The Ferdinand Magellan, the private Pullman railroad of the the railroads cooperatively built and assigned in 1942 to the late Pres. Accords to the Asso. Press, the car is like a rolling fortres with armor plate and 3-inch-tick windows of bullet-proof glass. It weights 286,520 pounds. An ordinary steel passenger car weighs around 160,000 lbs.

Early in the war Michael F. Reilly, then head of the WH Secret Serv. detail, decided more protection was needed in the Car used for the P. Members of the Asso. of Amer. Railroads chipped in on the cost and the Pullman Standard Car Manufacturg Co. made over the old Ferdinand Magellan.

The armor and other safeguards were added under supervision of the Secret Serv. and Army ordnance experts. Elevators were installed on the rear platform for Pres. Roosevelt. (Fm a stoy in the NY Times, with a Wash. date line Oct. 27, 146)

A brief history of the Presidential Railroad Car, Ferdinand Magellan:

The Perdinand Magellan was rebuilt by the Pullman Standard Car Manufacturing Company for the Association of American Railroads for the use of the Presidents of the United States. The car was amour-plated and equipped with bullet-proof glass windows; the weight of the car was approximately 140 tens. The car contained four bedrooms, an observation lounge and a dining room that could seat 12 people, and a complete galley for preparing meals.

The car was first used by President Franklin D. Boosevelt early in 1943, and continued in service during all the war-time travel by President Boosevelt. The car at one time or another has been over all the rail systems in the United States, Canada and Hexico. It was used by Winston Churchill, Queen Wilhelmina, and Juliana of the Betherlands, and numerous heads of State during the war years.

The car was used by President Truman, and it was on board the Ferdinand Magellan that he made his "whistle stop" campaign in 1948.

The car was used by President Eisenhower on two occasions -- one trup to Canada and one to State College, Pennsylvania.

In 1958 the car was declared surplus property and case up for disposal. It was turned over to the University of Miami, Miami, Florida, where it is available for public viewing.

Dear Mr. Blake:

I have made several inquiries concerning your request of April 7, and learn that there is presently no special railroad car set aside or otherwise designated for use by the President.

The Ferdinand Magellan is now in the custody of the Museum at Miami University, Coral Gables, Florida. I suggest you contact the Curater of the Museum for further information on this car.
