OUR FARMERS AND RANCHERS DON'T PRODUCE
THE MOST WHOLESOME AND VARIED FOODSTUFFS
KNOWN ANYWHERE AS A RESULT OF 21-1/2 PERCENT
INTEREST RATES. WHEN WE TOOK OFFICE, THAT'S
WHERE THE PRIME RATE STOOD. NOW I KNOW THAT

IN 1982, NEARLY ONE-FIFTH OF THE

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: RECEPTION FOR FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA TUESDAY, JULY 24, 1984

Thank you for that warm farm welcome. I'm delighted to be with those of you who represent America's bedrock industry.

Agriculture is a driving force in our Nation's economy, and the Future Farmers of America are working hard to keep it that way.

I know you'll meet with our Secretary of Agriculture, Jack Block, and he'll probably spin a few of his stories. And Jack was a Greenhand in the Knoxville, Illinois chapter of F.F.A. But we both like to put on a blue denim jacket whenever we get the chance, and I remember once, some years ago, having an experience that you'll all understand. With all the space Nancy and I had at the ranch, I decided it would be a good idea to have our own fresh eggs every morning. So I put in a battery of chickens. And we had our own fresh eggs every morning. They only cost \$1.65 apiece.

All of us know that God has blessed America with a vast and fertile land. But it's ingenuity, muscle, and sweat that have made our farms the envy of the world. And the last thing our farmers need is Government getting in the way and making a tough job even tougher.

You know, there's a story about a young city fella who hired out to work on a farm during the harvest season. And the first morning everyone was up well before dawn. The new hired hand and the farmer made their way in the dark out to the oat field.

Neither one said a word on the way out. Finally, the city fella asked what kind of oats were they going to cut -- wild oats or

tame oats. The farmer, more than a little surprised, said, "Well, tame oats, of course. But why do you ask?" "Well," he said, "I was just wondering why we're sneaking up on 'em in the dark." Well, that's about as much as some people know about what past policy mistakes and economic difficulties meant to our farm community.

Our record of agricultural productivity -- unmatched anywhere in the world -- didn't come about thanks to double-digit inflation. In the 3 years before 1981, farm costs jumped an outrageous 45 percent -- and that was nearly \$40 billion, the largest 3-year increase in our history. And today, we've knocked the wind out of inflation. It's down to around 4 percent, and, as a matter of fact, for the last 3 months, it's been 3.7 percent.

Our farmers and ranchers don't produce the most wholesome and varied foodstuffs known anywhere as a result of 21-1/2 percent interest rates. When we took office, that's where the prime rate stood. Now I know that some of our critics have a very short memory, but you and I know that 21-1/2 percent interest rates were a devastating blow to an industry that spends a fifth of its cash outlays on interest expenses.

New don't get me wrong, interest rates are still far too high. And I'm going to entinue my fight until we get them down even more. And one of these days, and I hope it's very soon, some people will wake up and realize that not only is inflation firmly under control -- but we will keep it that way. And with signs of future price trends pointing to low rates of inflation

as far as we can see, I can't help believing there is no excuse for interest rates being where they are.

In 1982, nearly one-fifth of the world's agricultural products was shipped from American ports. That didn't happen thanks to grain embargoes and protectionism. The grain embargo was a cruel, painful blow -- and terribly unfair. That's why one of my first actions in this job was to lift the embargo. And as long as I'm President, our farmers will never again be made the scapegoats for a foreign policy of weakness and indecision.

What we're doing, and what we'll continue to do is to move in a positive direction -- pursuing new export markets, and working to remove export barriers. Our trade teams have been continuously on the go in search of new markets. Jack Block has been knocking on doors all over the world, and he's going to keep on knocking.

Libelieve these efforts are paying off. We've negotiated new import quotas with Japan that will lead to a doubling of beef exports and a 54 percent increase in citrus exports over the next 4 years. On another front, we demonstrated our determination to aggressively maintain exports, including a strong American challenge to the European Community's subsidy program. As a result, the European Community has joined us in serious discussions in an effort to solve some of the problems caused by their subsidized exports.

Let me assure you, Now that we've regained our reputation as a reliable supplier, we intend to maintain that reputation.

And today, at home, we're hard at work on the 1985 Farm
Bill. The Department of Agriculture will continue to solicit

farmers' views on this important bill. So far, they've accepted hundreds of pages of written recommendations and held listening sessions around the country. The latest session was held just last week in Dallas.

You know, I don't get the chance to talk to our farm community often enough to suit me. You represent the best in America. Our farmers and ranchers have always honored and lived by the values and traditions that make America great -- faith, family, neighbors helping neighbors, hard work, free enterprise, and independence. We can touch the spirit of America in our farm communities. And again, much is owed to the Future Farmers of America. F.F.A. is giving more than a fine start to our young people. By cultivating traditional values, leadership skills, and patriotism, the Future Farmers of America ensure the strength and vitality of our country.

Now before I close, I want to say a few words about the thousands of volunteers and private industry sponsors who are reaching out to America's future. F.F.A. has some 14,000 adult teachers and State advisers -- good, caring Americans who are offering a gift that will last a lifetime -- the gift of opportunity.

Thank you Don Miller, and thank you all very much.

Ladies and Gentlemen of America's Team at the 23rd Olympiad: You did us proud.

You're heroes, every one of you _______You're living proof of what happens when America sets its sights high and says, "Let's create a little excellence." And you gave us moments we'll never forget. There was Blatnick falling to his knees in thanks -- and Hary Lov Retton getting that perfect ten. There was Steinseifer and Hogshead hitting the wall at the exact same hundredth of a second -- and Carl Lewis' smile when he tied Jesse Owens' record.

There was something very special about this Olympics, there was a special spirit to it. You gave us all such a lift -- you gave us something to be unified around and cheer for together. I think you may have heard that cheer. It went something like "U...S...A!" It doesn't matter whether you won the gold, the silver or the bronze -- that cheer was tor you.

The specialness of this Olympics was apparent from the beginning, when all of you marched into the Coliseum together. An Englishman watching from the stands looked out at you and was quoted as saying, "That's what the world loves about America, that wonderful casualness and confidence." You walked into the opening ceremonies with a special kind of pride, a vibrant and very human delight that was transmitted to the crowds and that was picked up by people watching throughout the country.

I couldn't help but think that if the people of the world judged Americans by what they saw of you, then they think, "Americans? Well, they're generous and full of serious effort, they're full of gaity and high spirits, they're motivated by all the best things...and do they bring home the gold, or what?"

I want to take a moment here to single out and say thank you to the uncelebrated people in the story: your coaches and trainers, your parents and friends. All the quiet people who stood behind you when the shot rang out and the race began. Every hero knows that no hero does it alone. The people who stood behind you deserve our thanks. The way I see it, there ought to be an Olympic event in Moral Support. They'd get a perfect ten.

I want to say too that the city of Los Angeles did a marvelous job. What terrific people in this town. Just about everyone in this city had to put him or herself out in some way, one way or another, while the Games were on. They not only did it. they did it with a smile. They won the admiration and thanks of the entire country. And I think a guy back East summed it up when he was sitting around with his family during the games one day. He said, "L.A. has a lotta class, a lotta style." Don't you think he was right?

This is a good time also to thank the corporations and businesses that decided, a few years back, to contribute money and personnel and time to help our athletes. They proved that the profits reaped from a free economy can be used to help our young people compete on an even footing with the state-subsidized

athletes of other countries. Those corporations did us proud. So did Bill Simon, who led this great Citizen's Effort. So did the Los Angeles Olympic Committee...and the U.S. Olympic Committee.

The 23rd Olympiad of the modern era is over but it will never be forgotten. It was attended by more countries than ever before — there was more competition than ever before — there was more brilliant talent than ever before — and, incidentally, more records were broken than ever before. A few countries — very few — did not attend. But at least now we know why the Soviets said they felt so insecure about coming. If <u>I</u> thought I'd lose a lot of gold while visiting another country I might think twice too! I have just a final point here. One of the things I noted, and liked so much as I watched the Games on T.V., was that usually, in most of the events, you could sort of figure out who represented what country . . . except with the American athletes. With the American athletes you almost always had to see the U.S.A. on their uniforms — because our team came in all shapes and sizes, all colors and nationalties and races and ethnic groups. And I was thinking, you can talk on forever and read books about the melting pot, but the past two weeks there it was, winning medals for us, representing us every day.

And so I say to you, the great melting pot team of 1984, the members of America's team at the 23rd Olympiad: Thanks for the memories, thanks for the great moments. Thanks for being what you are: genuine heroes.

You did us proud.

And you know what? 1984 has a kind of special significance for me. I'm finding it to be a very interesting year. But after seeing what you did at this Olympics, I can't wait 'til '88. I can't wait.
