Republican National Chairman Bill Brock was born in Chattanooga, Tennessee on November 23, 1930. He attended Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Virginia, where he earned a B.S. degree in 1953. Following his military service as an officer in the United States Navy, Bill Brock became associated with the Brock Candy Company in Chattanooga as a marketing executive. In 1957 he married the former Laura (Muffet) Handly and they have been blessed with four children, Bill, Oscar, Hutchey, and John.

In 1960 at the age of 30, he and several colleagues, disillusioned with one-party rule in Tennessee, revitalized the 3rd District (Chattanooga) Republican Committee and the state Young Republican Federation. Starting at the grass roots, Brock built a strong precinct program where friends and business associates were asked to "get involved" by participating in the political process.

The response to the "get involved" campaign was encouraging, and with much hard door-to-door work, a growing volunteer organization emerged. Financial support for the political organization increased so that the Central Committee was able to hire a full-time executive director. Two years later, in 1962 Bill Brock became the first Republican to be elected to Congress since 1920, from the third-district of Tennessee.

Bill Brock devoted himself to building the Republican Party in Tennessee, extending the "people-to-people" program statewide and involving thousands of new volunteers, and his efforts kept paying bigger and bigger dividends. The number of Republicans in the numbersee legislature grew from 27 in 1962 to 32 in 1964, and to 47 in 1966, the year ard Baker became Tennessee's first Republican Senator since Reconstruction. In 1968 Republicans carried the state for their presidential nominee and elected 62 Republicans to the state legislature, a majority of the State Assembly.

In 1970, after four terms in Congress, Bill Brock challenged three-term Democrat Albert Gore for the U. S. Senate. Drawing upon his "people-to-people" experience in building the Hamilton County and Tennessee Republican parties, Bill Brock involved some 10,000 volunteers in his campaign, most of them young people, and won an upset victory. Elected with him in 1970 were Winfield Dunn, Tennessee's first Republican Governor in half a century, and 5 of the 8 Republican Congressional candidates.

Senator Bill Brock's interest in Party-building continued undiminished at the national level as well. In 1972 he headed the National Young Voters Program which mobilized some 500,000 volunteers nationwide. The Republicans won a majority of the 18 to 24 year-old vote that year, which was considered a near miracle by most political observers, who had expected the youth vote to go overwhelmingly to Senator McGovern.

In 1974 Bill Brock was selected by his GOP colleagues to head the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee. In that post, he brought about an unprecedented level of cooperation among the Senatorial Committee, the Congressional Committee, and the RNC. For the first time, these groups shared field staff and eliminated duplicative efforts.

In 1977 the Republican Party turned to Bill Brock to lead its efforts to restore its grass roots, expand its base, and re-earn the support of a majority of the American people, electing him as its National Chairman.

COMMENTS:

Ambassador Brock currently serves as the United States Trade Representative with the rank of Ambassador, having continuously served in that position since his appointment by President Reagan on January 22, 1981. From 1977 until his appointment as the United States Trade Representative, Ambassador Brock served as the Chairman of the Republican National Committee. From 1974 until 1977, he headed the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee. In 1970, after four terms in Congress, Ambassador Brock was elected to the Senate. Prior to his entry into national politics, he was associated with the Brock Candy Company in Chattanooga, TN.

If confirmed, Ambassador Brock will serve as the Secretary of Labor, appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, pursuant to the provisions of 29 U.S.C. § 551. The purpose of the Department of Labor is to foster, promote, and develop the welfare of wage earners of the United States, to improve their working conditions, and to advance their opportunities for profitable employment. The Secretary of Labor serves at the pleasure of the President.

Review of Ambassador Brock's financial disclosure report reveals the existence of approximately 17 separate trusts. Two of these trusts are qualified blind trusts created in April 1981, shortly after Ambassador Brock assumed his duties as the United States Trade Representative. remaining trusts are "old family trusts" which were, until the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 was amended in 1983, incapable of being "blinded." Section 202f(7) of the Ethics in Government Act now provides that any such trust may be considered to be a "qualified blind trust" if "the trust instrument is amended to comply with the requirements of [(5 U.S.C. app. § 202f(3)] or, in the case of a trust instrument which does not, by its terms, permit amendment, the trustee, the reporting individual, and any other interested party agree in writing that the trust shall be administered in accordance with the requirements of [5] U.S.C. app. § 202f(3)] and the trustee of such trusts meets the requirements of [5 U.S.C. app. § 202f(3)(A)]."

Because the assets contained in the aforementioned trusts consist primarily of common stock in a substantial number of varying corporate entities, many of which will, in my opinion, and in the opinion of the Solicitor of the Department of Labor, present Ambassador Brock with potential conflicts of interest; upon my recommendation, Ambassador Brock has agreed to undertake to blind all of these trusts pursuant to the provisions of 5 U.S.C. app. § 202(f)(7). standing the conversion of these trusts to the equivalent of qualified blind trusts, the "blinded" assets will continue to constitute financial interests of the reporting individual for the purposes of section 208 of Title 18, United States (5 U.S.C. app. § 202(f)(4)(A)). Accordingly, an analysis by Department of Labor attorneys is currently underway to determine the scope of any waiver which may be necessary to allow Ambassador Brock to function effectively as the Secretary of Labor. I spoke to Mr. Jim Frierson of Ambassador Brock's staff and he represented, on behalf of Ambassador Brock, that the Ambassador would recuse himself from participating in "case, or controversy specific issues" as the Secretary of Labor. Such recusal will be at the Ambassador's discretion, however, and he will reserve the right to divest himself of any offending financial interest rather than disqualify himself from participation in a particular matter as the Secretary of Labor.

At some point in the near future, I will make a recommendation to the Counsel to the President that the President issue Ambassador Brock a "generic waiver" under the provisions of 18 U.S.C. § 208(b) specifically to allow him to participate as the Secretary of Labor in broad policy matters and the issuance of regulations affecting an entire industry or industries, notwithstanding the fact that reposing in one or more of his blind trusts will be common stock from an entity which may be directly and predictably effected by such participation.

Review of Ambassador Brock's responses to the questions on the Personal Data Statement reveals no information of a potentially embarrassing or controversial nature. He does report that he wishes to maintain the following positions: Director, National Endowment for Democracy; Director, the Hand Foundation; Director, St. Alban's School; Public Director, the Hudson Institute; Director, Big Brothers and Big Sisters; member, Council on Foreign Relations; and Director, Freedom's Foundation. Ambassador Brock will, in regard to the National Endowment for Democracy, recuse himself from participating in any labor issues which may come before the Endowment. The Hand Foundation is a family foundation which generates income for the Brock's to donate to charity. Mr. Hunter Heggie, Ambassador Brock's attorney

and Mr. Jim Frierson, who serves with him in the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative, both advised that Ambassador Brock has no knowledge of the assets in the Foundation; his role is solely to determine the objects of charitable giving. The Ambassador receives no compensation for serving in any of the aforementioned positions and I see no potential for actual or apparent conflicts of interest arising out of the his continuation of those relationships. Since Ambassador Brock has continuously served as the U.S. Trade Representative since his appointment in January 1981, I did not conduct a personal interview in this instance, but rather relied upon my review of the materials he most recently submitted, together with a review of the information he submitted in relation to his earlier appointment and, my discussions with members of his staff, his personal attorney, and the Solicitor of the Department of Labor and members of his staff.

No matters of a potentially embarrassing or controversial nature were revealed during the course of my review of all of the information submitted by Ambassador Brock.

Accordingly, assuming successful completion of all other background checks, I reaffirm my earlier recommendation that this nomination go forward. Ambassador Brock's original financial disclosure report has been forwarded for review to the Office of the Solicitor, Department of Labor; draft copies have been forwarded for preliminary review to the Office of Government Ethics.

In any event, it is my view that the conditions set forth in this waiver are adequate to assure full protection of the public interest. Accordingly, it is my finding that the interests listed on the attachment to this memorandum are not so substantial as to affect the integrity of the services to be rendered by you.

For the foregoing reasons, I am hereby granting you this limited waiver in accordance with 18 U.S.C. 208(b)(1) to engage in the following official activities insofar as they may affect the interests listed on the attachment: the setting of policy (including enforcement policy), the making of legislative recommendations and other legislative matters, rulemaking, and administrative matters. This waiver does not apply to particular investigations; or to individual exemptions, advisory opinions, variances, enforcement actions, litigation, grants, contracts or other particular matters in which the listed interests are parties, subjects, applicants, petitioners, respondents or defendants. In situations not covered by this waiver you must either divest the interest or recuse yourself whenever your participation would constitute a violation of 18 U.S.C. 208(a), as discussed earlier in this memorandum.

Finally, as noted above, I respect your concern for avoiding the appearance of impropriety in carrying out your important duties. The Department of Labor's ethics and conduct regulations reflect this concern in providing for the avoidance of apparent conflict-of-interest situations on the part of Labor Department officials. I therefore understand that there may be situations in which it will be appropriate for you to recuse yourself from participation in a particular matter, notwithstanding the applicability of this waiver.

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MEMORANDUM FOR WILLIAM E. BROCK, III

SUBJECT: Waiver of 18 U.S.C. 208

This memorandum provides you with a limited waiver under 18 U.S.C. 208 in the exercise of your authority and responsibilities as Secretary of Labor.

I share your view that adherence to the highest ethical standards is essential in maintaining public confidence in the integrity of the government. I am aware that you have already taken some actions and are planning to take other steps to assure that in carrying out your responsibilities as Secretary of Labor you will avoid even the appearance of any conflict of interest. It is my understanding that you have already established two qualified blind trusts. I further understand that you intend to convert other trusts in which you and your family have beneficial interests into qualified blind trusts, which are subject to approval by the Office of Government Ethics. The future acquisitions of qualified trusts would therefore present no conflict-of-interest issues as you perform your official duties.

As you know, current blind trust assets as well as other non-trust interests are fully subject to the provisions of 18 U.S.C. 208. Section 208 prohibits a government official from taking actions which affect the interests which are set forth in its provisions. Should a situation arise involving a potential application of 18 U.S.C. 208, you have agreed either to recuse yourself from taking action or to divest the interest in question where such actions are not governed by a waiver under the statute. I believe that this action on your part is fully appropriate.

It is also my judgment that it is in the public interest to grant you a limited waiver with respect to certain of your activities as Secretary of Labor. I believe it is essential that, to the maximum degree practicable, you be able to bring to bear the full range of your expertise on the wide variety of important issues facing your office. Your official actions in matters of policy and other matters of general applicability would not necessarily contravene the provisions of 18 U.S.C. 208. Any impact on your interests or those of your family may be speculative and may not have a direct and predictable financial impact.

In accordance with the regulations promulgated under Title II of the Ethics in Government Act, at 5 C.F.R. 734.604(c), and as the designated agency ethics official for the Department of Labor, I have reviewed the enclosed financial disclosure report (SF 278) filed by Mr. William E. Brock, III, who has been nominated as the Secretary of Labor. I have the following comments on Mr. Brock's report.

Because of the broad mission of the Department of Labor, it is possible that some of the interests disclosed on Mr. Brock's report could be affected by Labor Department activities. However, the specific impact of any future actions by Mr. Brock on his own financial interests or those of his family would generally be speculative. In order to avoid any such impact, Mr. Brock has undertaken important preventative actions.

As indicated on his report, Mr. Brock has placed certain interests into a qualified blind trust approved by your office. He also intends to submit to your office a request to convert the other family trusts into qualified blind trusts. If approved, this will prevent the trusts' future acquisitions from raising conflict-of-interest issues. In addition, in the absence of any waiver issued under 18 U.S.C. 208(b), we understand that Mr. Brock is willing either to recuse himself from any particular matters involving the listed entities whenever his participation would constitute a violation of 18 U.S.C. 208(a), or to divest the interest involved.

In view of the considerations discussed above, I have signed the certification for Mr. Brock's report.

Dear Mr. Martin:

I am writing to you in connection with my nomination as Secretary of Labor. As indicated in my financial disclosure report, my family and I have certain financial interests that potentially might be affected by official actions, especially in light of the broad and varied responsibilities of the Secretary of Labor.

As you know, I have already established two qualified blind trusts that have been approved by your office. If confirmed by the Senate, I intend to submit to your office for approval a request to convert the other trusts in which members of my family and I are beneficiaries into qualified blind trusts as soon as possible. If approved, the future acquisitions of these trusts would not present conflict-of-interest issues for me in performing my official duties.

With respect to the trusts' current interests, I recognize that there may be a possibility that some official actions on my part could be viewed as affecting certain financial interests. Accordingly, in the absence of a waiver under 18 U.S.C. 208(b), I propose either to divest the interest involved or to recuse myself whenever my participation would constitute a violation of 18 U.S.C. 208(a).
