SUBJECT: PRESIDENT'S VISIT TO GERMANY

Spoke twice today with Ambassador Burns, Bonn. Herewith his views.

- A) No Western statesman has visited Bitburg Cemetery.
- B) German media are starting, just now, to focus upon the "storm in Washington."
- C) Friendly German media with whom Ambassador spoke, at my request, are divided. One said the German people could well understand why RR may have to cancel. Another said that to cancel would dishonor German soldiers. Another that he could appreciate Jewish outrage. I.e. no-win proposition.

Burns' counsel:

- 1) President ought not go to Dachau.
- 2) Go to Bitburg, but not to cemetery.
- 3) Lay wreath, not at Bitburg, but a famous Cemetery in Bonn, visited by distinguished visitors over the years. (Advanceman checking this out.)
- 4) Burns discussed this idea with Kohl's intimate foreign policy adviser who said it may be a "workable idea," but he is going to get to Kohl on this, and if the Chancellor is sharply opposed to any change, Burns will get this back to me in the morning.
- 5) Burns says another possibility is to drop Bitburg altogether and do Berlin, which has rich possibilities. However, this should be done only if the "minimum alteration" proposed by Burns does not work out.

Crucial, however, Burns insists, that whether we do nothing or something, decision be made and final by Monday morning.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF

FROM: PAT BUCHANAN

Last night CBS reported, and today the New York Times recorded for posterity, a genuine Communist historical outrage at the former Nazi concentration camp of Buchenwald. The American liberators and Jewish victims were non-persons at the 40th Anniversary. In this Soviet-East German re-write of history, no credit was given to the liberating American soldiers; instead, the United States was smeared as a menace to peace.

The Soviets may have played into our hand, and provided us with an opportunity. We can now plausibly argue that the "Orwellian rewrite of history attempted yesterday at Buchenwald," the lie reminiscent of the thirties, calls forth a Presidential response. I.e., we have a changed situation, which calls forth a revised Presidential schedule in Germany, and a new focus for Presidential remarks this Friday on Jewish Heritage Week. In those remarks, the President can talk about who was left out of the Communist ceremonies at Buchenwald -- i.e. American Liberators and Holocaust victims -- and indicate his new schedule in Germany.

To set the stage, however, requires a certain indication, today at best, that the President has seen either the CBS report and/or the Times report, that he considers the Communist falsification an insult to the memory of American soldiers and Jewish victims, and that he intends to respond soon to this Orwellian rewrite of history.

Also, Bill Buckley called. Says our "friends" are deeply disconsolate not only over the German military cemetery, but this Buchenwald episode. He suggests either A) a Presidential visit to Plotzen, where the anti-Hitler plotters/martyrs are buried, or B) to Synagogue in Berlin destroyed by Hitler rebuilt by Americans (Sasenstrasse). Charles Wick has visited the first.

Also, Al D'Amato called, urging a change in schedule (which he is publicly predicting) and Hy Bookbinder of AJC, who says that an emergency meeting of the Holocaust Commission in New York is taking place tomorrow -- and if we have any message on possible changes we should get it to Elie Wiesel, whose phone number I now have.

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Again, with this Buchenwald thing, we have a peg on which to alter or add events in Germany; and we have an occasion to recapture high ground -- perhaps by Tuesday, when RR speaks to the Religious conference. Will be home this afternoon.

And don't worry about Pat. I think he really came out ahead of the sniping in the media. I'm only sorry he had to endure it -- but he knows them as well as you and I do and has a good sense of humor about it.

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

The Streets of Crackow

Though it is May Day There are few signs of celebration. I cannot uncover smiles Laughter Or dancing In the streets.

Somber faces match Primarily monochromatic attire. Men sport tarnished leather jackets. Women drape colored scarves Over drab garments. Here and there a flash of mauve, Or electric blue, A hive of henna. A rare Italian heel Spikes the pavement.

But ... oh, the children! Butterscotch faces, Shining hair Hugging apple checks, Hand-knitted caps, Garlands and flowers, Embroidered blouses and stockings. Oblivious of my presence They bunch together in the market square, On top of a slab celebrating the Great War, To watch the peasant dancers.

Kaminska: actress, Peretz: writer, Dineson: biologist, Czerniakow: community leader, With a sigh And motions us through the thicket. Of Steiners and Erlichs and Friedmanns and Goldsteins,

Sussmans, Balabas, and Cohns.

But where is their city? Where their marble monuments?

Weeds and decaying leaves choke these headstones.

The three million lews of Poland are gone. Their culture fossilized, pulverized, lost. No one sings or dances or celebrates among these graves.

Not even the shy young man, Nurturing the stones.

We shake his hand, and He hands us a silent mission.

We few who have walked here Must carry these lives with us . . . always.

A Fireplace

I have wept for the dead, For the tattered childrens' vestments. The kimonos, nighties, dressing gowns, The ovens, the gas chambers, The ghosts I saw in the barracks And latrines. I do not feel noble. I feel empty And wait

The Training Resource Assistance Center (TRAC) is a 3d Armored Division detachment located at Friedberg, Federal Republic of Germany. The TRAC was established on 20 February 1981 to correct deficiencies found by the DAIG in the areas of training device accountability and training device maintenance. The mission of the TRAC is to provide training, supply and maintenance support for training devices to all units of the 3d AD on a General Support Basis. The TRAC also manages the use and development of the Friedberg Division Training Area (FDTA).

Customer units requisition all non-expendable training devices through the TRAC Operations Sections. For materials not available at the TRAC, units prepare a DA 3161 Request for Issue which the TRAC will forward to the Training Support Activity, Europe (TASE) for action. Devices so requested are then delivered to the TRAC for issue to the requesting unit.

Units may request maintenance and repair of training devices by filling out DA 2404 in two copies and DA 2407 for each device, and bring device to the repair shop. Large numbers of training devices requiring repair require advance notification prior to bringing devices to the TRAC to ensure rupid processing of unit requests.

Requests for Training Facilities or Training Areas may be done 90 days in advance by attending quarterly range conferences held in January, April, July and October of each year at the TRAC. During the current quarter, available Training Areas or Facilities may be requested by DF to Commander, 3d Armored Division, ATTN: AETFGC-TR, APO 09074. DF should state dates desired, training areas required, type of training to be conducted and POC name and telephone number. Telephonic notification is encouraged although DF requirement will not be waived. The TRAC welcomes visits by commanders, training officers and other interested individuals to review currently available training devices and facilities and to become familiar with new training techniques. To enable the TRAC to plan for the most effective use of available time, personnel and other resources, request that such visits be coordinated in advance for either Tuesday or Thursday of each week.

For further information on the functional areas of the TRAC, contact the Operations Section during normal duty hours.



Warum Verbindung?

Die Vermassung unserer Hochschulen in den letzten Jahren hat dazu geführt, daß es für junge Studenten immer schwieriger wird, die Schranken der Anonymität zu durchbrechen und sich einen dauerhaften Freundeskreis an der Universität aufzubauen. Eine funktionstüchtige Verbindung bietet durch ihren überschaubaren Rahmen und die gemeinsame Übereinstimmung in ihren Prinzipien eine tragfähige Basis für lebenslange und für den einzelnen fruchtbare Freundschaften. Das Lebensbundprinzip fördert den Kontakt der Generationen und das Verständnis füreinander.

Warum "katholisch"?

Unsere Verbindung wurde 1844 von katholischen Studenten als Antwort auf starke liberalistische Tendenzen der Zeit gegründet. Trotz großer Fortschritte der ökumenischen Bewegung ist die konfessionelle Spaltung immer noch nicht überwunden. Voraussetzung für ein fruchtbares gemeinsames Ringen um die eine Wahrheit ist, vorhandene Unterschiede nicht einfach zu negieren, sondern sich zunächst über den grundsätzlich für richtig gehaltenen eigenen Standpunkt klar zu werden. Nicht im Verwischen von Konturen, sondern im Verstehen sehen wir die Chance der Ökumene.

Wie setzt sich unser Programm zusammen?

Das Programm fördert sowohl die menschliche als auch die geistigabstrakte Auseinandersetzung der Verbindungsmitglieder. Ersterem dienen Ausflüge, Kneipen oder Tanzfeste. Kneipen sind keine rituellen Besäufnisse im schwarzen Anzug, sondern gesellige Abende im Kreise der Bundesbrüder, deren Reiz unter anderem in einem gewissen traditionellen Rahmen liegt, der Gespräche und Stimmung nicht unterdrückt, sondern eher fördert. Vorträge, Besichtigungen und Einkehrtage vertiefen das Lehrangebot an der Universität und gehen auch darüber hinaus. Gelegenheitzum persönlichen Fragen und Diskutieren mit Fachleuten aus vielen Bereichen ergibt sich bei den "Akademischen Abenden". Weiter finden sich die Bundesbrüder der einzelnen Fakultäten zum gemeinsamen fachbezogenen Studium und Absolvieren von Ptüfungen oder Scheinen in kleinen und daher effektiven Arbeitsgemeinschaften zusammen.

Das Verbindungsleben macht es überflüssig, die Freizeit totzuschlagen; vielmehr bietet es die Gelegenheit, sie auf erfreuliche und auch nützliche Weise auszufüllen.
