Dear Mr. Dorian:

I have been asked to reply to your letter to the President expressing your views and those of other Armenian Americans.

I am sure that you are aware of the President's high regard for Americans of Armenian descent and the important contributions they have made to this country. From his long experience in California politics he has come to know well and respect the talents and great contribution made by individuals such as George Deukmejian, Governor of California, and many others. His remarks to a group of ethnic journalists that Turks and Armenians should sit down to work out their differences reflect his conviction that such differences can only be resolved by means of frank, positive dialogue.

At the same time, you can also appreciate the President's strong position on the subject of international terrorism.

This scourge of modern mankind has struck heavily at us, most notably in the terrorist bombing in Beirut, and it has been and will be a priority goal of the Administration to give substance to our desire for greater international cooperation to eradicate terrorism.

It is a crushing feeling to be the most powerful human being on earth. Your responsibilities are beyond imagination, your burdens crushingly heavy and, needless to say, like all Americans, you have the heartfelt prayers and unreserved support of American Armenians.

But please, Mr. President, do not permit the defeat of the ideal on which our beloved country is founded. Justice, human rights, freedom and truth have been the overpowering forces which attracted our forebears to seek a new life in America. We have toiled far and hard in attaining the proud label "Loyal Americans" and, next to the Bible, our citizenship paper is the most worshiped document we all cherish.

Do not blame, Mr. President, the American Armenians who are weary, stung and frustrated by your glossing over the Armenian genocide of 1915 as only a "terrible trouble" during your recent press conference for ethnic publications. It was not "terrible trouble, " Mr. President, it was the first genocide of the 20th century, with all its misery, bloodshed, and the two million dead or deported. The documents are there, proof easily accessible, including Congressional hearings and statements of all US presidents since 1915.

Regardless of the sanctity of our objectives and the validity of our cause, no thinking American Armenian wants to be linked with errorism and violence. This will be too ugly a curse and too heavy a burden for Armenians, who were the first nation to have accepted the one body, one spirit, one Lord, one faith, and one God, and who, with so much suffering, hard work and sacrifice, defied the laws of survival and secceeded in proving that it is possible to overcome all challenges, including genocide.

In all your press conferences, speeches, weekly radio talks and television appearances, you have championed the cause of justice, human rights, reason and truth, always emphasizing the unacceptability of terrorism and force. Not only do we subscribe to all these, Mr. President, but with one accord generously offer our denunciation of terrorism to achieve our objectives. We embrace your counsel that we, Turks and Armenians, "ought to sit down and work out our differences."

The Turk, however, refuses to heed your call. The Turkish government is engaged in distorting history, the Turkish embassy in Washington is busy in using its US aid dollars to pursuade Senators, Congressmen, the State Department, and state governors that the genocide is the figment of our imagination, and Ankara is engaged in burdening the desks of every American official, college president, high school principal and libraries all over our land with tons of books, leaflets and "documents" painting Armenians as terrorists and their rights and demands as non-existent.

With the august power of your position, Mr. President, and your world-wide influence, I very respectfully suggest that you can help dispel the environment of frustration, anger and rage of the American Armenians by asking Turkey to break away from her untenable position and respond to the peaceful initiatives Armenians are ready to undertake. We never abandon hope that your championing of justice will also include the Armenian cause and the just demands of the American Armenians.

Dear Mr. Haratunian:

Thank you for your recent letter regarding issues raised by the article "Armenian Terrorism: A Profile," which appeared in the August 1982 issue of the Department of State Bulletin.

The article, a part of a special section intended to convey the serious concern of the United States over terrorism, whatever the group or justification invoked for violent actions, was published as an article of interest and not as an official statement of policy.

The following editor's note was published in the very next (September 1982) issues of the Bulletin:

"The article, 'Armenian Terrorism: A Profile,' appeared in the feature on terrorism in the August 1982 issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>, does not necessarily reflect an official position of the Department of State, and the interpretative comments in the article are solely those of the author."

I have been assured that neither the article "Armenian Terrorism: A Profile" nor the accompanying footnote represented an effort to present an official position of the Department of State.

Thank you for your expression of concern. I hope this information is useful in clarifying this matter.

Dear Mr. Clark:

It is absolutely astounding to read in the Department of State Bulletin of August, 1982, that our government considers the historical record of 1915 in Turkey as being "ambiguous" and that the State Department "does not endorse allegations that the Turkish Government committed a genocide against the Armenian people".

As a long-time supporter of the Republican party and this administration, I never dreamed that we would ever turn our backs on innocent victims for the sake of geopolitical realities. I am not one of those who endorses violence or terrorism, however justified the cause, and I have spoken out publicly against Armenian terrorists. 

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MRS. REAGAN'S COFFEE FOR MRS. TURGUT OZAL

BACKGROUND: Mrs. Ozal can understand English but is sometimes shy about speaking it. She may rely on the ladies accompanying her to translate her remarks. The United States and Turkey have cooperated successfully on narcotics interdiction since 1972. Mrs. Ozal has not been invited to attend the First Ladies Conference on August 24-25.

NARCOTICS:

- -- I am deeply concerned about the growing abuse of narcotics in the United States and I am working hard to help educate our people to this menace.
- -- We appreciate your government's excellent cooperation in controlling narcotics production and trade. Turkey is helping a great deal to reduce the flow of narcotics to the United States.

CULTURE:

- -- Americans are fascinated by Turkish culture, but perhaps not well enough informed. I am told the National Gallery is arranging an exhibition on Suleiman the Magnificant which will open in Washington in 1987 and been shown in other cities as well. This will be a wonderful way for Americans to learn more about Turkey.
- -- What other cultural exchanges does Turkey plan with the United States?

CAMPAIGNING:

-- I find political campaigning in the United States exciting and exhausting. Tell me about campaigning in Turkey. What role does a candidate's wife play?

SUBJECT: Request for Coffee Given by the First Lady in Honor of Mrs. Ozal

Turkish Prime Minister Turgut Ozal will be in Washington for an official working visit from April 1 to April 5. He will be received at the White House for a meeting with the President and luncheon on April 2. This will be the first such visit by a Turkish head of government in over a decade, and the Turkish government attaches great importance to it.

The Turks hope the First Lady will host a social event for Mrs. Ozal and other ladies of the delegation in connection with the Prime Minister's visit. Such a gesture would be particularly appropriate in the Turkish case, because of Mrs. Reagan's strong interest in combatting narcotics addiction. Although Mrs. Ozal has not been invited to participate in the First Ladies' Drug Conference in April, Turkey has an outstanding record in stamping out the illegal production of opium and curtailing narcotics trafficking. The U.S. has provided considerable assistance to Turkey in support of this effort, and we have greatly valued the cooperation we have received from Turkey in this area, over the past two decades.

A decision by the First Lady to give a coffee in honor of Mrs. Ozal would be both appreciated and considered appropriate by the Turkish government. We strongly recommend that the First Lady agree to host such a function.
