Assembly Joint Resolution No. 58—Relative to a memorial to women Vietnam veterans.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AJR 58, Speier. Women Vietnam veterans: memorial. This measure would memorialize the President and Congress to support and enact legislation for the erection of a memorial honoring women Vietnam veterans on the grounds of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

WHEREAS, Over 10,000 military and civilian women served our country in a brave and selfless manner in Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, Their unique, valuable, and extremely laudable contributions to American efforts during that conflict have gone unnoticed by many people in our nation; and

WHEREAS, The nonprofit Vietnam Women's Memorial Project, Inc., was founded in 1984 to educate the public about women's military service in Vietnam and to construct a memorial honoring their accomplishments; and

WHEREAS, The proposed placement of the memorial -a lifesize statue - on the grounds of the nation's Vietnam Veterans Memorial received the support of the Secretary of the Interior and the Director of the National Park Service after extensive consultation with veterans and other interested groups; and

WHEREAS, Support has also come from the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Vietnam Veterans of America, the American Nurses Association, Disabled American Veterans, National League of Nursing, Jewish War Veterans, American Federation of Nurse & Health Professionals/AFT and others; and

WHEREAS, Despite the extent of this support for the memorial, the federal Fine Arts Commission has disapproved placement of the statue because of its belief that the existing statue depicting three male soldiers also represents the contributions of women, and that if a women veterans statue were allowed, it would be necessary to add other statues such as one for the Canine Corps; and

WHEREAS, A women veterans memorial is most appropriate to show this country's appreciation and recognition for their bravery, honor, and unparalleled

commitment to service; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly and Senate of the State of California, jointly, That the California Legislature respectfully memorializes the President and Congress of the United States to support and enact legislation for the erection of an appropriate memorial statue honoring women Vietnam veterans on the grounds of the Vietnam

Veterans Memorial; and be it further

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies of this resolution to the President and Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to each Senator and Representative from California in the Congress of the United States, and to the federal Fine Arts Commission.





#### Purpose

Authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to complete a land exchange with Tuskegee University to facilitate administration of the Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site in Alabama.

#### Discussion

Booker T. Washington established Tuskegee Institute (now Tuskegee University) as a college for black Americans in southeastern Alabama in 1881. Much of the original campus is now part of Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site established in 1974.

The Historic Site also includes Grey Columns, an antebellum mansion located one-half mile from the campus. The National Park Service (NPS) spent approximately \$650,000 acquiring and renovating the building, for use as a visitor center and headquarters. By 1984, however, it was apparent that Grey Columns was too far away from the Historic Site's main visitor attractions to serve properly as a visitor center. Accordingly, NPS signed an agreement in 1984 under which the President of the University moved to Grey Columns and NPS moved its operations to the President's former residence, which is on campus. H.R. 3869 would, in effect, permit this agreement to be made permanent.

H.R. 3869 would authorize the Secretary of the Interior, if he determines that it would be in the public interest and in furtherance of efficient administration of the Historic Site, to convey Grey Columns to the University in exchange for "University properties which the Secretary deems necessary for administrative, parking, and maintenance facilities . . . ."
This exchange would be accomplished without monetary consideration. The specific exchange envisioned by Interior and the University would transfer to Federal ownership the property now occupied by NPS, plus a tract for parking, another tract for a maintenance facility, and a scenic easement. Following the exchange, the Historic Site's boundaries would be revised accordingly.

The Administration opposed H.R. 3869 while it was under consideration by the House, because the property to be conveyed to the University is worth approximately \$500,000 more than the property to be acquired by Interior. Subsequently, the Administration supported H.R. 3869 in the Senate because of new information provided by Interior. Specifically, as part of the exchange proposal, the University agreed to provide in-kind services to NPS on a long-term basis that would reduce Federal operations and maintenance costs of the Historic Site.

Accordingly, we join Interior in recommending that you approve H.R. 3869.

## One Hundredth Congress of the United States of America

AT THE SECOND SESSION

Begun and held at the City of Washington on Monday, the twenty-fifth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eighty-eight

#### An Act

To amend the Act providing for the establishment of the Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site, Alabama, to authorize an exchange of properties between the United States and Tuskegee University, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 101(a)(5) of the Act entitled "An Act to provide for the establishment of the Clara Barton National Historic Site, Maryland; John Day Fossil Beds National Monument, Oregon; Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site, North Dakota; Springfield Armory National Historic Site, Massachusetts; Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site, Alabama; Martin Van Buren National Historic Site, New York; and Sewall-Belmont House National Historic Site, Washington, District of Columbia, and for other purposes", approved October 26, 1974 (88 Stat. 1461), is amended by striking out "(5)" and inserting in lieu thereof "(5)(A)" and by changing the semicolon to a period, deleting the word "and" thereafter, and inserting the following new subparagraph:

(B) If, following the acquisition of Grey Columns, the Secretary determines that it would be in the public interest and in furtherance of efficient administration of the national historic site to do so, the Secretary may convey Grey Columns to Tuskegee University and in exchange therefor he may accept from the University properties which the Secretary deems necessary for administrative, parking, and maintenance facilities for the national historic site. As to the property between the Carver Museum and the Oaks, the Secretary may accept an easement from the University which shall limit development for the purpose of maintaining the view between the Carver Museum and the Oaks and provide for construction and maintenance by the Secretary of a public walkway from Campus Avenue to Montgomery Road. The conveyance of Grey Columns shall be made upon the express condition that the grantee shall maintain its historic integrity in accordance with the Secretary's standards on historic preservation and make the property available for public use subject to its primary purpose as the residence of the University's president. The exchange herein authorized shall be accomplished without monetary consideration to or from either party. Following such exchange, the Secretary shall cause to be published in the Federal Register a revised boundary map or other boundary description of the national historic site.".
