Dear Mr. Solarz:

Thank you very much for your letters of March 25 and March 28 in which you and a number of your colleagues urged that the President include a stop at Dachau in the schedule for his May visit to the Federal Republic of Germany (FRG).

At the outset, let me assure you that the President remains deeply committed to full recognition of the horrors surrounding the Holocaust. He has demonstrated his continuing concern both by words and actions.

Concerning your specific question, we and the German Government fully considered the possibility of a visit to Dachau in reviewing the President's itinerary. However, due to the limited amount of time available for the bilateral portion of the President's visit to the FRG, it did not prove possible to include a visit to the Munich area. Although the President will be in the FRG for several days, most of his time will be spent in Bonn for the Seven-Nation Economic Summit and talks with President von Weizsaecker and Chancellor Kohl.

Let me reemphasize that the President fully appreciates the special significance of events related to the Holocaust during this year, when we will be marking the 40th anniversary of the end of World War II. The German Government, and Chancellor Kohl personally, share this understanding, as indicated by the Chancellor's scheduled visit to the site of the former Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on April 22, the 40th anniversary of its liberation by Allied forces. Our Ambassador to the Federal Republic, Arthur Burns, will join Chancellor Kohl -- as the President's personal representative -- at the ceremonies at Bergen-Belsen. His presence at Bergen-Belsen, particularly given Ambassador Burns' high personal prestige, will emphasize the importance which the President, and all Americans, attach to this event. Again, we appreciate your interest in this important matter.

Dear President Reagan:

As the Member of Congress who represents the communities that contain one of the largest concentrations of Jews and Holocaust survivors of any District in the country, I must take issue with a remark you made in your press conference of March 21, 1985.

In response to a question concerning the itinerary for your upcoming trip to Europe to participate in ceremonies marking the 40th anniversary of V-E Day, you restated your decision not to visit a Nazi concentration camp. You indicated that your reasons for not visiting Dachau were a desire to avoid "... reawakening the memories and so forth, and the passions of the time..." and a belief that "... the German people have very few alive that remember even the war, and certainly none of them who were adults and participating in any way..."

Frankly, Mr. President, I found these reasons to be astonishing. Many people who are today citizens of the Federal Republic were alive during the war and some -- including some members of the West German government -- even participated in the war. I can understand your desire to commemorate the beginning of an era of peace and friendship between our nation and the Federal Republic of Germany, but this is no reason to avoid dealing with the reality of Nazi atrocities committed against 6 million Jews and millions of other people.

I'm sure you share my fervent hope that a conflict like World War II never occur again, and that a horrible and savage outrage such as the Holocaust is never repeated. In fact, I have publicly praised your strong support for the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council and the moving addresses you have delivered to Holocaust survivors during the annual Days of Remembrance ceremonies.

But to insure that such episodes in history do not recur, I believe it is absolutely imperative that the story of Nazi atrocities is never forgotten. People all over the world must be

reminded that this event did happen -- especially now when so many survivors of the Holocaust are still alive to speak of their experiences.

The citizens of the Federal Republic of Germany have made significant efforts to deal with their past, and West Germany has compensated the State of Israel, and those surviving victims of the Holocaust, for the injustices and injuries inflicted upon them, with reparations. Certainly if you were to go to Dachau, your visit would not be construed as an accusation of the current West German government of complicity with the grievous wrongs committed by the Nazis 40 years ago. To refuse to visit Dachau for the reasons you have stated would be considered an abdication of responsibility to those who perished in the Nazi Holocaust and to those Americans who gave their lives in defense of our country and our values. For if the world forgets what happened in Nazi Germany 40 years ago, humanity may be doomed to repeat that sad chapter of history.

On the basis of a number of discussions I've had with West Germans who lived through the Nazi period, I believe there are a great many citizens of the Federal Republic who regret your decision. These Germans themselves are committed to remind their countrymen of the horrors that were committed by Germans during this period of time.

Mr. President, I urge you in the strongest possible terms to reconsider your decision. It would remind the entire world of the evil the Allies confronted 40 years ago and the importance of defending our values. A visit to Dachau would demonstrate your commitment to the belief that the lessons of the Holocaust should be taught and must be remembered.

Dear Mr. President:

It was with great amazement and shock that I listened to your comments and rationale concerning your decision not to visit a concentration camp site on your forthcoming visit to Germany.

I could not believe what I heard.

I do not quarrel, although I disagree, with your decision. Your decision is not the issue. I do, however, quarrel with the reasons for your decision and your explanations.

The fair import of your remarks was that the murder of 6,000,000 people (for no reason other than being Jewish) was a necessary prelude to peace. Was it really a prerequisite to first impose this terribly inhumane blight on world history before peace could be sought? Did peace really begin then? Did friendship really start then? Do we have peace and friendship today?

Are you also saying that we should forget about the Holocaust simply because it occurred 40 years ago? Should we also forget the Civil War? The Inquisitions? Viet Nam?

Your comments only serve to bolster those who maliciously and deliberately seek to distort history --- those who falsely claim that the Holocaust never occurred --- those who want to sweep it under the rug. I invite your attention to the hateful and deceitful publication "Hoax of the Twentieth Century".

Do you for a moment really believe that your visit to a concentration camp site would re-ignite the passions and memories of those remaining victims and the families of those who were slaughtered? Their memories, their passions and their scars have remained and will always remain so long as they and their descendants live.



Dear Mr. President:

This letter is written in hope. That hope is predicated on your steadfast and heartfelt -- and very much appreciated -- support of my legislation to bestow honorary United States Citizenship on Raoul Wallenberg. Your support for this effort was consistent and firm from the outset, and was critical to its ultimate success.

My hope is also predicated on our shared experience of the Second World War, and our opposition to totalitarianism and the degradation that it brings to human life. More personally, my hope is based on your unforgettably moving speech at the American Military Cemetery at Omaha Beach ten months ago when we stood together commemorating the anniversary of the Normandy Invasion.

If we as Americans are not to be like a cork bobbing aimlessly on a stormy sea, we must be firmly anchored by an understanding of our past. And the experiences of 40 years ago -- which we both share -- are key to understanding our world today.

In that spirit, I am not now asking you to visit the Dachau concentration camp during your forthcoming visit to Germany. But I do ask you to do one thing before you make a final decision on that question: I ask you to watch the television miniseries "Wallenberg: A Hero's Story" which will be broadcast April 8 and 9.

After you have seen that incredible but true story, then decide whether or not to visit Dachau. You owe it to yourself to see this story of the heroism of Wallenberg and of the martyrs he sought to save. Then make the decision about whether to skip what is likely to be your only and last opportunity as President to stand symbolically with Wallenberg.

Dear Mr. President:

Your remarks last week in response to a reporter's question have prompted confusion and concern over our nation's commitment to the memory of the Holocaust. A refusal to attend ceremonies next month at Dachau have raised questions throughout the world as to whether our nation's leaders believe that the Holocaust is to be forgotten in the pages of history or whether it shall remain as a living and constant reminder of the greatest of human tragedies.

This concern is compounded by remarks in the past by your new Communications Director Patrick Buchanan. His remarks have added to the doubts about your Administration's commitment to the memory of the victims of the Holocaust. On several occasions over the last few years, Mr. Buchanan has criticized the efforts of the Justice Department's Office of Special Investigations to pursue the trail of Nazi war criminals. During an interview in 1982, Mr. Buchanan called for the "abolition" of the Office of Special Investigations, which he termed a "fruitless exercise" and "not a proper use of resources". During the discussion Mr. Buchanan insisted that there is no "singularity" about the Holocaust that warrants investing federal funds in "going after people who are about 70 years old now" and whose crimes "occurred thirty-five, forty years ago". He later authored two nationally syndicated columns in which he renewed his attacks on the Office.

Although in the past your Administration has supported the activities of the Office of Special Investigations, these statements and Mr. Buchanan's appointment to the highest councils of the White House now raise questions about the commitment of our nation's political leaders to the memory of the Holocaust.

I believe it is important to take action to alleviate concerns and correct these wrong impressions. It is essential that a visit

be scheduled to the Dachau Holocaust site next month in order to participate in the Holocaust ceremonies and, just as importantly, it is essential that you assure the world that Mr. Buchanan's peculiar views are strictly his own and that these views will not be allowed to influence Administration policy or to interfere with the workings of the Office of Special Investigations.

Two years ago in a speech to more than 15,000 Holocaust survivors you stated, "Our most sacred task now is insuring that the memory of this greatest of human tragedies, the Holocaust, never fades -- that its lessons are not forgotten."

I hope that as the 40th Anniversary of this greatest of human tragedies approaches that you will do all that you can to insure that the memory of the Holocaust never fades nor is forgotten.

Thank you very much for your letter of March 11 in which you indicated that your constituent, Mr. Sigmund Gorson, has urged that the President include a stop at Dachau in the schedule for his May visit to the Federal Republic of Germany.

At the outset, let me assure you that the President remains deeply committed to full recognition of the horrors surrounding the Holocaust. He has demonstrated his continuing concern both by words and actions.

We and the German Government fully considered the possibility of a visit to Dachau in reviewing the President's itinerary. However, due to the limited amount of time available for the bilateral portion of the President's visit to the FRG, it did not prove possible to include a visit to the Munich area. Although the President will be in the FRG for several days, most of his time will be spent in Bonn for the Seven-Nation Economic Summit and talks with President von Weizsaecker and Chancellor Kohl.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to you as the National President of Hadassah, The Women's Zionist Organization of the United States, which represents some 370,000 women organized in every state of the Union.

I feel it is important for me to voice our deep concern over your decision not to visit Dachau concentration camp during your upcoming visit to Germany. Your comments regarding this matter disturbed us and I can only believe that your choice of words was a mistake.

The end of the war, while joyous for many people, signified the liberation of the remnants of the Jewish people and an end to an infamous period in world history. Our joy was mixed with sorrow and despair at our loss. Your remark that "guilt feelings that have been imposed upon the German people" does not deal directly with the culpability of the German people during the Holocaust. While we do not wish to blame innocent Germans for the sins of their parents and grandparents, neither do we wish to expunge the memory of the Holocaust from the history books and to deny its reality.

As Jews, as women and as human beings we believe that it is imperative that mankind remember the crimes of the Holocaust and understand completely the potentiality for evil which exists in mankind. Only in remembering the atrocities of that period and the lack of concern and courage by many people in the time of this tragedy can we have any hope of averting disasters of this kind in the future.

I urge you to reconsider your decision not to visit Dachau. This visit would convey to the world your own well known abhorrence of the Holocaust.

Dear Ray:

Thank you for sharing with us your views concerning the President's State Visit to the Federal Republic of Germany. We fully understand the depth of your concerns and assure you the President's feelings about the crimes against humanity perpetrated by the Nazi regime are no less deeply felt. President Reagan has attempted to make absolutely clear during his visit the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors which were committed in the name of the German state and our determination not to forget them. As you know, his itinerary included a ceremony at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in order to pay homage to all those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the anniversary of the liberation of that camp April 21, there can and should be no absolution.

President Reagan is certain you agree that, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. The President was asked by Chancellor Kohl to pay a visit to a German military cemetery in Bitburg, and he has honored that request.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past and has, in countless ways, demonstrated concretely its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. With particular regard to the younger generation in Germany, it is important to demonstrate that, while we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism.

Let me make clear that the President does not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes, but rather one of acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considers this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracts from his full and heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Dear Mr. President:

I write out of profound concern for the well-being of our nation. The decision to drop a scheduled visit to a concentration camp and to visit a cemetery where many avowed fighters for the cause of Nazism are buried threatens to polarize citizens around the country.

One of the most noble foreign policy initiatives of our nation has been to build and strengthen an alliance with the Federal Republic of Germany. But a relationship which ignores reality is built on a shaky foundation.

It has been said that a majority of Germans today were not born and do not know the events that occurred on their native soil and neighboring conquered territory 40 years ago, and drawing attention to this tragedy will inflict undue guilt and reopen emotional wounds. However, Mr. President, millions live with a daily memory of horrors past. These include death camp survivors and liberators who share the emblazoned images of crematoriums, suffering, starvation, disease, torture, the stench of death, and the fearful eyes of crippled victims who had not yet been sent to "their final solution". Others, whether they be parents, siblings, children, distant relatives or coreligionists, are scarred and haunted by the grim realization of the planned extermination of their people.

As the elected leader of the most powerful democracy on earth, you have the unique opportunity to make a gesture and take a stand for all humanity. During your visit to Temple Hillel last fall, a synagogue in my district, you told those assembled that the living have a responsibility to keep alive the memory and the fate of those who perished. As you so appropriately noted, it is "the fundamental moral obligation" of those who remember the lessons of the Holocaust "to assure never again".

I respectfully urge you to reconsider this decision. As our moral burden is to bear witness and remember, I am certain you will heed the message of Yom Hashoa, the Day of Rememberance.

Dear President Reagan:

I write to you as a Republican officeholder concerned about the announced plans for your visit to Germany. I believe it is mistaken both as policy and as a political matter for you to plan to visit a German military cemetery but not a concentration camp site.

I agree that we have a national interest in supporting the present democratic and pro-Western regime in Germany and in recognizing the emergence of a post-World War II generation. Your original decision not to make the obligatory ritual visit to a concentration camp site may have been defensible in that light. However, at the same time as you visit a German military cemetery, to fail to visit either an Allied cemetery or a site appropriate for remembrance of the victims of Naziism is to fail to acknowledge the special character of World War II as a just war against an especially nefarious tyranny. In view of your correct insistence on the moral distinction between the West and the Eastern totalitarian regimes, I believe that you are foregoing an important opportunity and occasion for moral leadership.

From a political point of view, many of us are attempting to wean sectors of the Jewish community from its historic liberalism and support of the Democratic party. Your policies in the Middle East and your noble efforts on behalf of Ethiopian Jewry certainly entitle you to support and recognition. An insensitive act like your announced travel plans gives an unnecessary argument to those who continue to identify the Republican party and conservatism exclusively with the "country club set".

I urge you to modify your plan appropriately.

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

Dear Mr. President:

It was reported in the April 22,1985 issue of *The Wall Street Journal* that you will attend a wreath-laying ceremony May 5th at a West German cemetery where World War II Nazi soldiers are buried.

We urge you not to attend. Rather, place a wreath on May 5th at any one of the many cemeteries in Europe where American soldiers are buried.

In our opinion, your proposed wreath-laying ceremony in West Germany will be looked upon with disdain by most allied veterans of WW II. How do you know whether German SS officers are not buried in this West German cemetery? The proposed wreath-laying could give the impression that our President is honoring the Nazi murderers! Please, reconsider.

It is a painful paradox that Poland—who was first to fight Nazi Germany's aggression in September 1939, and who continued the fight thru 1945—was deprived the liberty shared by the other victors! Poland contributed greatly to the victory; in 1945, 195,000 Polish troops were on the western fronts; about 400,000 on the eastern front, and hundreds of thousands in partisan activities. Poland's losses were substantial, 5 to 6 million of its citizens were murdered by the Germans in WW II, another 1.5 million citizens were brutally deported to the USSR by the Soviet KNVD, most of the deported died. Yet, you place no wreath at a cemetery for Polish soldiers!

Consider, that the Kremlin may well use the German wreath-laying event for its ividious progaganda. The Soviets might say, "The President of U.S.A. honored those who killed his own soldiers and who killed the soldiers of his nation's war-time Allies!"

The history of the German peoples is indicative that they look-out for their own self interest, often at the expenses of their neighbors. How, therefore, can a wreath-laying ceremony improve American-German foreign relations? West Germany's vital concern is U.S. protection against the threat of Soviet missile and tank superiority; wreath-lay seems to have no apparent connection to containing the Soviet threat. In fact, some Germans might look at the event in puzzlement (e.g. What kind of a leader would honor those who killed his own people and his people's friends?).

Let me conclude by commending the President for the many prudent things the President has done in office; you have called the Soviet leadership by what they have been (and are), liars. You have sought always to improve our national defense, despite the critics.

A few words on my background, so that you may know where I am coming from. On 1 September 1939, I was on active duty as combat officer in the Polish Army, I fought through the September campaign—even after the Soviet invasion of September 17,1939. Avoiding capture, I fought as a partisan throughout the war. My partisan unit, the Holy Cross Brigade, crossed over in Czechoslovakia in 1945 to avoid annilation by the Red Army, which was then occupying Poland. In Czechoslovakia, we liberated a German concentration camp and capture a German Panzer officer head—quarters. The brigade then joined General Patton's 3rd Army, Indian Head Division. After the war, I served with the American Army that occupied Germany. As a result, I know of many crimes committed by German soldiers against allied prisoners of war and civilians alike.

Please, Mr. President consider laying a wreath at a cemetery for the American soldiers, or at a former German concentration camp. But not at a cemetery for those who killed in the name of Hitler and the German Reich.
