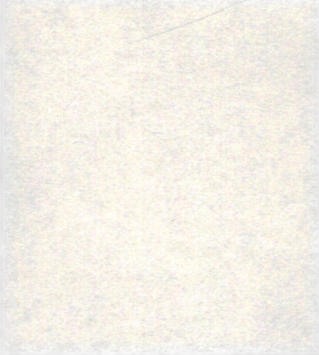

Hello to all my friends in Texas; I want to say how delighted I am that you are holding this salute to the Presidents and how grateful I am for this chance to participate in your program tonight.

Now I don't have to tell you that this political year presents an enormous challenge and opportunity for Republicans. In fact, if you're like me, I'm sure that you have been following the political coverage thus far with a sense of unbelief. It really does seem that a once-great political party -- one that formerly spoke for working people and everyday Americans -- seems to be transforming itself into the party of the left. It seems to be becoming a party that favors big spending, higher taxes, quotas and busing, dangerous cuts in our military readiness, weak stands in foreign policy, but a party that also opposes tax cuts, the balanced budget amendment, voluntary prayer in school, tough anti-crime laws, a strong defense, and the proper use of American power in such situations as the rescue mission in Grenada.

The leadership of the other party is separating itself from the views of those average Americans who have for years been its mainstay. And that's where our great opportunity arises this year: We Republicans have to get out there and get our message to those moderate and conservative Democrats and Independents. We have to remind them that the stakes are very high this year; remind them of how much progress we Republicans are responsible

for during the past few years; and remind them that the other party is now strongly attached to positions that can only take America back to the days of malaise, confusion, economic hardship and America held hostage.

Much needs to be done to bring this message home, especially in crucial States like Texas. But believe me, I remember 1976 and 1980 very well; no one needs to tell me how hard Texas Republicans can work for strong Republican candidates. I think this dinner is a great way to start. I know you're in extremely good company with Senators Tower and Denton, and you're off to a great start in this election year.

I firmly believe that if all of us pull together, the record of this Administration, coupled with the wayward direction of the other party, will convince millions of Independents and Democrats that the Republican Party is just what we have always said it was: the party of growth and opportunity, the party of a strong America at home and abroad. Thank you for all your help; I'm certain that your efforts will make the difference this fall. I'm looking forward to a great Republican victory that we will win together.





PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF RETIRED PERSONS
MONDAY, MARCH 5, 1984

My warm greetings to all of you at the National Convention of the American Association of Retired Persons. I wanted to be with you to help celebrate your Silver Anniversary, and the 100th Anniversary of the birth of your founder, Dr. Ethel Percy Andrus. But since I'm in China, I've asked a younger fella to represent me. I also asked the Vice President not to stop at the table which has the forms to join the A.A.R.P. -- despite what some folks might be advocating, we have no current plans to retire. But I'll be in touch again in '89.

Now before I say anything else, I want to congratulate your outgoing president, Mr. Arthur Bouton [BOW-ton], and your incoming president, Mrs. Vita Ostrander. Your Association did not become our Nation's largest senior citizen organization by accident. You did it through hard work and outstanding leadership.

I'm familiar with your achievements and you have good reason to be proud. Your community volunteer efforts -- from health and consumer education to crime prevention programs, driver improvement classes and your income tax return assistance program -- all prove that you live by your motto: "To serve, not to be served."

In America, senior citizens provide invaluable experience, skill, and the wisdom that comes only with years. Older Americans have much to give. And all of us have much to do to

make the lives of our senior citizens safe, rewarding, and enjoyable.

Three years ago, our broken economy hit senior citizens especially hard. Inflation was a cruel nightmare for those living on fixed incomes. And like all Americans, senior citizens found it very hard to find jobs. But today, less than 3 years since our Administration set its economic policies in place, our Nation has one big program to help every American, young and old. It's called economic recovery.

Inflation has plunged by two-thirds to about 4 percent during the past year. That lower inflation rate makes the average retired person's private pension benefits worth about \$1,000 more in purchasing power than if inflation had stayed at 1980 levels. The economy is strong and our future looks bright: housing starts, factory orders, retail sales, and real wages are all up. And last year, more than 4 million Americans found jobs.

Now, some claim that our Administration has cut Social Security and Medicare benefits. Whenever I hear that, it kind of gets my ire up. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Our budget for this year provides for \$238 billion in programs that affect older Americans. That includes Social Security benefits that for the average retired couple have gone up about \$180 a month since we took office, and medicare benefits that are higher than under any previous administration. Even after adjusting for inflation, America's senior citizens receive more Social Security, Medicare and other benefits than ever before.

We will not betray those entitled to Social Security or Medicare -- and that's a promise. So, the next time you hear the baloney that's going around, call it baloney.

Before I leave your screen, I want to mention a problem that threatens all of us -- crime.

For too many years, crime has sapped the strength and vitality of our people. The reason crime has been so bad is no mystery. The scales of criminal justice have been tilted in favor of the criminals themselves. We came to Washington determined to restore the balance, and common sense is beginning to pay off. In 1982, the crime rate dropped by 4.3 percent -- the biggest drop in a decade.

Recently, our Comprehensive Crime Control Act passed the Senate, but it's still bottled up in the House. I urge you to join me in pressing for swift action. Please tell the House leadership that the American people want safe streets, not partisan politics.

Once again, my heartfelt congratulations to your fine Association. You couldn't have chosen a more appropriate theme for this convention. As you make your "Silver Salute to the Future," may I just say that the future of America is very bright, too.
