Mr. Wettering opened the conversation by noting that he had looked at some of the reports from the field on the Songo-Songo project for a gas-fed urea fertilizer plant, and that the project seemed quite compatible with the approach to economic development favored by the Administration. noted that the President attaches great importance to the role of the private sector in the developing countries. a period when it was difficult to expand official aid flows, the great reservoir of capital available from the private sector should not be overlooked. Wettering said Tanzania heretofore had been somewhat neglected by private investors, in part because the Government of Tanzania was seen as inhospitable to private investment. The Songo-Songo fertilizer plant might be just the kind of pilot project that would attract private interest, and the U.S. very much hoped it would succeed.

Minister Kassum responded by reviewing the Tanzanian decision to seek joint ventures with private capital to develop mineral resources. Forward-looking legislation on this subject had been adopted in 1980 and important joint-venture mineral agreements had already been concluded with Union Carbide and a West German firm. Oil exploration had been conducted by joint-venture arrangements with major oil companies since 1969--in fact, Kassum's stop in Dallas on this trip was to talk with Sun Oil about possible exploration. Kassum emphasized that Tanzania recognized it could not undertake large natural resource projects alone, but needed outside technical and financial participation.

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Wettering commented that business organizations were conservative and hesitant to break new ground. Tanzanian Embassies abroad should be kept fully informed about joint-venture opportunities and promote them.

Kassum cited the favorable experience in Tanzania of General Tire. He then went on to describe the terms of the proposed fertilizer joint venture with Agrico. The Tanzania Government would take 74 per cent equity, while Agrico would hold 26 per cent. Certain decisions would require a three-quarters majority of the board, in effect giving Agrico a veto. All earnings would be paid into an offshore account, thus assuring the return to foreign lenders. Kassum felt it would look bad for this project to go to an American company, but to lack any U.S. Government commitment. He thought he could get most of the financing from other sources, but hoped at least for OPIC involvement. Ex-IM Bank had been negative in their meeting with Kassum the previous day.

Wettering agreed that it would be wise to focus on OPIC. He explained the limits under which EX-IM works, which give it less flexibility than the export financing schemes of other governments.

Kassum reported that he had also met with AID, seeking to enlist its cooperation in providing funds for developing the town at the fertilizer plant. AID had been interested but non-committal.

Kassum responded to Wettering's question about the market prospects for the fertilizer by pointing to the high demand in developing countries of Africa and the Indian Ocean littoral. He said Tanzania would supply feedstock gas to the plant at a low price, beginning at \$0.75 per thousand cubic feet, which would make the product very competitive.

Wettering asked how Tanzania's negotiations with the IMF stood, since business people often placed great stock in the IMF's opinion. Kassum said he didn't know. He hoped agreement with IMF was not a condition precedent for U.S. support of Songo-Songo. Wettering assured him it was not, but wanted to make the general point about enhancing business confidence.

Kassum thanked Wettering for receiving him, and Wettering urged Kassum to keep in close touch with Ambassador Miller.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to you as Chairman of the Front Line States and as a respected world statesman, and as one fully aware of the central role that you have played in the history of modern Africa and your contribution more recently to the achievement of Zimbabwe's independence. Over the past several years you have been deeply involved in the effort to achieve peace and independence for Namibia.

I have asked my valued and trusted friend, Vernon Walters, an advisor to six Presidents of the United States, to meet with you first in a series of consultations on the southern Africa negotiating process. He will also visit Lusaka and Luanda. The Western Five through their representatives will meet later with your government, SWAPO and the governments of the other Front Line States and Nigeria. General Walters is prepared to give you a full account of our recent discussions in Geneva, Paris and Luxembourg. He will seek your counsel regarding the next steps to be taken. It is my belief that we are now virtually at the watershed of a Namibia settlement. To achieve that settlement we must deal with serious problems, each of which General Walters wants to discuss with you.

You know the importance which I attach to achieving peace in southern Africa and the effort my Administration has undertaken in this regard. I am committed to early and effective progress. ticular, I want to be sure that we understand each other's views fully on the importance of rapidly concluding Phase One and on the shape of proposals regarding the UN Transition Assistance Group (UNTAG) and the question of impartiality. It is also vital that I have your thoughts on how to advance the negotiations rapidly and bring about an early cessation of hostilities in Namibia and Angola.

I believe that we now have an historic opportunity to achieve the breakthrough that can result in implementation of United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 in the very near future. In my view, such a breakthrough is going to require our best and most urgent collective effort.

I am sending General Walters to you to help improve our communications and thereby enable us to avoid any misunderstandings that might exist or arise which could hinder efforts to take full advantage of new developments. Your role in securing peace for southern Africa is vital, Mr. President. I look forward to hearing General Walters' report of your discussions and know that you will be as frank with him as you would be with me.

Last month President Nyerere of Tanzania wrote you deploring the Israeli actions in Lebanon and the loss of life and asking you to intervene to end the fighting. (U)

Discussion

The proposed reply drafted by State summarizes what you have done to date to try and end the fighting. It also sets out US policy on foreign force withdrawal and underscores that we fully share President Nyerere's humanitarian concerns. (C)

Dear Mr. President:

Thank you for your most candid letter of July 2 concerning the present fighting in Lebanon. I share your deep concern for the tragic loss of life and property which has occurred and join with you in your sincere hope that further bloodshed can and shall be averted. As you know, since the outbreak of hostilities all our efforts have been aimed at our mutual goal of bringing about an effective end to the fighting and the intolerable loss of life. To this end, Ambassador Philip Habib has been engaged under my personal direction in intense negotiations throughout the crisis.

I can assure you that the United States remains fully committed to the independence, sovereignty, unity, and territorial integrity of Lebanon. A key element of U.S. policy is to strengthen Lebanon's central government so that it will be capable of extending its authority throughout all of Lebanon. The U.S. seeks the withdrawal of all foreign military forces -- Syrian, Israeli, and the armed PLO -- from Lebanon; and the restoration of a secure Lebanese-Israeli border, one which will help assure protection for Israel against attack from Lebanese territory.

I fully agree that a way must be found to end further violence in Beirut between the Israeli army and the PLO. The U.S. has called on all parties to observe a strict and sustained ceasefire in place to avert further fighting and loss of innocent life. I have made it clear to all concerned that further escalation of the violence is unacceptable. I have also expressed my strong conviction that the PLO must not delay its departure from Lebanon.

The United States is determined to exert every possible effort to end the immense lossses in human life and material which the Lebanese people and innocent Palestinian residents of Lebanon have sustained. The United States has made \$15 million available for emergency assistance such as food, medicines, medical care, clothing and shelter. In addition, you should be aware of the Congressional authorization of \$50 million for the critical major relief and rehabilitation needs of individuals affected by the conflict. In this effort we are cooperating with the government of Lebanon and with a variety of international and private voluntary organizations, such as the United Nations and the International Committee of the Red Cross.

I am certain that we agree that the present tragic situation in Lebanon should not be viewed in isolation. If there is to be a just and durable Middle East peace, as I know we both so devoutly hope, the conflict's underlying causes must be addressed. The United States remains committed to the Camp David framework as the only existing workable basis for a negotiated solution to the conflict. That is the framework which calls for Palestinian participation in resolving the status of the West Bank and Gaza; and seeks a resolution which both recognizes the legitimate rights and just requirements of the Palestinian people and ensures the security of Israel.

We will be devoting great attention and energy to these and related issues, and will be directing our efforts at all concerned parties.

I AM WRITING TO YOU ON THE SUBJECT OF LEBANON. WITHOUT ANY OUFSTIDM, THE ISRAEL! INVASION IS A FLAGRANT VIOLATION OF THE SOVEREIGNTY AND TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY OF LEBANON. IT CONSTITUTES AN ARROGANT DISREGARD OF INTERNATIONAL LAW AND OF THE BASIC PRINCIPLES OF MANKIND'S COMMON HUMANITY. AND IT CANNOT POSSIBLY BE JUSTIFIED ON THE GROUNDS OF A THREAT TO ISRAEL'S EXISTENCE OF SECURITY BY LEBANON, OR FROM LEBANON BY THE PALESTINE LIBERATION ORGANIZATION. NO SUCH THREAT DID EXIST OR COULD EXIST. THE DEATHS FROM GUERRILLA ACTIVITY OR FROM TERRORISM IN ISRAEL, OR OF ISRAELIS ELSEWHERE, CAN NO MORE JUSTIFY THE MASSACRE IN LEBANON THAT THE ASSASSINATION OF ONE NAZI OFFICIAL BY ONE JEWISH YOUTH COULD JUSTIFY THE EXTERMINATION AT LIDICE.

THE STATE OF ISRAEL EXISTS AND HAS ALL THE RIGHTS OF A STATE. BUT IT HAS NO RIGHT OVER OTHER PEOPLES OR OTHER MATIONS, AND IT HAS NO RIGHT TO IGNORE THE UNITED NATIONS WHICH CREATED IT. FOR THE PEOPLE OF PALESTINE ALSO EXIST; AND THEY TOO HAVE RIGHTS TO A STATE WITHIN INTERNATIONALLY RECOGNIZED BORDERS. THE SEARCH FOR A SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM OF PALESTINIANS AND ISRAELIS LIVING TOGETHER, EACH IN THEIR OWN HOMELAND, AND ON THE BASIS OF MUTUAL RESPECT, IS AN URGENT ONE. THE SUFFERING MISERY, AND DISTRUCTION CAUSED BY THE ISRAELI INVASION OF LEBANON, AND ITS AIR AND SEA ATTACKS ON THE TERRITORY OF THAT COUNTRY, HAVE HAD A DEVASTATING EFF UPON THAT SEARCH, AND THERFORE UPON THE FUTURE SECURITY OF LL THE PEOPLES OF THE MIDDLE EAST - INCLUDING THE ISRAELIS THEMSELVES. IT IS CERTAIN THAT NEITHER THE CAUSE OF THE PALESTINIAN PEOPLE, NOR THE AUTHENTICITY OF THE.P.L.O. AS THEIR REPRESENTATIVE, CAN BE ELIMINATED BY DEATH AND DESTRUCTION LAUNCHED FROM

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I AM APPEALING TO YOU MR. PRESIDENT TO USE THE GREAT INFLUENCE, PRESTIGE AND POWER OF YOUR COUNTRY TO DO EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO BRING ISRAEL'S INVASION OF LEBANON TO AN END. Dear Mr. President:

In June, you were kind enough to receive my trusted friend and adviser Vernon Walters for discussions on our efforts to bring the southern African negotiations to a successful conclusion. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you, as Chairman of the Front Line States, my views of where we stand in the negotiations and of what remains to be done.

During the past month in New York, the Front Line States, the Western Five, the UN Secretariat, and SWAPO representatives have made significant progress. Tanzania's representatives have made an enormous contribution to those talks. In conjunction with the New York discussions, we have also worked hard in Washington with South African representatives to bridge remaining differences. At the same time, the UN Secretariat and the South Africans have responded favorably to our encouragement to move ahead quickly on the questions of UN Transition Assistance Group (UNTAG) composition and deployment. We look forward to resuming work with your representatives on the remaining issues, and you can be sure of our commitment to moving as quickly as possible toward implementation of a settlement.

At the same time, Mr. President, my government has made clear that there is also a vitally important Angolan agenda which needs to be addressed. We and others are discussing this matter directly with the Angolans. General Walters' recent visit to Luanda helped to bring about more complete understanding between us and the Angolans of the concerns on both sides. Those delicate negotiations are continuing, and

we are now in the process of trying to answer each other's questions about practical military considerations on the ground and respond directly to Angola's security concerns. We recognize that Cuban troop withdrawal is an extremely difficult issue for the Angolan government, and we are prepared to show the greatest possible flexibility in response to reasonable proposals.

We have no desire to place Angola on the formal Namibian agenda. However, the momentum we have sustained on Namibia has not lessened our concern over the Cuban forces and the implication of their presence for long-term regional security. simple reality, which we have been quite clear about since the beginning of this round of negotiations, is that we will need a credible Angolan commitment to a parallel framework of Cuban withdrawal by the time of the Security Council enabling resolution to set UNSCR 435 in motion. We cannot afford to think in terms of open-ended negotiations with the Angolan government. Our allies share our view of the vital importance of movement on this I believe you will agree with me that the positive climate so painstakingly built through your efforts and ours would not survive if a lack of concrete progress with the Angolans prevented us from being able to bring the Namibia package to the Security Council. At the same time, I must underscore that we cannot and will not put aside the Cuban issue. It is a fact of life in the southern African equation. The net result, Mr. President, is that we have to reach agreement this summer, or this fragile historic opportunity will be lost.

The coming weeks will be perhaps the most crucial of the entire southern African negotiation process. I want to assure you of my own full commitment to help bring about the success we all so earnestly

desire. To that end, I will continue to count on your advice and support.

AUGUST 17, 1982

DEAR MR. PRESIDENT:

THANK YOU FOR YOUR MOST CANDID LETTER OF JULY 2 CONCERNING THE PRESENT FIGHTING IN LEBANON. I SHARE YOUR DEEP CONCERN FOR THE TRAGIC LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY WHICH HAS OCCURRED AND JOIN WITH YOU IN YOUR SINCERE HOPE THAT FURTHER BLOODSHED CAN AND SHALL BE AVERTED. AS YOU KNOW, SINCE THE OUTBREAK OF HOSTILITIES ALL OUR EFFORTS HAVE BEEN AIMED AT OUR MUTUAL GOAL OF BRINGING ABOUT AN EFFECTIVE END TO THE FIGHTING AND THE INTOLERABLE LOSS OF LIFE. TO THIS END, AMBASSADOR PHILIP HABIB HAS BEEN ENGAGED UNDER MY PERSONAL DIRECTION IN INTENSE NEGOTIATIONS THROUGHOUT THE CRISIS.

I CAN ASSURE YOU THAT THE UNITED STATES REMAINS FULLY COMMITTED TO THE INDEPENDENCE, SOVEREIGNTY, UNITY, AND TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY OF LEBANON. A KEY ELEMENT OF U.S. POLICY IS TO STRENGTHEN LEBANON'S CENTRAL GOVERNMENT SO THAT IT WILL BE CAPABLE OF EXTENDING ITS AUTHORITY THROUGHOUT ALL OF LEBANON. THE U.S. SEEKS THE WITHDRAWAL OF ALL FOREIGN MILITARY FORCES -- SYRIAN, ISRAELI, AND -THE ARMED PLO -- FROM LEBANON; AND THE RESTORATION OF A SECURE LEBANESE-ISRAELI BORDER, ONE WHICH WILL HELP ASSURE PROTECTION FOR ISRAEL AGAINST ATTACK FROM LEBANESE TERRITORY.

I FULLY AGREE THAT A WAY MUST BE FOUND TO END FURTHER VIOLENCE IN BEIRUT BETWEEN THE ISRAEL! ARMY AND THE PLO. THE U.S. HAS CALLED ON ALL PARTIES TO OBSERVE A STRICT AND SUSTAINED CEASEFIRE IN PLACE TO AVERT FURTHER FIGHTING AND LOSS OF INNOCENT LIFE. I HAVE MADE IT CLEAR TO ALL CONCERNED THAT FURTHER ESCALATION OF THE VIOLENCE IS UNACCEPTABLE. I HAVE ALSO EXPRESSED MY STRONG CONVICTION THAT THE PLO MUST NOT DELAY ITS DEPARTURE FROM

THE UNITED STATES IS DETERMINED TO EXERT EVERY POSSIBLE

EFFORT TO END THE IMMENSE LOSSES IN HUMAN LIFE AND MATERIAL WHICH THE LEBANESE PEOPLE AND INNOCENT PALESTINIAN RESIDENTS OF LEBANON HAVE SUSTAINED. THE UNITED STATES HAS MADE DOLS 15 MILLION AVAILABLE FOR EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE SUCH AS FOOD, MEDICINES, MEDICAL CARE, CLOTHING AND SHELTER. IN ADDITION, YOU SHOULD BE AWARE OF THE CONGRESSIONAL AUTHORIZATION OF DOLS 58 MILLION FOR THE CRITICAL MAJOR RELIEF AND REHABILITATION NEEDS OF INDIVIDUALS AFFECTED BY THE CONFLICT. IN THIS EFFORT WE ARE COOPERATING WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF LEBANON AND WITH A VARIETY OF INTERNATIONAL AND PRIVATE VOLUNTARY ORGANIZATIONS, SUCH AS THE UNITED NATIONS AND THE INTER-NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE RED CROSS.

I AM CERTAIN THAT WE AGREE THAT THE PRESENT TRAGIC SITUATION IN LEBANON SHOULD NOT BE VIEWED IN ISOLATION. IF THERE IS TO BE A JUST AND DURABLE MIDDLE EAST PEACE, AS I KNOW WE BOTH SO DEVOUTLY HOPE, THE CONFLICT'S UNDERLYING CAUSES MUST BE ADDRESSED. THE UNITED STATES REMAINS COMMITTED TO THE CAMP DAVID FRAMEWORK AS THE ONLY EXISTING WORKABLE BASIS-FOR A NEGOTIATED SOLUTION TO THE CONFLICT. FOLLOWING LETTER FROM PRESIDENT NYERERE TO PRESIDENT REGAN, DATED SEPTEMBER 7, WAS DELIVERED TO CHARGE BY TANZANIAN MFA PRINCIPAL SECRETARY GILMAN RATIHINDA LATE AFTERNOON SEPTEMBER 9: QUOTE PRESIDENT RONALD REAGAN THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON, D. C. U. S. A. DEAR MR. PRESIDENT, ON 17TH AUGUST 1982 YOU WROTE TO ME GIVING YOUR VIEWS ON SOUTHERN AFRICA, WITH SPECIFIC REFERENCE TO THE CONTINUING NEGOTIATIONS FOR A PEACEFUL SETTLEMNT OF THE NAMIBIAN PROBLEM AND TO AMERICA'S CONCERN ABOUT THE CONTINUED PRESENCE OF CUBAN TROOPS IN ANGOLA. I THANK YOU FOR WRITING SO FRANKLY; IF WE ARE TO SUCCEED IN BRINGING PEACE TO THE SOUTH WESTERN PART OF AFRICA WHICH I BELIEVE WE BOTH DESIRE - THESE EXCHANGES CAN ONLY BE HELPFUL. I AM GLAD THAT THERE IS PROGRESS ON THE NEGOTIATIONS FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 435 AND THE U.N. PLAN FOR THE TRANSITION TO NAMIBIAN INDEPENDENCE. YET I MUST CONFESS THAT I WAS DISTURBED BY THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE STATEMENT IN YOUR LETTER THAT "A LACK OF CONCRETE PROGRESS WITH THE ANGOLANS" (CONCERNING THE WITHDRAWAL OF CUBAN TROOPS FROM ANGOLA) WOULD PREVENT YOU "FROM BEING ABLE TO BRING THE NAMIBIAN PACKAGE TO THE SECURITY COUNCIL". THIS PRESIDENT, MAKES A DIRECT LINK BETWEEN NAMIBIAN THIS. INDEPENDENCE AND THE SOVEREIGN DECISIONS OF AN INDEPENDENT

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STATE REGARDING ITS OWN SECURITY NEEDS. FOR ITS OWN REASONS THE GOVERNMENT OF THE U.S. A. DOES NOT LIKE TO SEE CUBAN TROOPS IN ANGOLA, TANZANIA TOO DOES NOT LIKE TO SEE ANY FOREIGN TROOPS IN ANY AFRICAN COUNTRY.
I MYSELF, AND MY GOVERNMENT, WILL THEREFORE BE VERY
HAPPY WHEN ANGOLA'S SECURITY PROBLEMS ALLOW IT TO DISPENSE WITH THE CUBAN TROOPS WHICH WERE REQUESTED FOLLOWING THE FIRST INVASION OF THAT COUNTRY BY SOUTH AFRICA. BUT SINCE THAT TIME SOUTH AFRICA HAS NOT STOPPED COMMITTING AGGRESSION AGAINST ANGOLA; EVEN LAST MONTH - WHILE YOUR GOVERNMENT WAS URGING THAT THE CUBANS SHOULD BE WITHDRAWN - SOUTH AFRICA MADE ANOTHER ATTACK ON ANGOLA. IT IS THE WHOLE WORLD WHICH HAS DEMANDED THE DECOLONIZATION OF NAMIBIA. ANGOLA'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THIS DEMAND IS'NO GREATER THAN THAT OF ANY OTHER COUNTRY; WHAT GOES ON INSIDE ANGOLA HAS THEREFORE NO MORE RELEVANCE TO THAT DEMAND THAT WHAT GOES ON INSIDE TANZANIA - OR INSIDE U.S.A. THE WITHDRAWAL OF CUBAN TROOPS FROM ANGOLA MAY BE A MATTER WHICH YOUR GOVERNMENT WISHES TO DISCUSS BEFORE GRANTING FORMAL DIPLOMATIC RECOGNITION TO INDEPENDENT ANGOLA; THAT IS A MATTER FOR YOUR TWO GOVERNMENTS. BUT CUBAN TROOPS IN AFRICA WOULD BE RELEVANT TO NAMIBIAN INDEPENDENCE ONLY IF THEY WERE IN NAMIBIA - EITHER AS ILLEGAL OCCUPANTS LIKE THE SOUTH AFRICIANS OR AS FIGHTERS WITH THE NATIONALIST MOVEMENT. THEY ARE NOT IN NAMIBIA. IT IS IN THIS CONTEXT OF THE COMPLETE SEPARATION OF THESE TWO MATTERS - NAMIBIAN INDEPENDENCE AND ANGOLA'S RELATIONS WITH THE REST OF THE WORLD - THAT AT THE FRONT LINE STATES SUMMIT MEETING ON 4TH SEPTEMBER 1982 PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS TOLD HIS COLLEAGUES ABOUT ANGOLA'S CONTINUING DISCUSSIONS WITH U. S. A. ON THE QUESTION OF CUBAN TROOPS. WE WERE IMPRESSED BY HIS UNDERTAKING THAT ALL CUBAN TROOPS WOULD LEAVE ANGOLA AS SOON AS THE THREAT AGAINST THE SECURITY OF HIS COUNTRY IS REMOVED. WE NOTICED WITH ADMIRATION ANGOLA'S UNDERSTANDING OF - AND WILLINGNESS TO MEET - YOUR OWN

NEED FOR THAT COMMITMENT TO BE DEMONSTRATED BY THE WITHDRAWAL OF SOME CUBAN TROOPS AS SOON AS SOUTH AFRICA HAS REDUCED ITS TROOP NUMBERS IN NAMIBIA IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE U.N. PLAN. PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS TOLD US ALSO THAT HE HAD MADE CLEAR TO YOUR NEGOTIATORS THAT THE REST OF THE CUBAN TROOPS WOULD LEAVE ANGOLA AT THE GREATEST SPEED WHICH IS CONSISTENT WITH HIS COUNTRY'S CHANGING SECURITY NEEDS; WHAT THESE WILL BE DEPENDS UPON THE ACTIONS OF SOUTH AFRICA AND THE SUPPORT IT GETS IN BT

ITS HOSTILE ACTS. IT BECAME CLEAR TO US FROM PRESIDENT DOS SANTOS' EXPLANA-TIONS OF HIS COUNTRY'S POSITION, THAT THE ANGOLAN GOVERNMENT IS ANXIOUS TO ESTABLISH GOOD POLITICAL RELATIONS WITH U.S.A. AS SOON AS THIS CAN BE DONE WITHOUT PLACING THE INTEGRITY AND SECURITY OF ANGOLA IN JEOPARDY; IT ALREADY HAS CONSIDERABLE ECONOMIC RELATIONS WITH YOUR COUNTRY. WE APPLAUDED THE CONCERN AND THE POLICY OUTLINED TO US, BUT JUST AS YOUR GOVERNMENT HAS TO OPERATE UNDER DOMESTIC POLITICAL CONSTRAIGTS AND THE REQUIREMENTS OF YOUR SECURITY CONCERNS, SO DOES THE GOVERNMENT IN LUANDA HAVE TO OPERATE WITHIN A SIMILAR KIND OF FRAMEWORK. ANGOLA IS A VERY YOUNG STATE WHICH HAS NEVER BEEN GIVEN A CHANCE TO REBUILD AFTER THE WAR OF INDEPENDENCE; INSTEAD, ITS VULNERABILITY HAS BEEN CONSTANTLY DEMONSTRATED BY OUTSIDE ATTACK, SUCH OBVIOUS WEAKNESS INEVITABLY LIMITS THE AMOUNT OF FLEXIBILITY WHICH IS CONSISTENT WITH ANGOLA'S NATIONAL SECURITY AND INTEGRITY. THUS, WITHIN THE LIMITS IMPOSED BY ITS CIRCUMSTANCES IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE ANGOLAN GOVERNMENT HAS ALREADY DEMONSTRATED ITS GOODWILL AND ITS WISH TO COOPERATE WITH AMERICA'S CONCERNS. THEREFORE HOPE THAT IT WILL BE POSSIBLE FOR YOUR GOVERNMENT TO ACCEPT ANGOLA'S POSITION. MR. PRESIDENT; I LOOK FORWARD, AS I AM SURE YOU DO, TO A SPEEDY CONCLUSION OF THE NAMIBIAN NEGOTIATIONS. WE IN AFRICA HAVE DAUNTING ECONOMIC PROBLEMS AND WISH TO BE ABLE TO GIVE THEM OUR FULL ATTENTION WITHOUT THE NECESSITY TO DEAL WITH UNFINISHED LIBERATION PROBLEMS. 2. IN DELIVERING TO CHARGE PRESIDENT NYERERE'S LETTER TO PRESIDENT REAGAN ON NAMIBIA LINKAGE QUESTIONS (TEXT SENT SEPTEL). TANZANIAN MFA PRINCIPAL SECRETARY RUTIHINDA AND DIRECTOR FOR AFRICAN AND MIDDLE EASTERN AFFAIRS OPANGA MADE THE FOLLOWING POINTS: -- LETTER IS INTENDED TO BE AS FORTHCOMING AS POSSIBLE TO USG CONCERNS ON CUBAN TROOP WITHDRAWAL WHILE AT THE SAME TIME PRESERVING ANGOLA'S INDEPENDENCE OF ACTION: -- TANZANIA FOR THE MOMENT HAS NO DIRECT ROLE TO PLAY -THE ACTIONHAS BEEN SHIFTED TO LUANDA, PRETORIA, AND WASHINGTON. THE TANGOV IS HOWEVER HOPEFUL THAT AGREEMENT ON THE CUBAN TROOP ISSUE CAN BE REACHED QUICKLY SO THAT THE FINAL ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE AGREED UPON IN NEW YORK AND IMPLEMENTATION OF UNSCR 435 CAN BEGIN. -- ONLY THE HEADS OF STATE SAT TOGETHER IN LUSAKA FOR THE CRITICAL MEETING WITH DOS SANTOS WHEN ANGOLA'S STRATEGY WAS DISCUSSED. THEREFORE KNOWLEDGE ABOUT THE SUBSTANCE OF THE CONVERSATIONS IS EXTREMELY LIMITED. -- PRESIDENT NYERERE LEFT LUSAKA WITH THE IMPRESSION THAT THE ANGOLANS WERE WORKING HARD TO ACCOMODATE U.S. CONCERNS, BUT NONETHELESS REMAINED EXTREMELY CONCERNED ABOUT SECURITY ISSUES.

-- TANZANIA, APART FROM THE LUSAKA COMMUNIQUE DID NOT WISH TO BE CONFRONTATIONAL ON THE CUBAN TROOP ISSUE. IT WOULD BE A TRAGEDY IF THE TALKS BROKE DOWN AT THIS POINT IN THE NEGOTIATIONS.

-- THERE REMAINS A RESIDUE OF ILL WILL AMONG FLS ABOUT THE U.S. ROLE IN INTRODUCING THE CUBAN TROOP ISSUE. MOST FLS LEADERS PERCEIVED THAT THE AMERICANS ARE FAR MORE CONCERNED THAN ARE THE SOUTH AFRICANS ABOUT CUBAN TROOPS IN ANGOLA.

-- A POTENTIAL STUMBLING BLOCK REMAINS THE CHOICE OF ELECTORAL SYSTEM. SWAPO HAS STUDIED THE ZIMBABWE PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION MODEL AND CURRENTLY FAVORS IT. TANZANIA FOR ITS PART HAD RECOMMENDED A SINGLE MEMBER CONSTITUENCY SYSTEM SIMILAR TO ITS OWN. THERE REMAINS CONCERN THAT SOUTH AFRICA WILL ATTEMPT TO INTRODUCE A MODIFIED MIXED SYSTEM, I.E. PR WITHIN INDIVIDUAL DISTRICTS.

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
