Every night before we go to bed, Ruth and I kneel down and, among other things, pray for you and Nancy. We love you very much, and admire you tremendously for your leadership during these critical years.

One of my closest friends for many years was J. Willard Marriott, Sr. As you know, he was in charge of the arrangements for both of Mr. Nixon's Inaugurations, and has always been a strong Republican. I have been asked to contact you concerning the possibility of giving him the Medal of Freedom posthumously. If you are going to give any more, I would heartily recommend Bill Marriott. His high moral character and strong family life should be an inspiration to all Americans.

I don't know when we will have the opportunity of seeing you again, but we really have missed seeing you for the last few weeks.

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




