VISIT OF MUSA HITAM, DEPUTY PRIME MINISTER OF MALAYSIA
October 12, 1983

I. SETTING AND OBJECTIVES

Deputy Prime Minister Musa Hitam is in the United States as head of the Malaysian delegation to the United Nations General Assembly. He is the second ranking member of the United Malays National Organization (UMNO), the dominant political party in the ruling coalition. Musa's visit comes at a time when the Malaysians have indicated an interest in expanding ties with the U.S. Bilateral relations, while satisfactory, have been strained periodically by differences over commodity issues. We are making a concerted effort to overcome these irritants, specifically by negotiating a Memorandum of Understanding with Malaysia and the other ASEAN countries which will provide a useful consultative framework to deal with the question of GSA tin sales.

Under the leadership of Prime Minister Mahathir, Malaysia has assumed an increasingly activist role in foreign affairs. Malaysia values its non-aligned credentials; is an active yet moderate member of the Non-Aligned Movement; and generally supports moderate positions on Middle East issues. As a member of ASEAN, Malaysia has played a leading role in efforts to forge a political solution to the Kampuchean issue and induce Vietnamese withdrawal from Kampuchea. We recommend the following objectives for your luncheon meeting with Deputy Prime Minister Musa.

1. Establish personal rapport and assure him of your personal sensitivity to his views and concerns.
2. Indicate U.S. desire to continue to expand our bilateral relations based on a shared interest in regional security, economic progress, and mutual respect.

II. ISSUE TO BE RAISED

1. A Measured Expansion of U.S.-Malaysian Ties.
The Malaysians have evinced sensitivity about the paucity of high level contacts between the Mahathir and Reagan Administrations. (Prime Minister Mahathir is the only ASEAN head of state who had not yet paid an official working visit to the United States). The luncheon provides an opportunity to remedy this situation and an occasion to set the stage for the visit

of Prime Minister Mahathir, now scheduled for January 1984. We believe the Memorandum of Understanding on GSA tin sales will do much to put a major irritant in our bilateral relations behind us. It will be important to draw Musa out on other areas of possible cooperation which might be discussed during the Prime Minister's visit.

III. CONTINGENCY ISSUES (Only If Raised)

1. Global Economic Issues and Trade. Musa may elicit your personal sympathy with Malaysia's desire that the U.S. be responsive to developing nations on North-South issues, increased access to the U.S. market, and commodity matters. He should be assured that we have his concerns in mind.

2. "Kuala Lumpur Plan" for Peace in the Middle East. Malaysia hosted an East Asian Regional Conference on Palestine in May 1983 and urged us to participate in September's Geneva Conference on Palestine. The Malaysians have advocated the establishment of an independent Palestinian state to be administered by the United Nations Security Council. While expressing our appreciation for the moderate leadership Malaysia has exercised, we continue to doubt the practicality of any "mandated solution" to the Middle East problem and believe a lasting peace will only emerge as the result of agreement among the Middle East parties concerned as called for in President Reagan's initiative of September 1982. You should reassure Musa that we have Malaysia's views in mind and that we will continue our best efforts toward Middle East peace.

3. Malaysian Initiative on Antarctica. Malaysia is leading an effort to have the question of Antarctica discussed at the U.N., presumably with a view to establishing a common heritage regime in the region. We view this initiative as unnecessary and potentially disruptive of the existing Antarctic Treaty which has been remarkably successful in keeping the region free from international rivalries and discord. The U.S. and U.S.S.R. are both consultative parties and cooperate closely. The treaty is open to accession by any member of the United Nations. The U.S. does not recognize claims to sovereignty in Antarctica, but we are concerned that efforts to eliminate claims such as the Malaysian initiative will only serve to intensify commitment to them and lead to conflict.

- We look forward to continued close contacts with ASEAN on matters of common interest and applaud Malaysia's strong leadership role in the region.

PROPOSED TOAST

We are delighted today to welcome to Washington a distinguished visitor who has graciously taken time from what I know is a busy schedule as head of his country's delegation to the United Nations General Assembly to visit us here. I hope, Mr. Deputy Prime Minister, that your visit will provide a useful exchange of views. Certainly we all benefit from the opportunity to meet with you and discuss matters of mutual concern and interest. Indeed, we earnestly desire further expansion of high level contacts with senior Malaysian leaders. We will do our best to encourage this in the months ahead.

The United States is profoundly aware of the important role your country continues to play in world affairs. I take special note of the critical part that Malaysia plays in the Association of South East Asian Nations. In our view, ASEAN has contributed to the enormous progress which Malaysia and the other members have made in fulfilling the aspirations of the people of the region.

We come together at a time when world economic conditions are improving. I am convinced that the recovery will continue to be strong. The sound financial management which has characterized Malaysia's economic policies throughout this difficult period serves as an impressive example for many other nations in the world.

In recent years the United States has had the privilege of seeing a remarkable increase in the number of Malaysian students who have chosen to pursue a portion of their education in the United States. I believe the number is now more than 20,000. Their presence is an important means of furthering mutual understanding between our two countries. We look forward to further expansion of a wide variety of contacts -- economic, cultural and social -- in both directions in the future as well.

Finally I would add -- and I know that President Reagan joins me in saying this -- that we warmly greet the visit of Prime Minister Mahathir in January of next year.

Let me now offer a toast to the Deputy Prime Minister and the people of Malaysia, and to mutual respect and our common desire for a better world.

FROM: ROBERT M. KIMMITT *Rob*SUBJECT: First Lady Tea for Mrs. Mahathir

The State Department has recommended at Tab A that Mrs. Reagan host a tea for the wife of Prime Minister Mahathir during his visit to Washington, January 17-20, 1984.

We concur in the State Department recommendation. It is especially important that this visit be as successful as possible in the wake of the postponement of the President's visit to Southeast Asia. The Prime Minister's reception here will be watched closely by the other four ASEAN countries (Indonesia, Singapore, Thailand and the Philippines). A successful visit will help to offset a current perception of some in the region that Southeast Asia is not an important part of the world for our interests.

January 17-20, 1984

Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir will be accompanied on his visit by his wife, Y.A.B. Dato' Seri Datin Paduka Dr. Siti Hasmah who is a medical doctor by training and still actively practices medicine. Mrs. Mahathir has also been active in business in her own right. She is highly articulate, speaks excellent English, and is involved in a wide range of charitable and other activities. During the course of her stay in Washington we plan to arrange visits to Children's Hospital and other places of interest. The Mahathirs' have several children one of whom - a son - is studying petroleum engineering in Tulsa.

We think it would be appropriate for Mrs. Reagan to host a small tea in her honor at the White House on January 18 or 19. Such an occasion in which the two first ladies would have an opportunity to meet informally and discuss a number of topics of mutual interest, such as rehabilitation for the handicapped and narcotics education for youth, would go a long way to help establish the kind of rapport which is a principal objective of the visit. This will be the first visit of Dr. Mahathir (who is also a physician) to Washington as Prime Minister, and this will be the first official visit here of an ASEAN head of government since postponement of the President's visit to Southeast Asia.

We recommend that the tea involve no more than four or five ladies to include the wife of the Malaysian Ambassador.



Part of our discussion focused on trade in commodities, which is significant to the well-being of Malaysia. Prime Minister ^{MAW HOTEAR} ~~Mahathir's~~ creative leadership has been instrumental in developing the U.S.-ASEAN understanding on tin.

Malaysia shines as an example in many areas. Its vibrant economy, complemented by balanced social development and flourishing democratic institutions, should serve as an inspiration to developing nations.

On the international scene, we discussed the situation in the Middle East. Although we have differing views on certain aspects of this complicated situation, we both seek an end to the turmoil that has engulfed the area for too long.

SUBJECT: Request to Provide Transportation from Tulsa
to New York for Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir

Following completion of his official working visit to Washington January 20, Prime Minister Mahathir plans to travel to Tulsa, Oklahoma to visit his son, a student at Tulsa University. The USAF will transport the Prime Minister's party from Washington to Tulsa as provided under established procedures for official working visits. Although not obligated to provide transportation beyond the first stop after Washington, we urge that the U.S. Government offer to fly the party to New York City from Tulsa on January 21. The plane will need to return to the east coast in any event, and it should be possible to arrange for the crew to remain overnight in Tulsa to be available for the return trip.

Only a small portion of the Prime Minister's official delegation, probably no more than ten, will accompany him to Tulsa from Washington. It may well be possible to use a smaller plane than is normally the case to avoid tying up larger USAF assets for the additional time in Tulsa. We are not being pressed by the Malaysians to provide the Tulsa to New York service, but we are aware that it is difficult to find suitable commercial connections in the time frame they are considering. An offer to provide the return transportation would contribute measurably to the atmosphere of rapport that is a principal objective of the visit.

We urge that the USAF be authorized to provide transportation for Prime Minister Mahathir and a small party from Washington to Tulsa on January 20 and from Tulsa to New York City on January 21.

Dato' Seri Datin Paduka Dr. Siti Hasmah who is a medical doctor by training and still actively practices medicine. Mrs. Mahathir has also been active in business in her own right. She is highly articulate, speaks excellent English, and is involved in a wide range of charitable and other activities. During the course of her stay in Washington we plan to arrange visits to Children's Hospital and other places of interest. The Mahathirs' have several children one of whom - a son - is studying petroleum engineering in Tulsa.

We think it would be appropriate for Mrs. Reagan to host a small tea in her honor at the White House on January 18 or 19. Such an occasion in which the two first ladies would have an opportunity to meet informally and discuss a number of topics of mutual interest, such as rehabilitation for the handicapped and narcotics education for youth, would go a long way to help establish the kind of rapport which is a principal objective of the visit. This will be the first visit of Dr. Mahathir (who is also a physician) to Washington as Prime Minister, and this will be the first official visit here of an ASEAN head of government since postponement of the President's visit to Southeast Asia.

We recommend that the tea involve no more than four or five ladies to include the wife of the Malaysian Ambassador.
