CONTINGENCY PRESS STATEMENT FOR USE AFTER WHITE HOUSE MEETING

Vice President Bush today met with Ilter Turkmen, the Foreign Minister of Turkey, who has come to the United States at the invitation of Secretary Haig.

The meeting included senior officials from both Turkey and the United States Government.

The Vice President and the Foreign Minister reviewed in a cordial way a number of bilateral and international issues. They discussed in particular the need for all NATO allies to continue concerted efforts to enhance their defense posture in response to Soviet actions in Southwest Asia and Europe. The Vice President expressed support for the efforts of General Evren and his early institute veforms which will make passible the return to democratic government in Turkey. He also noted with satisfaction Turkish efforts to improve bilateral relations with Greece, and Turkish support for the ongoing intercommunal talks on Cyprus.

The Vice President took special note of the excellent state of the Turkish-American relationship and the significance of this year, which marks the centennial of the birth of Mustafa Kemal Ataturk, the founder of modern Turkey.

SUBJECT: Statement on Turkey and the Ataturk Centennial

This year, the Republic of Turkey is commemorating the centennial anniversary of the birth of Mustafa Kemal Ataturk, the founder of modern Turkey and one of the imposing figures of the twentieth century. For Turkey and its people, the Ataturk Centennial will be as important a milestone as the 1976 Bicentennial was for us.

Understandably, Turkey wants its friends and allies to take part in the Ataturk Centennial. Specifically, the Turks have requested that the USG issue a high-level statement on Ataturk and his legacy during the March 30-April 9 visit of Foreign Minister Turkmen.

The Department of State believes that a White House statement would make a significant contribution to our already excellent bilateral relationship with Turkey. Accordingly, the Department attaches a suggested text with the recommendation that it be issued before Turkmen leaves the United States on April 9.



SUBJECT:

Attached are the briefing materials prepared by the State Department. They are comprehensive, covering the major areas of common interest between the United States and Turkey.

One area not mentioned in the papers which is on every Turk's mind these days is terrorism. It was the lawlessness in the country that in large measure prompted the Army to take over the government last year. Recently two Turkish diplomats were gunned down in Paris, causing a strong reaction of outrage in Turkey. Because Foreign Minister Turkmen would fully share this Administration's commitment to combat terrorism worldwide, you might find it useful to review with him the President's strong feelings in this area.

Since your meeting with Minister Turkmen will take the place of the President's previously scheduled meeting, two additions have been made to the briefing material:

- -- The memorandum from Secretary Haig to the President has been included;
- -- At Tab II the Press Talking Points prepared for the President's use immediately following his meeting have been included.

ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE AND DEBT RESCHEDULING

In January 1980, Turkey launched a major program to reorient its economy along the lines of greater reliance on market forces, higher exports, and incentives for the private sector. The program was designed to deal with an extremely high inflation rate and a balance-of-payments crisis aggravated by oil prices. Turkish implementation has been consistent and effective: inflation, still running at 50% annually, is way down; exports and workers remittances are at record highs. It will take several years of sustained effort to overcome the fundamental problems of the Turkish economy. In 1979, a Consortium to help Turkey through its adjustment process was formed under OECD aegis and FRG leadership. The Consortium pledged concessional aid of \$916 million in 1979 and \$1.16 billion in 1980. Other support has come from the IMF, the World Bank, and the Saudis.

For 1981, Turkey has asked the Consortium for \$1.5 billion. The pledging session will occur around mid-May. Our preliminary interagency assessment is that Turkey will need \$1.2-\$1.4 billion. In 1979 and 1980, the USG and the FRG each provided 25% of the package. On that basis, the USG "share" in 1981 (FY 1982) would be \$300-\$350 million.

The FY 1982 budget request has \$300 million in ESF for Turkey: two-thirds would be grant; one-third, a 20-year loan with five-year grace and 5% interest. An additional ExIm package in the \$50 million range may be possible.

In 1980, the USG and other creditor nations concluded a three-year debt rescheduling agreement with Turkey. Each year is contingent on GOT compliance with the IMF stabilization program. The first year included, on an exceptional basis, previously rescheduled debt (PRD). The GOT has asked whether a further rescheduling of PRD would be possible for the second and third years. We have demurred, citing our longstanding policy preference for more direct forms of assistance. A meeting to review the 1980 Debt Rescheduling Agreement, possibly including the PRD question, may take place after the pledging session.

SECURITY ASSISTANCE

The level of our security assistance for Turkey is the single most important element in our relationship. In the 1981 Defense and Economic Cooperation Agreement the USG pledged its "best efforts" to provide military and economic assistance to Turkey over the five-year term of the agreement. A significant portion of Turkey's defense equipment is obsolete. Turkish requirements for military equipment necessitate extensive financial assistance from the U.S., and as much direct credits as possible, particularly if the defense forces are to be modernized. The Administration reinforced the already substantial increases in Carter Administration's security assistance for Turkey by increasing the concessional component of the FMS program and by increasing the IMET program.

\$400 million of FMS credit is considered the minimum needed to arrest the deterioration of the Turkish armed forces. This figure may now be inadequate because of inflation and other factors. The FMS program concentrates on spare parts, upgrading existing equipment and some modernization. The FRG

which provides grant military assistance is the other major donor to Turkey. Turkey's economic difficulties make repayment of conventional FMS credits very difficult, and we have rescheduled most earlier loans. The large portion (\$250 million) of direct FMS credits in FY 82 will lessen the debt repayment burden. The IMET program, which has been underfunded for several years will be restored to pre-embargo levels.

The ESF program is discussed in the economic assistance paper.

TURKEY: RELATIONS WITH ARAB STATES AND ISRAEL

Turkey's role as a NATO state on the periphery of the Middle East raises major dilemmas for GOT policymaking. Turkey depends primarily on the West for security, political and economic support. But changing economic and political realities are also impelling Turkey to seek closer Middle Eastern ties with states which oppose certain Western interests.


The Turks have asked us to intercede with Saudi Arabia and the Gulf States for economic aid, but not oil shipments, to Turkey. In his February 19 meeting with Turkish Deputy Prime Minister Ozal, the Secretary agreed to take up the matter of bilateral aid with these states. Saudi Arabia is the only significant donor to Turkey not in the OECD consortium: in 1980, the Saudis loaned Turkey \$250 million, making them Turkey's third largest aid donor, after the US and FRG.

The Secretary should tell Turkmen that increased aid to Turkey and Pakistan will be discussed with the Saudis during his visit there. However, there is little chance of a positive response from Kuwait and the Emirates.

Aside from Egpyt, Turkey is the only Islamic Conference nation to maintain diplomatic ties with Israel. In response to growing Islamic pressures, however, Turkey has recently reduced the scope of these relations. In recent months, Turkey has downgraded the legations in Tel Aviv and Ankara to Second Secretary level. These steps have not affected other relations -- air flights, commercial and consular ties -- between Turkey and Israel.

Foreign Minister Turkmen assured Secretary Muskie in December, 1980 that barring a provocative step by Israel, Turkey would not further reduce its ties with the GOI. We need to make certain that commitment has not changed. We should also press Turkey to resist any efforts by supporters of the PLO to amend Resolution 242 at this fall's UNGA, or to suspend Israel's UNGA membership. It is unlikely that Turkey will vote against the PLO directly.

Attached are the briefing materials prepared by the State Department. They are comprehensive, covering the major areas of common interest between the United States and Turkey.

One area not mentioned in the papers which is on every Turk's mind these days is terrorism. It was the lawlessness in the country that in large measure prompted the Army to take over the government last year. Recently two Turkish diplomats were gunned down in Paris, causing a strong reaction of outrage in Turkey. Because Foreign Minister Turkmen would fully share this Administration's commitment to combat terrorism worldwide, you might find it useful to review with him the President's strong feelings in this area.

ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE AND DEBT RESCHEDULING

In January 1980, Turkey launched a major program to reorient its economy along the lines of greater reliance on market forces, higher exports, and incentives for the private sector. The program was designed to deal with an extremely high inflation rate and a balance-of-payments crisis aggravated by oil prices. Turkish implementation has been consistent and effective: inflation, still running at 50% annually, is way down; exports and workers remittances are at record highs. It will take several years of sustained effort to overcome the fundamental problems of the Turkish economy. In 1979, a Consortium to help Turkey through its adjustment process was formed under OECD aegis and FRG leadership. The Consortium pledged concessional aid of \$916 million in 1979 and \$1.16 billion in 1980. Other support has come from the IMF, the World Bank, and the Saudis.

For 1981, Turkey has asked the Consortium for \$1.5 billion. The pledging session will occur around mid-May. Our preliminary interagency assessment is that Turkey will need \$1.2-\$1.4 billion. In 1979 and 1980, the USG and the FRG each provided 25% of the package. On that basis, the USG "share" in 1981 (FY 1982) would be \$300-\$350 million.

The FY 1982 budget request has \$300 million in ESF for Turkey: two-thirds would be grant; one-third, a 20-year loan with five-year grace and 5% interest. An additional ExIm package in the \$50 million range may be possible.

In 1980, the USG and other creditor nations concluded a three-year debt rescheduling agreement with Turkey. Each year is contingent on GOT compliance with the IMF stabilization program. The first year included, on an exceptional basis, previously rescheduled debt (PRD). The GOT has asked whether a further rescheduling of PRD would be possible for the second and third years. We have demurred, citing our longstanding policy preference for more direct forms of assistance. A meeting to review the 1980 Debt Rescheduling Agreement, possibly including the PRD question, may take place after the pledging session.

SECURITY ASSISTANCE

The level of our security assistance for Turkey is the single most important element in our relationship. In the 1981 Defense and Economic Cooperation Agreement the USG pledged its "best efforts" to provide military and economic assistance to Turkey over the five-year term of the agreement. A significant portion of Turkey's defense equipment is obsolete. Turkish requirements for military equipment necessitate extensive financial assistance from the U.S., and as much direct credits as possible, particularly if the defense forces are to be modernized. The Administration reinforced the already substantial increases in Carter Administration's security assistance for Turkey by increasing the concessional component of the FMS program and by increasing the IMET program.

\$400 million of FMS credit is considered the minimum needed to arrest the deterioration of the Turkish armed forces. This figure may now be inadequate because of inflation and other factors. The FMS program concentrates on spare parts, upgrading existing equipment and some modernization. The FRG

which provides grant military assistance is the other major donor to Turkey. Turkey's economic difficulties make repayment of conventional FMS credits very difficult, and we have rescheduled most earlier loans. The large portion (\$250 million) of direct FMS credits in FY 82 will lessen the debt repayment burden. The IMET program, which has been underfunded for several years will be restored to pre-embargo levels.

The ESF program is discussed in the economic assistance paper.

We understand that <u>preliminary</u> approval had been given to the idea of a Presidential meeting with Turkish Foreign Minister Turkman. We have reexamined the pros and cons of such an event in the light of the President's crammed calendar and the fact that a Turkman call on the President would fall in the particularly tight period of Dutch Prime Minister van Agt's visit.

We conclude that it is neither necessary nor desirable for the President to meet with Turkman and believe that the considerations we originally advanced against such a meeting in our memo of March 14 (Tab A) have even greater relevance now. We strongly favor dropping the idea of a Presidential meeting and going with State's recommendation of a Vice Presidential meeting. (C)

RECOMMENDATION:

That no meeting between the President and the Turkish Foreign Minister be scheduled at this time.

Attached is a State recommendation that the President meet briefly with Minister Turkmen during his Washington visit. This is on the heels of a request for a meeting with the Vice President, which we forwarded with a favorable recommendation. Note that the request is not signed by the Secretary himself, as have been other visit requests of higher importance. (U)

We recommend against this meeting:

- -- Reception by the President is not crucial to the success of Turkmen's visit here;
- -- We have no outstanding issues with Turkey that require urgent resolution;
- -- The Greek Foreign Minister would quickly request equal time;
- -- State needs to think through its requests for White House visits ahead of time, rather than this nickel-and-dime approach.

Subject: Recommendation that the President Meet
Briefly with Turkish Foreign Minister Turkmen

At the invitation of Secretary Haig, Turkish Foreign Minister Ilter Turkmen will visit Washington March 31-April 4. Turkmen has expressed strong interest in a call on the President. The Department believes that a brief meeting in the Oval Office would be most helpful in demonstrating that the USG values Turkey as a NATO partner and ascribes special importance to the Turkish-American relationship. Above all, a Turkmen visit with the President would highlight the fundamental importance of GOT political and military cooperation to USG interests in Europe and SWA.

Accordingly, the Department strongly recommends that the President receive Foreign Minister Turkmen for ten minutes on the afternoon of April 1 or on April 2. The Department is also recommending that the Vice President meet with Turkmen.
