

Dear Dr. Allen:

I spoke recently to a member of your staff expert in European affairs regarding the elections in Greece.

A number of prominent Greek-American leaders are deeply concerned about the possibility of a Socialist victory in Greece which we believe would have a very damaging effect on the Western Alliance. While interference in the campaign by the United States would be unwise and intrusive, this group of Greek-American leaders believe that some recognition by the United State of the importance of Greece to the Western Alliance would improve the prospects for the incumbent government.

They have suggested to me a meeting with the President to urge him to undertake in the next couple of weeks the following course of action: extend an invitation to the President of Greece, Constantine Caramanlis, to visit the United States on a date after the election. We believe such an invitation would have a substantial, but subtle effect on Greek and American relations.

The group of Greek-American leaders include:

Peter Agris - Publisher of the <u>Hellenic Chronicle</u> newspaper (the largest Greek-American newspaper in New England).

George Chrisotopher - former Mayor of San Francisco and U. S. Delegate to a United Nations Commission.

Thomas Korologos - partner in Bill Timmons & Co.

Gus Koffinas - Supreme President AHEPA (the Greek-American fraternal order).

Andrew Athens - United American Hellenic Committee.

BIOGRAPHY - Nicolas Karandreas

Greece

Ambassador Nicolas Karandreas, Greek Ambassador to Switzerland and a career diplomat, has served at diplomatic posts in the United States, Europe, and Africa.

Born in Athens, Greece, in 1921, he studied at the Law School and the School of Political and Economic Sciences at the University of Athens.

Following his entry on duty with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1950, Ambassador Karandreas served as Third Secretary at the Greek Embassy in Washington (1953-56) and as Deputy Consul General at the Greek Consulate in Alexandria, Egypt. After service in the Foreign Minister's office in Athens, he headed the Greek Military Mission in Berlin (1961-64).

In 1965, Ambassador Karandreas was named Consul General in Istanbul, Turkey, and served there until 1967 when he became Deputy Director of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Directorate for Eastern European Political Affairs. In 1971 he was named Ambassador to Sudan. Posted the following year as Ambassador to Finland, he also headed the Greek delegations to the Multilateral Preparatory Talks in Helsinki and to the first stage of the ensuing Geneva Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe.

In 1974, Ambassador Karandreas became Chief of Protocol until his appointment that same year as Ambassador to the Netherlands, a position he held for three years. In 1977, he returned to Athens as Head of the Foreign Ministry's Organization Division and as Director of the Center for Diplomatic Studies. In 1981, he was named Ambassador to Switzerland.

The Ambassador is married.

A thorough search of United States Government sources reveals no grounds for objection.

Dear Mr. Mann:

It was a pleasure to speak with you over the phone regarding the possibility of my serving as a member of the negotiating team concerning U.S. bases in Greece. I want to thank you for your broad understanding of my position, and I also wish to thank Mrs. vonDamm, who, as you know, had called me earlier regarding the same subject. She too, has always been most gracious and I deeply appreciate the courtesies extended to me.

As I explained I must respectfully beg leave to abstain from this proferred honor, not because I do not wish to serve, but rather because the unpredictable schedules and the need for frequent shuttles over the Atlantic places on me certain Constraints that might impair my fullest efficiency in this responsibility.

If this were an assignment that would permit me to stay established in one location for a reasonable length of time, with perhaps a reporting trip every 3 or 4 weeks it could be handled. You may recall that at the outset of the Administration, my name had been entered for consideration as Ambassador to Greece. In view of my knowledge of the language and customs, and long standing acquaintance with the highest Greek officials I thought that I could be of some service to the United States. Should this opportunity arise again in the future, I would be pleased to discuss it with you.

Should Judge Clark, the President or your office feel that I can be of some service to the United States, I would be very happy to go to Greece for a period of a month or more if necessary to assist your negotiators in their task. I know that I would have the attention of President. Caramanlis, a staunch friend over the years, and a loyal friend of America as well.

In the past I have discussed these matters with Prime Minister Papandreou, and several former Prime Ministers of Greece, and my objective has been to sustain the traditional friendship of Greece and the United Statesas it has been nurtured over the past 160 years. There are some 3 million Greek Americans in the United States who are deeply anxious that this amicable relationship be enhanced.

Appended hereto are some thoughts that might, be of interest to you, Judge Clark and members of the negotiating team.

Please be assured of my abiding respect and highest esteem for the President who is meeting his awasome responsibilities with great courage and devotion.

Memorandum



Negotiations with Greece can be more productive if the United States can give Prime Minister Papandreou even the slightest avenue of escape from his campaign rhetoric. The Cyprus issue is one area that is very sensitive and there are methods of rectifying this controversy during the U.S. base negotiations without offense to any side.

When I last spoke with President Reagan he informed me that he was appointing a "task force" to work exclusively on the Cyprus matter. Shortly thereafter, I visited Cyprus and Greece, by official invitation of their governments. While in those countries, I related President Reagan's action, and there was great jubilation, attracting many newspaper headlines. This task force was headed by a Mr. Reginald Bartholomew. However, since then nothing has transpired and Mr. Papandreou was able to capitalize on this sensitive matter during the Greek elections. In fact the general feeling currently is that the Greek, Turkish, Cypriot situation has worsened in he last 18 months.

Since the invasion of Cyprus 8 years ago, it claimed that 2,000 persons are missing. In my several visits to Cyprus, this matter has become an increasingly sensitive complaint. Refuges continually asked me why we do not instigate a search committee etc. They say "All we want to know is whether they are dead or alive, and we will reconcile ourselves to whatever the situation is."

During my service in the United Nations, the Cyprus government sent a special representative to the United Nations to introduce a resolution calling upon the Secretary General of the U.N."to use his good offices in expediting the search for the missing persons." This appeared to me to be a passive, inoffensive resolution with no harm done to anyone. However, the U.S. Delegation informed me that there were several objectionable words in the resolution and as a consequence, the U.S. would abstain in the vote. I tried to point out the damage this would do, especially in view of President Reagan's direct promises during the campaign. I was then informed that if I could have the Cypriots agree to remove certain objectionable words from the resolution, the U.S. could vote for it. I labored many hours with the Cypriots, and finally deleted certain language. At the last minute. Mr. Bartholomew nevertheless sent a wire asking the U.S. to still abstain. The Cypriot delegate returned to Cyprus and the news accounts were unfavorable in Cyprus and Greece. A simple matter such as this has caused impairment of our relations in the Mediterranean. and has encouraged a former minority of Anti-Americana to gather unwarranted strength.

The Greeks and Turks are not too far apart in the matter of the territory that each should occupy in Cyprus. A more direct encouragement by the United States, or at least, a direct word of principle in this regard would be invaluable. This plus the missing persons matter would well pave the way in our Greek base negotiations.

The above two points-missing persons and territorial claims cannot be solved at once. But a carefully planned statement of objectives would greatly alleviate the pressure in Greece and would ease the road to accomplish our purpose.

As soon as possible, I would suggest that President Reagan invite the President of Greece, Mr. Constantive Caramanlis, to visit him in Washington. President Caramanlis has told me several occasions that he would be pleased to accept the invitation. If this could be done prior to the start of the base negotiations, it would have a telling effect in the discussions. President Caramanlis has always been a staunch friend of America. He can be very important in the forthcoming base negotiations. And the publicity in Greece would be of great value at this time.

I consider this of such importance that I would go to Greece purposely to escort him to the United States. Mr. Caramanlis has been our house guest in San Francisco, and I know that a gesture of friendliness and hospitality will go a long way in these matters.

We cannot evade the fact that politics is involved in these matters. During the Presidential campaign, I traveled the U.S. extensively and organized many groups especially the Greek Americans-3 million of them in the United States. Despite the fact that Greek Americans are normally Democrats we know that 85% of the Democrats voted for President Reagan, based on his statement regarding Cyprus. It is not yet too late to hold this support, but I must confess that it is eroding. Wherever I go I am asked when the campaign pledge will be fulfilled. A manifestation of goodwill from the President-an encouraging word-a semantical expression of hope, will L am sure, be of tremendous value to all.

We must remember that we are involved with different customs, diverse emotions and sensitive principles of nationalism. We can say the same thing to two different groups, but the manner of expression can be decisive.

If at any time the Administration desires to discuss this further, I will be pleased to come to Washington for that purpose.

I recall that in the past, I have discussed various matters with De Gaulle, Kruschev, Adenauer, etc., but each had to have conveyed to him our American principles in a different semantical way.

Dear President Reagan,

Enclosed you will see a Presidential directive issued by exPresident Carter in December of 1980. This directive was the
result of my cry for help, as an American, to ex-President Carter,
in the desperate hope that he, or someone powerful enough in our
Government, would take a personal interest in a quest for justice
that has spanned over 7 years and 3 countries. It pertains to a
matter that caused my father's death prematurely at and 61, and
which has left my family emotionally and financially grained.

We are WITHOUT HOPE unless you choose to take a personal interest in righting a grievous wrong at the hands of a foreign country, where there is no justice and certainly to fair of retribution. They have ignored some of the most powerful attornies in the country. They have ignored gestures by our American Embassy. It is the old story of David and Goliath. In our case, ONLY YOU can provide the necessary sling so that justice may finally prevail.

I don't know, had ex-President Carter remained in office, if he would have pursued this matter any further, but at least his directive gave us the ability to protone the inevitable until now. Admittedly, we have gotten alot further than most impricans co in the Greek system of justice, but we have now reached the end of the line. What is surprising about this matter is that it deals with a FLAGRANT violation of Greek laws, but unfortunately, we are dealing with defendants who are protected by their government, because they are part of what they call the "inner circle" and part of a mighty institution. The defendants, as you will see below have a "license" to play with people's lives and fortunes, at whim. In this instance, they played for self-enrichment.

Our remarkable trials and tribulations, all documented, are best surmed up by a remark mode by one of the defendants upon hearing of my father's untimely death (an employee of the National Bank of Greece) stating: "They are only woman, what can they do now?". But my sister, mother, and I wowed, over my father's grave that we would not rest until this matter had been properly brought to justice, in the true sense of the word.

THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

In responding to your letter of February 4, let me assure you at the outset that I take the views you expressed with such forthrightness and clarity seriously, addressing as they do matters of special concern to your government.

The United States provides security assistance to its friends and allies to assist them to live in security and peace. In the Eastern Mediterranean as elsewhere, we seek to establish and maintain a structure of peace that strengthens the ability of states in the region to deter aggression from without while promoting improved relations within the region. In considering levels of security assistance for Greece, my Administration will continue to be guided by this objective, which is consistent with the principles embodied in United States law to which you referred.

May I assure you, as well, that I regard a new agreement to define our security relationship to be in the interests of both our countries, and this is the aim of the negotiations in which we are currently engaged. In this context, the Administration will seek increased levels of security assistance for Greece above the levels of the current program.

The United States will earnestly pursue a satisfactory resolution to the outstanding issues in the negotiations. With good will and determination on both sides, I am confident we will complete them successfully.
