REMARKS BY SENATOR BYRD RICHMOND, VIRGINIA SEPTEMBER 24, 1981

Several weeks ago I was invited by mutual friends to help welcome to Virginia tonight the President of the United States. It is unfortunate that he was forced to change his plans because of a nation-wide television address he is making tonight concerning our nation's economic problems.

But in his stead Virginia is fortunate to have the person closest and dearest to him. The President asked me, as Senior Senator from Virginia, to present his wife to this audience. I am as honored and pleased to welcome the First Lady as I would have been to welcome the President. I might say that even though President Reagan's charm is legendary, I find Nancy Reagan even more charming.

Before commenting on the President's work in Washington and then presenting to you the First Lady, I want to say this to Nancy Reagan: This audience of many hundreds is a wonderful group of Virginians. I see so many wonderful persons in the audience whose friendship I value highly.

When I was invited to welcome President Reagan tonight, I was pleased to accept as he is the only President in recent years who has made a determined effort to control government spending which, in my judgment, is essential if our nation is to be preserved.

In addition, President Reagan and I are in thorough agreement that the three great excesses of the federal government are excessive spending, excessive regulation and excessive centralization of power-all of which he is seeking to effectively attack.

It was last October, less than a year ago, that I came to Richmond to endorse Ronald Reagan for President of the United States. I was convinced then that he represented the basic philosophy of a large majority of the Virginia people. Perhaps I should say that I was equally convinced that Jimmy Carter had been a disaster for the American people.

During President Reagan's eight months in office, there has been a dramatic change in the atmosphere in Washington, D. C. The change has been for the better.

The dominant problem facing our nation today is the American economy, the need to reduce the cost and size of government, to balance the federal budget and to bring down the devastatingly high interest rate:

What I am going to now say may not be very politic, especially in front of Mrs. Reagan and this <u>somewhat</u> partisan group. But since I do quite a few things which political experts do not consider politic, I think I shall say it anyway.

Although I endorsed Ronald Reagan for President and supported him enthusiastically in 1980, I was not totally convinced that, once elected, he would carry through on his firm commitment to get federal spending under control. I am pleased to report to you tonight that my fears have been proven unfounded.

President Reagan has come to grips with the spending problem and, indeed, I can say unequivocally that had it not been for his courage, his determination and his leadership, the Congress of the United States never--never--would have voted a \$35 billion reduction in proposed spending. What has been done in the past eight months in the field of government finance is revolutionary.

Let me give you two figures: During the last year of Jimmy Carter's Presidency, the cost of government increased by 17 per cent; during the first year of Ronald Reagan's Presidency, government spending will increase by six per cent.

President Reagan feels--and in my judgment--rightly so--that this dramatic reduction still is not enough. That is why he is not here tonight. He is taking his case for further reductions to the American people via television several hours from now.

But not only in the financial field has President Reagan shown courage and determination. When a group of government employees illegally and in violation of their own written oath went on strike, Ronald Reagan fired them on the spot saying that no one has the right to strike against the people of the United States.

Then in the field of foreign affairs, President Reagan made it clear that the United States will defend its rights in and over international waters, and if our aircraft or naval vessels are attacked our military personnel has the authority to respond appropriately.

So when two Libyan planes attacked two United States aircraft over international waters, the American pilots responded effectively, secure in the knowledge that they would be backed in their action by their Commander-in-Chief in Washington.

I have contacts throughout the world and it is my observation that America's prestige, which has been in a state of deterioration, soared high as a result of the Libyan incident.

Nations everywhere have been put on notice, that so long as Ronald Reagan is President of the United States, that whoever trifles with America or Americans can expect firm and instant retaliation.

So I salute President Reagan for his achievements during his first eight months in office.

Now let me say a word about our First Lady. She is modest, she is charming and she is lovely. More than that, she has a keen knowledge of government and of politics. I am told by those who know her best that she has the unusual ability indiging people. She is a good judge of character. I can testify first-hand of the importance of this characteristic as my wife's same quality has been so helpful to me.

So, ladies and gentlemen, I am pleased and proud to present to this splendid Virginia audience the First Lady of our land, who presides with such grace and charm at the White House in Washington, Nancy Reagan.
