EXECUTIVE ORDER

PRESIDENTIAL COMMISSION ON THE HUMAN IMMUNODEFICIENCY VIRUS EPIDEMIC

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and laws of the United States of America, including the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. App.I), and in order to create an advisory Commission to investigate the spread of the (HIV) virus and the resultant acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) in the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Establishment.

- (a) There is established the Presidential Commission on the Human Immunodeficiency Virus Epidemic to investigate the spread of the HIV virus and the resultant AIDS. The Commission shall be composed of 7 members appointed or designated by the President. The members shall be distinguished individuals who have extensive experience in the fields of medicine, epidemology, etc.
- (b) The President shall designate a Chairman from among the members of the Commission.

Section 2. Functions.

- (a) The Commission shall advise the President and the Secretary of Health and Human Services on long-range planning to deal with the public health danger including the medical, legal, ethical, social, and economic impact from the spread of the HIV virus and the resulting illnesses including AIDS, AIDS related complex, and other related conditions.
- (b) The primary focus of the Commission shall be to recommend measures Federal, State, and local officials can take to (1) assist in finding a cure for AIDS; (2) protect the public from contracting the HIV virus; and (3) care for those who already have the disease.
- (c) In particular, the Commission shall (1) evaluate efforts by educational institutions and other public and private entities to provide education and information concerning AIDS; (2) analyze the efforts currently underway by State and local authorities to combat AIDS; (3) examine long-term impact of AIDS treatment needs on the health care delivery system, including the effort on non-AIDS patients in need of

medical care; (4) review the U.S. history of dealing with communicable disease epidemics; (5) identify future areas of research that might be needed to address the AIDS epidemic; (6) examine policies for development and release of drugs and vaccines to combat AIDS; (7) monitor the progression of AIDS among the general population and among specific risk groups; (8) evaluate research activities relating to the prevention and treatment of AIDS; and (9) study legal and ethical issues relating to AIDS.

d) The Commission shall report to the President from time to time and shall submit its final report no later than one year from the date of this order.

Section 3. Administration.

- (a) The heads of Executive departments and agencies shall, to the extent permitted by law, provide the Commission, upon request with such information as it may require for purposes of carrying out its functions.
- (b) Members of the Commission shall serve without additional compensation for their work on the Commission. While engaged in the work of the Commission, members appointed from among private citizens of the United States may, to the extent funds are available, be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by law for persons serving intermittently in the government service (5 U.S.C. 5701-5707).
- (c) The Office of the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall, subject to the availability of appropriations, provide the Commission with such administrative services, funds, facilities, staff, and other support services as may be necessary for the performance of its functions.
- Section 4. General Provision. The Commission shall, unless sooner extended, terminate 30 days after submitting its final report to the President.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

PRESIDENTIAL COMMISSION ON THE HUMAN IMMUNODEFICIENCY VIRUS (HIV) EPIDEMIC IN AMERICA

By authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and laws of the United States of America, including the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. App. I), and in order to create a Commission of distinguished individuals to investigate the spread of the (HIV) virus and the resultant acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) in the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Establishment. (a) There is established a Presidential Commission to investigate the spread of the HIV virus and the resultant AIDS. The Commission shall be composed of 7 members.

- (b) The President shall designate a chairman from among the members of the board.
- Sec. 2. Functions. (a) The Commission shall advise the President on long-range planning to deal with the public health danger including the medical, legal, ethical, social, and economic impact from the spread of the HIV virus and the resulting illnesses including AIDS, AIDS related complex (ARC), and other related conditions.
- (b) Its primary focus shall be to recommend measures
 Federal, State, and Local officials can take to (1) assist in

finding a cure for AIDS; (2) protect the public from contracting the HIV virus; and (3) care for those who already have the disease.

- (c) Specifically, it shall (1) evaluate efforts by educational institutions and other public and private entities to provide education and information concerning acquired immune deficiency syndrome; (2) analyze the efforts currently underway by state and local authorities to combat acquired immune deficiency syndrome; (3) examine long-term impact of AIDS treatment needs on the health care delivery system, including the effect on non-AIDS patients in need of medical care; (4) review the history of dealing with communicable disease epidemics; (5) identify future areas of research that might be needed to address the AIDS epidemic; (6) examine policies for development and release of drugs and vaccines to combat AIDS; (7) monitor the progression of acquired immune deficiency syndrome among the general population and among specific risk groups; (8) evaluate research activities relating to the prevention and treatment of acquired immune deficiency syndrome; and (9) study legal and ethical issues relating to acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
- Sec. 3. Administration. (a) The heads of Executive departments, agencies, and independent instrumentalities, to the extent permitted by law, shall provide the Board, upon request, with such information as it may require for purposes of carrying out its functions.

- (b) Members of the Commission shall serve without additional compensation for their work on the Commission. While engaged in the work of the Board, members appointed from among private citizens of the United States may be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by law for persons serving intermittently in the government service (5 U.S.C. 5701-5707), to the extent funds are available.
- (c) To the extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of appropriations, the _____ Office shall provide the Board with such administrative services, funds, facilities, staff, and other support services as may be necessary for the performance of its functions.
- Sec. 4. General Provision. The Board shall terminate 30 days after submitting its report to the President but not later than 1 year after its initial meeting. The Board shall submit interim reports as appropriate.

Andrew P. O'Rourke Biographical Data

Andrew P. O'Rourke, the Westchester County Executive, brings to the position experience garnered as a city and county legislator, a practicing attorney, a teacher, an author, a military officer, and a civic leader.

Andy O'Rourke has a long history of involvement in Westchester's governmental and civic affairs. He began his career as an elected public official in 1965 when he won the right to represent Yonkers' 5th Ward on the City Council. During his 8 year tenure on that legislative body, he served both as its Majority Leader and its Minority Leader. In 1973, O'Rourke ran for the 17th District seat on the Westchester County Board of Legislators, and was elected to represent an even larger area of northeast Yonkers. His colleagues named him Chairman of the Board of Legislators in January, 1978, and O'Rourke held that position until he left the Board in December, 1982.

O'Rourke resigned from the Board of Legislators in order to accept nomination to the office of Westchester County Executive by his fellow legislators in January, 1983 and resoundingly won election in his own right to the two-year balance of the term on November 8, 1983. In November, 1985, Andy O'Rourke won election to his first full four-year term as Westchester County Executive by the largest margin in the history of the office.

The author of numerous articles published in many law journals, O'Rourke has also had articles published on such diverse topics as the Russian Navy (Journal of the Naval Institute, April 1982) and the Roman Army (the Medal Collection, August 1982).

His novel on the Russian navy, The Red Banner Mutiny, will be published by Bantam Books in April, $\overline{1986}$

He was an Adjunct Associate Professor of Law at Fordham University from 1974 to 1975, and an Instructor in Business Law from 1976 to 1977 at Mercy College.

A member of many local, state, and national bar associations, County Executive O'Rourke is admitted to practice in New York State Courts, U.S. District Courts for the Eastern and Southern Districts, the Court of Military Appeals, the Second Circuit Court of Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court.

Andy O'Rourke has long played an active role in his community. He is a former director of the Cardinal Newman Foundation of New York, a former member of the Big Brother-Big Sister Committee, a director of Westchester Community Development, and belongs to the Yonkers 5th Ward Republican Club, the John Dunbar Post of the American Legion, the Fordham University Alumni Association, Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, and is on the Board of Advisors for the Hudson River Museum. O'Rourke is a communicant of Annunciation Church in Yonkers.

As County Executive, O'Rourke has been awarded Long Island University's 1984 "Seth Low Award for Distinguished Public Service" and the Jewish National Fund's highest award, the "Tree of Life" in recognition of his "outstanding community involvement and dedication to the cause of peace and the building of Israel". He was also named 1984 "Man of the Year" by the Westchester County Sheriff's Association for speaking out "in the areas of Drunk Driver Awareness Programs, DWI Road Blocks, advancement of Volunteer Law Enforcement Groups..." He was granted a honorary Doctor of Humane Letters by Mercy College in January, 1985.

I am informed that, as part of your responsibilities for President Reagan, you are to assist him in the formation of the above referred to commission. In this regard, I would respectfully request that you consider recommending to the President my appointment to this commission. As an attorney, I believe that I would bring a variety of perspectives that would be of great assistance to the deliberations of the commission and assist it in developing its' recommendations to the President regarding the practical responses by government and private industries to this disease.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to encourage you to consider the following individuals for the AIDS Commission. I feel their experience and credentials will facilitate the work of the Commission, and I know that all of us in Congress look forward to working with the Commission in a spirit of bipartisan cooperation to deal as quickly and effectively as possible with this immense health crisis. The five individuals I recommend for your consideration are:

Harvey Fineberg, M.D., Dean of the Harvard School of Public Health, has made AIDS a priority for his institution -- particularly the communication of educational and prevention information, for both general audiences and health professionals. At the Harvard School of Public Health, great emphasis is placed on the evaluation of the effectiveness of disease prevention/health promotion campaigns. In whatever fashion individual communities and educational institutions decide to convey AIDS prevention messages, it is essential that we assess the impact on behavior change. Dr. Fineberg also served on the National Academy of Sciences/Institute of Medicine panel that conducted an in-depth study of the AIDS problem.

William Haseltine, PhD, molecular virologist at the Dana Farber Cancer Center, has been at the cutting edge of basic research on AIDS since the discovery of the etiologic agent responsible for the epidemic. In fact, his most recent work on the genetic components of the AIDS virus offers the possibility of defusing the reproductive capability of the virus. He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences Committee on a National Strategy for AIDS (Research Panel) and is a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the American Foundation for AIDS Research. He was also a member of the Director's AIDS Executive

Committee at the NIH. Dr. Haseltine has participated in numerous NIH grant review panels and has concrete suggestions for expediting the award of funds to meritorius AIDS research projects.

Philip Lee, M.D., Director of the Institute for Health Policy Studies at the University of California/San Francisco, has unique knowledge of the impact of AIDS on the nation's health care system. The institute has studied the economic effect of AIDS more closely than any other agency. In addition, Dr. Lee oversees the \$17 million program funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to create more affordable patient care mechanisms for AIDS. As a former Assistant Secretary of HEW, he is equipped with hands-on knowledge of how federal health programs and policy operate.

Mathilde Krim, PhD, Founding Chairman of the American Foundation for AIDS Research, is a research biologist who has played an instrumental role in the development of interferon for use in cancer. Her early recognition of the potentially catastrophic implications of the AIDS epidemic helped establish her reputation as a leading private sector spokesman on the issue. In collaboration with Ms. Elizabeth Taylor, Dr. Krim has rallied the financial support of both private and corporate donors to expedite AIDS research efforts with quick-turnaround grant dollars.

Ashton Hawkins, Esq., Vice President and Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, is a prominent New Yorker who has worked diligently in the last 12 months to make others aware of the AIDS crisis and to enroll their support in curbing the epidemic. He has been active in raising funds and mobilizing support in the art world for the American Foundation for AIDS Research. In addition, he was instrumental in introducing NIH AIDS Coordinator, Anthony Fauci M.D., to Mrs. William F. Buckley and Mrs. Samuel Peabody who have become actively interested in this issue. Mr. Hawkins has extensive board experience, with both academic and charitable organizations, and can assist in building the kind of consensus that will be essential for the AIDS panel.

Each of these five outstanding citizens has already demonstrated the abilities to contribute to the solution of the national emergency that this epidemic poses. I urge you to review their credentials and consider them as candidates for membership on the National Commission on AIDS.

AIDS Commission Report Deadline

As you know, the AIDS Commission has been given one year to complete its work. Depending on when one considers the "starting gun" went off, that means the report will be delivered sometime between June and August of 1988 - right in the middle of the Presidential primaries and nominating process.

Several Commissioners are concerned about whether the work can be done in this time, and whether we are risking the issue becoming even more politicized. The attached letter, written by Dr. William Walsh, suggests we extend the deadline until December 1, 1988. I believe this is a good suggestion and we ought to move now to implement it.

Dear Gary:

You will recall when I visited with you last Monday that I expressed considerable concern over whether the AIDS Commission could properly complete its work by its currently scheduled deadline of June of 1988. Three days in New York with several of the Commission members, and a dawn-to-dark schedule of learning the complexities of this problem, have convinced me more than ever that there should be an extension of the deadline to the first of December.

The likelihood of any such report being received in an unprejudiced fashion, during the midst of a political campaign for the nation's highest office, would in my opinion negate the value of our effort. We had the benefit of meeting with, hearing or receiving statements from almost 200 committed individuals in New York City. Members of Congress accompanied us on some of our visitations. Two outstanding members of the Republican State Legislature, who had pulled together an excellent task force report on AIDS for the State, joined with us. All who participated were serious, but many had deep emotional commitments which will require time and reasoning to modify so that we may have a broad base of support for whatever we may recommend.

May I respectfully suggest, therefore, that you bring to the attention of the President or whomever he has so designated, the suggestion that the work of the Commission be extended to December 1, 1988 so as to avoid the bitter conflicts that may arise during the 1988 campaign. The vast majority of the members of the Commission, with whom I have discussed this, share these feelings with me. We want to do a very good job but it will take time.

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It is conceivable that the Commission will recommend such an action in its initial report to the President at the end of the 90-day period. This may be an opportune time for the President to authorize the extension if you and your colleagues along with him, agree that it would be of greater benefit to the nation in its development of a national strategy against this dread disease.
