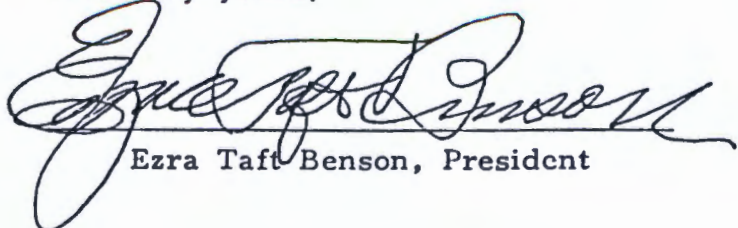

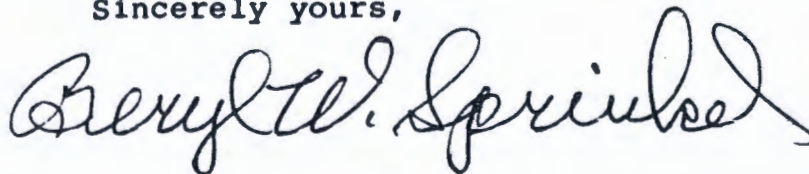
Dear Sir:

On January 9, the Post contended that President Reagan erred in stating that "we're getting the same percentage of gross national product in tax revenues, at the lower rates, that we've been getting before."

A careful look at the facts reveals just how tellingly correct the President was. With the exception of 1969-70, Federal receipts were less than 19 percent of GNP until 1980 (see chart). However, high inflation during 1978-81 acted as an unlegislated tax increase, pushing receipts to just over 20 percent of GNP by 1981. Tax legislation passed in 1981 and 1982 restored taxes to pre-1980 levels. As a result, we are now getting essentially the same percentage of GNP in tax revenues, after these rate reductions, as during much of the 1960s and 1970s.

More importantly, the chart makes clear that current budget deficits stem from a failure to control spending. While receipts exhibited little upward trend from 1960 to 1985, Federal outlays grew steadily from roughly 18 percent of GNP in 1960 to 24 percent today. The solution cannot be to raise taxes continually to fund ever-expanding Federal outlays; this would undermine our economic vitality and impede growth. Instead, we must control the government's urge to spend.

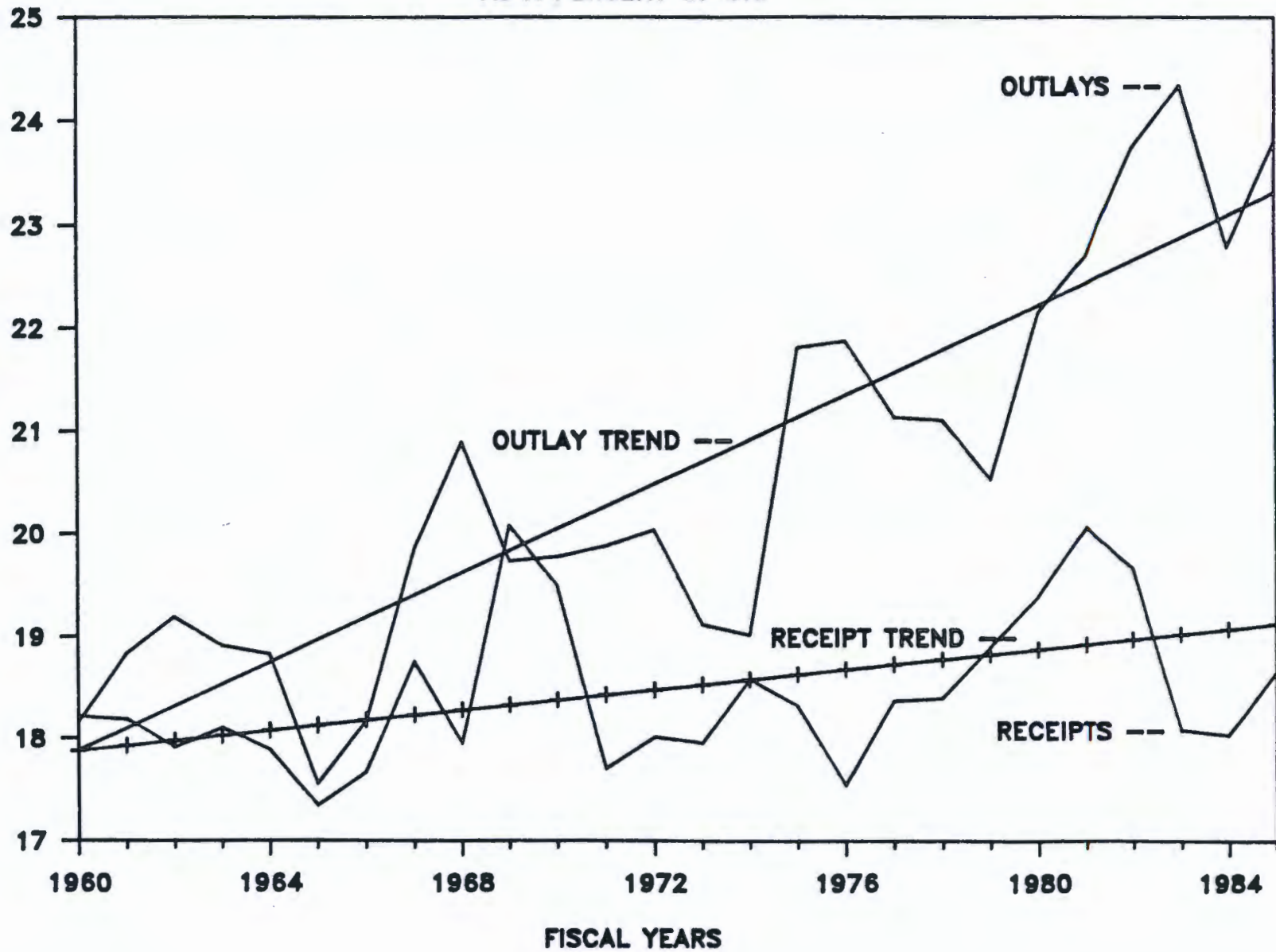

Long Faces at the White House Gate

The Gramm-Rudman-Hollings balanced budget measure is now the law of the land, but some people remain unhappy about it. Among the unhappiest are 200 students, teachers and parents from Ashburton Elementary School in Bethesda.

For weeks, the Ashburtonites had been planning to take the White House public tour on ~~Dec. 16~~. The whole school had been bubbling about it. "I mean, the kids were more excited than if they'd been on their way to see Santa Claus," reported one chaperone.

Because their group was so large, ~~the~~ Ashburtonites had made a reservation with the White House Visitors Office. They even showed up 10 minutes early in case there was some mistake. "We did everything by the book," the chaperone said.

But as they stood outside the gates of the White House, the group was informed that the building had been closed to public tours for the rest of the day so the president could conduct the Gramm-Rudman bill-signing ceremony. There was ~~no advance~~ notice, no apology and—on the part of the police officer stationed at the gate—not a whole bunch of sympathy.

The Ashburtonites said they have nothing against bill-signing ceremonies. But couldn't somebody from the White House have called the school ahead of time and told them that public tours had been canceled for the day?

"At the last minute, we had to limit the number of tours going through," said Dale Petroskey, the assistant White House press secretary. " . . . We regret that it happened, but when the president has something like this . . ."

"Occasionally, the president needs to use his house," added Dottie Dellinger of the White House Visitors Office.

But no White House bill-signing ceremony is ever organized at the drop of a hat, and the Gramm-Rudman ceremony wasn't, either. It usually takes most of a morning to set up a ceremony for the same afternoon. A lot of times, the setting-up takes longer.

So there was plenty of time for the White House to have checked the ~~public tours reservations log~~ and to have made one timely phone call to Bethesda—before the buses full of excited kids pulled away.

The Ashburtonites say they'll return and try to do better sometime in January. Let's hope the White House does the same.

Dear Mr. Levey:

I would like to respond to your December 27th column, "Long Faces at the White House Gate." First, I am truly sorry for any unpleasantness incurred by the Ashburton Elementary students of Bethesda. We never like to turn people away, and I hope the school will be able to return to visit us sometime in January.

I would, however, like to clarify a few points you made in your column. You said the date of the Gramm-Rudman signing ceremony was December 16th. In fact, the day was December 18th. The 16th was a Monday and we are never open for tours on Monday or Sunday. More importantly, the school did not have a reservation. School officials had apparently planned to attend the public tour for which reservations are not accepted. Since we do not know who is coming on a public tour there is no way to know who to telephone on a short notice closing. We did, however, put the fact that we would be closed on the 18th on our telephone recording during the afternoon of the 17th -- as soon as we learned of the closing.

You said that "no White House ceremony is ever organized at the drop of a hat." Unfortunately, sometimes they are. You may recall, on December 16th, the President and Mrs. Reagan made an unscheduled trip to Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. This necessitated that both of their schedules be rearranged on Tuesday and Wednesday. The bill signing could not be held on the afternoon of the 18th due to a large previously scheduled event. Therefore, it was decided late afternoon on the 17th to close public tours on the 18th. As I stated, we did put that on our information tape (456-7041), and we always recommend people check this tape prior to coming to prevent exactly this type of problem.

I would be happy to aid Ashburton Elementary in scheduling a tour. However, I need your help with another group. Thirty-five Air Force wives, I believe from Bolling Air Force Base, also were turned away that day. I do not know how to contact them in order to invite them back. Maybe you could put out the word so that they will contact me.

Please remember the White House is the only State House in the world regularly open to visitors. On occasion it does have to be closed on short notice. I hope you will advise your readers to always call the morning that they plan to visit.

The Report

My dear Mr. President:

I had no idea when I came back to Washington in 1981 to work in your Administration that you would have such a profound impact on me personally. As a life-long Conservative Republican I supported your platform in 1980 and voted for you but my experience over the past five years has meant more to me than mere politics. Mine has been the humble and rare opportunity to observe a great leader close at hand. I shall long cherish our private conversations as well as the more formal briefings and meetings.

Pages and pages are being written about your popularity with the American people. I have it all figured out. It's what means so much to me, too. It's your conviction, your unswerving commitment to principle and your unfailing humility. From what I've seen in you, however, it goes further. You have a deep spiritual sense which must stem from a genuine understanding of your relationship to God. You've the right perspective. You're serving, and the one who serves best, leads best. That's you.

In the last three years of your presidency you can even let those qualities shine brighter. The world so needs them. The world needs compassion and strength, by example. You have the capacity to give this. You have shown it.

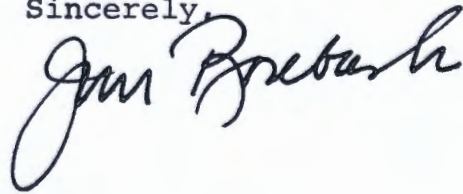

Mr. President, you were sent to lead America now, at this time, at this juncture in our history. You will always be safe because of this. One little passage I always keep with me is "In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct thy path."
