Thank you very much for your letter of April 23, and I'm sorry to be so late in answering.

Our problem with the Soviets and arms control is not a new one. Indeed our government has tried to involve the Soviet government in arms control talks 19 times between WWII and my taking office. In 1946 we proposed putting all nuclear weapons and material under an international commission to prevent any nation from having such weapons. At that time we were the only nation with such an arsenal. The Soviets had not yet completed a socalled bomb. Even so, they rejected the proposal.

Over the years we let our defenses down in the hope that, as you suggested, they would be reassured and join us in reducing their military. Instead, they engaged in the most massive military buildup in history.

Let me give you a clue to their thinking. When they had an ABM (anti-ballistic missile) and we didn't, we tried to get them into an agreement banning such weapons. They refused. Then our Congress authorized our building of such a missile. The Soviets almost instantly proposed an ABM treaty and it was signed. They respect our technological capacity.

In the present situation, they have had SS20 nuclear missiles -- intermediate range with three warheads per missile targeted on all of Europe for quite awhile. Our NATO allies had no deterrent against these missiles.

In 1979 NATO asked us to provide such a deterrent. President Carter agreed and manufacture of the Pershing II missiles began. Our Administration inherited this program and, of course, carried on.

Suddenly the Soviets began a propaganda campaign to scare our allies into changing their minds. In response, I proposed an arms reduction agreement calling for the total abolition of such intermediate range weapons. The Soviets agreed to negotiate but rejected the total ban. Dear Mr. President:

Within the last twenty years it seems our candidates for the presidency have been to submissive with other countries. As an individual I follow political figures as they try diplomatically to ease tension within our globe. #### Dear Miss Roberts:

In reply to your letter of April 27th, I can understand how you have a misperception about my speech in China. There was a certain amount of distortion in the press accounts. Actually, there was no "incident" worthy of a press story. Relations with the Chinese leaders were and are on a sound friendship basis.

The theme of their remarks and mine was one of recognizing the differences between us, but emphasizing how many things we had in common. my speech I made no criticism of their system or philosophy but, in the context of getting to know each other better, I sketched the basics of our system so they could understand where we were coming from. At the same time I contrasted them and ourselves with the country which has 56 divisions poised on their border (we only have 17 divisions in our entire Army). I also mentioned that country's expansionist policies which have them promoting the conflict in Vietnam and Kampuchea on China's southern border. All of these things had been discussed with my hosts and we were in agreement.

I believe some bureaucrat at a lower echelon took it upon himself to edit out those few lines possibly because of the impending visit of a Soviet diplomat who, incidentally, cancelled his visit probably because of China's movement of troops to the Vietnam border. By the way, my line about the "greatest threat to peace in the world today" was a repeat of what Premier Zhao had said to me.

Well, you see your letter did get to me, and I don't take daily zzzz's. That's another distortion by the press. I'm enclosing your letter just in case you'd prefer to have it.

Dear Mr. Ide:

There were no misrepresentations or halftruths in my speech. I can, however, understand why you might think so, since your letter reveals your acceptance of the worldwide propaganda put forth by the Cuban and Soviet disinformation network.

The radical rightwing forces in El Salvador, which admittedly would have a totalitarian government every bit as repressive as the one the guerrillas are fighting to have, do operate without governmental sanction. Indeed, the only elected government -- three elections in 26 months -- has made tremendous strides in curbing their activities. D'Aubuisson had his chance in a free and open election and he was rejected by the voters -- more than 80% of the electorate voted even though the guerrillas had told them, "Vote today and die tonight." Were we a perfect democracy for all of our 200 years? What about lynchings with no arrests being made more than a 100 years after we had adopted our Constitution?

Why is it that every murder is purported to be the work of the so-called death squads? The guerrillas a couple of years ago boasted openly they had killed more than 10,000 of their countrymen.

In Nicaragua, I'm sure, some of the Contras are former members of the National Guard. They would be executed if they tried to live as citizens under the Sandinistas. Most of the leadership of the Contras is made up of men who were part of the revolution against Somoza.

When victory came they were denied a place in government. The Sandinistas, who a few years ago joined the P.L.O. in declaration of war against Israel, seized total control and with Cuban and Soviet help established a totalitarian government on the Cuban and Soviet pattern. I think there are other reasons behind Mr. Pastora's reluctance to align himself with the other freedom fighters.

Nicaragua now has a military more powerful than that of all Central American nations combined. The government has declared its revolution is not bound by any national boundaries.

We do support the Contadora process and its 21 points. There have been criticisms from time to time by some in that process, but still we have a good relationship. We continue to seek a negotiated peace and the government of El Salvador and the Contras support us in this. Only the guerrillas and the Sandinistas refuse. We were providing financial aid to the Sandinista government for some time after I took office as my predecessor had. Then it became clear the Sandinistas were supplying arms to help overthrow the government of El Salvador. In fact, the guerrillas' headquarters is in Nicaragua about 20 miles from the capital.

Incidentally, the persecution of the Miskito Indians has not ceased. Thousands upon thousands are herded into concentration camps under deplorable conditions.

We have legislation before Congress for an \$8 billion five year program to help Central American countries establish viable economies and social reforms. Less than a quarter of that amount is

to provide help to their security forces so that the social and economic programs can be implemented.

Thank you for giving me a chance to reply.

Mr. President:

I am writing to you because of the misrepresentations contained in yourspeech about Central American policy. Among those I noted are these:

You said that the extreme Salvadorean right wing was not part of the Salvadorean government, bût you overlooked the reported links between the death squads and Roberto D'Aubisson and his party. You also neglected to mention that most human rights groups believe that the death squads are responsible for most of the human rights abuses in Salvador. For example, Amnesty International has said (in a statement to the House Western Hemisphere Affairs subcommittee, 26 July 1983) that "analysis of all available data suggests that the majority of the reported violations, including torture, 'disappearance,' and deliberate, coldblooded killings, have been carried out by the security forces, and have been directed against individuals not involved in guerilla activity".

You referred to the land-reform program, but did not mention that the most important part of that program (that dealing with medium-sized farms) has not been carried out. You talked about those who could not farm because they would be killed by the left, but did not mention those who have been threatened and killed by the right wing death squads.

You praised the Salvadorean offer of amnesty, but neglected to mention those who have been killed by the death squads after release from prison, including Manuel de Jesus Orellana Moran, Pedro Antonio Chamal, Pablo Roberto Torres, and Nelson William Solano.

You claimed that the contras are fighting for democracy, but didn't discuss the large number of them who were part of the brutal, totalitarian Somoza regime. You mentioned those who were formerly part of the Sandinista government, but didn't note that one of them, Eden Pastora, has refused to join the U.S.-backed guerillas because of their links with the former Somoza regime.

You mentioned the increase in the Nicaraguan armed forces, but did not mention their fears of a U.S. invasion, fears which your administration has deliberately and callously encouraged.

You said that you support the objectives of the Contadora process, but did not mention that leaders of Contadora nations have deplored your Central American policy.

These by no means exhaust the half-truths in your speech, but they adequately illustrate its propagandistic nature.

I have no illusions that the Sandanista government is perfect—their mistreatment of the Miskito Indians (which, however, has reportedly ceased) is sufficient to demonstrate their short—comings—but their misdeeds do not justify your administration's backing guerillas who are attempting to overthrow that government.

Nor do I think that the Salvadorean guerillas will solve the problems of Salvador. But a policy which ignores the limitations the Salvadorean army has already indicated will be placed on any president's ability to reform the armed forces, and which ignores the continuing human rights violations by the right wing death squads can only exacerbate the problems.

The problems of Central American will not be solves by simplistic rhetoric. What I have heard tonight gives me little reason to hope that your administration will contribute significantly to the solution of those problems. And your resorting to half-truths which distort the real situation suggests that you yourself do not believe that this policy is in the best interests of the Americas.

#### Dear Mr. Lawrence:

Thank you for including your return address in your letter of May 10. I appreciate the opportunity to reply to your statements which, while well intentioned, do not present a factual account of the situation today either, in El Salvador or Nicaragua.

It is true that El Salvador was supportive of repressive and violent forces even after the coup which overthrew a military dictatorship. But there were those in that coup who wanted true democracy. One such was for a time chosen to be President, but he was never allowed to serve. Jose Napoleon Duarte was imprisoned, tortured and exiled. He is now the President-elect of El Salvador.

There have been three elections in 26 months. Bipartisan teams of observers from our country have been in El Salvador for each of those elections, and they have been unanimous in their praise of the people who voted in spite of death threats by the guerrillas -- guerrillas, I might add, who are trained and supplied by Cuba, the Communist Bloc countries and the Sandinista government of Nicaragua.

Of course, the duly elected government of El Salvador, beset by powerful guerrilla forces, has not entirely gotten a handle on the right-wing radicals assailing that government from within. But they have made tremendous strides and will make more under the newly elected President.

Mr. Lawrence, our democracy is 200 plus years old, but I remember a time in this century when citizens could be lynched without any arrests being made. Don't you think it's understandable that a new democracy can't do everything in less than a decade? They are trying.

As for Nicaragua, the Sandinista government is purely totalitarian and has committed genocide against the Miskito Indians. The Contras assailing that government are led in large part by people who were part of the revolution that overthrew Somoza, and all they want is the democracy they fought to have. The Sandinista group denied them a place in government and to this day has never kept a single one of the promises made to the Organization of American States which they asked for help during the revolution.

The archbishop of San Salvador has been quoted as calling for removal of our forces. He has denied this and states that he want us to stay. The bishops of Nicaragua, at risk to their lives, have called on the Sandinista government to keep its promises and stop persecuting the Nicaraguan people.

Yes, you are right that Central America needs economic help and social reforms. Our legislation before Congress asks for an \$8 billion five-year program to do just that. Only about 20% is to provide military support. You can't institute economic reforms while you are defending yourself against a powerful, well armed hostile force.

We support the 21 points of the Contadora Group. We continue to appeal to the guerrillas in El Salvador and the Sandinistas to negotiate a peaceful settlement in both countries. So far the guerrillas have refused and so have the Sandinistas. The government of El Salvador and the Contras in Nicaragua have joined us in seeking a peaceful solution. We are not militarizing Central America.

And, in addition to the doctors and teachers you identify as Cubans in Nicaragua, there are also several thousand Cuban military there as well as some P.L.O., Bulgarians and others. We have 55 military instructors in El Salvador.

Thank you for giving me an opportunity to respond.

Dear Mr. President:

I was saddened and angered by your speech on Central America. Having worked for two years in El Salvador as a member of the U.S. Public Health Service and having returned three times over the past eight years for periods of one to three weeks, I find the disortions and manipulation of the facts contained in your speech to be reprehensible, especially coming from someone holding the highest elective position in our country. We have supported, and your policies continue to support, the most repressive and violent forces in El Salvador. As a member of a medical mission of inquiry into the abuse of Protocol 2 of the Geneva Convention (the protocol guaranteeing the concept of medical neutrality under conditions of armed conflict) which visited El Salvador last year, I and my colleagues documented the continuing violation of human rights, the use of torture and executions, and the wholesale disregard for judicial review by the security forces of the Government of El Salvador, a group you describe as struggling for freedom and the protection of democracy.

Similarly, your description of the situation in Nicaragua was filled with half-truths, distortions of fact, and glaring omissions. You are either poorly informed or engaging in the worst form of political demagoguery. Yes, the Cubans do have thousands of personnel in Nicaragua, but why don't you say that 1600 of them are doctors and 2000 are teachers? Why aren't we sending similar groups to educate and heal the people of Central America rather than supplying guns and bombs to a corrupt and incompetent military? Why are we afraid to have our policies examined before the World Court and unwilling to support the efforts of the Contadora Group to bring about a negotiated settlement of the conflict in Central America? Your policies bring dishonor to the American people and mock the very principles which have made our system of democratic government survive for two centuries. I urge you to stop your dangerous policy of confrontation and militarization of the Central American isthmus; to end your support for the security forces and death squads which have killed over 30,000 civilians in El Salvador; to accept the offer of our neighbor, Mexico, and Panama, Venezuela and Colombia to mediate a negotiated settlement to the fighting; and to end the covert support of the Samos thugs you call "freedom fighters."



- \* Shortly after your April 27 speech at the Great Hall, I happened to be with four of the Chinese leaders who sat on the stage with you. They independently commented on your youthfulness, your vitality exhibited by the way you delivered the speech, the substance of the speech, and, most impressive of all, your superb memory you only glanced at your paper once or twice. The next day, I happened to meet several of my Chinese friends from the audience. They made practically the same comments. Since they all are so convinced of your superb memory, I, did not have the heart to tell them that you had some technical help. (They thought the plastic plate was a protective shield.)
- \* In January of this year, while back in the States, Beulah received a telex from the North Rose Corporation in Beijing, which had been founded with her inspiration and assistance. (As you probably know, during the Cultural Revolution, one could get imprisoned if one grew roses or other plants.) She was requested to bring bare roots of a certain award-winning rose known as "First Lady Nancy" in anticipation of the visit. Beulah followed the request and the "First Lady Nancy" roses grew in the Chinese soil for the first time and blossomed just a few days prior to the visit. A picture, showing us ready to present the three roses, is enclosed for the First Lady.

All in all, the American community in China is very proud of your visit and performance. You have certainly impressed the Chinese with your vigor, friendship and strength.
