I. PURPOSE

To review several issues with the Republican congressional leadership.

II. BACKGROUND

The Congress continues to muddle along with many major issues still unresolved.

House action on an unacceptable farm bill will be completed this week. The Senate is expected to consider it mid-October. We want to work with Senator Helms, Senator Dole and the GOP Senate to improve the Senate version in order for the House-Senate conferees to produce a bill that you can sign. We are concerned about cost -- but we are even more concerned about putting into place better farm policy.

There has been substantial discussion about the prospects of both the House and Senate completing action on tax reform legislation this year. Senator Dole and Senator Packwood have told you that the Senate could complete action if the House passes the bill prior to November 1. We continue to push both the House and Senate to act as soon as possible. It is up to a Democratically controlled House to pass the bill before Senate Republicans have a chance to consider the legislation. Treasury has also indicated that the debt ceiling must be extended by early next week -- both the House and Senate leadership recognize how important it is for them to act in a timely fashion.

Trade continues to be a major congressional political issue. Both the House and Senate are faced with votes on the textile bill in the near future. We have been working with our GOP allies to head off these short-sighted protectionist bills. Additionally, you have taken many administrative actions to show your commitment to free and fair trade. Today you will announce your Strike Force, with Mac Baldrige as chairman.

There is substantial interest in your recent discussions with Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze and King Hussein. Congressional understanding and support for our arms control policy and Middle East policies are important. This meeting will provide an opportunity for you to update the GOP leadership on your talks with the Soviets. With a substantial number of senators and congressmen expressing concern and opposition regarding the proposed arms sales. This session will enable you to stress the importance of the arms sale and to urge leadership support.

The appropriations and reconciliation bills are not moving very rapidly, and it is very likely that the Congress will not be able to meet its savings goals as required by the Congressional Budget.

I. PURPOSE

To address the 54th General Assembly of the International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL).

II. BACKGROUND

Since 1984, INTERPOL has become the principal international entity for exchanging information on apprehending criminals involved in international terrorism. Since the INTERPOL Constitution was modified last year to permit cooperation on terrorist matters, their USG point of contact, the FBI, has benefitted from the INTERPOL network. In 1984, INTERPOL assisted in uncovering a plot against the life of Honduran President Suazo. INTERPOL is currently assisting in locating the fugitives from the Puerto Rican terrorist group that was apprehended on September 12 in San Juan. The FBI and INTERPOL are also working together in linking the law enforcement agencies involved in criminal prosecution arising from the TWA 847 hijacking.

It is customary to have the Head of State in the country which is hosting the assembly address the annual convocation.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Senior police and law enforcement officials (including Ministers of Interior and prosecutors) from 109 countries.

IV. PRESS PLAN

There will be media coverage of this event.

V. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

Good morning. I regret not being able to attend the American Magazine Conference in person, but it's good to be able to take advantage of technology to be with you in spirit.

In the spring of this year, when I spoke to your group at the White House, we were just beginning our campaign to reform our Federal tax system. As you know, it's been tough going, but we've made real progress in controlling the rate of Government spending and explaining the necessity for tax reform to the people of our country.

I am pleased to note that the American people are more aware of these complex issues than ever before. I know that magazines have taken a leading role in informing the public about the pros and cons of various issues. During your last American Magazine Conference, M.P.A.'s President, Bill Gorog [GOR-og], urged you to assume greater responsibilities in informing the public about these critical issues. I commend the American Society of Magazine Editors for their vital role in this education process. And I can only add that even though the tax reform story has been around for a year, it's gaining new angles every day. Just recently a House Committee found ours to be the most pro-family tax reform proposal. And a couple of weeks ago, the Council of Economic Advisers linked our proposals to greater economic growth and the creation of new jobs. We thank you for your comprehensive coverage of the tax reform story.

I have also been informed that the M.P.A. is about to begin a major project aimed at alerting the American people to the serious literacy problem that faces our Nation. The Awareness Project and the establishment of a volunteer fundraising effort to support teaching programs are an example of the kind of private sector leadership that I applaud. Your chairman, Jack Rehm [Ream], and the members of the M.P.A. board are to be congratulated for this unique private approach to a serious national problem.
