Dear Francois:

At our meeting in Ottawa last July, I spoke about the need for better control over trade with the Soviet Union in strategic goods and technologies as we pursue our common goal of strengthening Western security. We agreed to hold a special high-level meeting of the East-West Trade Coordinating Committee to discuss this issue.

That meeting should reach a consensus for tighter controls that are better enforced and administered. Over the past decade, Western exports (and illegal Soviet acquisitions) have made significant contributions to the military capabilities of the USSR and the Warsaw Pact.

These contributions have added to the shift in the global military balance that we must now redress at great expense. The uncontrolled export of technology and critical equipment for the Soviet military infrastructure must be stopped. In making this request, I am counting on your appreciation of the dangers of the current strategic position of the industrial democracies.

I know that there are differences among the COCOM countries on these issues. But we all recognize that concern for our security must be paramount. To emphasize that concern, I have asked the U.S. Defense Department to join the small U.S. delegation to the high-level meeting.

We look forward to continuing our consultations with your government as we prepare for this meeting. We have discussed a number of details and have agreed that the meeting should provide the political framework for further meetings on technical issues.

Our diplomatic representatives are consulting now on appropriate responses to the events in Poland. These consultations and individual government decisions may lead to the adoption of special measures. However, the issues which the high-level COCOM meeting will address predate and will continue beyond events in Poland and should be addressed on their own merits. Their successful resolution is vital to our collective security. I hope you share my view that this meeting should provide the framework for further meetings on technical issues and lead to much closer consultation, cooperation and agreement among COCOM members.

As you know, the heads of state and of government of the Europe of The Ten, meeting recently in Brussels considered the status of economic relations with Eastern Europe and specifically mentioned in the final communique that "the important issue of credit policy should be made the subject of a careful examination by the European Community, the governments of the Member States, and other governments, both at the national and international level, and of close consultations with the other OECD countries."

Bud, attached is a joint Rentschler/Robinson draft for a turn-around on the Presidential letter to Mitterrand. As per guidance from the Coast, this version differs from State's in that

- --- language has been somewhat toughened;
- --- reference to energy security issue is included along with credit restrictions;
- --- it seeks a tonal half-way house between State's flaccid version and the style that exercised the Eagle; and
 - --- it makes the Polish context more explicit.

Given time constraints, we have not checked this with Norm Bailey and leave it to you whether you think that step is required.

Note that the draft has been done up as a Blue Line message, since the Judge's guidance specifically said don't bother clearing with State (in view of State's interest, however, you might want to have an approved text go out from the Sit Room with info to State so latter is at least au courant....).

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT TO PRESIDENT MITTERRAND

His Excellency Francois Mitterrand President of the French Republic Elysee Palace Paris

Dear Francois:

My March 7 letter to you expressed the serious concern

I feel over the danger which a continuation of previous

practices in the matter of Western official credits and credit

guarantees for the Soviet Union poses for our collective security

and financial interests. Since that time, Under Secretary of

State Jim Buckley has been working with representatives of your

government and the other summit participants to reach an

agreement which would diminish that danger. In a related

area, we are also anxious to develop agreed measures which

would enhance Europe's energy security and lessen the potential

for undue dependency on Soviet supplies.

Our efforts to restrain the extension of credits to the USSR are consistent with seeking a unified allied position on the sanctions imposed against the Soviet Union following the declaration of martial law in Poland. We continue to maintain that the necessary preconditions for a return to more normal commercial relations with the USSR and Poland are the lifting of martial law, the release of political prisoners, and the reestablishment of a dialogue between the Government, Solidarity and the Church. Regrettably these developments

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have not transpired and the opposite trend may in fact be the case. I continue to hope that the agreement among the Allies not to undercut each others' sanctions during this difficult period will be observed.

Against this background, Jim Buckley reported to me that his meeting in Paris on May 14 was a major disappointment due to the unexpectedly negative position taken by your government. not be frank if I were to gloss over the major difficulties I believe the West will confront in strategic terms if we fail to deal forcefully with these issues. At the same time, I must stress the negative effect on public opinion in my own country should an appearance of Alliance disunity in this sensitive area prevail. Since 1974 the U.S., for its part, has refused to subsidize or quarantee credits to the Soviets, a political decision which has meant considerable sacrifice to American commerical interests. While Americans are fully prepared to make these sacrifices in the context of our mutual security, they will properly view with concern actions which can be interpreted as unfair to them at a time when they are shouldering greatly increased expenditures on behalf of our common defense.

A subsequent meeting in Washington last week of technical experts demonstrated that a balanced effective agreement is within the legal and technical capabilities of the participating countries provided the political will exists. My purpose in writing to you today is therefore to express my strong

hope that when Jim Buckley meets tomorrow in Paris with his counterparts, your government will help provide this essential element of political will and enable us to demonstrate Alliance solidarity at Versailles on an issue of grave importance for us all. If a satisfactory agreement is not concluded in advance of the summit, however, I would be perfectly willing to continue the discussion at that time.

I look forward to seeing you in Paris next week.

The French have formally replied to the request of the Lebanese government and Mitterrand has answered your letter calling for a positive French decision. Translations of both messages are attached.


To be honest, the French response is far from crystal clear. The language they use contains ambiguities and apparent preconditions.

The French Ambassador here has given us his personal interpretation -- based on his telephone conversations with Paris -- that the French decision amounts to acceptance of a role in the international force if two key elements are in place

- (1) PLO agreement to French participation (we also will require this)
 - (2) An expression of consent by the UN.

The second point is of course the problem. The French Ambassador's interpretation is that if the UN would send observers to Beirut, this would be regarded as an "expression of consent" in the eyes of the French. The French Ambassador in Beirut has given Phil Habib the same interpretation.

To avoid Soviet obstructionism, our plan continues to be simply to notify the Secretary General of our decision to participate in the force and to invite him to supply UN observers. It will not be easy to do this while avoiding formal Security Council action and a Soviet veto. We plan quietly to sound out the Secretary General as to how he would proceed to deal with our notification and invitation. We will encourage him simply to receive our notification and agree to send observers (he may decide he must informally

consult with Security Council members on the observer question). These particular observers in a sense "belong to the Secretary General" and can be deployed by him without formal UNSC action. This course of action could provide a useful team of observers, avoid Soviet mischief, and satisfy France's desire for UN approbation. Needless to say, there are many pitfalls and the whole delicate scheme could be thrown out of balance.

While trying to manage the French aspect, we are continuing to talk to the Italians about participation. So far they seem basically positive and far less particular about the UN than the French. We hope to receive the Italian decision Monday.



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
