III. BACKGROUND

You have already reviewed 2 memos that are relevant -- an advocacy piece by Ken Khachigian and an options paper by Dave Stockman. You have also been briefed by Senators Baker and Laxalt on the "45/45/45" initiative being taken by the Senate Republican Leadership. There have been no significant developments since your meeting with them. But the press and our own Senate Republicans (if not the Democrats) are likely to try to push the process along soon -- as will the regular Congressional timetable, which is beginning to overtake us. If we wish to maintain the offensive, we need to settle on our strategy for this next phase.

IV. OBJECTIVES AND AGENDA

OBJECTIVES

Our objectives are to:

- achieve what deficit-reduction we can in 1984 -consistent with our policy preferences and constrained by the fact that this is an election year;
- keep the blame for the deficits on the Democrats;
- anticipate and somehow protect against Senate Republican adventurism; and
- keep financial markets from getting too nervous.

AGENDA

We need to consider the following issues and options:

- (1) Is our <u>defense bottom line</u> going to move to the 280s -- if not, we will not reach agreement with the Senate Republicans and must plan accordingly?
- (2) If we do intend to move on defense, is it with a view toward agreeing on a package with the Senate only -- to show a united front against the House? Or do we seriously wish to seek a package agreement with the House? [NOTE: The Democratic leadership doesn't really want a compromise agreement -- so their terms are likely to remain beyond what we could accept.]
- (3) If we wish to declare the downpayment negotiations effectively over, do we wish to go on television a la Khachigian? If so, we can blame the Democrats for the breakdown, defend our position on defense, criticize their position on taxes (as in the radio talk), and formally propose that the Congress act on our \$100 billion proposal. But will that be enough?
- (4) Do we need something more like:
 - stating that if the Congress doesn't produce sufficient spending cuts by July, we'll appoint a <u>Commission</u> to develop responsible bi-partisan support for cuts -- so action can be taken in early '85?
 - fleshing out our interest in "tax simplification" a bit more?
- (5) In light of answers to the above, what posture should we take with respect to the Rostenkowski bill -- which is moving to the Rules Committee for a rule?
