Dear Mr. President,

I read with great interest your letter dated September 15, 1983 concerning new US initiatives at the Geneva LR INF negotiations, and highly appreciated the complementary contacts and consultations of Assistant Secretary of State Richard BURT with the Experts of Allied Nations in the Special Consultative Group in Brussels on 19 September 1983.

The first of your three proposals is an appropriate clarification, useful above all for the internal German debate, but also for the Geneva negotiations themselves.

The second proposal, the main opening for the Geneva negotiations, also seems to contain great possibilities for future moves and progress in the negotiation.

The last proposal eliminates an argument used by the Soviets for blocking the negotiations and in so far, it may prove very useful, although in the short run we might be drawn into rather lengthy discussions as to which side presently holds a nuclear aircraft superiority.

The new US initiative seems to be timely and is, in my opinion, by far the most important initiative till now aimed at progress in the INF arms control negotiations. The Luxembourg Government welcomes and approves the new proposals and will support them nationally and internationally.

SUBJECT: White House State Visit

I would like to join with the State Department and the American Embassy (Luxembourg) in strongly urging that the Grand Duke and Dutchess of Luxembourg be invited to the United States as the President's quests in the second half of 1984. Luxembourg is among our strongest NATO Allies and has been quite helpful to us in this Administration.

The last Luxembourg State visit was made in 1963 by the Duke's mother. There is the possibility he will abdicate in favor of his son in the next two years. For him not to be officially received in Washington could be harmful to one of our most unswerving relationships.

Elections will be held in Luxembourg in late spring and the absence of an invitation by that time could play into the hands of the opposition. Moreover, President Reagan mentioned to Luxembourg Ambassador Peters when he presented his credentials last July, that he would hope to receive the Duke and Dutchess.

As you know, such a visit cements ties, is a symbol of appreciation, and helps to keep a relationship on a steady course. This would certainly be true for this State visit.

Please let me know what might be arranged.



How to respond to a letter from the U.S. Ambassador to Luxembourg John Dolibois.

#### Facts

John has written you a letter concerning the response to the recent State Visit by Grand Duke Jean. He also updates the story of George Mergenthaler, the war-hero whom you mentioned in your White House dinner remarks: Mr. Joseph Harpes, the village historian who knew George Mergenthaler, wrote John a letter which sheds some more light on the story.

Your letter (Tab A) acknowledges Dolibois's interesting note and expresses appreciation for sending the Harpes letter on Mergenthaler.



Dear Mr. President:

All of Luxembourg is still buzzing enthusiastically about the successful State Visit of their Grand Duke and Grand Duchess to the White House and the United States. Press reaction has been one hundred percent positive and our fine bilateral relationship is stronger than ever. We thank you, Mr. President, and Mrs. Reagan for your gracious hospitality and warm reception. Winnie and I will never forget that memorable day.

During our San Francisco stop, I had the pleasure of being at the same table with Mr. and Mrs. Diepenbrock of Sacramento, who support you most ardently as former neighbors and friends, and urged me to let you know we enjoyed meeting.

In your remarks at the White House dinner, you were kind enough to mention the story of George Mergenthaler, the GI who gave his life in the village of Eschweiler during the Battle of the Bulge. The Luxembourg TV broadcast your remarks and the people of Eschweiler were absolutely ecstatic. I have received a number of calls and letters from the villagers, and enclose a letter from Mr. Joseph Harpes, the retired schoolmaster of Eschweiler who knew George Mergenthaler well, and wrote his story for the village history. Mr. Harpes is 84 years of age and I am happy to add a translation of his letter. Like the story I shared with you about the American-Samoan cavalry trooper on patrol along the East German border, this too has a sequel.

More than ever, Winnie and I are extremely proud to represent you and the USA here in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. Thank you again, Mr. President, for giving me the privileged opportunity to serve our country.

#### TRANSLATION

"In the name of our entire village I wish to thank you, Excellency, for passing along the story of our own war hero, George Mergenthaler, to the President of the United States. There were many people in the community who cried when they heard and saw the President of the greatest nation in the world, on the radio and on television, speak of our little hometown. As you know, when Pastor Bodson was among us he saw to everything dealing with George Mergenthaler, his burial, repatriation of his remains, the annual commemoration of his sacrifice, and the restoration of the village church in his memory. But when (the pastor) was transferred to Stadtgrund, I took over the responsibility, and since I experienced the whole tragedy, I am pleased to be in charge of keeping alive the memory of George Mergenthaler.

To date I have received well over 400 Americans, among them many military personnel, relatives of GI's who also died here, writers and journalists, who interested themselves in the Mergenthaler story. This includes George's fiancee, later Mrs. E. Evan-Walker, from Buckboard Road, Tucson, Arizona. She cried a lot and requested Masses in George's name. Her brother was George's best friend, and he lies buried in nearby Wiltz. (Also killed in battle.) Many Luxembourgers make pilgrimages to the memorial for George; schoolchildren and organizations. My best memories are of the recent visit by the American-Luxembourg Society.

Two months ago I had a special visit: a farmer's wife and her husband from Ettelbruck. She had been the housekeeper for George Mergenthaler's parents for 3 years until they began to suffer from old age illnesses and moved to a home. She told me many intimate stories of her inspiring experiences.

In conclusion, thank you once again, Mr. Ambassador, for your goodwill. I hope to see you again at the Memorial service on January 20, 1985, and remain your admiring friend,
