Dear Congressman Loeffler:

On behalf of Secretary Shultz, I would like to thank you for forwarding to us the article on the 40th anniversary of V-E Day written by your constituents, Mr. and Mrs. Wehmeyer. The State Department certainly agrees with the sentiments expressed concerning the appropriate way to commemorate the anniversary. Our policy on World War II anniversaries generally is to stress peace, reconciliation and democratic solidarity rather than military victory. We recognize the sensitivity of these occasions, particularly in the FRG, and have been in close consultation with Bonn concerning them. As you know, the President will make a state visit to the FRG on May 5-6 following the Bonn summit. He will address the European Parliament on May 8. We believe these occasions will afford opportunities to stress the accomplishments of the past 40 years and our hopes for the future.

#### PRESIDENT REAGAN'S SECOND CHANCE

When the yearnings of American voters were understood and shared and when visible progress had been made toward their fulfillment, Ronald Reagan was elected President of the United States by a historic landslide. Now our president will have a second chance to produce a victory for world peace, with repercussions of even greater historic magnitude.

President Reagan's second chance will be in Bonn, West Germany on May 8 - the 40th anniversary of "V-E Day".

He missed his first chance last June 6th when he met with our World War II Allies in Normandy to celebrate the "D-Day" landings. Overlooked by the American contigent was the rejection and shame the West German people would and did feel as the Allies had their deserved and great celebration while West Germans watched the events on television without a signal of respect from America for its post-war partner.

Manfred Rommel, son of Field Marshall Erwin Rommel and now Mayor of Stuttgart, expressed the humiliation of the West German man-in-the-street when he said,

"D-Day" was one of the various great defeats in German history and I think it quite proper the Allies have their celebration. It was better to lose the war with Hitler than to win it with Hitler. This is a very bitter idea," he said, "but a very necessary idea."

When President Reagan is in Bonn on May 8th, he can demonstrate American understanding and willingness to share the yearnings of West German citizens. Just as his understanding and sharing the yearnings of his fellow Americans propelled him to victory at home, his demonstration of America's understanding and sharing of Germany's will propell America and West Germany toward imminent world peace, of which our mutual friendship is the cornerstone.

Buried under the cacophony of international diplomacy, trapped on their lips by fear in their hearts,

the deepest yearning of the West Germans is to be reunited
 with their East German brothers, sisters, mothers and fathers.

Reunification is not a propitious subject for discussion in the press or political circles, but given the opportunity to contact ordinary as well as extraordinary West German citizens and speak with them in their native language, is to know the burning yearning that is stifled at public levels.

One of Germany's wonderful walking paths begins at a village railroad station where a wood-carved gnome embraces a written invitation to walk through the Black Forest. We arrived there midway through a three month writing assignment on which we walked, trained and bussed through West Germany's countryside, stayed in its villages and visited in homes and guesthouses. The gnome-wrapped signpost begged us to take its picture. As we were about to do so, a taxi pulled between us and our subject. We asked the driver if he'd be kind enough to move long enough for a snapshot. He smiled at our accent.

"English or American?" he asked as he pulled out of the way.

"I appreciate your talking to me in my language," he said. "Would you take a message back to America for me? I was only a baby in the war. My sisters and brothers live in the eastern Fatherland and although we write, I have never seen them. We - you

and I - the whole world - we are all brothers and sisters. Do we not have one understanding that unites us? Cannot you in America unite with us in this understanding? Can you not help us?"

Tears welled in his eyes as we told him we would take his message home with us.

Our glimpse into the soul of the taxi driver was the most impromtu of our encounters with West Germany's "common man". The subject came up in nearly every conversation we enjoyed. Even in a tiny and remote village in Franken we were reminded of the pathetic but profound depth of their yearning. Standing high above the gravestones in the village cemetery a monument says, simply,

"To our beloved in the Eastern Fatherland"

President Reagan cannot directly address the problem of German reunification in May, what with the overriding responsibility to keep the hair of the Russian bear unruffled as disarmament negotiations show hopeful signs of progress. But, the first step at his second chance can be to let the West German people know we not only need West Germany as an ally, but desire her as a friend, that the American people respect and admire the accomplishments of the strongest nation in Western Europe, that "V-E Day" is a celebration of the entire free world and that the West German people are now as much a part of that world as are we in America.

If we fail to show and tell our West German Ally we are his friend, if this May we celebrate the defeat of the Nazis in the exclusive and separate way we did last June at Normandy, should we be surprised if West Germany someday succumbed to friendship with another who has the power to fulfill its most poignent yearning?

Last September, three months after the "D-Day" celebration, leaders of France invited West German leaders to Verdun where French and German armies slaughtered one another in World War I. In solemn ceremonies, the leaders of the two former enemies honored one another's battlefield dead and vowed that friendship between the two nations would be the memorial to their fallen sons.

If the French can reach out the hand of friendship to a powerful neighbor with whom they have been warring for over 1,000 years, is not the celebration of "V-E Day" a propitious moment for our President to make a similar, heartfelt gesture to our now strongest and most dependable ally with whom we have warred twice in 70 years? Would not the West German "common man" turn to an acknowledged friend when the realization of his most ardent yearning becomes a reality in the future? America must be that friend and President Reagan must take the first step toward recognition of that fact at his second chance on May 8.

Dear Mr. Schumer:

Thank you very much for your letter of March 28 in which you and 19 of your colleagues urged that the President include a stop at Dachau in the schedule for his May visit to the Federal Republic of Germany.

At the outset, let me assure you that the President remains deeply committed to full recognition of the horrors surrounding the Holocaust. He has demonstrated his continuing concern both by words and actions.

Concerning your specific question, we and the German Government fully considered the possibility of a visit to Dachau in reviewing the President's itinerary. However, due to the limited amount of time available for the bilateral portion of the President's visit to the FRG, it did not prove possible to include a visit to the Munich area. Although the President will be in the FRG for several days, most of his time will be spent in Bonn for the Seven-Nation Economic Summit and talks with President von Weizsaecker and Chancellor Kohl.

Let me reemphasize that the President fully appreciates the special significance of events related to the Holocaust during this year, when we will be marking the 40th anniversary of the end of World War II. The German Government, and Chancellor Kohl personally, share this understanding, as indicated by the Chancellor's scheduled visit to the site of the former Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on April 22, the 40th anniversary of its liberation by Allied forces. Our Ambassador to the Federal Republic, Arthur Burns, will join Chancellor Kohl — as the President's personal representative — at the ceremonies at Bergen-Belsen. His presence at Bergen-Belsen, particularly given Ambassador Burns' high personal prestige, will emphasize the importance which the President, and all Americans, attach to this event. Again, we appreciate your interest in this important matter.

Dear Mr. President:

As Jewish members of Congress and as strong supporters of human rights, we find it necessary to address a comment made during your Press Conference on March 21, 1985.

In light of your planned trip to Germany to commemorate V-E Day, you have decided not to schedule a trip to any of the Nazi concentration camps that serve as painful reminders of the terror of World War II. As justification for this decision, you stated at your news conference that "the German people have very few alive that remember the war, and certainly none of them who were adults and participating in any way." Not only is this statement untrue, but it reflects a thoughtless attitude towards the lessons of the war. Many German citizens who have lived through World War Il are indeed alive and very much aware that Nazism is a chapter in history that must never be repeated. More importantly, many of those who survived the Holocaust harbor memories that should be passed on to their children who were born too late to experience the horror firsthand.

We have a great deal of respect for German efforts to rebuild and promote the atmosphere of peace and democracy that has been Germany's goals in the years following the war, yet, as Representatives to people who directly experienced the horrors of Nazism, we cannot understand your decision to avoid visiting the concentration camps for the explanation you cited. The memories of the concentration camps that haunt these survivers cannot be erased. We strongly believe that a respected national leader--the President of the United States-- must set an example to the rest of the world by commemorating V-E Day with a visit to a site which accounted for a large number of deaths in World War II. Such a visit would not dampen the spirit of celebration that surrounds your planned trip. It would, however, add meaning to V-E Day by emphasizing how far the German efforts toward democracy and freedom have progressed.

Mr. President, we ask that you commemorate the end of World War II by honoring the memories of all those who perished in it. There must never again be another Holocaust, and we can prevent this by never forgetting the valuable lesson it taught us. By incorporating this lesson into our lives, we can continue to move forward, confident in the ideals of democracy.

Thank you so much for writing to me and inviting me to visit Augsburg Elementary School.


