We are concerned about the request by the Chinese government to Ambassador Hummel in Beijing that the U.S. government provide official statistics concerning the levels of arms sales to Taiwan. Since this is classified information and will be used by the Chinese to determine what level of arms sales to Taiwan they will tolerate in the future in accordance with the Taiwan communique of August 17, we do not see how providing such data could be in keeping with the President's pledge to us to support Taiwan as an old friend of this country.

Then if they chose to use it to attend this of conference so be it.

If Frank has a problem with that, I frankly believe you could go ahead being entirely up front about it. It would be useful, however, to know, after you talk to Frank, whether you think we are being set up here. I doubt it. As I said, Frank is a good guy. But without his intending it, one of the participants might make a grand scene about US sponsorship which would be gratuitous.

NSIC has requested \$9,086 to pay the airfare of five American academics invited to participate in a conference in Taipei October 31 to November 3 on the subject of "Security Cooperation in the Western Pacific." Please refer to attachments for further details: (1) original proposal; (2) follow-up letter; (3) confirmed program.

The proposal is opposed by the USIA Office of East Asian and Pacific Affairs. (See memo from Edward J. Findlay.) Ed Findlay raised questions regarding prior conferences, sponsoring organization (NSIC) and participants. I believe I have answered all of these to his satisfaction.

George Beasley, the China desk officer in EA, raised more serious questions—and he is not satisfied with my answers. Nor is Don Ferguson on the "Taiwan Coordinating Staff" at the State Department. Beasley and Ferguson are opposed to use of U.S. government funds to send Americans to a conference in Taiwan that concerns "security" matters. They would have no trouble with a conference on music or art or commerce.

Ferguson made the following statement to me: "The U.S. government does not acknowledge that we have any security or strategic interests with Taiwan--other than as they may affect the People's Republic of China, with which we do have security and strategic interests." So much for that "unsinkable aircraft carrier" people like Ronald Reagan used to talk about! (Ferguson agreed with me that what he was saying was patently absurd; nevertheless, he contends that it is official U.S. government policy--and has been throughout the Reagan Administration.)

Ferguson said it doesn't make any difference that this conference isn't about China. The problem, in his view, is that it is about security and military matters. By paying for Americans to go to Taiwan to discuss such a subject, he says, we would be creating the impression that the U.S. recognizes a strategic or security role for Taiwan—and that would bring strong protests from the PRC.

For that matter, says Ferguson, it also would cause problems if someone like Dr. Donald Daniel of the Naval Postgraduate School is on the program, regardless of whether the government or someone else pays his way. This is because Dr. Daniel is a government employee and would be speaking on his professional speciality. (He is one of America's foremost scholars on the Soviet navy.) Ferguson said Dr. Daniel would have to get State Department approval to participate in the conference, and he doubts that such approval would be granted.

I communicated the foregoing to Frank Barnett of NSIC and also told him that at the request of Bob Reilly I was going to write you a memo on the subject.

Bob Reilly and I strongly support NSIC proposal. We believe this will be a good conference and that it will serve the U.S. national interest to help NSIC send five American academics to Taipei to participate. We believe further that it will set a terrible precedent if this proposal is rejected simply on the basis that it might upset the government of the People's Republic of China for the U.S. government to pay airfares for five Americans to attend a conference on security matters in Taipei. We believe that President Reagan would be shocked if he knew that State Department officials are interpreting his China policy in this manner--and, more important, perhaps, that Ferguson appears to believe sincerely that it is the correct and proper interpretation. (The problem, I'm afraid, is that people like Ferguson act on the basis of things like written communiques -- not telephoned remarks to Dan Rather.)

Would you please advise on whether we should submit the NSIC proposal to the review panel--or follow the EA recommendation and withdraw it.

I. BACKGROUND

- A. For at least a decade, the National Strategy Information Center, Inc. (NSIC) has cooperated with "sister" agencies at home and abroad in carrying out the international security aspects of its overall educational mission. Along with the Center for Strategic and International Studies (Jakarta, Indonesia), Chulalongkorn University (Bangkok, Thailand), the John F. Kennedy Foundation of Thailand (Bangkok, Thailand), the Japanese Center for Strategic Studies (Tokyo, Japan), and the Pacific Institute (Australia), NSIC cosponsored a conference on "New Foundations for As and Pacific Security" in Pattaya, Thailand from December 12-16, 1979. The speakers and participants, who came from Japan, the Republic of Korea, the Republic of China, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand, and the United States, focused on the following subjects: the ongoing conflict in Indochina; the special Security problems facing Thailand; internal problems of Southeast Asian security; the Japanese defense posture and the Soviet challenge in Northeast Asia; the tensions on the Korean Peninsula; the contribution of the Republic of China to regional security; economic factors in East Asian security; United States security policy in East Asia; and proposals for a Pacific Basin Community. proceedings of the conference have been published in book form (New Foundations for Asian and Pacific Security, edited by Joyce E. Larson, distributed by Transaction Press, New Brunswick, N.J.).
- B. A follow-on conference on "The Security of the Western Pacific" was held at Tokyo, Japan from October 27-30, 1981. The conference cosponsors were NSIC, the Japanese Center for Strategic Studies (Tokyo), the Society for Strategic Studies (Taipei, Republic of China), the Center for Strategic and International Studies (Jakarta), the John F. Kennedy Foundation of Thailand (Bangkok), and Chulalongkorn University (Bangkok). Conference participants -- who, as in the Pattaya conference, came from Japan, the Republic of Korea, the Republic of China, Thai-· land, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand, and the United States -- presented papers on and discussed the security implications of the Sino-Soviet conflict, the expanding Soviet naval presence in East Asia, the security concerns and outlook of the Republic of China, the regional role of the People's Republic of China, the implications of the Soviet-Vietnamese alliance for Southeast Asian security, regionalism as a force for cohesion and stability, modes of formal and informal security cooperation, cooperation for protection of the sea lanes, and policy options for the 1980s for the non-communist countries of the Western Pacific region.

. II. 1982 CONFERENCE

NSIC, in close cooperation with the Society for Strategic Studies (Taipei, Republic of China), currently is planning a third conference, entitled "Security Cooperation in the Western Pacific: Facing the Threats and Challenges of the Era," to be held in Taipei, from October 31-November 3, 1982. Other cosponsoring organizations include the Japanese Center for Strategic Studies (Tokyo), the Heritage Foundation (Washington, D.C.), and the Institute for Foreign Poli-

cy Analysis (Cambridge, Massachusetts). Invitations have been sent to prospective participants in Japan, the Republic of China, the Republic of Korea, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand, the United States, and several Western European countries.

The aim of the conference is to examine the various security challenges faced by the non-communist states of the Western Pacific region, and to propose means of enhanced international cooperation to meet these challenges. Emphasis will be placed on the growing Soviet presence in East Asia, and the pressures resulting from this development. Speakers will address such topics as the Japanese contribution to regional security, recent developments on the Chinese mainland, United States policy options in East Asia, the Kampuchea problem, and the prospects for enhanced naval cooperation in the region. Proceedings will be published.

III. GRANT REQUEST

The National Strategy Information Center, Inc. is herewith requesting a travel grant from the International Communication Agency in the amount of \$10,370. for not more than five (5) participants from the United States. It is estimated that roundtrip economy airfare on an American carrier, plus in-country travel costs, would amount to \$2074. per person.

Enclosed please find a xerox copy of the program, now confirmed, for the NSIC cosponsored conference in Taipei on the subject of "Security Cooperation in the Western Pacific: Facing the Threats and Challenges of the Era."

As we discussed by telephone today, the financial assistance we have requested from ICA would be used to fund the cost of travel to and from the conference for five American academics who would not otherwise find it possible to attend. Each person so assisted would be assigned a formal role on the conference program as a speaker, discussant, or chairman.

The financial assistance we are requesting would cover round-trip economy airfare to and from Taipei. At least two of the persons would be travelling from the West Coast; round-trip economy fare from San Francisco is currently \$1432. From New York the fare is \$2074. Hence the maximum assistance requested (at current rates) would amount to two fares at \$1432. plus three fares at \$2074., for a total of \$9086.

Do you have any information of the previous conferences referred to in this proposal? It would be useful to know if USICA helped in the financing, and to have some kind of evaluation of the results of the prior meetings. Also, it is difficult to make a recommendation without some further information about the sponsoring organization, the National Strategy Information Center. further problem is that we're being asked to fund travel for five American participants with no knowledge of who they are.

Our China desk officer is bothered by the use of the term "Republic of China" throughout the proposal, and by the fact that a co-sponsoring organization is the Society for Strategic Studies in Taipei which is, and has to be, pro-Taiwan and anti-PRC. Inevitably, considering the subject of conference, there will be discussion of Taiwan's role, which is, of course, fine in a scholarly conference, but, as you know, our dealings with Taiwan are unofficial. This, our State Department colleagues point out, would bar the use of official USG funds, particularly so if some of the funded American participants argued for courses of action contrary to officially stated U.S. policy.

Considering the extreme touchiness at the moment on U.S.-Taiwan-PRC policy matters, it would be best if the USG did not get involved in the funding. is a small amount, \$10,000, which could probably, to the benefit of all concerned, be obtained from non-public sources.
