SUBJECT:

Request for Meeting with Vice President from Former Prime Minister of France (U)

I see no compelling reason why the Vice President's busy schedule need be excumbered with a call by former French Prime Minister Michel Debré. Because of his prominent Gaullist persuasions, the latter is seen by the present French leadership as a major irritant. I do not believe it would be appropriate for a White House official to meet with such a political figure at this early point in the Administration, particularly since we will not yet have received France's present Foreign Minister (who will be here next month).

I note that Secretary Haig has agreed to meet briefly with Debré tomorrow; that should take care of any Executive Branch courtesies. (U)

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

#### FRENCH PEACE INITIATIVE ON AFGHANISTAN

Our Ambassador in Paris was called into the Elysee at noon January 27 to be informed that Giscard planned that evening on TV to propose a conference on non-interference in Afghanistan. According to the French proposal, the countries involved would be the USSR, Pakistan, Iran, India, and the permanent members of the UN Security Council, as well as a representative of the Islamic Conference (neither the Kabul regime nor Afghan nationalists would be included).

Privately we responded thanking the French for informing us, noting in a low-key way that we would have preferred more extensive advance consultations, and asking a number of questions regarding modalities.

Secretary Haig welcomed the proposal publicly at his January 28 news conference, noting that we had been informed in advance and that we had asked a number of questions seeking further information.


We understand that the countries France listed as participants were all notified on January 27 with the exception of the USSR, which was informed on January 26. Responses so far have ranged from lukewarm to glacial. The Pakistanis were particularly incensed since they see the French proposal as complicating prospects for their own diplomatic initiative. The Soviets have yet to respond, but the Soviet Ambassador in Paris noted that, although Brezhnev had told Giscard in Poland this summer that the USSR was looking for a way to have a political settlement, "things have changed." EC countries were particularly annoyed that the French had not consulted them (the only EC member to hear about the proposal in advance was the UK).

The timing of the French initiative was not propitious, coming as it did on the eve of the Islamic Conference debate on the question of Afghanistan, where the Paks hoped to gain support for their own peace initiative. We speculate that the timing was as much for internal French political reasons (upcoming elections) as for international considerations.

The timing and unilateral nature of the French proposal tends to detract from the prospects that such a conference will ever materialize. It also seems unlikely that the Soviets would agree given their categorical rejection of a similar Pak suggestion last summer as entailing unacceptable "internationalization" of the Afghan question.







#### CONFERENCE ON DISARMAMENT IN EUROPE (CDE)

For the past eighteen months the French have been seeking our support for their proposal to convene a "Conference on Disarmament in Europe" (CDE), a 35-nation negotiation of confidence building measures (CBMs) to be held following the current Madrid CSCE review meeting, probably in November of this year. After working closely with the French to develop an acceptable CDE mandate, the Carter Administration withheld a decision on whether to support the French. We have been isolated on the issue, since our Allies unanimously support the French proposal. The new administration is now considering whether to support the French proposal.

CBMs are measures to increase stability and enhance warning time of surprise attack by providing for notification and observation of military movements and maneuvers. The CDE's proposed mandate limits discussions to militarily significant and verifiable CBMs applicable "from the Atlantic to the Urals". The present CSCE CBM is applicable only to 250 KM of Soviet territory, so CDE would greatly extend our watch over Soviet activities. Indeed, the French argue the Soviets will never accept the wider area "to the Urals" even if it means there will be no conference. The CDE's primary competitor in the security field at Madrid is the Soviet proposal for a Conference on Military Detente and Disarmament (CMDD). The CMDD would have an open agenda and thus leaves the way open for the Soviets to tout their largely cosmetic or propagandistic security proposals. It would not include the wider area for CBMs. In contrast, the CDE's mandate would limit discussions to proposals the Allies believe could contribute to Western security.

If de Guiringaud raises the subject of the CDE, you should say that the issue is still under consideration in the new administration but that we will have a position in the near future.

# DEPARTMENT OF STATE BRIEFING PAPER

YOUR MEETING WITH FORMER FRENCH FOREIGN MINISTER LOUIS DE GUIRINGAUD

You have agreed to meet with former French Foreign Minister Louis de Guiringaud on February 5 at 4:00 p.m. A former colleague at the UN, de Guiringaud is retired but he maintains an active interest in international affairs, particularly in Middle Eastern and East-West issues. The following topics may arise during your meeting.

The Middle East - The French have never accepted the Camp David accord as a basis for a comprehensive settlement in the Middle East, and have been working on a possible initiative by the European Community which poses the real danger of undercutting our own efforts.

#### Talking Points

- -- The President supports and endorses the overall thrust of the Camp David Accords. We will be consulting with Egypt, Israel and others in the region in coming months before deciding how we will proceed.
- -- We hope that the Europeans will limit themselves to the exploratory phase of their own initiative until we decide our own approach, and have the opportunity to consult with them.

### CONFIDENTIAL

<u>Poland</u> - The French share our views regarding the dangers in the present situation in Poland and we have been actively consulting the French and other allies regarding what should be done in the event of a Soviet intervention.

#### Talking Points

- -- We must continue making clear to the USSR that Soviet intervention would have incalculable consequences for East/West relations and the entire structure of detente in Europe.
- -- Contingency planning toward coordinated western response is continuing as are consultations with other key nations, such as Japan, Australia, and New Zealand.
- -- Secretary Haig has recently contacted other allied leaders, including the French Foreign Minister, to reiterate our continuing interest in close consultations on this critical issue.

Afghanistan - We have disagreed with the French about how to respond to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, beginning with the Olympics boycott and the imposition of trade sanctions on the USSR. Last week, Giscard proposed an international conference to work out a political solution. Although we have publicly welcomed this initiative, it is unlikely to win general support.

#### Talking Points

- -- We share the conviction of the French Government that we must continue to work for a political settlement involving Soviet withdrawal and the restoration of a sovereign Afghanistan free of external domination.
- -- We have carefully studied the French proposal and will be in touch with the French Government to provide our views on how we might best advance our shared objective.

### CONFIDENTIAL

CSCE/CDE - Discussions at the CSCE meeting in Madrid are continuing on the French proposal for a Conference on Disarmament in Europe (CDE) and the Soviet proposal for a Conference on Military Detente. The French are awaiting a US response to their proposal, which already has broad Western support.

#### Talking Points

-- We know the CDE proposal is important to the French and the new administration is reviewing it to see what can be done.


It is in the name of my comrades, former French combatants, that I would wish to express to you personally how much your election has meant to us who hope for the defense of our liberty and peace.

For 36 years I have worked for Franco-American friendship. This has not only been my duty, it has also been the best way I know to repay the debt I owe to the American Army Medical Service which saved my life with transfusions of American blood when I was wounded five times during my campaign.

In the hope that it will be possible to express personally to you, the very warm wishes we extend to your presidency, I remain,

VICE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH RENE MONORY, FRENCH MINISTER OF ECONOMY

#### Background

Rene Monory is in Washington on IMF business and is taking the opportunity to get acquainted with the new Administration's policy-makers. Monory, 57, a strong political supporter of Giscard d'Estaing, is the only businessman in the French cabinet. He was owner of a farm machinery manufacturing business until he was elected to the French Senate twelve years ago, a seat he gave up to enter the cabinet in 1977. His wife now manages the business.

The old French Ministry of Finance and Economy was split three years ago into a Budget Ministry and the Ministry of Economy, which manages general economic policy. Monory is about to replace the former Italian Finance Minister as Chairman of the Interim Committee of the International Monetary Fund, which serves as an executive committee of IMF Governors.

He was also tasked by the Common Market Finance Ministers, at their meeting two weeks ago, to press the Reagan Administration, on the occasion of this visit, regarding the strain on the European economies caused by high U.S. interest rates and the resulting strength of the dollar.

Monory will meet with the Secretary of the Treasury, the Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers and the Chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. His visit to Washington will be brief.

Monory will be especially interested in the philosophy and outlook for U.S. economic policy. He has been an advocate of liberalization and modernization of the French economy. His image in France is of a Cabinet member interested in the problems of smaller business. He will undoubtedly

express strong support for current U.S. policy of fighting inflation and restoring dynamism to the private sector.

#### Talking Points

- -- Congratulate Monory upon his becoming chairman of the Interim Committee of the IMF. Indicate that this Administration strongly supports the role of the IMF in the international monetary system and in the process of international adjustment to higher energy prices.
- -- Should Monory discuss interest rates, indicate that the President's economic program is designed to reduce inflation in this country, and that we anticipate that interest rates will fall as part of this stabilization process, although some time may pass before sharp reductions occur.
- -- Indicate to Monory the general tenets of the Administration's economic policy, which is similar to the stabilization program undertaken by Prime Minister Barre, and in which Monory plays a role in France.
- -- You may wish to ask Monory what he foresees as the principal problems confronting the French economy leading up to and following the French Presidential election on May 10.
