STATEMENT BY ROBERT MCFARLANE

MR. McFARLANE: As a result of exchanges in the past eight weeks between President Reagan and Chairman Chernenko of the Soviet Union, I am pleased to inform you today that the United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to enter into new arms control negotiations.

The Soviet Union joins us in making the following announcement at this time: The United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to enter into new negotiations with the objective of reaching mutually acceptable agreements on the whole range of questions concerning nuclear and outer space arms. In order to reach a common understanding as to the subject and objectives of such negotiations, Secretary of State, George P. Shultz and Foreign Minister Andrey A. Gromyko will meet in Geneva on January 7th and 9th, 1985.

When I advised the President of tentative agreement this past Monday in Santa Barbara, he commented that, "This is good news. It is the first step on what will be a long and difficult road; but the world is depending on us. I want you to get back to Washington and speed up the work necessary to prepare our position."

The announcement today stems from the President's personal efforts culminating in the proposal made in September that the United States and the Soviet Union renew talks aimed at a reduction of nuclear weapons.

Since that time, discussions between ourselves and the Soviet Union in private channels have advanced understanding of the scope and priorities of such a process.

As these exchanges have proceeded during the past eight weeks, the President has personally provided guidance in more than half a dozen meetings, which have included the Secretary of State, Secretary of Defense and others, and has led to the announcement we make today.

The President has informed his counterparts in allied countries. The Congressional leadership has also been informed in advance.

The President will continue his efforts to strengthen and consolidate bipartisan Congressional support, which is so essential if we are to negotiate effective arms reductions.

We have consistently taken the position that reducing nuclear weapons must be the most important objective facing both countries. And we are ready for genuine give and take with the Soviet Union with the purpose of reaching concrete agreements.

We've continued our preparations over the course of the past year. And we enter the talks in January in the spirit of honest compromise and getting results.





AGREEMENT

- 1. INITIAL SOVIET REACTION TO THE AGREEMENT TO BEGIN NEW ARMS CONTROL NEGOTIATIONS HAS BEEN LIMITED TO PROMINENT REPORTS OF THE JOINT ANNOUNCEMENT. THE TEXT IS BEING READ ON THE RADIO NEWS AND PRAVDA CARRIED IT JANUARY 9. ALTHOUGH ON AN INSIDE PAGE, PRAVDA GAVE THE ARTICLE PROMINENCE BY PLACING IT UNDER A PICTURE OF A NEGOTIATING SESSION. SUCH PICTURES ARE RARE IN THE SOVIET PRESS. THE EVENING BEFORE, IZVESTIVA ALSO CARRIED A PHOTO OF SHULTZ AND GROMYKO.
- AS OF NOON, JANUARY 9 THERE HAS BEEN NO EDITORIAL COMMENT. AN ARTICLE ON THE GENEVA TALKS BY VITALIY KOBYSH IN THE JANUARY 9 ISSUE OF LITERATURNAYA GAZETA WAS CLEARLY WRITTEN BEFORE THE AGREEMENT.
- 3. COMMENT: WE EXPECT INTERPRETIVE COMMENTS IN THE NEXT 24 HOURS. THEY WILL PROBABLY SAY THAT AN IMPORTANT FIRST STEP HAS BEEN TAKEN, BUT THAT ONLY THE ACTUAL NEGOTIATIONS CAN REVEAL HOW "SERIOUS" THE UNITED STATES IS. THE FIRST AUTHORITATIVE

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REACTION TO THE TALKS MAY APPEAR IN THE REGULAR FRIDAY REPORT OF THURSDAY'S WEEKLY POLITBURO MEETING. THE SOVIETS MAY, HOWEVER, WITHHOLD A FULL-DRESS LEADERSHIP ASSESSMENT OF THE OVERALL EAST-WEST SITUATION AND PROSPECTS FOR ARMS CONTROL UNTIL THE WARSAW PACT PCC SCHEDULED TO OPEN IN SOFIA JANUARY 15. HARTMAN BT
