## TO THE VETERANS OF THE U.S. ARMED FORCES

Nancy and I are pleased to send seasons greetings to the 27.3 million veterans of our Nation's Armed Forces and to their families and friends.

Christmas is a day of special blessings and togetherness for all Americans, a day of celebration affirming the supreme worth of sacrifice borne out of selfless love. Our Nation's veterans have a particular insight into this spiritual heart of the Nativity. Through your service in uniform, you bore such sacrifice so that no tyrant might ever crush the spirit of liberty and destroy the hope of lasting peace and goodwill among men. Many of you spent Christmases far from loved ones, uncertain when you would ever again gather with your families on this feast whose central image is that of the Holy Family.

America today enjoys the peace you sought, the peace you defended, the peace whose fruits we recently celebrated in national thanksgiving. You have given all of us a priceless Christmas gift — bought with your toil, wrapped in your courage, and tied with your devotion, wonderful at its first opening and more highly prized with each passing year.
