

Dear Dr. Sobol:

I am replying to your April 23 mailgram to President Reagan regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracted from his full and

heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.



The Veterans of World War I of the U.S.A., Inc., wish to go on record stating that we are pleased with the change in your itinerary for your upcoming trip to Germany. However, we would like to see one other change.

Mr. President, on the morning of November 11, 1921, the 3rd anniversary of the Armistice that ended World War I, the American Unknown Soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Four cemeteries near the major Fronts on which American Troops had fought, (Belleau Wood, the Somme, St. Mihiel, and the Meuse-Argonne), randomly chose a coffin of a soldier who had been buried among the unidentified dead in France.

The final selection was made by the dropping of roses on one of the earth-stained coffins. After the trek across the Atlantic on the Cruiser U.S.S. Olympia, the unknown warrior lay in state as a grateful nation paid homage. President Harding headed a cavalcade escorting the casket across the river to the Arlington National Cemetery.

The Veterans of World War I, who now are an average age of 89, would consider it an HONOR to have our President visit a cemetery where many of our American Buddies still sleep beneath the battle-fields of France.

We appreciate you giving this suggestion consideration and wish you much success on this timely visit.



Dear Mr. President,

I am now writing you to express to you in the strongest possible way my shock and sadness that you have added to your itinerary a visit to the Bitburg Cemetery where you will lay a wreath in memory of those buried at Bitburg. Due to the atrocities which occurred at the Battle of the Bulge and the massive participation of the German SS, I believe that a visit to Bitburg by an American president is unwarranted and would be most unfortunate. I see such an act as dishonoring our living and dead veterans of World War II and their families and reducing in significance the magnitude and devastation of the holocaust and the millions who died brutally and mercilessly by German hands. There is no valid or responsible reason why you, the President of the United States should honor the dead of the Third Reich who were responsible for atrocities beyond the human imagination. There are some events of such horror and magnitude that they cannot and should not be forgotten, regardless of the passage of time. The holocaust is certainly such an event, when, as you know, over 11 million people, including six million Jewish men, women and children were brutally murdered by the Nazis. I strongly urge you, Mr. President, to restructure your itinerary so as to omit the Bitburg visit.

The eyes and the ears of the entire world are focused on you and on our beloved Nation, you still have the time to reverse your ill advised visit to this Nazi cemetery, if you must visit a cemetery in West Germany, why not visit the grave site of a great German contemporary leader, Dr. Konrad Adenauer, or the cemetery of the American heroes who were slaughtered by the Nazis in the Malmedy Massacre, or even the graves of the brave Anti-Nazi German Officers who were murdered by order of Hitler.

The ugly ramifications of this horrifing visit to Bitburg will damage your great credibility as a compassionate leader and as the Chief Representative of the greatest people on earth; the American people. Please I beg of you, do not visit Bitburg.

I WISH TO QUOTE ELIE WEISEL CHAIRMAN OF THE UNITED STATES HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL COUNCIL. "HAVE OUR POLICY PLANNERS FORGOTTEN WHAT SS STANDS FOR. THEY WERE THE KILLERS OF JEWS PRIMARILY, BUT NOT ONLY OF JEWS. THEY BUTCHERED POLS AND CZECHS, FRENCH AND DUTCH, NORWEGIANS AND DANES, YUGOSLAVS, UKRANIANS, GREEKS, GYPSIES AND GAYS".

WHILE AMERICAN POLICY MAY FIND IT IMPORTANT TO CELEBRATE AND

STRENGHTEN OUR ALLIANCE WITH THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY IT MUST NOT BE DONE BY SHUTTING OUR EYES TO THE PAST, OR AT THE EXPENSE OF MILLIONS OF PEOPLE WHO SUFFERED AND DIED IN AUSHWITZ, DACHAU AND OTHER CONCENTRATION CAMPS.

WHILE IT IS COMMENDABLE THAT YOU HAVE FINALLY AGREED TO RECOGNIZE AND MEMORALIZE THE PAIN AND SUFFERING OF THE VICTIMS BY VISITING THE BERGEN-BELSEN CAMP, THAT DOES NOT OFFSET WHAT YOU WILL BE DOING BY PAYING TRIBUTE TO THE GRAVES OF NATZI SS MURDERERS. Dear Mitch:

Thank you for sharing with us your views concerning the President's State Visit to the Federal Republic of Germany. We fully understand the depth of your concerns and assure you the President's feelings about the crimes against humanity perpetrated by the Nazi regime are no less deeply felt. President Reagan has attempted to make absolutely clear during his visit the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors which were committed in the name of the German state and our determination not to forget them. As you know, his itinerary included a ceremony at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in order to pay homage to all those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the anniversary of the liberation of that camp April 21, there can and should be no absolution.

President Reagan is certain you agree that, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. The President was asked by Chancellor Kohl to pay a visit to a German military cemetery in Bitburg, and he has honored that request.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past and has, in countless ways, demonstrated concretely its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. With particular regard to the younger generation in Germany, it is important to demonstrate that, while we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism.

Let me make clear that the President does not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes, but rather one of acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considers this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracts from his full and heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Dear Mr. President:

As with many of your initiatives, I believe your plans to visit Germany reflect a forward-looking optimism intended to strengthen ties which bind Americans with Germans. Your foreign policy has been characterized by building upon understandings between nations and people, not by forcing America's way into world view by antagonizing or inflaming political and moral sensitivities.

I have witnessed and deeply appreciated the benefits of your consensus building and was all the more disappointed to learn of your decision to pay tribute to German soldiers buried in a cemetery which includes members of the notorious SS. I can only imagine the depth of grief and anger this decision must evoke in victims (and their families) who survived but continue to be haunted by memories of concentration camps where lives may have been held in the balance by one SS soldier. No one knows nor can track the involvement of every person who served in the SS. It is possible that soldiers buried at Bitburg were responsible for unspeakable atrocities against Jewish fellow Germans.

While I believe in the value of reconciliation of historical tensions, it is imperative this not be done at any cost. Those who survived have suffered enough. To pay homage to those buried in a military cemetery with SS soldiers is not balanced or made even by a visit to Bergen-Belsen.

There are neither Germans nor Americans asking you to pay respect to the SS or those buried at Bitburg. In a recent column in Die Zeit, the political editor, Christoph Bertram, said, "World War II was not just another European war. It was the darkest

hour of European civilization. Its end brought an end to the world's most atrocious regime and the world's hitherto most deadly conflict". I would urge you to change your itinerary and visit a memorial which honors the end of World War II. I believe all Americans and Germans would find such a tribute appropriate and the basis for a new beginning of consensus building.
