Tomorrow's events in forwarding the Jackson Plan require the use of a SAM aircraft for Dr. Kissinger. In his capacity as Chairman of the President's National Bipartisan Commission on Central America (NBCCA), Dr. Kissinger is hosting an event tomorrow at 1:15 p.m. in New York City with the Council of the Americas. His presence is also required here for the "Kick-off Ceremony."

Due to these conflicting schedules, we need to pick him up at Laguardia for arrival in Washington (State Department) by 9:15 a.m. A State Department briefer, familiar with the Jackson Plan, will accompany the aircraft in order to consult with Dr. Kissinger enroute to Washington. Dr. Kissinger will need to depart immediately after the "Kick-off Ceremony" concludes at 11:00 a.m. and return to New York for his speech at 1:15 p.m.

FACT SHEET
PROPOSED IMPLEMENTATION OF THE REPORT OF THE
NATIONAL BIPARTISAN COMMISSION ON CENTRAL AMERICA

I. FINDINGS OF NBCCA

- o Central America is in crisis.
- o Region, although relatively poor in human and capital resources, had a proven record of growth during the 1950's, the 1960's, and most of the 1970's.
- o Current crisis reflects impact of:
 - international recession, and associated deterioration in terms of trade;
 - local social and political conflicts arising, in large part, from inequitable distribution of income and paucity of democratic institutions;
 - insurgencies shaped and aided by outside forces.
- o Economic instability, poverty, poor growth prospects, recession are increasingly serious sources of social and political unrest.
- o Twelve Commissioners and concerned, knowledgeable Americans recognize that U.S. must help; vital national interests -- both humanitarian and security -- are involved.

II. COMMISSION'S PRINCIPLES FOR U.S. POLICY

- o Democratic self-determination, including human rights.
- o Encouragement of economic and social development that fairly benefits all.
- o Cooperation in meeting threats to the security of the region.

III. ADMINISTRATION'S COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH

- o Requirements for development of Central America are inter-related, i.e., a seamless web of military and economic assistance, and support for democracy and dialogue, to meet economic, political, social and security needs.
- o Central America has the potential to regain rapid economic growth if:
 - sufficient economic assistance is provided to cushion the impact of external shocks and permit economic stabilization and adjustment to proceed;

- we use our influence to reinforce the resolve of Central American governments to adopt and adhere to policies which ensure equitable distribution of the benefits of growth; and
- adequate military assistance is provided to shield progress realized in economic and social/political fields.

- o Proposed bill, the Central America Democracy, Peace and Development Initiative Act, reflects above principles and provides authority needed to carry out Commission's recommendations.
- o Budget recommendations reflect importance of economic/social factors; FY 1984 Supplemental and FY 1985 programs, taken together, are 75% economic, but the 25% in military assistance is for absolutely essential shield.
- o Seven countries, including Nicaragua, potentially eligible for assistance under the Act.
- o An integral part of Administration policy in the area coincides with Commission recommendations: support for implementation of the 21 Contadora objectives to help bring about peace.

IV. BASIC PROVISIONS OF LEGISLATION

- o Long-term U.S. commitment.
- o Central American governments must adopt and follow appropriate market-oriented economic policies.
- o Economic, social, political and security problems are inter-related and each must and will be addressed to ensure that real progress is realized.

V. ECONOMIC PROVISIONS OF LEGISLATION

- o Authorizes appropriations for development assistance, ESF and for other programs such as USIA and Peace Corps, housing guarantees, Trade Credit Insurance, and Migration and Refugee Affairs.
- o Authorizes appropriations of \$400 million in supplemental economic assistance for FY 1984.
- o Additional emergency assistance is needed to stop economic declines, which (in per capita terms) have reached 35% of GDP in El Salvador and 23% of GDP in Costa Rica.

- o Bill establishes need for and authorizes multi-year funding (1985-89) of \$5.9 billion in appropriated funds and \$2 billion in insurance and guaranty authority.
- o Authorizes appropriations of \$1,120 million in economic assistance, and insurance and guaranty authority of \$600 million for FY 1985.
- o Some of the major elements of the Administration's plan for the first year (FY 1985) of a five year initiative are:
 - \$541 million to finance critical imports by the private sector.
 - A \$185 million program in labor intensive infrastructure and housing projects.
 - \$113 million for education (including literacy and teacher corps), training and scholarships.
 - \$210 million for development of agriculture.
 - Special funding for the National Endowment for Democracy, earmarked for Central America, as well as other assistance to democratic institutions.
 - \$120 million in PL480 agricultural commodities, with local currency generations devoted to priority programs in, for example, education and health sectors.
- o Permits administrative allocation of funds among accounts after FY 1985 in interest of efficient management.
- o Permits appropriated funds to remain available until expended so they can be withheld temporarily or transferred among countries in response to performance.

VI. MILITARY ASSISTANCE PROVISIONS OF LEGISLATION

- o Military assistance is needed to shield economic and social programs and are an essential adjunct to a diplomatic solution to conflict in the region.
- o Military assistance should be furnished predictably.
- o Authorizes supplemental military assistance appropriation of \$259 million for FY 1984, of which \$179 million is for El Salvador. El Salvador program is concentrated in FY 1984 in order to break the military stalemate.

- o Authorizes appropriation of \$256 million in FY 1985, of which \$133 million is for El Salvador and \$63 million for Honduras, and \$20 million for the Regional Military Training Center.
- o Conditionality for Military Assistance: Requires "progress reports" to Congress every six months on Salvadoran efforts to achieve democracy, development and security, but without a "certification" requirement.
- o Directs the President to condition military assistance to GOES in manner which fosters political, social and economic progress, in accordance with recommendations of NBCCA.

VII. NEW SUBSTANTIVE PROVISIONS CONTAINED IN OMNIBUS BILL

- o Our bill contains certain substantive provisions needed to respond to NBCCA recommendations.
- o Assistance for Legal Reform: Permits up to \$20 million in ESF in any fiscal year to strengthen administration of justice in Central America and the Caribbean without regard to general prohibition against assistance to law enforcement forces.
- o Compensation for Property: Establishes an exception to the prohibition against using foreign assistance funds to pay compensation for land reform programs.
- o Central American Development Organization: Authorizes the President to participate in CADO under arrangements to be developed with recipients and other donors.
 - Recommendations of CADO to be taken into account by USG in determining country assistance levels.
 - No specific funds are to be controlled by CADO.
- o Trade Credit Insurance: Allows AID to guarantee repayment of higher-risk, short-term trade credits guaranteed by Exim Bank for financing imports by Central American private sectors.
