Dear Ms. Morey:

I am replying to your letter of December 14, 1984, to President Reagan in which you requested assistance in securing the release of amusement equipment which has been embargoed by customs authorities in Maracaibo, Venezuela since 1979.

The Department of State has assisted many of the American property owners involved in this incident since our Embassy in Caracas became aware of it in February, 1980. U.S. Government officials set up and attended high-level meetings with various Venezuelan government officials in an effort to resolve the situation.

The question of the release of the property and its removal from Venezuela is primarily a private matter to be settled between the interested parties. The Department's and the Embassy's initial involvement in this matter came about as a result of allegations that U.S. citizens were being discriminated against solely because of their nationality. However, it was determined that this was not the case.

The embargo on this equipment is based upon a court order in Venezuela issued upon the complaint of the Venezuelan promoter. Please note that legal disputes between private parties in foreign countries are matters in which the Department may not properly intervene. It is our understanding that suit has been brought by National Expositions, Inc. and Ken Penn Amusement against the Government of Venezuela and other parties, under the provisions of the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania. Since this matter is the subject of pending litigation in the courts, the Department of State believes that the interested parties are taking the proper approach towards a resolution of the case.

Dear Mr. President:

My name is Janice Morey and I am from Wildwood Crest, NJ. Last week I saw a brief clip on CNN of you and Venezuelan President Jaime Lusinchi. You spoke of democracy and a new democratic system in Venezuala that other South American countries should learn from. And that is encouraging to hear given the troubles in that area of the world.

However, on a person level, the treatment from Venezuala has been anything but democratic or fair.

In September, 1979, a group of people from the amusement business, my family included, took amusement rides and equipment to Puerto Rico for a fair. Our share included three major rides and equipment totaling \$1,000,000.00. From there the fair moved to Maracaibo, Venezuela. We were then to move to Caracas, but due to problems with the fair grounds, the City of Caracas was cancelled. We loaded our equipment and began procedures for shipping back to the United States from the port of Maracaibo.

As of today, December 14, 1984, our equipment still sits at the port despite more than numerous attempts to ship out. The equipment was under the control of customs, however attempts to remove the equipment were stopped by Venezuelan political forces. Whether or not the influences came from the local level or from higher up is unclear, but regardless, each attempt has failed. We thought that we have been following proper customs procedures for shipping from Venezuela to the US; and at one point even had contracted for a barge to pick up our equipment—however, the barge was not allowed to even enter the port.

So here we are five years later with our equipment still being "detained" in Venezuala. We have exhausted all legal possibilities and in addition have discussed this matter with the United States State Department. The only advise we seem to receive from them is to negotiate. Well, negotiate in

Venezuelan means to pay somebody off. And the problem with doing that is that there are so many people in line to receive our funds and so few people we can trust.

While I know this letter may never reach you, I hope that it does and that you or someone on your staff may help us personally deal with this frustrating situation.



RECENT LAGO REFINERY DEVELOPMENTS

- The Lago refinery was specially designed and maintained to process heavy Venezuelan crude in conjunction with Exxon's operations in Venezuela. Lago lost its producing link when Exxon's Venezuelan operations were nationalized in 1975. From 1978 to 1983, Lago operated under a supply contract with the Venezuelan National Oil Company (Lagoven) providing a preferential pricing system . During period, studies were jointly conducted on long-term alternatives, and Exxon continued investments to maintain the refinery's efficiency in processing heavy crude. By mid-1983, it became obvious that due to OPEC production quotas and worldwide petroleum refinery trends, the Venezuelans had more attractive long-term outlets for their crude. In late-1983, Lagoven offered a supply agreement for 1984 which reduced the crude volume and eliminated the preferential pricing system. Exxon signed a one-year contract recognizing it would lose money for the year, but allowing additional time to work out a long-term solution. In December, Exxon undertook a downsizing operation at the refinery to improve The circumstances leading to the downsizing were efficiency. conveyed at that time to the Antilles Governments.
- o In January 1984, Exxon management met with U.S. Government officials to apprise them on the status of the Lago refinery. This included the new contract signed with Venezuela, the downsizing, and the position that Lago was not economically viable under present conditions.
- o In February, similar discussions were held with government officials in the Netherlands:
 - J. de Koning Foreign Minister (Resp. for N.A.)
 - M. J. de Castro -Superior Ambassador from N.A.
- From March through October, Exxon met with leaders of the Netherlands Antilles and Aruba on 12 occasions. During this same period, 5 meetings were held with officials of Lagoven/PDVSA and the Venezuelan Government to seek a solution to the problem.
 - Throughout this time, there were ongoing discussions with Lagoven on possible alternatives to make the Lago refinery viable.
 - In April/May, Exxon agreed in principle with Lagoven to seriously develop a plan for a long-term lease followed by a sale of the refinery to Lagoven. Work continued on this plan until September. Shori-term alternatives to a long-term contract were also studied in an effort to gain more time.
 - In September, based on technical information provided to them, Lagoven concluded that the refinery could not be operated economically and broke off work on the lease/sale proposal. The economic analysis leading to this conclusion, shared by both Lagoven and Exxon, included a range of alternatives from downsizing toward lower levels of thruput to building modern fuel oil destruction facilities. None of these proved to be economically viable under the current crude oil pricing policies of Venezuela and the product price outlook.

- Independent of the Lagoven analysis, a consultant contracted by the Netherlands Antilles Government reached the same conclusion on the refinery's viability. The consultant had access to Exxon technical information on the refinery.
- On October 29, Exxon met with officials of Lagoven/PDVSA and the Venezuelan Government to inform them that inasmuch as no commercially viable solution had been found, Exxon would not renew its supply contract for 1985 under the present terms, and would be forced to shut down the refinery.
- o On October 31, Exxon first met with government officials of the Netherlands informing them of the planned shutdown. Afterwards, the shutdown plans were announced to Lago employees, the governments of the Netherlands Antilles and Aruba, the U.S. State Department and the media.
- o The shutdown plan involves a special separation package for all the employees, intended to compensate them for a portion of the hardship related to the shutdown. It involves a cost of approximately \$25 million. In addition, about 40% of the personnel will qualify for current or deferred pensions.
- Exxon is taking steps to assure that the shutdown will not interfere with the normal supply of products to the island for a period of six months. Longer-term supply arrangements are under discussion with the Aruba Government.
- o Since the announcement, Exxon has continued communications with the governments of the Netherlands Antilles, Aruba, and Venezuela related to various aspects of the shutdown.
 - Nov. 6 meeting with Aruba Government on overall Lago situation.
 - Nov. 12-14 and 19 meetings with Lagoven, PDVSA and Ministry of Petroleum on possible alternatives to defer the closure of the refinery.
 - Nov. 16 meeting with Commission of Deputies from Venezuela under Celestino Armas.
 - Nov. 25 status discussions with Aruba Government.
- o At this time no party has proposed a commercially acceptable arrangement to defer the shutdown of the Lago refinery until a long-term economic solution for the island can be developed.
- o The Exxon assessment is that the refinery will be shut down in accordance with the announced plan.

Pending Nationalization Matters

The assets of the former petroleum concessionaires, including Exxon's affiliates those of Creole Corporation and Internationl Petroleum (Venezuela) Limited, were nationalized at the end of 1975. By means of a series of mutual agreements, both formal and informal, a procedure for the nationalization of those assets was established which permitted the continued efficient operation of the industry, objective stated the Venezuelan Government. of Nevertheless, there are several important matters which have not been finalized as originally contemplated.

Recognizing that it was not possible to resolve all matters before year-end 1975, it was mutually agreed that certain matters, including the pending Hacienda income tax claims would be settled within the first six months of 1976. This has not been the case and in addition new problems have arisen which remain unresolved.

1. <u>Hacienda Income Tax Claims</u>

In an industry as complex as the petroleum industry it is inevitable that there will be differences of interpretation of the tax law between the tax authorities and the taxpayer. This occurred in the case of Creole and IPV where Hacienda has made tax claims totaling Bs. 613 million (including related fines) for the years 1967 through 1975. During the nationalization immediately process 1t was agreed that after nationalization, the Hacienda representatives would meet with the Creole/IPV representatives to effect an overall settlement of these pending claims as was done previously with the industry in 1966.

All action on these claims, including litigation, was suspended by mutual agreement. After a series of approximately 20 meetings with the government commission made up of Drs. Isidro Morales, Guillermo Farinas and F. Garcia Hercules, a tentative overall settlement was reached in early 1978. The settlement amount of Bs. 232 million was based upon a complete technical analysis of each of the issues involved and was considered equitable to both parties. Initially it was agreed

the settlement or "transaccion" would be implemented following the 1978 elections, but no further action was taken before President Carlos Andres Perez left office in March 1979.

Creole/IPV made an offer for a "transaccion" to the new administration in 1979 which was referred to a joint commission of Hacienda and Energy and Mines. Although there has been no official response to this offer, it was widely reported in the local press that the commission informed Congress that it could not agree to a transaction and that all cases had to be litigated. In April of 1980 Hacienda lawyers started to reactivate the cases and to date Hacienda has refused to reinstate the suspension of the cases.

2. Controller General's Income Tax Claims

After the nationalization the Controller General filed retroactive claims totaling approximately Bs. 2667 million against the former concessionaires (including Bs. 1163 million and IPV) affiliates Creole for alleged Exxon underpayment of Income Taxes from January 1, 1970 through March 17, 1971 claiming that the export values jointly established by the Minister of Energy and Mines and the Minister of Hacienda effective as of March 18, 1971 should have been established retroactively to January 1, 1970. These so-called "Controller General's Claims" are different from, and in addition to, the Hacienda tax claims referred to in 1. above. Administrative appeals to have the claims withdrawn were unsuccessful and the former concessionaires appealed to the courts. A lower court ruled against Creole in May of 1980 on procedural grounds on the largest of the claims (Bs. 940 million) without hearing the merits of the case.

Creole has appealed the case to the Supreme Court. Prominent Venezuelan counsel advice, which is supported by public statements of former government officials (Dr. Juan Pablo Perez Alfonzo, Dr. Gonzalo Barrios and Dr. Arevalo Guzman Reyes), is that the subject claims have no valid legal basis.

3 Latest Attempts at Settlement and Present Status

1981 the government reinstituted "transaccion" In late several of the former concessionaires, with discussions including Creole/IPV. In December of 1981 we met with Hacienda Minister Dr. Luis Uqueto who advised us that he had been given the responsibility by the President to settle the matter. the Manuel Lopez Acosta as designated Dr. Fifteen meetings were held by the Creole/IPVrepresentative. representatives with Dr. Manuel Lopez Acosta and Dra. Aurora Moreno de Rivas and their staff from January 1982 to September

1983 but no agreement was reached. During this period we also Dr. Ugueto's successor, Dr. Arturo Sosa, government's interest in reaffirmed the reaching a global settlement. Creole/IPV offered to pay Bs. 430 million for a global settlement of all outstanding claims including the Controller's General's Claim, with payment to be made from the Creole/IPV guaranty funds amounting to Bs. 667M which the Government still holds and will not release to the companies until all the claims have been disposed of.. However, late in our discussions the government took the position that they could settle the Hacienda claims only and would leave the Controller's claim for later solution. On this basis in August 1983, Creole/IPV offered to settle the Hacienda tax claims without the Controller General's claims, on the basis of its 1979 proposal adjusted for legal decisions which had occurred since that date, which resulted in a total adjusted offer of Bs. 184 million to be paid from the Creole/IPV guaranty funds. Reportedly, this offer was still under study when the Copei party was defeated in the general election of late 1983.

We have attempted to initiate negotiations with the new Accion Democratica government but have yet to show any concrete evidence of progress. Our last formal meeting with Dr. Manuel Azpurua Arreaza, the Minister of Finance, was in March of 1984. Since that time the Minister has announced the planned establishment of still another commission to analyze the pending tax claims. According to press reports this commission was to consist of a group of experts who would issue a definitive opinion on the claims but to our knowledge this group has yet to be appointed or convened.

Since March 1984 the Finance Minister has repeatedly confirmed through the U.S. Ambassador the government's desire to enter into an overall settlement of the pending nationalization matters, but he has also stated that the government is totally preoccupied by the debt restructuring issues and is not prepared to continue settlement discussions at this time.

Consequently, as of this time, practically all of the Hacienda Income Tax Claims and the Controller General's Claims are still unresolved and the companies Guaranty Funds have not been released. Nor has the Government paid to Creole/IPV an amount of approximately \$1.8M which it recognized as due to the companies as a part of the 1975 nationalization indemnity.
