I think it is time that an American President visited both a Nazi Jewish Annihilation Camp and German WW II veterans cemetary and made notes that would be helpful for the present and future from the dreadful past.

In a book by Elie Wiesel, The Jews of Silence, A Personal Report on Soviet Jewry, he notes that the Soviet Union doesn't have any memorials to Jewish victims of Nazism. In fact no cemetaries, just thrown into great ravines by native pogrom thugs under the direction of Nazis. No gravestones, according to the "Babi Yar" poem by Y. Yevtushenko.

Lucy S. Dawidowicz in her scholarly work, The War Against the

Jews, lists 5,933, 900 Jews annihilated by the Nazis (67% of all

European Jews). In the Polish killing ground alone, 3 million Jews

(90% of all Polish Jews) were slaughtered by many anti-semites under

the direction of the Nazis. In the baltic countries, white russia,

Ukraine and Russia (RSFSR) 1,480,000 Jews (48% of total Jews) slaughtered

by native thugs under the direction of the Nazis. Yet the silence

of the American Media is deafening when the Soviet Union will not give

one memorial to the Jewish holocaust that took place on its territory

(partially occupied) by Stalin's erstwhile partner Hitler. According

to Davidowicz, Hitler gave Stalin 77,000 square miles and kept only 73,000 miles for himself--part of the real estate sections of the Stalin-Hitler Non-Aggression Pact in August 1939.

Of course, when Stalin tried to pressure Hitler after getting 40 territories a bunch of more pieces like Turkey, Bulgaria, etc. that started a real explosion.

The Allies have never received any thanks from Stalin for officially warning him of Hitler's coming invasion as early as April 1939. In fact our "free" world media has been silently deafening too in its special sensitivity to the Soviet Union.

Dear Mr. President:

Without the graves of Nazi SS troopers in the military cemetary at Bitburg, Germany, or a visit to a death camp, the President of the United States of America's trip to the Federal Republic of Germany would be meaningless.

In the United States, a person is innocent until proven guilty. If a person is found guilty that person has an identity. Jews and other people have identified Nazi SS troopers as responsible for the Holocaust. Some of the graves in Bitburg contain the bodies of SS troopers. They have an identity. The President of the United States of America will be identifying the SS, not honoring them.

Some people possess beauty and others are ugly. Some are good and others are evil. On the street of any community, I recognize beauty and ugliness, but I am unable to identify the people who are good from those who are evil. In the cemetary, the President will know that soldiers of the Waffen SS were the evil Germans. It must be recognized, however, that some are quilty of crimes and others may not be.

My mother planted roses so she could relax and appreciate beauty. But she also planted ugly flowers. For without ugliness, she knew that she would be living in and unreal world, a world without God.

In the Bitburg cemetary are the graves of good and evil Germans, and flowers. The President will be in a real environment, in the world of good and evil, of beauty and ugliness and of God.

At the former Bergan-Belsen concentration camp, the President will be in an emotional environment. But the world will know that the President of the United States of America had accepted at Bithurg cemetary the SS as guilty of killing 6,000,000 Jews. And in the hearts of people and understanding President will live.

It is unhealthy for a nation to have the deeds of its murderers remain over the heads of its innocent people.

The Office of the Presidency is the highest honor that the citizens of the United States of America bestows upon another citizen. Mr. Reagan respects that honor and the American people.

As the President, he is aware that the time has come for the United States of America and its people to respect the Federal Republic of Germany and its good people and their contributions to human rights, to human freedom, to humanity.

My mother use to say: "When I have the wisdom to respect people, then I know that God is in my heart."

Dear Concerned Americans:

I am replying to your April 24 telegram to President Reagan regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracted from his full and

heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Bitburg - An Opportunity Lost

It seems to me that again the conservatives have allowed the liberals to take command of an issue.

Had President Reagan ONLY visited a concentration/death camp during the Economic Summit Conference, some printing ink unquestionably would have been used to extoll that visit as a reminder to everyone of the horrors of the Holocaust. But it is the Bitburg visit which had galvanized the world's attention on the German attrocities in a manner that far transcends the focus that would have occurred had the President simply visited a death camp. Only a fool would say that the same amount of attention and printing ink would have been used had it not been for the visit to Bitburg.

The collective shudder of the world has occurred BECAUSE the President is visiting Bitburg. Auschwitz and Bitburg form the two sides of the same coin - man's ability to debase himself, to sink to the sub-human level.

If we, as conservatives, espouse protecting the rights of the victims, then we must rivet attention on the criminals and their crimes. The Bitburg visit clearly has riveted world attention on the criminals in such a maner as to again re-remind us poignantly of the victims.

But if the world is to collectively learn anything, it must learn to bury its baseness. Those who lie in Bitburg have already had to stand the final judgment. Considering the magnitude of their attrocities, I believe that has been far more horrible than anything this world could exact.

Let us not forget, however, that for all those living today who were alive during World War II, the judgment of Auschwitz and Bitburg is ours as well. Collectively, as a world, Jew and Gentile stood by and mainly shook our collective heads in disbelief.

If we are to ask forgiveness for our comfortable complacency, our slowness to believe that man could perpetrate such horrors upon man in "our enlightened time," then let us learn to bury our baseness and work together for the future of mankind. The Auschwitz' and Bitburgs should both stand as a terrible admonition to the world to remember!

In my view, President Reagan has shown a courageousness which has not been seen in our political leaders for nearly five decades. He has stood on principle. Had world leaders stood on principle 40 years ago there would have been no death camps and the hurricane which blows across the graves of Bitburg today would only be a gentle breeze rustling the grasses between the tombstones of the fallen warriors.

For those in the White House who are in charge of communicating ideas and ideals, why have they allowed this opportunity to be lost?

### EXPLANATION OF VOTE ON BITBURG CONTROVERSY

• Mr. McCANDLESS, Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the President's scheduled trip to Europe, including his planned visit to the cemetery in Bitburg, Germany.

One by one I have watched my colleagues and other Americans denounce

the President's decision to make the visit to a wartime cemetery containing the graves of 2,000 German soldiers, including 49 members of the Waffen SS.

As a veteran of World War II. I hold the Nazis and the Holocaust with the same loathing and revulsion as all those who oppose the trip to the cemetery.

But I also see the President's trip as an opportunity, 40 long years later, to heal the wounds between our people and the Germans. I view his trip as courageous and farsighted. The President will not be saluting dead Nazis. He will be saluting live, free Germans, who have denounced the terrible sins of Hitler. He is a President who is strong enough to make the proper, though extremely difficult, symbolic gesture in surroundings that frankly acknowledge the past, and look forward to the future.

The President's visit is not an Ameriexoneration of the German people. They need no exoneration from us, as they have exonerated themselves. After the war, they set about becoming strong American allies. In the face of fierce domestic opposition, Chancellor Kohl accepted the placement of our Pershing missiles. His nation stands guard against terrible another enemy-rampant communism, as insidious a killer as the Nazis. Only the techniques vary, and the Communist's target is every free person worldwide.

Germans have paid the price of world shame for 40 years. I believe it's time we put the past to rest. We can remember, but not make Germany relive it day after day. The time for reconciliation is now, and I believe we are fortunate to have a strong President who sees his duty, and is prepared to do it.

PRIVILEGES OF THE HOUSE-RESOLUTION DIRECTING COM-MITTEE ON RULES TO UNDER-INVESTIGATION TAKE CERNING PROXY VOTING

### H. RES. 151

Whereas, Rule XI(2)(f) of the House of Representatives authorizes committees to adopt rules which allow voting by proxy;

Whereas, the practice of voting by proxy is contrary to the principles of representative democracy and create an aura of secrecy in legislative proceedings, where none should exist in a truly representative body;

Whereas, voting by proxy increases the possibility and incidences of inaccurate representations of individual Members' votes thereby imparing, the individual rights and duties of Members of the House of Representatives in their representative capacity.

Whereas, such inaccuracies further infringe upon the integrity of the legislative process and the accuracy of official House records and documents. Now, therefore, be

Resolved. That the House Committee on Rules shall:

(1) Undertake an investigation concerning the matter of proxy voting;

(2) Determine whether procedures including, but not limited to, eliminating proxy voting should be established and

(3) Report back to the House within 45 legislative days with recommendations on how to ensure the accuracy of official House records and documents, and ensure the integrity of House committees.



Dear Mr. Michejda:

I am replying to your April 17 letter to President Reagan, sent through Faith Whittlesey, regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive

gesture which in no way detracted from his full and heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Dear Mr. President:

Thank you very much for your strong support for the ideals of freedom and democracy fought for by the Solidarity Trade Union in Poland. The Polish nation has had to battle for it's freedom for many centuries. The current struggle for freedom and democracy being waged by the Solidarity Union is an extention of the one begun with Poland's loss of freedom in September of 1939. During the fight against Nazi terror, the Polish Home Army, which you honored so graciously in August of last year, was in the vanguard of battle. Now, some of these same people, along with their sons and daughters, continue the fight against communism.

In this fight, as in all previous ones, Poles do not seek territory, international power, or spoils. They view their struggle as a fundamental battle between good and evil. In such a battle, symbols are very important. It is for this reason that we must bring to your attention some concerns within our community about certain aspects of your planned trip to Germany - specifically, the proposed wreath laying ceremony at the military cemetery in Bitburg.

Though your rationale and intentions in this ceremony are not questioned and are understood, we would like to make you aware of certain perspectives that may not have been brought to your attention.

There is grave concern within our community that in laying a wreath at a cemetery at which are buried the remains of Nazi SS Troops, the willing instruments of Hitler's terror, you will allow considerable latitude for misinterpretation. Some will view this gesture on your part as an act of honor for these soldiers. However unintentioned, you should not permit the possibility for this type of misinterpretation. The memory of the millions of Poles and others who died at the hands of these murderers, as well as the continued misery of those who had the fortune to survive cannot be profaned by even the hint of honor to the perpetrators.

Those who have given up their lives for the sake of good, and those who continue to do so now in Poland and elsewhere,

must know that their sacrifices will never be compared to those who supported and willingly performed evil.

For this reason Mr. President, in the name of the millions who died during World War II, in the name of the tens of millions who honor their memory and struggle on in Poland, we ask that you reconsider this gesture and perhaps find a German cemetery that does not contain Nazi troops.

Dear Mr. Ehrenkreutz:

I am replying to your April 15 letter to President Reagan, sent through Faith Whittlesey, regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracted from his full and

heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Dear Mr. President:

As supporters of your policy and admirers of your courage and wisdom, we beg you to reconsider your decision not to pay tribute to victims of Nazism in the Dachau concentration camp but, instead, to visit a German cemetery in Bittburg where many soldiers of dreaded Himmler's SS Divisions are buried. These two decisions are loaded with a symbolism which may deal a fatal blow to your image not just among surviving victims of Nazi crimes but among all those nations where the fight against Hitler's tyranny drew the heavy price of blood.

Our homeland, Poland, lost six million people, mostly civilians, to the premeditated murder of Hitler's German supporters. As Christians we believe in reconciliation with former enemies. The past cannot be changed, but for the sake of the future it should not be forgotten. The memory of those who died and the grief of their children deserves your respect.

As Americans of Polish extraction we are also sensitive to the tragedy of many others who were persecuted by the Nazis. More than three million Jews, citizens of Poland, suffered dreadful death in the Nazi extermination camps. The visit of Pope John Paul II, a son of Poland, in Aushwitz did not offend the feelings of those Germans who have broken with the crimes of their predecesors and want to build a new, democratic Germany.

Reconsideration of your decision will win you even greater respect in America as well as in those countries of Europe which suffered under the Nazi yoke and are now victims of yet another criminal tyranny.
