Issue

Does the Joint Chiefs of Staff structure and organization need reform? If so, is legislation required?

Facts

In response to my request, Cap has forwarded a rather detailed memo outlining how the Defense Department is addressing the JCS reform issues raised by ongoing Congressional hearings.

#### Background

In February 1982, General Jones published a rather sweeping proposal for reorganization of the JCS. This was followed by a wide-ranging media debate. In April, a subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee commenced hearings. Last week, a JCS reorganization bill was introduced. There is no chance that Congress will act on the bill during this session.

#### Discussion

The topic is not new. There have been 15 national-level studies and commissions charged with finding a better JCS system since the JCS organization was established in 1947. Though these studies have, in the main, called for major changes, the legislative provisions which establish and structure the JCS have remained unchanged since 1958. There is no doubt that this issue deserves analysis by DOD.

Cap has begun a comprehensive review. When his review is completed in November, we will be able to determine the next steps that may be required.

SUBJECT: Hearings on JCS Reorganization

Bill Clark asked that you be apprised of how we are addressing the issues raised by the ongoing Congressional hearings and public discussions concerning the structure of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the process by which they formulate and present advice.

The JCS and I agree that there are five paramount criteria against which any proposal for reform ought to be measured: would the change improve the nation's ability to wage war; would it assure that you and I and future Presidents and Defense Secretaries receive better and more timely advice; would it ensure that the requirements of the commanders of our combatant commands are better met; would the proposal improve our ability to allocate resources for national defense more wisely and use them more efficiently; would the proposal be consistent with civilian control of the military.

By applying these criteria to issues now under discussion, we have observed that some contributors to the present debate may be uninformed of those DoD management improvements which since 1981 have provided direct access to the Defense Resources Board for commanders of the unified and specified commands, have assigned budgetary priority to readiness, and have ought systematically to modernize our forces and improve our overall military potential to implement national strategy. The JCS agree that in these respects, the present "system" has been improved. Nonetheless, further improvements may be possible, and we are carefully evaluating, against the stated criteria, measures which I or the JCS could adopt within existing laws, and also measures which would require statutory revisions.

Among the actions we can take without Congressional action are these:

a. Combatant commands. I will emphasize to the commanders of unified and specified commands that I look to the Chairman, JCS to be their spokesman on both requirements and operations. Moreover, I have asked each JCS member to capitalize on travel on service business to visit the combatant commands and joint exercises so that the Chairman and I will have frequent first-hand insights into the needs and achievements of our field commanders. I have reemphasized the importance of coordinating the program of each service component of a unified command with the plans and programs of its unified commander. And finally, as I said, the commanders have direct access and input to the DRB meetings.

- b. JCS continuity. The Chairman has established a scheme for rotating no more frequently than quarterly the duties of Acting Chairman among the Service members of the JCS so as to assure increased continuity in the Chairman's absence.
- c. Qualification for joint duty. The Chairman has asked the JCS to develop plans to provide well-qualified joint staff officers and potential joint commanders through efficient use of formal schooling and repetitive assignments, and to increase service incentives and rewards for joint duty. The Chairman is planning a training program for the officers serving on the Joint Staff.
- d. Responsiveness. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, with full support of the other members of the JCS, is committed to leading the JCS in providing us timely and useful advice. I have assured the JCS that you and I want and need good military advice that is timely, and that we recognize that unanimity on the complex national security issues addressed by the JCS is not expected. Concerning the responsiveness of the JCS in advising you, I believe that you found the May 18 luncheon meeting with the JCS useful. I believe that similar sessions, held regularly-perhaps every three to four months--would increase understanding between you and the JCS and would in fact help make their advice more responsive.

We are also examining other proposals which would require legislative changes as follows:

- a. Whether to stipulate that command is exercised through the Chairman, JCS rather than through the corporate body of the JCS.
- b. Whether to specify that the Chairman is your principal professional military advisor in lieu of the JCS corporately.
- c. Whether to seek authorization for a full-time, four-star Vice Chairman.
- d. Whether to seek relief from existing statutory limits on the number of officers assigned to the Joint Staff and the length of their tour thereon.
- e. Whether to subordinate the Joint Staff specifically to the Chairman in lieu of the JCS corporately.
- f. Whether the JCS should be supplanted by a Council of senior officers other than Chiefs of service.
- Again, I have asked the Joint Chiefs of Staff to advise me of the merits of each compared to the criteria set forth above. Needless to say,





far-reaching changes, especially in Title 10 US Code, deserve most careful consideration by the new Joint Chiefs of Staff, our Administration, and the Congress. I have asked the new JCS to complete their review by October 1, 1982. I will then review their conclusions and present a coordinated plan to you and the NSC by November 1, 1982.

Secretary Weinberger's response to your request for information regarding the Defense Department's addressal of the JCS reorganization issue is at Tab A to Tab I. The hard questions, precisely the issues which prompted the recent press discussions and Congressional hearings, have been referred to the JCS for review. Secretary Weinberger will review the JCS conclusions and present a coordinated plan to you and the NSC by November 1, 1982.

Secretary Weinberger's approach is just what was intended: the start of a deliberate, focused, and coordinated analysis of the JCS structure. This procedure should preempt premature discussion of the issue by Administration officials.

The HASC Subcommittee on Investigations introduced a bill on JCS Reorganization last week and is still holding hearings. The three new members of the JCS will testify on July 28. There is virtually no likelihood that the bill will get out of the House subcommittee during this session. Furthermore, there has not been any action on the Senate side. Finally, the bill's sponsor (Representative Richard White, D-Texas) is not up for reelection, a new sponsor will have to be found next year. We are not being pressed by congressional action.

In forwarding Secretary Weinberger's memo to the President, you should briefly note the background behind this issue.

#### MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

You may recall that during the working luncheon you hosted for the Joint Chiefs of Staff in May you suggested that it would be valuable to hold these meetings on a more regular basis. All the Chiefs and I enthusiastically agree that this type of periodic exchange of views between you and your senior military advisors would be extremely helpful in guiding the rebuilding of our nation's defenses.

I think we are now at a time when another such working meeting would be opportune and productive. First, your new Chairman (General Vessey) and new Chiefs (Admiral Watkins and General Gabriel) have been on the job for a month or so. After working closely together with them I'm pleased to report that a harmonious, professional relationship has quickly developed. Secondly, with the active participation of the Chiefs (and the CINCs), we have just completed our "Defense Resources Board" deliberations, the process I discussed with you which translates your overall defense policy into budget priorities. These intense meetings have been extremely useful in the formulation of a coherent, balanced, and attainable defense program.

A working meeting with you in the next few weeks would be most beneficial in reinforcing the implementation of your defense goals with the Chiefs as we move into the fall budget process.

SUBJECT: Unified Command for Southwest Asia

Subject to your approval, I propose to proceed as follows with the arrangements for the new unified command for Southwest Asia:

- The new command will be activated on January 1, 1983, and assume all the planning and normal peacetime functions, except the Security Assistance function which it will assume on October 1, 1983. This will give the new unified command time to become fully established in its planning and other peacetime functions before it has to handle Security Assistance.
- The region for which the new command will be responsible will include: Egypt, Sudan, Djibouti, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, United Arab Emirates, Yemen Arab Republic, Peoples Democratic Republic of Yemen, Bahrain, Iran, Iraq, Afghanistan, and Pakistan, plus the Persian Gulf and Red Sea. I recommend that Israel, Lebanon, and Syria remain in EUCOM's region of responsibility for the time being, because many feel that the already suspicious feeling in some Arab countries would be increased if they are linked, as they would see it, to Israel by being put in a command structure with Israel for a force they call "the intervention force." I do not entirely share this view but I think it would be useful to start out this way and we can always change it later if need be. In any event, this would, with the exception of Egypt, put all of the Mediterranean littoral states under EUCOM and thus recognize the importance of the role of the 6th Fleet for these countries. Egypt should be under the Southwest Asia Unified Command, since it may be the location of our most substantial support activities (and it also is the only Mediterranean littoral state with an extended coastline on the Red Sea).

The forces available to the new command for planning and training could also be deployed in support of Unified Commanders or the National Command Authority in other parts of the world. This could be accomplished by providing these forces either as separate reinforcing units for the other CINCs, who have plans which anticipate their receipt, or as part of a Joint Task Force.
