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



The Supreme Court must have justices who read the constitution in a literal and historical perspective with regard to intent. One such individual is John W. Whitehead of Manassas, Virginia. I have one of his books "The Second American Revolution" which by the way I recomend for your reading. He is a practicing constitutional lawyer who is also the president of the Rutherford Institute, P.O.Box 510, Manassas, Va.22110. I hope you pass along this recomendation to the president. To put things in perspective for you, Mr. Whitehead is everything Ruth McFarland would hate with a passion in a justice.

While I do not know his name there is also an appellate judge in Mississippi who had the courage and the correct constitutional insight to "overturn" a Supreme Court ruling to allow volentary prayer in that state citing the literal reading of the constitution and the historical context in which it was written- facts ignored in the 1962 decision banning religious activity from schools.

I trust you will give this matter attention after  $\underline{\text{your re-election}}$ . Thank you.

DESIGNATING WEEK OF FEBRU-ARY 17, 1985, TO RECOGNIZE BIG BROTHERS AND BIG SIS-TERS VOLUNTEERS

Mrs. HALL of Indiana. Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent that the Committee on Post Office and Civil Service be discharged from further consideration of the joint resolution (H.J. Res. 594) designating the week beginning February 17, 1985, as a time to recognize volunteers who give their time to become Big Brothers and Big Sisters to youths in need of adult companionship, and ask for its immediate consideration.

The Clerk read the title of the joint resolution.

The SPEAKER pro tempore Is there objection to the request of the gentlewoman from Indiana?

Mrs. LLOYD. Reserving the right to object, Mr. Speaker, and I do not intend to object, I am pleased that we are considering this resolution today and want to thank Representative HALL for bringing it to the floor. The House frequently approves commemorative legislation recognizing various groups and industries for their contributions to our society. I don't think any volunteer organization has done more for the children of one-parent families in America than Big Brothers and Big Sisters. This resolution acknowledges the work of this special group of individuals. They voluntarily assume one of the most difficult tasks any adult can undertake, that of guiding young people.

Big Brothers and Big Sisters of America gave us the first national service program for boys and girls who have only one parent. And as those of us who are parents know, one individual cannot possibly provide all the attention growing children need. Children today face challenges and temptations unthought of just a few years ago and many single parents are unprepared to cope with the problem alone. Currently there are over 12 million children in the United States who live in single parent families. In the absence of an extended family, a Big Brother or a Big Sister can help fill an emptines by providing adult companionship and guidance.

Childhood is the critical time of human development. If we can provide the proper stability and influence, our children are better prepared to face life and become productive citizens. Big Brothers and Big Sisters encourage the child to adopt good behavior and study habits by emphasizing the child's self-worth.

The quality of life in the future depends on the values we instill in our children today. Big Brether/Big Sister volunteers provide a valuable service toward that end and I want to join with my colleagues in applauding their efforts.

Mr. COATS. Mr. Speaker, I had the privilege of sponsoring with Congresswoman Marilyn Lloyd legislation acknowledging Big Brothers/Big Sisters

volunteers for their service with children. At this time, I would like to thank Congresswoman LLOYD for all her efforts in helping obtain passage of House Joint Resolution 594 which designates the week beginning February 17, 1985, as "Big Brothers/Big Sisters Week." Of course, we could not have accomplished this goal without the support of our colleagues, and I sincerely appreciate their cosponsorship of House Joint Resolution 594.

As a former big brother and as past president of Big Brothers/Big Sisters in Fort Wayne, I am personally familiar with and strongly support the operation and goals of this organization. The Congress, itself, recognized the important service of Big Brothers/Big Sisters when it issued a congressional charter in 1958.

For over 80 years, one-parent children have benefited from the friend-ship and care extended by volunteers in this special one-on-one relationship. Today, there are over 450 agencies serving approximately 100,000 children a year. These statistics reflect not only the achievements of Big Brothers/Big Sisters but the continual need for this national youth organization.

David Bahlman, executive vice president of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America, testified before the House Select Committee on Children, Youth, and Families that as children from father-absent families grow in numbers, so must society's sensitivity to their situation. Big Brothers/Big Sisters volunteers can assist children from father-absent homes to handle the challenges presented to them in a manner which will allow them to grow and mature into healthy, productive adults.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America is a national nonprofit youth organization based on a one-to-one friendship between an adult volunteer and a school-age child from a one-parent home who needs special, extra adult attention. Volunteers make a commitment to spend 3 to 6 hours a week for at least a year. Once a match is made, goals are set and regular contacts maintained between the parent, child, volunteer, and agency staff. Not every child from a one-parent home needs a big brother or sister, but for an estimated one-fifth of these children, there are no such supports. Big Brothers/Big Sisters is not a substitute parent but an ally who can help a child through a difficult period and the challenges of growing up.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters in just ever 80 years has become the fastest growing youth-service organization in the United States. Field studies have established this as a highly effective means for preventing juvenile delinquency and emotional problems, and preparing children for adulthood. It is also cost effective. A match costs about \$650 z year compared with \$3,000 for each child entered into the

juvenile justice system, or \$18,000 to \$65,000 a year for institutionalization.

while the demographics of our society may be changing, the needs of our children are not. I think it is more than time that we nationally recognize the Big Brother/Big Sister volunteers who give so much of their time, talents and love to help ensure the well-being of our children, and I am proud to have cosponsored with Congress-woman LLOYD this most worthy legislation.

Mrs. LLOYD. Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my reservation of objection.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Is there objection to the request of the gentlewoman from Indiana?

There was no objection.

The Clerk read the joint resolution, as follows:

#### H.J. RES. 594

Whereas many girls and boys in the United States suffer from a lack of parental time and attention because of the death of one or both of their parents, the divorce of their parents, or for other reasons;

Whereas this deprivation can result in serious problems for these children and their communities; and

Whereas there is a dire need for volunteers to serve as older brothers and sisters who can give these children the individual support, help, and counseling of a stable adult friend: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the week beginning February 17, 1985, is designated as a time to recognize the contributions of volunteers who give their time to become Big Brothers and Big Sisters to youths in need of adult companionship and the President is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation calling on the people of the United States to observe such week with appropriate celebrations and activities.

The joint resolution was ordered to be engrossed and read a third time, was read the third time, and passed, and a motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

the Silver Lining", and his most popular score, "Showboat";

Whereas Jerome Kern was the honored recipient of two Academy Awards during his lifetime for his works "The way you look to-night" and "The Last Time I Saw Paris";

Whereas the works of Jerome Kern have not only enriched the lives of countles Americans, but are enjoyed to this day by millions of people throughout the world;

Whereas January 27, 1985, marks the 100th anniversary of Jerome Kern's birth; and

Whereas the music industry is planning a year-long tribute to Jerome Kern's Centenary Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That January 27, 1985, is designated "National Jerome Kern Day", and the President is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the people of the United States to observe such a day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

• Mr. LEVINE of California. Mr. Speaker, as the author of House Joint Resolution 583, I urge my colleagues to designate January 27, 1985, as "National Jerome Kern Day." I would like to take this opportunity to thank Congresswoman Katie Hall chairwoman of the Subcommitte on Census and Population, and Kathy Jurado of her staff for their assistance in bringing this legislation to the floor. I would also like to thank Majority Leader Wright and over 200 of my colleagues for their support of this legislation.

Mr. Speaker, January 27 of next year will mark the 100th anniversary of one of Broadway's greatest composers, Jerome Kern. Mr. Kern is in fact often recognized as the "Father of the American Musical Theatre."

For many decades, Jerome Kern's music has entertained a listening public worldwide. During his career, Mr. Kern composed over 1,000 songs and 108 complete theatrical scores. He is responsible for writing such popular classics as "Look for the Sliver Lining," "Lovely to look At," and "Smoke Gets in your Eyes." No listing of Mr. Kern's credits would be complete without reference to his most popular score, "Showboat," which included such famous songs as "Make Believe," "Ol' Man River," and "Why Do I Love You."

I am pleased to inform my colleagues that the music industry itself is planning a year-long international centennial tribute to Jerome Kern, complete with tributes staged both in New York City and Washington, DC.

I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this resolution to honor this great man who broght such beautiful music to the world. He will long be remembered.

The joint resolution was ordered to be engrossed and read a third time, was read the third time, and passed, and a motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

## HAWAII STATEHOOD SILVER JUBILEE DAY

Mrs. HALL of Indiana. Mr. Speaker, F ask unanimous consent that the Committee on Post Office and Civil Service be discharged from further consideration of the Senate Joint Resolution (S.J. Res. 248) designating August 21, 1984, as "Hawaii Statehood Silver Jubilee Day," and ask for its immediate consideration.

The Clerk read the title of the Senate Joint Resolution.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Is there objection to the request of the gentlewoman from Indiana?

Mr. AKAKA. Mr. Speaker, reserving the right to object, and I do not intend to object, I urge all my colleagues to join me in supporting House Joint Resolution 546, which designates August 21, 1984, as "Hawaii Statehood Silver Jubilee Day." The resolution recognizes the 25th birthday of Hawaii's admission as a State.

Observance of the anniversary of statehood is important in view of Hawaii's long struggle to win the right to become the 50th State. In recognition of Hawaii's strategic military importance in the Pacific, the U.S. Congress officially annexed Hawaii on August 12, 1898. The Nation's new possession was quickly organized as a territory with Sanford Ballard Dole as its first Governor, taking office on June 14, 1900.

Statehood was first proposed during the reign of King Kamehameha III and became a more defined goal shortly after World War I when Hawaii's Delegate to Congress, Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole, introduced a bill to that effect. More strenuous efforts were made in the 1930's when Samuel Wilder King was Delegate, and this effort continued after World War II by Delegate Joseph Rider Farrington and after his death, by his widow, Delegate Elizabeth Farrington. It was in 1940 that a plebiscite showing a 2-to-1 vote in favor of statehood was conducted; in 1950, a Constitutional Convention was held to draft Hawaii's modern constitution.

All these efforts finally bore fruit in 1959, when John A. Burns was Delegate, and both Houses of Congress passed the landmark legislation granting Hawaii statehood. President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed into law "an act to provide for the admission of the State of Hawaii into the Union" on March 18, 1959. This act required a vote by the people of Hawaii on the question of statehood and was overwhelmingly passed by a 17-to-1 margin. Hawaii was thus officially admitted to the Union on August 21, 1959.

I proudly encourage each and every one of you to join me in recognizing this important date, "Hawaii's Statehood Silver Jubilee Day," by lending full support to House Joint Resolution

Mr. HEFTEL of Hawaii. Mr. Speaker, on August 21, 1984, Hawaii cele-

brates the 25th anniversary of its admission as a State.

For all of us who call Hawaii our home, it is our silver jubilee. It celebrates the culmination of a 40-year struggle to attain equal status for Hawaii's people with their brothers and sisters on the mainland. In 1919 Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole introduced the first Hawaii statehood bill.

Congress ignored the Islands' early efforts to gain admission as a State. By 1935, however, Hawaii's case proved too strong to be disregarded. Hawaii's population exceed that of four States. Its area equaled or exceeded that of six. Hawaii's economy was demonstrably capable of sustaining self-government. Indeed, her people's annual contributions to the Federal Treasury exceeded those of 15 States.

From 1935 to 1959 four strong Hawaii patriots eloquently and indefatigably argued Hawaii's cause. Delegates to Congress, Samuel Wilder King, Joseph and Elizabeth Farrington, and John A. Burns, saw Hawaii through over 30 congressional investigations. Thousands of pages of testimony attested to Hawaii's credentials to become a State, and congressional investigators swelled the Islands' tourist trade.

Yet time and time again Hawaii's ambitions were thwarted. Opponents balked at her multiethnic population. They questioned the patriotism of the Island's large number of aliens.

The curse of McCarthyism also slowed Hawaii's progress. Statehood opponents saw in the collective efforts of Hawaii's laboring community the threat of Communist influence in the Islands. Hawaii's supporters answered both charges. In 1935 the Islands' alien population was no larger than that of Boston and New York. But unlike Boston's Irish or Italians, the majority of Hawaii's aliens had no recourse. National immigration laws blatantly discriminated against them. It specifically prohibited the naturalization of first-generation Japanese immigrants.

During World War II, Hawaii's Asian population answered the charge of disloyalty with their blood. In Italy and France, Japanese-Americans of the 442d Regimental Combat Team, mer like Dan Isouye and Spark Matsu maga, fought and died to defend de mocracy and to demonstrate to their countrymen the patriotism of Americans of Japanese ancestry. The 442d emerged from World War II as the most heavily decorated outfit in th U.S. Army.

Those same veterans returned thawaii. educated themselves on the GI bill of rights, and entered the mainstream of Island life. They practiced law and medicine. They taughtine cooks. They entered politics and joined the labor movement. And the example sustained the statehood movements.

Dear President Reagan:

"I would die for the United States if necessary. This is my country. People who reject the United States do not know what America is as a nation, for she has been purchased with the sacrifices of untold millions (blood)." These are indeed strange words which come from a survivor of the Hiroshima atomic blast and whose family was killed in the Japanese holocaust on August 6, 1945.

My name is Thomas Takashi Tanemori; and would like, if I may, to take this opportunity to share my heart with you.

I remember that it has been twenty years ago that I heard the pleading of the Honorable Senator Barry Goldwater for the direction and destiny of our nation. He re-claimed the principles by which to guide the future of our nation. Unfortunately, it seemed as though, his voice and plea have fallen on deaf ears, especially at the eve of the Sixty and Seventy's unrest. Yet, for the last two decades, the flame of true Americanism has not been extinguished. The torch is burning ever brighter since you, Mr. President, have been in the Oval Office. The resurgence of patriotism, Goldwaterism, as some critics rightly labeled, the true Americanism has been witnessed on a global basis.

How grateful I am, and express my deepest appreciation for your Presidency for the last four years. You have guided our nation with courage. We see a sense of pride for being Americans. We have every reason and purpose to perpetuate ourselves as the nation, upon whose shoulders our own national security, peace and pursuit of happiness is depending, not only for us, but for the rest of the world. She is exercising her aggression or infiltration strategically throughout Eastern Europe, the Middle East, Africa, Southeastern Asia, and Central America in order to bring other free nations under her ungodly sickle!!

I believe that Hiroshima and Nagasaki brought an abrupt end to the war, and millions of lives were saved because of this. People of West Germany, France, England, Italy, and even Japan are standing on their two feet and enjoying their "zenith of glory" because of the unselfishness of America. These countries suffered no post-war slavery at the hands of their conqueror because of the sacrifices which America made, and her strength, and her ability. However, the ungrateful conduct of these same nations towards America, and even some of our own people, who are promoting the spirit of ANTI-AMERICANISM have brought shame and reproach, for "righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a disgrace to any people." (Proverbs 14:34) These nations should realize what wealth they possess in having such a FRIEND, America and her people, for how could they be even for a moment to enjoy the freedom if the conqueror were Russia or Hitler.

I painfully realize that we have become a "laughing stock" to the nations. We, in all these nations, including America, have forgotten what we were, and from what we have been rescued. The seeds of decay are within. Apathy has taken over as in the days of the Roman Empire before its fall. We have lost our sense of direction and goal. Where is the spirit and the pride which wave our Star-Spangled Banner in the high as the symbol of our strength and beauty?

I am aware, however, of the calculated risks and costs which are involved with the protection of human lives and of the democratic way of government in this age of sophisticated technology. In the final analysis, however, we, as a nation—The United States of America, cannot be meekly defenseless in the attempt to preserve our constitutional right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness at ungodly humanistic philosophy of "it is better to be RED that to die." Sacrifice one's self for others is the true Americanism!!

I am deeply grateful for your leadership; and once again, America is charting its course to the preservation and promotion of global peace and freedom. I am ever determined to support your Presidency, not only for ourselves, but for the world, because I believe, Mr. President, that your leadership has been ordained, by God. My utmost desire is that we may, if necessary, give our lives, like those who sacrificed many conveniences and their "rights" willingly to preserve, maintain and promote peace and security, and above all the <u>freedom of choice</u>. This must be for our children and future generations that they may be <u>equally</u> privileged to enjoy the fullness of life and they shall be known throughout the earth as "BLESSED ONES."

Again, I thank you, Mr. Reagan, for being our President in carrying the "torch", for the true Americanism. I would like to close this letter with the poem I wrote in promoting world peace:


### UNTIL PEACE COME TO THE WORLD



Dear Mr. Sheppard:

I have been asked by the White House to respond to your recent letter suggesting a way to prevent trade deficits. My response has two points -- first, not all trade deficits are bad, and, second, the cure you suggest may be worse than the disease.

On the first point, let me call your attention to the analysis of the U.S. trade deficit contained in the enclosed copy of World Financial Markets for September, 1984. (We in Treasury have conducted similar analyses, with similar conclusions.) As this analysis points out, as much as 2/3 of the increase in our trade deficit reflects external rather than internal events or factors. The problems of slow growth in the industrial countries, and adjustment efforts by the developing countries, would be made more rather than less severe if the United States took unilateral steps to restrict imports. The likely response would have a double-barrelled negative effect on U.S. exports, as our overseas market grew less rapidly and as our trading partners retaliated against U.S. import restrictions. This sort of "beggar-thy-neighbor" sequence is generally seen as a major factor in the severity of the Depression of the 1930s.

On the second point, the mechanism you suggest to control payments abroad would fly directly in the face of the basic thrust of the Reagan Administration policies which have restored sustained, non-inflationary growth to the U.S. economy. This basic thrust has emphasized deregulation and reduced government interference in the economy, in order to give maximum scope to market forces and individual initiative. The logic of our approach, and its international dimension, are explained in the enclosed article by Under Secretary Sprinkel. By contrast, your proposal would turn back the regulatory clock, and reduce the scope for market forces.

Indeed, it would do so in more ways than one. As you may recall, the U.S. experimented with wide-ranging controls over international flows of capital during the decade between 1963 and 1973. This experience showed that such controls, to be at all effective, must be so comprehensive as to be stifling. Even

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then, the effectiveness erodes rapidly as markets adapt to "play the system". The cost of such a strait-jacket would be enormous -- especially in terms of a loss of ability to compete in the large and growing market for international financial services. Exports of services, including financial services, have contributed a substantial surplus to the U.S. trade position in recent years.

With regard to your more specific suggestions, I might make the following comments:

- -- It is unconstitutional for the U. S. government to impose excise or sales taxes on U.S. exports.
- -- The International Trade Administration within the Commerce Department has a number of offices which offer technical and procedural assistance to those U.S. firms interested in exporting. In addition, Foreign Commercial Service officers from the Commerce Department are stationed in U.S. Embassies around the world. Part of their responsibility is to help locate trading opportunities that are available to interested U.S. firms.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I am writing to you to express my frustration in trying to offer assistance-to the President with ideas that just might be helpful with some of the problems he faces, and which will certainly continue through the coming years. I have written a number of times on many subjects, including providing information on frustrated blacks that I know who if given a little guidance were quite willing to shift to support, but my letters have not even been acknowledged. If I did not feel so strongly that this is the man I realy want to support, I would have given up long since. As you apparently have his ear, perhaps you will read this letter and if you think the idea has merit, pass it on. Incidentally I don't seek any recognition for anything I say, and you are entirely welcome to anything that may be useful to him.

A way to stop deficits in the balance of trade, without embargos or customs duties.

- 1. Each quarter the Treasury will total and advise the President the dollar amount of all funds received by the sale of goods and services outside the US during the preceeding quarter, as supplied from US plants and personnel.
- 2. The next quarter (the second from the one just totalled) no US dollars in excess of that total may be expended for imported goods and services. There will be no list of priority materials that do not have White House approval as emergencies, and any standing orders will be cut off when the dollar amount is reached, whether of not the order has been completed. Shipment of any balance can be continued the following quarter.
- 3. There will be no bulk dollar transfers from bank US to foreign bank without Treasury being advised so that these may be included in information totals, and that a record is clear of the ctual purchases and expenditures. (Currency transfers should be prohibited except for tourist small change, and all private transfers made through banks so that they are included in Treasury reports. Thus any dope pedaler shifting currency will be in violation if caught—another matter on which he can be tried.)
- 4. The President may request from Congress the waving of excise taxes on US produced products which after manufacture are shipped directly overseas on foreign orders, and providing that such products are so marked that if imported back into this country they will be identifiable by customs and the excise tax charged on them. This is respectially important in sales to countries where taxes are forgiven or financial support rendered to all manufacturers who make items for export.
- 5. The Dept. of Commerce shall assist in any feasable way with advice and council any manufacturer who is trying to engage in international sales. And on request the industrial attaché of all our embassies will investigate and include in monthly reports status on competitive materials sold in the country where stationed, and any ideas he may have to assist our exporter to sell competitively.

I have a suggestion on nuclear waste disposal that just might be productive, and which I would be happy to pass on to whomever you suggest. I am an engineer and chemist, and do understand the problem.
