SUBJECT: Your Meeting with Malaysian Home Affairs
Minister Ghazali Shafie

Attached are papers prepared by State for your meeting with Ghazali Shafie on 16 April.

In addition to State's points, I suggest you spell out our policy objectives on Indo-China:

- To reduce Soviet presence.
- To support ASEAN and the Thais.
- Withdrawal of Vietnamese troops from Cambodia.
- Genuine independence for Laos and Cambodia.

Then I suggest you fill them in on your talks with Ambassador Chai of the PRC, our strategic relationship with Peking, and our position on Taiwan under the Taiwan Relations Act.

Finally, you should know that US-Malaysian two-way trade totaled \$3.7 billion last year, up 20% from the previous year, and that the U.S. has about a \$500 million deficit with Malaysia.

We are now importing oil, rubber, tin and palm oil from Malaysia. Both Shell and Exxon are in exploration and production offshore Malaysia.

SUBJECT: The Vice President's Meeting with Malaysian Home Affairs Minister Ghazali Shafie, Thursday, April 16 at 4:30 p.m.

SUMMARY: Malaysia is a member of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN); support for ASEAN is the central element in our Southeast Asian policy. Minister Ghazali is the closest foreign policy advisor to the Malaysian Prime Minister. The purpose of this meeting is to indicate U.S. support for Malaysia and ASEAN and to discuss policies toward Indochina. Refugees and narcotics matters might also come up.

I. CHECKLIST OF OBJECTIVES

1. Reaffirm ASEAN's importance to U.S. interests in Southeast Asia.
2. Sound out Malaysian views on a solution to the problem of Kampuchea.
3. Express appreciation for Malaysia's policy of first asylum for Vietnamese boat people.
4. Discuss international efforts against drug trafficking.

III. SETTING

Malaysia is a member of ASEAN (other members: Thailand, Singapore, Indonesia, the Philippines), the Non-Aligned Movement, the Islamic Conference, the Group of 77 (developing nations) and the Commonwealth. Despite its non-aligned status, Malaysia has since its independence in 1957 been oriented toward the West and it maintains a defense arrangement with the U.K., Australia, New Zealand and Singapore. Since the fall of Saigon in 1975 and the Vietnamese invasion of Kampuchea in 1978, Malaysia has come to regard membership in ASEAN as the most effective guarantee of its security. Likewise, support for ASEAN has become the key element in U.S. Southeast Asian policy (see Talking Points at Tab A). While Malaysia maintains a public posture of equidistance between the Superpowers, in the past nine months there has been a definite warming in bilateral relations, and a turn toward closer security cooperation with the U.S. This has taken the form of requests for greatly increased military training in the U.S., for more frequent port visits by U.S. warships and for joint military exercises. There are no important problems in our bilateral relations.

Home Affairs Minister Tan Sri Ghazali Shafie (addressed as Mr. Minister), while not the Foreign Minister, is responsible for the most sensitive issues in Malaysia's external relations, including China, the Soviet Union, Indochina and the ASEAN countries. In his capacity as Home Affairs Minister, Ghazali is also responsible for security matters, intelligence liaison, refugee policy and the anti-narcotics effort. Philippine leaders believe that Ghazali has been, and may still be, involved in covert support of the Moro National Liberation Front; we have no definitive information on such involvement.

The subject most on Ghazali's mind should be Indochina, specifically the search for a solution to the Vietnamese occupation of Kampuchea. Ghazali is one of ASEAN's most articulate proponents of the theory that China, not the Soviet Union and Vietnam, is the greatest long-term threat to regional security, and this colors his views on an eventual Indochina settlement (see Background and Talking Points at Tab B). Contingency talking points on refugees and narcotics are at Tabs C and D. A biography of Ghazali is at Tab E.

US/ASEAN Relations

The United States has important strategic and economic interests in the ASEAN countries, including access to air and sealanes crucial to projecting force into Southwest Asia. ASEAN states are key suppliers of strategic commodities including tin, rubber, and petroleum, and collectively are our fifth largest trading partner. Their cooperation is crucial to success of our narcotics control and refugee policies.

Although formally an economic organization, ASEAN political cooperation has increased greatly since Vietnam's invasion of Kampuchea. ASEAN has avoided becoming a regional security organization, but its members are significantly increasing bilateral defense cooperation among themselves.

US/ASEAN relations are excellent. ASEAN maintains a regular "dialogue" with us as it does with Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the EC. Our cooperation helped formulate a common ASEAN position on Kampuchea and Afghanistan. In its dialogue with ASEAN, the U.S. has stressed the importance of unity among its members.

TALKING POINTS

- WE ARE PLEASED WITH THE CONSTRUCTIVE ROLE ASEAN HAS PLAYED IN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS.

- A UNIFIED ASEAN IS A STRONG ASEAN.

- U.S. SUPPORT FOR ASEAN WILL CONTINUE TO BE A KEY ASPECT OF OUR SOUTHEAST ASIAN POLICY.

KAMPUCHEA

ASEAN has taken the lead in opposing the Vietnamese occupation of Kampuchea. A recent USG policy review concluded that U.S. objectives re Kampuchea are:

- (a) preservation of Thai security and strengthening ASEAN;
- (b) withdrawal of Vietnamese troops from Kampuchea;
- (c) Khmer survival and national self-determination; and
- (d) reduction of Soviet influence and elimination of Soviet military access to Indochina.

We also concluded that patience and increased pressure on Vietnam are needed to impose a cost for their continued occupation of Kampuchea and induce a change in Vietnamese policies.

Because of differing historical and cultural backgrounds, the various countries in ASEAN approach regional issues from different perspectives. Thailand and Singapore tend to see Vietnam as the greatest threat to stability in Southeast Asia, while Indonesia and Malaysia, with large ethnic Chinese minorities, perceive a greater threat from China. This leads some Indonesians and Malaysians to favor an early settlement in Kampuchea closer to Vietnamese terms over prolonged confrontation with Vietnam. (Ghazali is a particularly strong advocate of this point of view.) Despite these differences, ASEAN has managed to set forth a unified joint approach to dealing with Vietnam. For example, for the past two years ASEAN has supported maintaining the UN credentials of Democratic Kampuchea against the claim of the Vietnam-sponsored Heng Samrin regime in order to sustain the legitimacy of the Cambodian resistance. We have supported this position and will do so again this year in the UN.

The ASEANs are considering appealing to SYG Waldheim to convene an international conference on Kampuchea, as provided for in an October 1980 ASEAN-sponsored UNGA resolution. The Vietnamese say they will not participate, but the ASEANs want to proceed with a conference to retain the initiative and keep pressure on Hanoi.

Finally, we have been watching the talks between the DK and the non-Communist Khmer nationalists -- Prince Sihanouk and former Premier Son Sann -- on forming a united front to oppose the Vietnamese. The outcome of those negotiations is uncertain.

TALKING POINTS

-- THE U.S. SEES THE SOVIET UNION AND ITS VIETNAMESE SURROGATE AS THE EXTERNAL SECURITY THREAT TO ASEAN.

-- THE U.S. FIRMLY SUPPORTS ASEAN IN WORKING TOGETHER TO INCREASE THE PRESSURE ON VIETNAM TO NEGOTIATE SERIOUSLY ABOUT KAMPUCHEA. PATIENCE IS NEEDED FOR THE STRATEGY TO SUCCEED AND WE MUST CONTINUE EFFORTS TO ISOLATE VIETNAM POLITICALLY AND ECONOMICALLY IN THE MEANWHILE.

-- THE ASEAN DECISION TO PROCEED WITH AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE, AS CALLED FOR IN THE UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION, OFFERS THE BEST BASIS FOR A SETTLEMENT OF THE KAMPUCHEAN PROBLEM. IF ASEAN ISSUES A PUBLIC CALL FOR THE SECRETARY GENERAL TO CONVENE A CONFERENCE, THE U.S. WILL ENTHUSIASTICALLY SUPPORT ASEAN.

-- WE WELCOME THE RALLYING OF KHMER NATIONALISTS TO OPPOSE THE VIETNAMESE OCCUPATION OF KAMPUCHEA, AND BELIEVE SUCH RESPECTED NATIONALISTS AS SON SANN AND PRINCE SIHANOUK CAN PLAY AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN THIS EFFORT.

NARCOTICS

Malaysia has a huge domestic heroin addiction problem and is a major transshipment point for heroin from the Golden Triangle region of Burma, Thailand and Laos, an area of particular importance to us in the coming year because of an expected bumper crop in opium. Ghazali has termed drug addiction Malaysia's greatest threat. The U.S. and Malaysia cooperate closely on narcotics matters. There is a three-man Drug Enforcement Administration office in Kuala Lumpur and a wide-ranging training program in drug treatment and rehabilitation funded by the State Department's Bureau for International Narcotics Matters. We also supply enforcement training to police and customs officials.

TALKING POINTS

-- BOTH THE U.S. AND MALAYSIA HAVE SERIOUS DRUG ADDICTION PROBLEMS WHICH HARM OUR MOST IMPORTANT RESOURCE -- OUR PEOPLE.

-- OUR JOINT EFFORTS AGAINST DRUG ABUSE AND INTERNATIONAL HEROIN TRAFFICKING ARE THEREFORE AN IMPORTANT PART OF OUR BILATERAL RELATIONS.

-- WE EXPECT THAT THIS COOPERATION WILL CONTINUE IN THE FUTURE. I HOPE THIS TRIP IS INSTRUMENTAL IN ENHANCING OUR MUTUAL EFFORTS.

(Note: Although we have a significant cooperative anti-narcotics program with Malaysia, we are not looking to broaden the scope of the program, especially in the treatment area. Malaysia is already helpful in enforcement against international traffickers. The treatment training is only of indirect benefit to the U.S., and has not been used efficiently by the Malaysians. We do not want to encourage additional Malaysian requests for this kind of assistance.)

INDOCHINESE REFUGEE PROGRAM

Malaysia continues to play a key role in the refugee drama, as a country of first asylum with a current refugee population of more than 11,000. To ensure GOM maintenance of its first asylum policy, we and other resettlement countries must provide a steady, substantial resettlement flow out of the Malaysian camps, thereby reducing the refugee population in Malaysia. We have been largely successful in this effort, and we therefore have no current major problems or disagreements with the GOM on refugee matters.

The Malaysians, however, sensitive to their own serious communal problems, keep a very close eye on refugee flow and will react abruptly if they perceive any sign that resettlement countries -- particularly the U.S. -- are changing their policies in ways that might leave them "holding the bag". They are adamant that there will be no local resettlement of Indochinese refugees except for a few ethnic Khmer Muslims, and they are only willing to accept these people under the pretext that they may ultimately be resettled elsewhere.

TALKING POINTS

-- WE APPRECIATE THE CONSTRUCTIVE APPROACH MALAYSIA TAKES TOWARD THE RESOLUTION OF THE INDOCHINESE REFUGEE SITUATION. BY PROVIDING FIRST ASYLUM TO THOSE WHO HAVE FLED INDOCHINA, YOU HAVE MADE A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION TO SOLVING THIS MAJOR INTERNATIONAL PROBLEM.

-- FOR OUR PART, WE REMAIN COMMITTED TO DEVOTING MAJOR RESOURCES TO HANDLING THIS PROBLEM, ESPECIALLY THROUGH THE CONTINUED RESETTLEMENT IN THE U.S. OF LARGE NUMBERS OF INDOCHINESE REFUGEES. THIS YEAR, AS YOU KNOW, WE PLAN TO RESETTLE UP TO 168,000 INDOCHINESE IN THE U.S.

-- WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH MALAYSIA AND OUR
OTHER FRIENDS TO CONTINUE THE SUBSTANTIAL PROGRESS WE
HAVE MADE IN THE PAST 18 MONTHS IN REDUCING REFUGEE CAMP
POPULATIONS AND ALLEVIATING THE LARGE BURDEN YOU AND THE
OTHER FIRST ASYLUM COUNTRIES HAVE BORNE.





2. THE WHITE HOUSE HAS RECONFIRMED APPROVAL FOR THE JANUARY 1984 OFFICIAL WORKING VISIT TO WASHINGTON OF PRIME MINISTER MAHATHIR. AS EMBASSY IS AWARE, THE OFFICIAL WORKING VISIT WILL INCLUDE A MEETING WITH THE PRESIDENT, A LUNCH HOSTED BY THE PRESIDENT, AND MEETINGS WITH CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS, AND CABINET AND OTHER OFFICIALS AS APPROPRIATE.
