I know that you continued those discussions through the day with Secretary Shultz, Secretary Weinberger, and Secretary Baker. As always, our discussions were able to take almost for granted certain shared values.

Yet these values -- liberty, democracy, the dignity of each individual -- these values are sacred. And nowhere are they more important or more in evidence today than in the strength of the Atlantic Alliance, and in the unshakable commitment of the United States to the defense of Europe. So it is that even as we seek to negotiate arms control and other agreements with the Soviet Union, we will continue to consult closely with our European

allies. Our message is clear -- to friend and foe alike:
America stands with Europe.

Permit me now to invite you all to join me in raising a glass in friendship. To France -- and to our honored guests, Prime Minister Chirac and Madame Chirac.
