Background Papers for Afternoon Interview

Mort Allin and NSC have been huddled this a.m. coming up with attached points for your interview with White House correspondents this afternoon. Also including come domectic notes from Baroody/Duberstein.

Andropov on Limits Based on Warheads

- Will study this latest suggestion seriously as we do all Soviet proposals.
- Will be talking with Ambassador Nitze next week prior to his May 17 return to Geneva.
- Geneva is the proper forum to discuss the subject and RR would prefer not to comment further at this point.

US/USSR

Bishops' Letter

- Have not received letter approved yesterday.
- But let's not emphasize possible differences.
- Important thing is that we -- church, public government -- are discussing issues of peace and war.
- Bishops have now contributed an important effort to discussion.

Freeze

- Important to discuss as a public issue.
- Congress has by now thoroughly explored the subject.
- Basic flaw of the freeze proposal is that is would have us turn our attention from negotiations for reductions, which is a far better approach than negotiations for a freeze at current high and unequal levels.

Cohen, Nunn, Percy Letter

- Fully support all aspects of Scowcroft report, and certainly those dealing with arms control. RR made that clear April 19 when accepting the report and no changes since.
- Integration of their recommendations regarding START is a complex subject requiring careful analysis within Administration and in consultations with our Allies. Certainly, based on the single warhead small missile, our accounting will likely move towards warheads, rather than launchers.
- Hope these modffications can be completed by June 8 when START resumes. But caution you against reading this as a change in my goal of significant reductions to verifiable and equitable levels.
- Emphasize again need to move ahead on bipartisan MX/Midgetman/ arms control package.

Guaranteed Build Down (Cohen)

1

- Constructive and interesting. Looking at it to see how it would affect modernization and our goals of deep reductions.

- As RR emphasized in speech, we all share responsibility for what happens in Central America.
- In RR view, it is unwise and yes, irresponsible, to put such specific limits on the use of U.S. support for governments in the region who are trying to defend themselves.
- Pleased the committee recognizes the importance of interdiction efforts aimed at interrupting Sandinistas' export of revolution.
- But, we must keep in mind the nature of the Nicaraguan government and the key role it is playing with Soviet and Cuban backing to destabilize countries in the region which are trying to build democracies.
- The limitations of the Boland Committee impose strict restrictions on the use of the funds and, in effect, make the Sandinista regime immune -- no matter how outrageous its conduct -- from other activities which governments in the area may find necessary to protect themselves. Should Managua be a sanctuary for Soviet-Cuban efforts to overthrow governments friendly to the U.S.?
- Will continue to work with Congress as legislative process continues to ensure that everyone is fully aware of the potential consequences of their actions.

NOTES FOR OVAL OFFICE INTERVIEW WITH SIX REPORTERS

Senate budget negotiations -- RR's strategy?

- o Senate Budget Committee resolution was passed in effort "to get something to the floor."
- o Committee vote not really a show of support for the Senate resolution -- which really isn't much better than the Democratic alternative budget passed by the House.
- Senate version's \$30 billion in higher taxes in 1984 and \$39 billion in 1985 not acceptable. Defense numbers also too low.
- o We are working with Senate Republicans -- RR is optimistic that a more acceptable compromise may emerge from their efforts.
- o Elements of compromise being developed by Senate Republicans:
 - -- RR's revenue numbers for 1984 and 1985 -- meaning no new taxes.
 - -- 7.5 percent defense growth for 1984 (but lower 5 percent growth for 1985 still very troubling).
 - -- Domestic spending at same level as Senate Budget Committee version -- RR hopes we can do better than that.
- o No shift in RR's basic position. Will veto any repeal of 3rd year or indexing. (Pleased to note yesterday's pledge by 34 Senate Republicans and 148 GOP House Members to sustain that veto if RR has to cast it.)
- Key point: Recovery's finally here; inflation, interest rates down. Need to keep up progress by keeping to basic policies of fiscal restraint. Return to uncontrolled spending growth and higher taxes last thing we need to keep recovery going and create more jobs.

Recovery -- some reminder notes

- o There's been practically no inflation for last six months (0.5 percent to be precise).
- o Housing and autos both coming back as interest rates come down.
- o Dow-Jones has climbed over 400 points since last August -- showing strong evidence of investor confidence. (NOTE: Dow closed up 4 points at 1208 on Tuesday.)
- o Index of leading economic indicators up last month -- 11th rise in 12 months. This time, wasn't expansion of money supply that boosted it, giving further strong evidence that real growth is why index is rising.
- o Economic growth real key to solving many economic problems. It came to a virtual halt at start of 1979. Now, for first time since then, there's consensus expectation of solid future growth (and 1st quarter figures bear that out with 3.1 percent GNP increase).

As background for your half-hour interview with six WH correspondents on Wednesday, here are a number of questions that are brewing:

FOREIGN POLICY QUESTIONS

Central America

What is your view of the 9-5 vote in Boland committee on Tuesday?

Are you unalterably opposed to turning "covert" aid into "overt"? What's wrong with that? What impact will it have on our efforts regarding Nicaragua?

Does the Boland committee vote mean that Congress is rejecting your call for bipartisanship?

What's the eventual outlook on the Nicaraquan issue?

What about general funds for Central America? How much do you expect to get from Congress?

Are you thinking of naming a deputy or associate to Dick Stone? Are you concerned about his relations with Democrats in Congress and the left in Central America?

Mideast

After 10 days of Shultz trip, what has been accomplished? How much contact have you had with him? How optimistic are you?

Do you foresee agreement on withdrawal from Lebanon by week's end?

Reaction to Hussein's continuing criticism of U.S. position and failure to do more? What are he and other Arabs saying to us privately?

Are there differences between Weinberger and Shultz over Lavi? Why should Israel get top U.S. technology?

US/USSR

What's your reaction to the bishops' letter? Disappointed? What impact will it have?

The freeze proposal in the House has had a number of amendments, and some Republicans seem prepared to vote for it. Are you opposed to it in its current form?

Percy/Nunn/Cohen letter -- If you fully endorse the Scowcroft report on arms control, why does your administration need time to study this matter more fully? Why is the Hill even questioning RR's commitment? Do you expect to change your START proposal as result of the letter and the commission? If so, before the June 8 resumption of talks?

Do you support a guaranteed build down? How would it work?

Who is Percy talking about when he says there are White House and DOD aides opposed to any arms agreement at all?

What reaction to Andropov's comments on Tuesday about counting warheads and launchers?

Do you plan an environmental speech? How soon?

In the original text he said, "Now I realize there is a theory that good news isn't good for the ratings, but I only wish Dan Rather, Tom Brokaw [of NBC] and Ted Koppel [of ABC] and others in the media would focus a bit more on some of the truly admirable things being done by the American people."

Rather called Reagan's proposal "at very old and, I would have thought, discredited technique, which has been used by presidents of both parties, to try to convince the public that problems are not



With respect, for I have respect for all presidents, I think the public is smarter than that. There is a lot of good news on television, but politicians are always trying to sell the idea that the only coverage that is fair is coverage that is favorable."

Pessimism from Media Causes Stress Buildup

Editor, Naples Daily News:

"No news is good news" is a precept that seems to have been reversed by today's news and TV media. Editors and anchormen speak as if good news is a no-ne. Emil Coue, French psychotherapist, held that "every day in every way we are getting better and better," but the media would have us believe that every day in every way the economy is getting worse and worse.

We, the public, are fed pessimism and put down. President Reagan calls news critics "drumbeaters of doom." The effect on the reading and listening audience is a continual

buildup of stress.
Stress, caused l

Stress, caused by pressures that surround us, especially from the bombardment by unfavorable news, was the subject of a recent address on how to handle it given to the Collier Council on Aging by Dr. Joseph G. Spano, Naples internist and enterologist. To cope with the ills that beset us, he said, we

must turn inward and refer he recommends a quiet period that he describes as "creative reverie."

Yes, there can be life after stress, whether caused by health problems or by a continual diet of downbeat news, but how many of us ordinary mortals have the fortitude to cope?

Could we persuade the media to turn about and feed us good news for a change? Could they be urged to follow the advice of the old, pepular song, "Accentuate the Positive?"

If this were to happen, it is my guess that our economy would improve, unemployment lines would shorten and citizens would welcome stress-free life. The optimists among us could rejoice at being relieved of negativism, and the world would be a happier place to be alive in.



Godson said that Douglas-Home wrote an excellent leader in the TIMES on the morning following the Mountbatten Lecture (5 May) and that Douglas-Home sent a copy to Mr. Meese directly.

I would suggest the following: when Karna has local press interest in an event, she should alert the press office before she makes obligations for coverage. We can then decide if the local interest serves the best interests of the President and his policies.
