I'm especially proud to be here in Idaho today because I want to do everything I can to encourage the people of Idaho to elect Steve Symms to the U.S. Senate. Let me tell you why.

Next January, with your help, I expect to be President of the United States.

And I can promise you that I don't intend to spend three or four months - or years - getting the Reagan Administration off and running. Already I have fifty-one transition task forces working in almost every area of foreign and domestic policy. I have additional task forces working on organization of the White House staff, finding capable men and women to head my administration, and - perhaps most importantly - mapping out a program for cutting out waste and fraud and other federal spending which does little more than feed bureaucrats and consultants with your hard earned tax dollars.

Let me tell you how federal budget outlays have soared since Jimmy Carter got into office. IN fiscal 1977 outlays were \$402 billion, under the last Ford budget. For fiscal 1981, the Carter Administration predicts - most recently - spending of \$633 billion and a deficit of \$30 billion. MOst people think those estimates are low.

In just four fiscal years, federal budget outlays have grown by an astonishing 57% and Jimmy Carter has watched while some \$183 billion was added to the national debt.

Clearly the federal budget - federal spending and federal deficits - are threatening to get totally out of control. It's time we put on the brakes - and quickly. And to do that, we have to have an effective Republican President in the White House and a majority of men like Steve Symms in the Senate and the House.

Remember - no President can do this alone. No President, however popular, can rein in runaway Federal spending and cut back runaway federal taxation and eliminate needless and stifling federal regulation single handed. He must have strong Congressional support. Even without an actual majority in the Senate or House, a Republican President can still do a lot by using the veto - provided there are enough Republicans to uphold that veto. And I know that if I veto a foolish or extravagant bill, Senator Steve Symms of Idaho will stand by me and by the people of Idaho in sustaining that veto.

Another thing we badly need is a strengthening of our national security. There is no way we can preserve the peace of the world, when every day we are slipping further behind the Soviet Union . I know this is the kind of thing that alarms the people of Idaho. They want, and deserve, not one but two United States Senators who will work for and vote for a meaningful margin of safety for our country.

Unfortunately, right now they have only one Senator working to preserve that vital margin of safety, and that's Jim McClure. And more often than not, his responsible vote is

canceled by the vote of Democratic Senator Frank Church.

I asked Steve Symms about Senator Church's voting record on defense issues. And do you know what he told me? He told me that on 41 of 45 key defense research, development and procurement issues over the last 12 years, Senator Church has voted in the negative forty-one times!

Now does that kind of voting record reflect the wishes of the people of the state of Idaho? I cannot believe it. And I cannot believe that the people of Idaho would seriously entertain the idea of returning to the Senate a man who has so consistently voted against the national security of his country.

But federal spending and defense are not the only issues of 1980. America runs on energy, energy for factories, energy for vehicles, energy for our homes and farms. And when it comes to generating electrical energy, nuclear power is a vital part of our national energy capacity.

Now we all know that there are still some problems with nuclear power. The Kemeny Commission pinpointed some operating problems. The permanent waste disposal problem is not yet solved - largely because of the Carter Administration's indecision and fumbling. But I am confident that those problems can be solved, using the talents of the brilliant men and women like those who have done so much to advance our knowledge of nuclear energy right here at Arco.

There are a lot of people in this country, as you probably know, who are hysterically opposed to any use of nuclear power.

They have totally lost sight of scientific evidence. They have ignored the splendid safety record of the civilian nuclear industry -

never a loss of life due to nuclear accident in all the years since the first reactor went on line in 1957. They don't care in the slightest what happens to Americans who rely on electric power, so long as they can shut down our nuclear generating capacity at any cost.

When the accident happened at Three MIle Island, the anti-nuclear activists and their friends in Congress tried to take advantage of the media hysteria by pushing a bill through Congress to put a stop to all nuclear plant construction. BUt one thing Ralph Nader and his allies didn't count on: the fact that Steve Symms of Idaho was the ranking Republican member of the House Energy and Environment Subcommittee.

Thanks to Steve's leadership, that nuclear shutdown bill was killed in the Congress of the United States. Instead of buying the anti-nuclear activists' program to call a halt to nuclear energy, Congress moved instead to improve the waste management process. For this the people of Idaho - and in fact, every electricity user in America - owe Steve Symms a vote of thanks.

So I hope you'll give him not only a vote of thanks, but a vote of confidence to represent Idaho in the Senate for the next six years. I need men and women in the Senate and House who will back me in my efforts to turn this country around. I know I can count on Jim McClure - but I need another strong voice and sure vote from Idaho, not a Senator like Frank Church who time andagain cancels out Jim McClure's responsible votes.

With this kind of support, we can work together effectively to begin straightening out the mess in Washington , and get this country turned around . I know Idaho will answer this call.

EXCERPTS FROM REMARKS BY GOVERNOR RONALD REAGAN

IDAHO FALLS, IDAHO

I'm especially pleased to be here in Idaho today because I want to do everything I can to encourage the people of Idaho to elect Steve Symms to the U.S. Senate. As you know I'm looking for a job. If I get it the next administration won't put Idaho or the West on a "hit list," the way the Carter administration has.

As Governor of California for eight years, I grew to understand the special difficulties Western residents face. I learned long ago something this administration apparently still doesn't know--that Westerners themselves do a far better job of allocating their precious water resources and developing their lands than does a federal government hundreds of miles away in Washington, D.C.

The next administration won't treat the West as if it were not worthy of attention.

The next administration will reflect the values and the goals of the Sagebrush Rebellion. Indeed we can turn the Sagebrush Rebellion into the Sagebrush Solution.

I know and love the West. Its values and goals are at the heart of Steve Symm's campaign. He is a leader who is going to provide the families of Idaho with a voice in the Senate.

No president can rein in runaway federal spending and cut back runaway federal taxation and eliminate needless and stifling federal regulation single-handed. He must have strong congressional support. Even without an actual majority in the Senate or House, a president can still do a lot by using the veto-provided there are enough courageous leaders like Steve Symms to uphold that veto.

There are so many issues that I could choose to demonstrate the current administration's total lack of understanding of the problems of the families of the West and of Idaho. But we'd be here for days if I listed all of them, so let me discuss just two key issues.

The first has to do with the fundamental issue of water. Conservation and development of water resources is vital, not only for the West and for Idaho but for our nation because the West is more and more providing direction and leadership for our nation.

If the nation thinks the energy crisis is bad--and it is-then what will we think if we ever get to the point when we find our water policies have led us to a crisis?

The Carter administration simply does not understand this.

But I do and we are going to work to see that a water policy that meets the needs of the West and of Idaho and the American people become a reality. We will develop a partnership between the federal government and the state governments which will respect the traditional role of the states in water law.

With help from Congressmen and Senators with the courage and vision of Steve Symms, we will have cooperation between the Executive and Legislative Branches in developing and implementing that policy.

There has been no such partnership during the Carter administration. All we have seen is bitter confrontation, confusion, indifference to the needs of millions of Americans and a general policy of obstruction on the part of the administration.

Today here in this state the Carter administration has closed lands that are rich in the minerals we need and now import--among them cobalt. It is estimated that Idaho has enough cobalt to reduce our imports by 20 percent.

I pledge you my cooperation.

We can develop multiple-use projects.

We can clean our lakes and rivers.

We can meet the needs of irrigated agriculture.

We can achieve a workable balance between the many competing demands on our water resources.

That doesn't mean that you don't place a premium on the natural beauty of Idaho. I know better. You love this land and you would never agree to its exploitation if that meant sacrificing its beauty to get at its riches. But there is a common sense way to have both.

The second key issue is energy. The president would have us believe that we are energy poor. But you and I know that isn't true. We have here in the West potential energy sources that are sufficient to make the United States self sustaining. They range from coal--oil--natural gas--geothermal--and of course hydroelectric energy.

And as in so many areas of our national life, Idaho and the West are playing leading roles in the development of nuclear energy, which I think we can succeed in making even safer.

I know that George Hansen, Steve Symms, and Jim McClure have been fighting the Carter administration and those in Washington who would do away entirely with nuclear power.

In fact the Democratic platform promises to do just that. There is some qualifying language in their platform suggesting that nuclear energy will be phased out as we develop new sources of fuel. South Dakota farm and ranch families don't need to be told what inflation has done to our country. Jimmy Carter's inflation has taken the profit out of farming and the heart to be told what

Quite often we cannot find words to adequately describe those things we hold most dear: our homes, our families, our faith in God. Instead, we talk about other subjects, perhaps more easy to discuss, like economy and government policy and programs. But when I do this, I want you to know I realize that what is at the heart of the matter is not statistics, not print-outs from some government computer but you--the families of South Dakota and families like yours all across America.

Since those things we hold most dear lie beyond our gifts to express, let me talk about those aspects of our lives words can describe and let's begin with what is happening to the hard-earned dollars that help your family.

Based on what the dollar would have bought in 1967, net income from farming in 1980 will be the lowest since the depression of the 1930's. In 1973, the highest net income year ever for American farmers, it was \$25.1 billion in 1967 dollars. This year in those "real" dollars it will be down to \$9.8 billion.

But farmers and their families already know what has happened to them in the past three and one-half years. What they want to know is what is going to happen to them in the 1980's.

I say it's time to get America back on the track - moving ahead again - and let's begin with American farms. Let's put the profit back in farming!
