On November 20, a week after your radio address, President Mitterrand wrote to you concerning the French-U.S. differences on East-West economic relations (Tab B). We interpret his letter as basically conciliatory, although loaded down with standard French positions about national sovereignty. He has also leaked these portions of his letter to the French press, playing to the domestic audience. (S)

The reply for your signature at Tab A responds in a conciliatory spirit. It urges Mitterrand to join us in the follow-on work called for in the "non-paper," and it maintains our position that the French were a part of the consensus which was worked out here in Washington. (8)

Dear Francois:

Thank you for your letter of November 20. I share your desire to put behind us whatever misunderstanding may have arisen over East-West economic issues.

Our basic community of interests on these issues was evident in the discussions which Secretary Shultz began during the informal NATO Foreign Ministers meeting at La Sapiniere and which continued here in Washington. As you know from our talks in Williamsburg, Ottawa and Versailles, I attach the greatest importance to the achievement among the Western Allies of a consensus on our economic relations with the Soviet Union which will ensure that these relations work to our advantage and avoid giving strategic benefits to the Soviet The discussions here in Washington demonstrated that there was no disagreement in principle among us on these points and I considered it a great success that we worked out a consensus document on these principles and an approach to turning them into policies.

It is unfortunate for the Alliance that this success was marred by a public disagreement between us. had good reason to believe, after weeks of discussion, that France was satisfied with the conclusions reached by our representatives here in Washington. We worked earnestly to accommodate French concerns -- indeed, to the point of modifying positions to which all of the other partners were ready to agree. During our Washington discussions, your ambassador made it clear that France did not regard the lifting of sanctions as "linked" to the issue of reaching a consensus on the paper our representatives were considering. But I must note that the European Ambassadors indicated that consensus on the Summary of Conclusions was contingent on knowing what we would do about the sanctions. To us, the implication was clear. In any event, I was careful to avoid any suggestion in my public statement that France had agreed to our consensus in return for having the sanctions lifted.


I very much welcome your desire to put any misunderstanding on this issue behind us. It is a
desire I wholeheartedly share. In that spirit I
look forward to working with you and our other
allies to translate the progress our representatives
have thus far made into a more harmonious common
Western approach. This work should begin immediately
so that full advantage can be taken of the
opportunity provided by the NATO ministerial
meeting. I continue to believe that it would
serve all our interests to publish the Summmary of
Conclusions which our representatives so painstakingly formulated.

I know that different national practices mean that our task will not be easy, and I respect what you have said about France's sovereignty. But I deeply believe, as I know you do, that we have powerful common interests which, combined with good will and intelligent work, will prove that a common approach is not inconsistent with the national responsibilities each of us bears.

I fully share your view of the importance of our mutual participation in a common defensive alliance and am pleased that you will be meeting with Secretary Shultz to advance our common interests when he visits Paris this month. I look forward to our next opportunity to discuss the full range of our mutual concerns. I greatly value our relationship and always welcome your wise counsel.

President Mitterrand's letter of November 20 on East-West economic issues is basically positive, although it is burdened with characteristic French verbiage on national sovereignty and independence and is not distinguished by its clarity of presentation. French officials have stressed to us that Mitterrand's letter is conciliatory and urged that we accept it in this spirit. At the same time, however, Mitterrand has made statements to the press in the last few days that belie this supposedly conciliatory effort.

Attached is a draft response to Mitterrand for your consideration which essentially accentuates the positive elements of his letter while explaining our position and making clear that we continue to attach the greatest importance to the prompt development of a coherent, coordinated Western strategy on economic relations with the Soviet Union. The draft response makes no concessions to the French position on any of the issues under discussion but does emphasize our desire to move ahead expeditiously on the follow-up process.

AND HAVE A TIMELY EXCHANGE OF VIEWS IN ORDER TO AVOID THE POSSIBILITY OF IT AGAIN EMERGING AS A CONTENTIOUS PUBLIC ISSUE BETWEEN US. THE ISSUE IS A COMPLEX ONE AND REQUIRES CARE TO FASHION THE BEST WAY TO ADDRESS COMMON CONCERNS WHILE RESPECTING NATIONAL SOVEREIGNTIES. I AM CONFIDENT THIS BALANCE CAN BE ACHIEVED. SINCE IT IS CRITICAL THAT THE WORK IN THESE OTHER ORGANIZATIONS BE FAR ENOUGH ALONG THAT WE DO NOT HAVE TO BELABOR THESE ISSUES AT THE SUMMIT. I THOUGHT IT USEFUL TO DESCRIBE FOR YOU WHAT I ANTICIPATE CAN AND WILL BE ACHIEVED IN THE VARIOUS WORK PROGRAMS BY THE TIME OF THE WILLIAMSBURG SUMMIT:

IN COCOM. THE NATO MINSITERIAL IN JUNE, WHICH FOLLOWS THE

I TAKE SOME CARE IN DESCRIBING THESE ANTICIPATED RESULTS
BECAUSE I WANT YOU TO KNOW MY THINKING AND TO ASK YOU TO CONTINUE TO ENCOURAGE THIS WORK IN EVERY WAY POSSIBLE TO ACCHIEVE EXPEDITIOUS RESULTS. I HAVE NO DESIRE TO ACCORD EAST-WEST ECONOMIC RELATIONS A PROMINENT POSITION IN THE SUMMIT AGENDA OR IN THE PUBLIC DISCUSSION AROUND THE SUMMIT. I AM FAR MORE CONCERNED THAT WE ACHIEVE THE REAL RESULTS BEING DEVELOPED IN THE OTHER ORGANIZATIONS. IT WOULD BENEFIT ONLY THE SOVIET UNION IF EITHER OF OUR COUNTRIES FELT IT NECESSARY TO HIGHLIGHT DIFFERENCES ON THESE ISSUES IN A PUBLIC WAY. AND THIS CAN ONLY HAPPEN IF WE FAIL TO COMMUNICATE NOW WITH CLARITY AND CANDOR ABOUT OUR EXPECTATIONS FOR THE RESULTS OF CURRENT EFFORTS IN THESE BODIES AND SPECIFIC SUBSTANTIVE CONCERNS ON PROGRESS TO BE ACHIEVED BY THE TIME OF THE SUMMIT.

IF IT IS ALSO YOUR UNDERSTANDING THAT BY MID-MAY WE WILL HAVE ACHIEVED THE SPECIFIC RESULTS I HAVE INDICATED, WE COULD AT THAT TIME AGREE UPON THE PUBLIC PRESENTATION OF THIS ISSUE IN CONNECTION WITH THE SUMMIT INCLUDING HOW WE HANDLE IT IN THE JOINT PRESS STATEMENT. A PREDETERMINED ACCORD BETWEEN US ON THE PUBLIC HANDLING OF THIS AGENDA ITEM WILL ALMOST CERTAINLY ENSURE THE OVERALL SUCCESS OF THE SUMMIT FOR ALL PARTICIPANTS AT A VITAL MOMENT IN THE WORLD'S ECONOMIC DESTINY.

Dear Francois:

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I have followed the bold domestic economic measures announced by your government with interest. They are a courageous effort to ensure a sustained non-inflationary recovery for France, and I wish you every success and good fortune in this effort.

As the Williamsburg Summit nears, I want to reaffirm our strong mutual desire for harmonious and constructive meetings to address the crucial issues of global economic growth and prosperity. In general, I am satisfied with progress in preparation for Williamsburg, and I am grateful for your cooperation and support.

I have been informed of the concerns expressed by your representative at the recent San Diego meeting, particularly regarding the agenda item on East-West economic relations. It is important that we understand one another fully on this issue and have a timely exchange of views in order to avoid the possibility of it again emerging as a contentious public issue between us. The issue is a complex one and requires care to fashion the best way to address common concerns while respecting national sovereignties. I am confident this balance can be achieved. As I have often stated, our relationship with France is of vital importance to the United States and the cause of Western freedom. Our overriding common interests provide us







with the strength and flexibility to overcome any differences in approach. Your most recent communication on INF has encouraged me greatly and illustrates the depth of these interests.

Moreover, I believe we share the fundamental assessment that our heavy defense burdens should not be made more difficult by our economic policies towards the Soviet Union.

It is my understanding that your fundamental concerns are these: first, that in the area of East-West economic relations we create no new multilateral bodies which will infringe on national decisions; second, that no new multilateral Western policies on East-West trade be announced at the Williamsburg Summit itself. On the first point, I can assure you that we are in agreement. The second point seems to me to be one essentially of public presentation. As Secretary Shultz and Foreign Minister Cheysson agreed last year, what is important is to accomplish the work on these questions in the appropriate bodies of the OECD, IEA, COCOM and NATO. In COCOM, we are working toward a consensus on an agreement to implement immediately controls on items already agreed to during the first round of the List Review; on agreement in principle to control or watch so-called "disembodied technologies" and emerging technologies; on early agreement in the List Review on the high-priority items of communications switching equipment, computer hardware and software and robotics; on several technical and administrative measures to improve the effectiveness of both national enforcement measures and the COCOM secretariat; and on agreement to conduct a study on other high technology items, including oil and gas equipment.







In the area of energy security, the conclusions proposed by Ulf Lantzke of the IEA are fully satisfactory to us and should be the basis for agreement by the IEA and endorsement at the OECD Ministerial. Those conclusions of particular interest include an agreement to limit non-OECD gas imports from any one supplier to 30% of total gas supplies; encouragement of accelerated development of major Western alternatives, especially the Troll field; and undertaking security measures to protect against gas supply disruptions.

The study underway in the NATO Economic Committee, ably led by France's representative, is making available valuable new information on the security dimensions of East-West trade to guide us in formulating independently our policies in this area in the future. The NATO Ministerial in June, which follows the Williamsburg Summit, is expected to draw important conclusions from this work and to strengthen the Economic Committee to continue its work in this area in the future.

I take some care in describing these anticipated results because I want you to know my thinking and to ask you to continue to encourage this work in every way possible to achieve expeditious results. I have no desire to accord East-West economic relations a prominent position in the Summit agenda or in the public discussion around the Summit. I am far more concerned that we achieve the real results being developed in the other organizations. It would benefit only the Soviet Union if either of our countries felt it necessary to highlight differences on these issues in a public way.







And this can only happen if we fail to communicate now with clarity and candor about our expectations for the results of current efforts in these bodies and specific substantive concerns on progress to be achieved by the time of the Summit.

If it is also your understanding that by mid-May we will have achieved the specific results I have indicated, we could at that time agree upon the public presentation of this issue in connection with the Summit including how we handle it in the joint press statement. A predetermined accord between us on the public handling of this agenda item will almost certainly ensure the overall success of the Summit for all participants at a vital moment in the world's economic destiny.

I would appreciate receiving your views and expectations on these issues. I also hope that we can meet together personally prior to the Summit and will be in touch with you shortly about possible time and place. I am determined to use every opportunity and resource at my disposal to exercise strong mutual leadership with you and our other Summit partners to achieve a unified Summit that marks quiet progress on security-related economic issues and rallies public confidence on the crucial issues of economic growth and employment for our free societies.

On export credit arangements, the OECD negotiations are leading to a new export credit consensus arrangement that provides for the automatic adjustment of interest rate guidelines to market conditions and reduces the amount of cover on credits or guarantees for Category I countries.

In addition to approving this strengthened arrangement on credits, the OECD Ministerial meeting is expected to record significant progress in the assessment of the balance of advantages in East-West trade so that we are better equipped to deal with the monopsony power of Soviet trading practices.
