOLA. HOW CAN YOU THEN THINK THAT ANYTHING USEFUL CAN COME FROM ITS PROPOSAL?

U.S. RESPONSE: SOUTH AFRICA REMAINS CONCERNED ABOUT THE THREAT THAT SWAPO PRESENTS TO NAMIBIA. WE HAVE NEVER AGREED THAT IT HAD ANY RIGHT TO CARRY OUT MILITARY ACTION IN ANGOLA OR TO OCCUPY ONE SQUARE CENTIMETER OF ANGOLAN TERRITORY. AT THE SAME TIME, THERE IS NO INCONSISTENCY BETWEEN SOUTH AFRICA OFFERING IN GOOD FAITH TO WITHDRAW FROM ANGOLA BUT TRYING BEFORE HAVING TO MAKE GOOD ON THAT OFFER TO RENDER SWAPO INCAPABLE OF CAPRYING OUT AN OFFENSIVE IN NAMIBIA DURING THE TRUCE. IN SHORT, AL BELIEVE THE SOUTH AFRICAN OFFER IS SERIOUS AND INCAPABLE OF CAPRYING THAT CAN BE WORKED WITH.

L. SOVIET POINT: HAVE YOU DISCUSSED THIS MATTER
DIMECTLY WITH THE ANGOLANS? WHY ARE YOU COMING TO US?
WE DON'T CONTROL THE ANGOLANS. {POSSIBLE REAL SOVIET
GUESTION: DO WE -- THE SOVIETS -- HAVE THE MPLA'S
INTACTS WITH THE U.S. UNDER CONTROL!}

G.S. RESPONSE: GIVEN THE IMPORTANCE THAT WE ATTACH TO THESE TWO DEVELOPMENTS -- THE SOUTH AFRICAN DECEMBER 15 PROPOSAL AND THE ANGOLAN DECEMBER 31 RESPONSE -- WE ARE ENDEAVORING TO PURSUE THE OPPORTUNITY PRESENTED BY THE EXCHANGE THROUGH CONTACT WITH ALL PARTIES. (IF SPECIFICALLY ASXED. NO FORMAL MEETING IS SCHEDULED AS YET WITH THE ANGOLANS ALTHOUGH WE ARE IN CONTACT WITH THEM.)

P. SOVIET QUESTION: IS SOUTH AFRICA GOING TO AGREE TO ANGOLA'S CONDITIONS, AS SET FORTH IN THE DECEMBER BY DOS SANTOS/PEREZ DE CUELLAR LETTERY IF YOU REALLY WANT HAS TO BE IMPLEMENTED, YOU SHOULD PUSH THEM TO DO IT. WE THOUGHT THAT WAS THE BASIS OF CONSTRUCTIVE ENGAGEMENT.

U.S. RESPONSE: LOOKING AT THIS EXCHANGE BETWEEN SOUTH AFPICA AND ANGOLA AS PART OF AN EVOLVING NEGOTIATION, IT APPEARS TO US THAT NEITHER THE DECEMBER IS SOUTH AFRICAN STATEMENT NOR THE DECEMBER IN ANGOLAN STATEMENT ARE ADEQUATE IN THEMSELVES TO BRING THE MATTER TO A SUCCESSFUL CONCLUSION. AT THE SAME TIME, IT APPEARS TO US THAT THERE IS POTENTIAL FOR PROGRESS IN BOTH STATE—MENTS. THAT WE ARE PREPARED TO EXPLORE WITH ALL PARTIES.

6. FYI ONLY: ALTHOUGH WE PLAN -- WITH THE SOVIETS AND WITH OTHER PARTIES -- TO TREAT SERIOUSLY THE NEGOTIATIONS, THE ANGOLAN CONDITIONS AS THEY ARE PRESENTED IN 102 SANTOS' DECEMBER 31 MESSAGE TO PEREZ DE CUELLAR, IT IS NONETHELESS THE CASE THAT THEY ARE FOR THE MOST PART UPDE AND CANNOT BE MET. IT IS ALSO IMPORTANT TO BEAR IN TIAT IN YOUR EXCHANGE THAT THERE IS, OF COURSE, NO GLESTICN OF MOVING TO IMPLEMENTATION OF MAS WITH NOTHING ON CUBAN TROOP WITHDRAWAL. END FYI.

Dear Tom and Terry:

Thank you for your letter of February 29, recounting your recent efforts in regard to your peace initiative.

As I wrote you on February 7, you are certainly to be commended for your tireless and imaginative work on the problem of eliminating war between nations.

I have been attempting for some time to put our relations on a more positive track with the Soviet Union by discussing a wide range of concrete steps which we both could take to diminish the threat of war. As I wrote you before, I believe that some of these steps must be achieved before a proposal such as yours could be realistically considered.

Up to now, unfortunately, the Soviets have not been cooperative in addressing most of the problems between us. Therefore, we must persevere in our efforts to concentrate attention on these concrete issues.

For this reason, I believe it is still premature to consider a general initiative of the sort you are proposing. Since it is important that other governments not misunderstand our position, you should make it clear in any future activities that the United States Government did not solicit your proposal and does not sponsor it. The United States Government is of course sympathetic to the purposes of the plan and its content.

I hope that, if our current efforts bear fruit, conditions will change sufficiently to make your plan a practical possibility.

Dear Tom and Terry:

Thank you for calling to my attention your proposal entitled "Taking the Essential Step Now to End War between Nations in Our Lifetime."

I think you are to be commended for the imagination and hard work which went into developing this proposal. I know that it required considerable personal sacrifice on your part and I admire your faith in the possibility of reaching out to the humane instincts which God has given every human being.

But in considering your proposal, I must give careful thought to how Chairman Andropov is likely to interpret it. The fact is that when I called for an expansion of our dialogue in an effort to solve problems between us, the Soviets charged me with political grandstanding and ill intentions. Now, I'm not going to give up on my effort to engage the Soviets in an intensive problem-solving dialogue. That effort is going forward, and I hope it will bring some concrete results soon. I fear that if I endorse your proposal at this time, the Soviets would interpret it as a ruse, to get off our problem-solving agenda. I know that this is not your intent, but feel that the Soviets are likely to view it that way.

Tom and Terry, your selfless efforts to promote peace provide another wonderful example of what I have always said makes America great: the dedication of our people to contribute their time and talents to making the world a better place. I

hope that the time will soon come when proposals such as yours can be accepted by our adversaries in the true spirit in which they are offered. It is my goal to bring us to that point.

#### Bud:

Your responses through Wilma have really served in keeping the initiative private and effective. Thank you. As you probably know, we believe it has now been delivered to all three leaders, as Bill met with Tikhonov this week.

We have enclosed a letter to the President acknowledging his earlier response, as we knew you would arrange the most fitting delivery. As we have not yet received responses from Deng or Chernenko, we have not shared the President's thoughts. We have recast them slightly in our return letter believing it provides greater clarity. If any of this is inaccurate or inappropriate, please let us know.

We want to make sure now that the President has seen that the commitment to accomplish the result as an essential step in accomplishing it. Our conviction is that the declaration will create the necessary shift in attitude and will allow the current "agendas" to be expedited - will in fact make those items more likely to be implemented. It is complementary to whatever steps need to be taken for problem-solving dialogue. As you pointed out, the commitment is the right thing to do, even in the more limited context of establishing a level of trust and correcting current public impressions of our leaders, both here and in the Soviet Union.

Bud, we anticipate responses from the others relatively soon, and will be promptly sharing those with you, and the President's with them. Please advise us of any additional thoughts you or the President wishes conveyed.

Where the plan is now is that the document has been delivered to Deng Xiaoping. Our emissary has requested a tentative response by February 10.

We have identified the appropriate emissary to take the document to the Soviets: Bill Verity. They believe that you are familiar with him in that he has carried a few documents for President Carter and one as well for President Reagan. He is with USA-USSR Trade Council and is the former Chairman of ARMCO. No one here knows what the President will be speaking about, or why he has chosen 10:00 in the morning to do so. We have just learned that with him in the Oval Office are his wife Nancy, their children and closest friends, Vice President Bush, former Presidents Carter, Ford, and Nixon, all of the Democratic Presidential candidates, House Speaker O'Neill, and Senator Baker obviously a remarkable and historic gathering. The President is about to speak.

#### TAKING THE ESSENTIAL STEP NOW

#### TO END WAR BETWEEN NATIONS WITHIN TEN YEARS

#### A Dramatization

"My fellow Americans, today it is my privilege to report to you on the most significant turning point in human history: the time when the world has chosen to move to end war between nations...to move beyond the use or threat of mass destruction as an acceptable means of resolving our conflicts as nations. I am speaking to you at this time of day and with these other representatives of our nation because right now, simultaneously, President Andropov and representatives of the Soviet government are addressing the people of the Soviet Union, and Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping and representatives of the government of the People's Republic of China are addressing their people.

Our three nations, and in fact all nations, have vast differences. We do not embrace their forms of government; they do not embrace ours. Without being blind to the real differences between people, we know the people of all nations have common human interests. We all inhabit the planet, breathe the same air and cherish our children's future.

This growing interdependence, combined with the real and increasing threat of mutual extinction, and the contributions by millions today and throughout history toward this goal of peace, create the conditions in which the time is right, NOW, to bring forth peace between all nations. No nation, no leader alone, can produce world peace. Many have tried and it has not been achieved. For the first time in human history it is now time for the world to focus on and commit to ending war between nations.

Accordingly, in concert with President Andropov for the Soviet Union, and Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping for the People's Republic of China, and using the power here-tofore used by our Presidents to declare war, I hereby declare and commit the Unite States of America to achieving the end of war between nations within ten years, and we invite everyone in the world to join in this commitment.

Fellow Americans, peace between nations is possible now. There will be risks. We will maintain our freedom and security. It will not be easy, and with your support and that of the world's people, in the next 10 years we will develop an effective, non-violent means of resolving our conflicts as nations. We will realize conditions where war and the threat of war are obsolete as instruments of national policy.

In a few moments, President Andropov and Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping will be directly addressing you stating their countries' commitment to us and to the world, and I will be directly addressing their nations on your behalf. Then this evening will be speaking to you and a joint session of Congress about specific actions alreunderway and being taken today to produce peace between nations within ten years, a about the role each of us can play in this shared journey.

As I said last Thanksgiving, "Let us work for peace, and as we do, let us reme ber the lines of the famous hymn, 'Oh God of love, Oh King of Peace, make wars thro out the world to cease.' Thank you, good day, and God bless you."

#### President Reagan:

Thank you for your thoughts regarding the initiative, "Taking the Essential Step to End War Between Nations in Our Lifetime". There are few places in the world where such an idea could germinated and where private citizens could be privileged to play a part. We deeply appreciate your role in maintaining our freedom to quietly bring this proposal forward for Americans and for the world.

We greatly respect your conservatism in not endorsing the idea prior to its delivery to Deng and Secretary Chernenko. It is very much in keeping with your concern, which we share, about a potential negative characterization of the plan by one of the other two. We sense that to have the idea presented as any country's official proposal would raise the same suspicions. Accordingly, the idea is being presented to you, Deng and Chernenko for exactly what it is, a peoples' initiative by private American citizens, not as a proposal of the United States Government.

As we have not yet received a response from the other two leaders, (we believe delivery was completed this week) we have not shared your response with them. We interpret your letter to indicate your interest in pursuing the idea, as a private initiative, another step if the others are, given all of the procedures are followed.

We met with Ambassador Matlock on 2-21 regarding this initiative's potential impact on other agendas and have corresponded with Bud McFarlane on that same subject. As you pointed out, problem-solving dialogue is what is needed, and this first dramatic and safe step of declaring our joint commitment will enhance the probability of such dialogue being effective in producing the result we all want.

If our interpretation of your response is in any way in error, please let us know. Otherwise, we will inform you promptly through Bud, of the other responses when they are received.

God bless you for your contribution to a safer world for all.

Dear Tom and Terry:

Thank you for your letter of February 29, recounting your recent efforts in regard to your peace initiative.

As I wrote you on February 7, you are certainly to be commended for your tireless and imaginative work on the problem of eliminating war between nations.

I have been attempting for some time to put our relations on a more positive track with the Soviet Union by discussing a wide range of concrete steps which we both could take to diminish the threat of war. As I wrote you before, I believe that some of these steps must be achieved before a proposal such as yours could be realistically considered.

Up to now, unfortunately, the Soviets have not been cooperative in addressing most of the problems between us. Therefore, we must persevere in our efforts to concentrate attention on these concrete issues.

For this reason, I believe it is still premature to consider a general initiative of the sort you are proposing. I hope that, if our current efforts bear fruit, conditions will change sufficiently to make it a practical possibility.
