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

Dear Ms. Canada:

Your letter of July 18 to Douglas Riggs, Special Assistant to the President for Public Liaison, has been referred to the Office of the Counsel to the President. You have requested a cassette tape of the President's remarks at services for the Vietnam War's Unknown Soldier at Arlington Cemetery on May 28. The tape of the President's remarks would be used for fundraising purposes on behalf of your client, Operation Rescue, Inc.

As Wendell Willkie of my office advised you in an earlier phone conversation, we are not able to comply with such requests. As you might imagine, the President receives a great many requests that he participate in or lend his support to various charitable and other worthy endeavors. As it would be impossible to comply with even a small portion of such requests, it was decided early in the Administration that the President would have to limit his participation only to those projects, necessarily few in number, in which he could be personally involved, or in which all Presidents participate as a matter of historical tradition or precedent.

We appreciate your inquiry. Although I know you will be disappointed by this response, I hope you can understand the reasons we must adhere to the policy described above, in fairness to all who seek the President's participation.

Operation Rescue's Request for Tape of President's Address at May 28 Service for the Vietnam Unknown Soldier

Linda Canada of Bruce W. Eberle & Associates wrote Doug Riggs (Office of Public Liaison) on July 18 on behalf of her client, Operation Rescue, Inc., whom she describes as a "non-profit organization concerned with the POW/MIA issue."

Canada requests an audio cassette tape of the President's address at the services for the Vietnam War's Unknown Soldier, at Arlington Cemetery on May 28. She writes: "Copies of the tape would be distributed to Operation Rescue patrons in appreciation of their support." In a telephone call, Canada confirmed that their hope was to be able to use copies of the tape for fundraising purposes. I advised her orally that White House policy would ordinarily preclude the use of the President's remarks in connection with fundraising activity.

Our press office handles such requests from members of the public on a discretionary basis, generally providing such tapes on request. John Murphy, General Counsel, Veterans Administration, advised me that Operation Rescue was not a registered veterans group; according to Harry Walters, this may in fact be a "fringe" group, causing some difficulties for Administration policy in Southeast Asia. In any event, I think we would be better off simply not providing the tape, rather than doing so coupled with a caveat that it not be used for fundraising purposes.

Accordingly, I have prepared for your review and signature a letter to Canada, advising her that our policy simply precludes compliance with her request.

BACKGROUND: A nationwide videoconference on Small Town

Revitalization is scheduled for September 18, 1984. This is the result of a partnership among USDA, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the National Trust for Historic Preservation. It will be broadcast by satellite to six regional centers and dozens of smaller communities all across the

country.

The Main Street approach emphasizes local initiative, entrepreneurship and private investment. In its four year history, the program has generated over \$127 million in new investment and over 900 new

businesses.

Main Street towns all have a heritage to preserve and an economy to redevelop. And because they are small communities with limited resources, they must plan carefully to revitalize their sagging downtown business districts. They look for manageable, affordable solutions.

That's where the National Main Street Center can help. It provides training and technical assistance to communities with populations under 50,000 so local citizens can tailor the Main Street approach to fit the needs and special character of their own downtown. The approach itself is flexible, comprehensive, and incremental. It seeks to rebuild the image that downtown projects to shoppers, residents, investors, and visitors.

By concentrating on improvements in four related areas—organization, promotion, design, and economic restructuring—citizens learn how to put existing resources to better use. They also learn how to build more effective public-private partnerships so that everyone who has a stake in downtown has a role to play in its revitalization.

What does all this mean on Main Street? It means . . .

- retaining and strengthening the businesses that give Main Street its variety and vitality;
- diversifying downtown's economic base by recruiting new businesses matched to changing consumer demands and putting old buildings to imaginative new use as residential, office, recreational, and even light industrial space;
- preserving the distinctive features that set Main Street apart from competing commercial areas—its historic buildings and public amenities—and using these to market the image of downtown as the unique center of everyone's community;
- developing special events and festivals that appeal to all ages and interest groups so that Main Street can again become a place where people come to have fun.

- A Main Street Videoconference

September 18, 1984, is the day you can learn all about the Main Street approach through an exciting nation-wide videoconference sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the National Endowment for the Arts. This day-long conference is for community leaders—like you—people who are interested in revitalizing their downtown business district.

From the studios of BizNet at the United States Chamber of Commerce in Washington, D.C., the videoconference will be broadcast by satellite to regional conference centers in the following cities:

- · Olympia, Washington
- Denver, Colorado
- · Jefferson City, Missouri
- · Bloomington, Indiana
- · Tallahassee, Florida
- · Hartford, Connecticut

If you are not near these cities but want to participate, you can arrange to receive the videoconference in your own community. One hundred small communities will be assisted in making such local arrangements by The Learning Channel, a Washington, D.C.-based cable network. (See enclosed card for further information.)

What Will You Get From The Videoconference?

First-hand advice from people who know how to make a revitalization program work, including NMSC staff, experts in design and economic development, and local Main Street project leaders. Using visual presentations and case studies drawn from towns around the country, these speakers will examine practical, cost-effective improvements that you can adapt to the needs of your own community in the areas of organization, promotion, design, and economic restructuring.

During the 5½-hour videoconference there will be periodic breaks when participants can call in their questions to the BizNet studio. In addition, participants at all sites will receive a special information kit to help them implement the Main Street approach in their own communities. Registrants at each regional conference center will also benefit from a special "wrap-around" program before and after the videoconference. Conducted by representatives of the National Trust and successful state and local Main Street programs, this session will enable participants to ask additional questions and learn more about resources for downtown revitalization in their own region.

Can Your Community Afford To Pass Up This Opportunity?

No. Fortunately you *can* afford to take advantage of it. Thanks to underwriting by its sponsors, the videoconference is available for only a \$25 registration fee at each of the six regional sites. Background information is attached for your review. We will provide a draft statement for the President should you find that desirable.

BACKGROUND ON THE USDA/NATIONAL TRUST PROJECT

The Office of Rural Development Policy was created in 1981 by the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a practical strategy for responding to the needs and opportunities in rural America. The Office reports directly to the Under Secretary for Small Community and Rural Development on issues affecting rural areas.

Responding to the Rural Development Act of 1980, the Office of Rural Development Policy prepared the nation's first comprehensive policy for rural development. Called "Better Country: A Strategy for Rural Development in the 1980's," the report emphasized the importance of building economic vitality in the nation's small cities and towns. The Department of Agriculture recognizes the importance of off-farm income to rural families and that the main streets of small towns must be healthy in order for rural citizens to prosper.

The Office of Rural Development Policy has enlisted the help of the National Main Street Center of the National Trust for Historic Preservation in order to promote their successful techniques for Main Street revitalization to small communities in rural areas. The National Trust, a private non-profit organization, launched its Main Street Program in 1977 to address the commercial revitalization and preservation needs of smaller cities. Originally developed in three pilot Midwestern towns, the program was later expanded to encompass networks of towns in six states: Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Georgia, Texas, and Colorado. Starting with 30 communities in 1980, this network has grown to include 63 small cities and towns.

The Department of Agriculture is responding to the technical assistance needs of rural citizens by providing the sound development lessons of the National Trust's Main Street program in a series of videocassettes, a format that can be used and re-used at the local level. The project also calls for a week long training institute for rural leaders to be held this summer. That institute will provide first hand training in the areas of economic development, public investment and sound design principles. Also, a national videoconference will be broadcast from Washington, D.C. on September 18, 1984, to six regional conference centers and other local sites.

The Office of Rural Development Policy will coordinate the project for the Secretary. Willard (Bill) Phillips, Jr., Director of that Office expressed his support for the program because it has demonstrated that it works. He pointed out that it properly emphasizes local private involvement and sound business practices as well as design and public sector elements. The videocassettes and user guides are scheduled for completion by August of this year, with the training institute planned for July.





U.S. MIDEAST PEACE EFFORTS AWAIT NEW ISRAELI GOVERNMENT (Transcript: McFarlane television interview) (1,510)

Washington -- National Security Advisor Robert McFarlane says he expects that once a new government is formed in Israel, the United States will seek to determine if other Arab nations, especially Jordan, are ready to negotiate with Israel.

The presidential advisor says President Reagan believes that U.N. Resolution 242 remains valid as a basis for a settlement in the Middle East.

He made the comments in an interview September 6 on the MacNeil/Lehrer News Hour television program.

McFarlane also made the following points:

- -- "When trouble has arisen in the Middle East, the Persian Gulf...and...in the Red Sea, who do countries in the area turn to -- the United States...They have confidence that this country stands for peace and will act in their best interest."
- -- "The United States neither sponsored nor condoned nor endorsed the private effort" by two Americans who reportedly died in a helicopter crash in Nicaragua while aiding opposition forces there.
- -- President Reagan believes that the best way to overcome differences with the Soviet Union is by "high level exchanges and good place to start is an exchange" between Secretary of State Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko scheduled for the end of September at the United Nations in New York City.

Following is a transcript of the interview with McFarlane. (begin transcript)

QUESTION: We've heard the president (in his B'nai B'rith speech) sound very optimistic about the prospect for peace in the Middle East, and yet his own plan was not accepted by either of the two key countries involved, Israel and Jordan. What is he trying to say?

ANSWER: The United States has an enduring interest in trying to help the countries of the Middle East to come together. The basis of the president's proposal of two years ago was premised on Camp David, fundamentally upon U.N. Resolution 242 -- that is an exchange of peace for territory.

The president believes strongly that the principles involved in the U.N. resolution remain as valid today as they were when it was enacted.

At bottom, it requires that Israel talk directly with its neighbors. The president remains committed to that. Once the government is formed in Israel, I would expect us to seek to do what we can to bring the neighbors together again.

Q: Is there a specific plan underway now to do that?

- A: I think it's premature to say that in the short-term I would expect any major initiative to be taken. I think that we have to wait for the parties -- notably Israel in the area to establish its own government -- and then to determine if Israel's neighbors, importantly Jordan, can step up to the issue of direct negotiations for a peace settlement.
- Q: Most Middle East analysts would agree that it's going to take some pressure from the United States on Israel to stop the settlements on the West Bank before we can see any progress over there. Is the Reagan administration prepared to exert that kind of pressure or whatever word you want to use for it?
- A: For an honest broker to say a priori that it's going to do this or that removes its credibility as an honest broker. The United States wants to help the parties directly negotiate with each other and to come up with a just settlement between them, but to prejudge what it's going to take to do that is probably unhelpful.
- Q: The Democratic vice presidential nominee, Geraldine Ferraro, said yesterday that the failure of this administration in Lebanon was that it never adequately explained why the marines were there, and that, in essence, the marines died for no reason, because our policy was never explained. How do you respond to that?
- A: The marine presence there -- together with French, British, Italian soldiers -- was to try to prevent a war between Israel and Syria. Now to say that the situation wasn't helped is simply wrong. Ask yourself, what had led to the violence in the first place -- the presence of the PLO in southern Lebanon launching attacks into Israel.

As a consequence of U.S. and other countries' efforts, 15,000 PLO left Lebanon. That's a fundamental change in the situation and the source of violence in the area.

And so it isn't at all fair to say that we didn't achieve something. We achieve something that is very fundamentally important.

I think, too, that if you look at what has happened since a year ago, you find that when trouble has arisen in the Middle East, the Persian Gulf this past June and more recently in the Red Sea mining, who do the countries in the areas turn to -- the United States.

They don't do that out of some instinctive reaction. They have confidence that this country stands for peace and will act in their best interest.

- Q: Let me turn now to Central America. The administration has repeatedly denied that these Americans who were killed in this helicopter incident in Nicaragua were CIA, and yet the helicopter apparently took off from an American land strip in Honduras and they apparently had contact with the American embassies in Honduras and El Salvador -- and there are reports to that effect. What was the U.S. role in endorsing the mission of these men, these mercenaries, if that's what they were?
- A: The United States neither sponsored nor condoned nor endorsed the private effort that was taken on this past weekend. The Defense, State Departments and CIA have looked exhaustively for any history of association with these private citizens and haven't found any.

You made a point about their having been in touch with the embassy there. As best we can tell, the questions of the embassy in Honduras earlier this year concerned how they could be in touch with governmental officials there about providing assistance. We pointed them -- as we would to any American citizen -- to the local officials.

We surely didn't endorse nor approve nor make possible this kind of effort.

- Q: It turns out that they were in the process of transferring arms that they had obtained apparently in this country to the rebel groups in Nicaragua and government-supported groups in El Salvador. Is that the sort of activity that we condone?
- A: I don't believe, as nearly I can tell. No one says nor has evidence that there was any ordnance or munitions ever transferred by these people. I have heard reports about clothing, other non-ordnance kind of things.

Secondly, you will recall that when the United States was prevented by the Congress from providing any further assistance in this program area that you can expect the United States to lose influence with the parties and they will naturally turn elsewhere to third countries, to other Latin American countries.

I think that one thing that is being missed here is this. I have seen reports today that the people involved -- indeed there were casualties in this episode -- were Cubans. If we're going to talk about foreign presence and violence, it's curious to me that no one has pointed out that the Cutans were there. Why? What possible justification?

- Q: Are you saying that it is all right with the administration for this sort of activity to continue?
- A: No I don't. In fact, I said earlier just the cpposite that we do not condone, encourage, endorse nor facilitate this kind of thing. I'm simply pointing out that when we are prevented from exercising control over whatever happens down there by a cutoff of our funds, that one can expect the people involved to go elsewhere. And this kind of thing can happen, but it surely is not with the encouragement of the U.S. government.
- Q: About the Soviets, what we know about the announcement that Marshal Ogarkov has been removed? Do we known anything at this point?
- A: We don't basically, and it's probably premature to speculate on either the motives or what may come of it. It is conceivable that indeed it will represent a promotion over time.

There is considerable turmoil within the Kremlin, within the Soviet leadership now -- a kind of turmoil that comes from having to digest an enormous amount of change in the West and in this country in the past four years, and that comes from having to cope with two transitions of leadership in their country and arrange the division of labor and decision-making authority.

- Q: And yet they have gone ahead and set up a meeting later this month between our secretary of state and their Foreign Minister Gromyko.
- A: The president welcomes that. There's no question but that there is a great deal of misunderstanding between ourselves and the Soviet Union. The president believes that the best way to overcome that is by high-level exchanges and a good place to start is an exchange between the foreign minister and Secretary Shultz. We look forward to that.
