

Achieving unanimity is expected to be difficult since we understand the United Kingdom, Germany, Canada, Italy, and Denmark will also offer candidates. However, we believe we have a good chance of getting the U.S. nominee elected. Our basic argument is simply that the U.S. has more to offer NAMSA in terms of potential business and there has been no U.S. General Manager since 1964.

The official announcement soliciting U.S. candidates for the NAMSA General Manager is currently in preparation. When it is released, we will ensure General Walker receives it. As you pointed out, General Walker's credentials make him a very strong candidate for this important NATO position.

Dear Mr. President:

It is a high honor to bring to your attention the name of Brigadier General Harry D. Walker, U.S. Army, Retired, for nomination by the Department of Defense as the General Manager of the NATO Maintenance and Support Agency, headquartered in Cappellen, Luxembourg.

The incumbent General Manager, a retired French general officer, will retire at the end of this year for reasons of age. We urge the designation of General Walker as an American replacement. In our collective judgment, this action will lead to a more meaningful coalitional logistics effort among NATO members, a longstanding goal of the Alliance.
