Dear Mr. President:

Although I am using the stationery provided to me as an elected municipal official in Florida, at the present moment this letter is written to you by the undersigned as a private citizen.

However, I intend to ask my Town Council to adopt a resolution along the lines of this letter.

Although I was just under the age, in 1941-45, whereby I could serve in the Armed Services during the Second World War, many of my close friends did serve, and most of my present friends were members of those Armed Services.

I have also participated, for forty years, in ceremonies marking Veterans Day, and among those whom we have mourned, as you have, are those who fell before the Nazi onslaught in Europe.

I recognize and appreciate your fondness and respect for Chancellor Kohl. He is indeed a very fine man and his nation is our ally. However, I seriously doubt that he would want you or anyone else, for that matter, to honor the Waffen S.S.

It would constitute the deepest type of insult by an American President, both to the memory of the American boys who fell before the Nazi hammer, as well as to millions and millions of American citizens who were deeply scarred by the particular actions of the S.S.

I could almost see you taking the action that you want to take if the cemetery in question consisted entirely of regular Wehrmacht troops. However, even in such instance, I would expect you, as my President, to lay a wreath on the graves of the American dead as well. (And what about the British and the French and the Poles?)

I recognize that you must rely on the advice of subordinates; but when these underlings, coupled with misleading information from German authorities as well, fail to inform you in advance of the "trap" they have inadvertently

set for you, then it is high time that you disclaim these people, that you characterize them in the terms which they deserve, and that you stand up and take the responsibility, as you did for the tragedy in Lebanon, as Commander-in-Chief.

It is with a sense of great anguish and disappointment that I write this letter to you today.

This is in reaction to your decision <u>not</u> to visit the Concentration Camp Dachau, during your planned visit to Germany next month. The official reason given by the White House for this incomprehensible omission, is: "Not to arouse guilt feelings" among the new generation of Germans who were born after Hitler's defeat in 1945.

The idea of visiting the Cementery at Bitburg, where members of the infamous S.S. Murder Formations are buried, is so obscene, offensive and painful, that I wouldn't even discuss it.

Mr. President, all of my friends, mostly Survivors of the Nazi-Holocaust, we want and we must believe your decision is the result of some really bad advice given to you by those who planned your trip to Germany. It is absolutely incomprehensible to us, that this decision was made by the same President Ronald Reagan, who spoke to us, 20,000 Survivors of the Holocaust exactly 2 years ago in Washington, D.C. When you talked to us at that historic gathering, you touched our hearts and our souls, yes, you became an instant hero of all the Survivors of the Holocaust in the United States and througout the world.

The Nazis believed in the "Reich (Empire) of a Thousand Years", yet a thousand years will pass, and the guilt of the German people in whose name the most monstrous and unspeakable crimes against humanity were committed,

will not be eradicated from the memory of history. We must remember, and will never forget that the Nazis annihilated, systematically, and in traditional German efficiency, 6 Million Jewish people, among them 1½ Million children and 5 Million other people during the Holocaust.

The guilt feelings of the German People, if indeed they are there, what are they compared to the un-imaginable pain and degradation suffered by the victims, who were brutally murdered, what are they compared to the pain and the nightmares of the few hundred thousands Survivors, who suffer as long as they live. Yes, even the children and the grandchildren of the Survivors suffer from it.

Can there ever be a redemption of the German People, unless they acknowledge the horrendous crimes against humanity committed by the Nazis in their name? We should not forget, there are still close to 25 Million Germans alive, who knows how many of them did actively collaborated with the Nazis? Shouldn't the German People, who were borne after Germany's defeat, learn about the Holocaust, be aware of these crimes, and above all, learn the important lessons of the Holocaust, so that they may become more sensitive, and better human beings? Shouldn't the new generation of Germans be in the forefront of all those who stand up and speak-out for human-rights against persecution and oppression.

Mr. President, while living in the death-camps literally fighting every single day for survival, we were haunted by the thought, we were more afraid of it than dying ourselves, the terrible thought that all of us will get killed, and none will survive to tell the story of our pain and our sufferings, and the millions will have died in vain.

Therefore we must tell the story over and over again, we must bear wittness, and above all we must remember, by doing so we fullfill the most ardent wish of the 6 Million Martyrs, our parents, our brothers and sister who did not survive.

But not for their sake alone must we remember, for the sake of our grandchildren, yes Mr. President for the sake of your grandchildren and their children's children, we must talk about it, we must teach it on every level everywhere, so that never again any people, at any time will suffer such inhumanity.

Mr. President, may I humbly suggest, that you instruct those, who advised you not to visit Dachau, and not to pay tribute to the victims of Nazism on this historic anniversary, to read the book "The Abandonment of the Jews" by David S. Wyman. This monumental work by a non-Jewish historian, based on 15 years of research, must convince every decent human being, that one of the major factors which caused the Holocaust to occur in the first place, was the incomprehensible insensitivity of the leading statesmen of the Western World. It was this blatant insensitivity to the suffering of others, which later developed into total indifference, which gave the Nazis the signal to go ahead and commit the most monstrous crime against humanity in all recorded history.

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Therefore Mr. President, on this historic anniversary of the defeat of Nazi-Germany, and the liberation of Hitler's Death Camps, I humbly urge you to ignore the advice of insensitive advisors and indeed do visit the historic Site of the Dachau Concentration Camp.

Please do demonstrate to the American People, to the Survivors, and to the people of the Free World that you are indeed a decent and sensitive human being, a great leader of the Free Democratic Nations, who remembers the important lessons of history as so brilliantly formulated by the great American Philosopher Santayana.

Dear Mr. President:

On behalf of our entire organization, representing over one-quarter million American Jews, permit me to express our deeply held feelings regarding your proposed visit to Germany next month. As Jews and as Americans, we cannot help but feel disturbed, even betrayed, by your continued insistence on visiting the military cemetery at Bitburg.

Your decision, albeit belated, to seek a suitable venue to memorialize the millions of Jews and others who perished at the hand of the bestial Nazi regime, is appropriate. No commemmoration of the end of World War II could be complete without a memorial to the innocent victims of slaughter. Unfortunately, the very sentiments you seek to convey, as a man of conscience, as an American, and as a world leader, are negated by your planned visit to Bitburg.

The map of Germany presents many sites suitable for a meaningful tribute to those Germans who were themselves victims of Nazism. No one would question such a tribute, nor could one deny its validity. But the choice of Bitburg, burial place of members of the SS, perhaps even the very troops responsible for the brutal massacre at Malmedy, conveys the message that the United States and its President are ready to forgive the unforgivable and forget the unforgettable.

A memorial visit to Bitburg Cemetery would dishonor not only the memory of our people who perished in the flames of the holocaust, but also the memories of all American soldiers who fought and died to eradicate the unspeakable horrors wrought by the very people whose memory your visit would honor and legitimize. Forty years may seem like a long time in the memory of an individual; in the sands of history it is but a speck. And just as we are convinced that the memory of this era of destruction will never be erased from our collective consciousness, so we believe that all men and nations of good will never allow the world to forgive and forget.

We urge you, Mr. President, to reconsider your decision and remove Bitburg from your itinerary. That in itself would be a truly appropriate tribute, on behalf of all America, to the memories of the millions of victims of Nazism, and serve as a clear signal to the entire world of America's committment never to forget the horrors of the Holocaust, and never to permit them to be repeated.

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

Dear Ms. Karpa:

I have been asked to reply to your letter of March 28 to President Reagan concerning the President's upcoming visit to the Federal Republic of Germany. The President is certainly keenly aware of the symbolic dimension imposed on his trip by the coincidence of the 40th anniversary of the end of World War II. In our preparations for the commemoration of this anniversary, he has stressed his personal determination to ensure that the crimes of the Third Reich shall not be forgotten and that conditions which made them possible shall never return again.

As the President noted at his press conference on March 21, the best way to achieve this goal is to look to the future. Commemoration of the Holocaust should be not only a matter for Germany, but for all mankind. The President has elected to speak before the European Parliament in Strasbourg on May 8 in order to underline to all of Europe the American commitment to maintaining conditions which will make it impossible for dictatorship and intolerance to find sustenance in any of the democratic nations of Europe.

Similarly, the state visit to Germany will make clear that while we do not forget the past, the United States views defense of our common democratic alliance as essential to preservation of human liberties in the Federal Republic. In so doing, the President will not ignore any of the atrocities committed by the Third Reich. He will not pass up the need to remind Germany -- and the world -- that human beings everywhere must view the Holocaust as a brutal lesson of the depths to which mankind can descend.

This by no means implies the the President or his German hosts seek to ignore those who lost their lives or the hideous excesses of the totalitarian Nazi regime, of which Dachau is a nightmarish example. The holocaust remains part of the consciousness of all responsible persons in Germany and it is a subject the President has discussed with Chancellor Helmut Kohl on numerous occasions. It is a burden which the Federal Republic recognizes it will continue to bear even as it looks to its future.

But the end of World War II has other associations for the German people in addition to the historical obligations it imposes. It was a time of defeat, humiliation, despair, and loss of hope. Its commemoration in Germany must necessarily be a somber and reflective occasion which focuses on each individual and his conscience. The United States is proud of its role in helping to create conditions in the Federal Republic which make unthinkable a return to the excesses of the Third Reich. The President believes that we should take satisfaction in this historic accomplishment and should entrust to our German allies the responsibility for observing this historic date as they see best.

## Let's not honor Nazi dead

President Reagan's plans to write a new script for World War II and place a wreath in a cemetery in West Germany where Nazi soldiers were buried after the 'Battle of the Bulge' should be aborted. The president, in his visit to Europe at the end of April to attend an economic conference in Bonn, should seek a more appropriate way of recognizing the postwar friendship between Germans and Americans and the common suffering of both nations that ended 40 years ago.

An official presidential honor cannot be paid to the buried dead of an evil war machine without calling back the screams of its victims, millions of whom found no common grave in a neat military cemetery but were turned to ashes or buried like garbage in ditches. The German nation must not be permitted to forget the long night of terror it waged against humanity, nor the genocide its leaders committed against the German people and other races that fell under their unspeakable shadows.

While new generations who had no part in the monstrous crimes should not

be kept in a state of penance and guilt, they must be permitted to learn from the past, and its memories should not suffer distortions in the name of new friendships, national alignments and the politics of peace.

The president, in his thoughtless, nonchalant way of looking at the end of World War II, has been accused of focusing on the German dead in order to avoid having to recall the facts that America and the Soviet Union were allies and that dead Russian soldiers also fell in a common cause. That is a risk he need not take.

Reagan, in planning his trip to Europe, passed up an invitation to visit Dachau, one of the many German concentration camps that housed the Nazi horrors, for fear of opening old wounds. But in his reluctance to commemorate the sufferings of millions who were tortured; starved, gased and burned in ovens, he wounds the camps' survivors, and in honoring the memory of enemy dead with a wreath, he risks rearranging history.

Dear Mr. Mazewksi:

I am replying to your April 15 and 19 telegrams to President Reagan regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracted from his full and

heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.
