Mr. President,

Your visit to the German War Cemetery at Bitburg, Germany was, in the face of pressure and protest from the press and various groups, an act of courage. It was also great and responsible statesmanship.

During a reunion of the 36th. "Texas" Infantry Division in Italy last October, an old combat buddy and I laid a wreath at the U.S. War Cemetery in Nettuno, Italy as representatives of the Military Order of The Purple Heart. On our left, during that memorable ceremony, also laying a wreath honoring our war dead were representatives of the 26th. Panzer Grenadier Division - men we had fought against forty years ago. We had also honored, in the same way, their war dead at the German War Cemetery in Cassino a few days earlier.

This, after forty years, is the way it should be with friends and allies. None of the Veterans at those War Cemeteries in Italy, German or American, had forgotten the war nor the lessons it had taught. The war we had put behind us - where it belongs. The lessons learned were in evidence at those War Cemeteries in Italy.

Mr. President, you have the everlasting gratitude of this combat veteran and ex-Prisoner of War(captured, by the way, by the Waffen SS - and well treated) for your actions at Bitburg. I hope that the deep meaning of your visit is understood and appreciated by all Americans.



Dear Mr. President:

As a survivor of the Holocaust I send you my heartfelt support. I applaud both your speeches at Eegen Belsen and at Bitsburg. I also take this occassion to support your domestic policies and your foreign policy, especially as regards the "fire next door" in Nicaragua.

I was born in 1929 in Jarsaw, Foland into a Jewish family. In 1939 we fled the Nazis and, after two years in the Balkans, found our way to what was then the British mandate of Palestine. By father served in the Allied forces; after the war, with our native land falling into the hands of the Communists, we came to this country in 1947.

Anyone who has studied the history of the United States knows how abused, how criticized, how misunderstood were our greatest leaders, your predecessors in the Nhite House.

Remember the scorn heaped on Thomas Jefferson for the Lousiana Purchase? Remember the abuse heaped on Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Harry Truman? And now they are hailed as giants, as the great Fresidents - as you shall be in years and centuries to come.

God bless you and keep you, Mr. President. Remember, in moments of fatigue or doubt, in your many and difficult labors, what the Bible says: "A prophet without honor in his own country... "Future generations will pay homogage to your labors, your policies and your noble words. Flease accept this humble homogage from a naturalized citizen who is proud to be an American, and happy that he voted for you both in 1980 and 1984. And were it not for the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution I would be proud and happy to vote for you again in 1988.

To our First Public Servant future generations of Americans will repeat the words of the Bible, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."





Dear Mr. President:

We follow your moves and thoughts on television. I know you try your best to decide what you think is the right choice. I disagree with many of your decisions and with your hostile feelings toward Russia.

You recently visited a prison site in Germany. Forty years ago I visited the Buchenwald prison with four other doctors of the American Army Medical Corps. No one could forget what we saw. It was a terrible, terrible, terrible place, expressing human cruelty and depravity beyond ordinary imagination. I don't understand how the German people could have been even temporarily so irrational. But their leader thought he was doing "right" until he finally killed himself. While he lived and talked, they listened to him hopefully. They have been repenting and recovering ever since then.

I am opposed to all forms of shooting, blasting, bombing, torturing, and other military machine killing. I don't consider them a nation's defense or an index of national strength, only of destructive power, which is ultimately self-destructive.

Dear Barbara:

Thank you for sharing with us your constituent's views concerning the President's State Visit to the Pederal Republic of Germany. We fully understand your constituent's concerns and assure you the President's feelings about the crimes perpetrated against humanity by the Nazi regime are no less deeply felt. President Reagan attempted to make absolutely clear during his visit the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors which were committed in the name of the German state and our determination not to forget them.

President Reagan is certain Mrs. Sheiman agrees that, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. The President was asked by Chancellor Kohl to pay a visit to a German military cemetary in Bitburg, and he honored that request.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past and has, in countless ways, demonstrated concretely its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. With particular regard to the younger generation in Germany, it is important to demonstrate that, while we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism.

Let me make clear that the President does not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes, but rather one of acknowledgement of the democratic society the German people have built. He considers this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracts from his full and heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

Peace—after 40 years of anguish*

Alma B. Sonne is a high councilor in the Whittier California Stake. The following are excerpts from a speech he gave at the priesthood session of Whittier 1st Ward conference.

BY ALMA B. SONNE

WHITTIER, CALIF.

Iwo Jima is a small island, located about 700 miles off the coast of Japan. During World War II, it was a Japanese stronghold and was considered by many military experts to be so well fortified that it couldn't be conquered. Here, one of the most decisive battles of the Pacific was fought between American and Japanese forces.

The U.S. Marines landed there on Feb. 19, 1945. The ensuing battle turned out to be one of the most costly of the war.

Thirty-six days later, 7,000 Marines were dead, 23,000 were wounded and only 1,000 Japanese survived.

I was a rifle platoon leader and landed in the assault wave on the beach with 45



of what I thought were the finest Marines. Just 36 days later, I boarded ship with only eight men left.

I decided to revisit Iwo Jima for a 40th anniversary . . . commemorative service on the island. . . . However, I began

reliving the terrible moments of the bloody battle, and at one point, found that my decision to go had reopened so many bad memories that I just about opted against it. To keep in tune with what the Lord might want me to do, I fasted, prayed and went to the temple. By doing this, I was able to reaffirm my decision to go.

We left Tokyo the morning of Feb. 19 at 4 a.m. When we got to the island, we stepped off the plane to a beautiful sunny day with a calm breeze swaying the trees and green brush.

In traveling over the island, I had difficulty locating the once-familiar areas of our operation. The battle-scarred island, once marred with war dead, guns, tanks and bomb craters and stripped of vegetation . . . presented a pastoral beauty as if the battle had never happened. On the day of our visit, a tough sergeant major . . . said, with tears streaming down his cheeks, "God certainly must have been wearing His dress blues for this day." We were all touched by the events of that day, as if the Lord had planned it especially for us.

As I stood at the top of Suribachi volcano, I felt the quietude of the island. An overpowering feeling came over me, accompanied by an inner peace and a serenity that matched the peaceful island. It was as if the Lord was trying to say, "The battle is over. I have cleansed this island and washed it of its battle scars. Now you must put aside the bad memories of the battle, for they, too, must be erased to put your mind to rest."

I left the island with a serenity that had finally been found after 40 years of mental anguish.



Dear Ms. Silversmith:

I am replying to your May 23 letter to President Reagan regarding his trip to the Federal Republic of Germany.

During his visit, the President made absolutely clear the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors committed in the name of the German state before and during World War II, and our determination not to forget them. His itinerary included a ceremony at the site of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp to pay homage to those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the April 21 anniversary of the liberation of that camp and again during his own visit, "There can and should be no absolution."

President Reagan strongly believes, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. In this spirit, he was asked by Chancellor Kohl, and accepted the invitation, to visit a German military cemetery in Bitburg.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past. It has demonstrated concretely in countless ways its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. The President's trip to Bitburg included a visit to the large Bitburg Air Base, which houses members of both the U.S. and German Air Forces.

It is important to demonstrate, particularly to the younger generation in Germany, that although we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism. The President did not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes. Rather, it was an acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considered this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracted from his full and

heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

I regret that I did not indicate that I felt that I could remedy the situation and that the purpose of my letter to you was to call to your attention the callousness of many of the Veterans Administration employees and their lack of concern for the veterans and veteran's widows that they were employed to serve.

As a veteran of World War II with five campaign stars and an arrowhead on my ETO ribbon indicating that I landed on an unsecured beachhead at H-hour plus two, I am very concerned about the unqualified endorsement of the Veterans Administration by the American Legion, an organization that I have belonged to as far back as I can remember having enough money to join. This organization does not represent the thinking of my WWII friends and comrads.

I have sent my membership card back to National Commander Clarence M. Bacon in protest and I think you should be aware that the American Legion represents and speaks only for the politically active hierarchy of an organization which represents a very small percentage of the WW II veterans. Most of us only have used the organization for communications and information concerning our organization reunions.

I think that you should be aware that those of us that I have been in communication with who were in the North African, Sicilian, Italian, and European operations strongly support President Reagan in his efforts to heal the breach bylaying a wreath at a German cemetary. I think that most of us were aware at the time that the ordinary German soldier was only fighting for his homeland as we were.

In the very first days of 1945 our very small unit was in control of a mountain pass in the vicinity of Ste. Marie Aux Mines while we were in support of the 2nd French Corps in the Colmar Pocket. There was a small German Cemetary in the pass containing the kids that had defended the pass before we came. As an immature 21 year old sargeant, I looked at the head stones but could not see German soldiers but only the faces of boys like Smith, Tolbert, Ahlers, the kid whose name we didn't even get to know, and my buddy, Mc Donald. As I look at the picture of the cemetary today I cry on the inside almost as much for them as I do for Mac. You never get over it. Hobnail boots sticking out of a pile of rubble haunt you just as much as burned stubs of legs on the peddles of a burned out Sherman.
