
Dear Mr. Brady:



Dear Mr. President:

Allow me to first congratulate you on a very outstanding campaign and welcome you to the White House.

I would like also to introduce myself as the Chief Operating Officer of the country's first Black owned and operated radio network. We covered your campaign from the beginning to the end and found it most exciting. However, because we are a Black network serving the news and information needs of approximately 17 million Black Americans, we feel that there is an element still missing, and that element is having you explain directly some of your viewpoints and plans on those issues that impact on those 17 million Black Americans.

At the risk of being somewhat less than tactful, I would say that to many Black Americans you represent four years of extreme uncertainty. I personally don't think this is fair to you nor is it fair to the people you will serve for at least the next four years.


Therefore, Mr. President, please accept this letter as a formal invitation for you to appear on our weekly target-news program entitled, "Black Issues and the Black Press." This show is aired during the weekend by our 94 affiliated radio stations and taped during the week before. It is normally taped in our New York studios where two reporters and myself, as moderator, would question you on the issues pertinent to the Black electorate. However, if you should grant this interview, we would make arrangements to do the taping anywhere and at anytime your staff would deem convenient and practical.

Mr. President, I think it is important that you respond in the affirmative, because no American should be left with the impression that he or she is not a part of this great society because of labels such as conservatism and liberalism, which are legitimate by-products of our Democratic system. This, however, could very well happen if a segment of our society does not understand how the government is prepared to respond to its basic needs. I hope to hear from you soon.




I read recently of your great interest in the foster grandparent program, and that is the reason for this letter.

This is to alert you and your staff, in case you are not already aware of it, to the Brinkley Magazine program to be aired this Friday, February 27, at 10 p.m. on Channel 4 television.

The Magazine, from what I have learned in advance, will document the ongoing KGB-controlled parapsychological research in the Soviet Union as reported by Soviet defector Kochlov.

For your information, I hold the first accredited graduate degree in this country in experimental parapsychology; personally know the American civilians who regularly visit the Soviet Union and are closest to penetrating the inner circle of this research there; personally know the members of Congress, the DOD, and the intelligence community who take this research very seriously and consider it formally or informally part of their responsibility; and am well known in my field and can answer any question you or your staff have in this area, or will know exactly who to call, at a moment's notice, to get the answer.

Please don't hesitate to contact me if you would like assistance in this area, at any time.



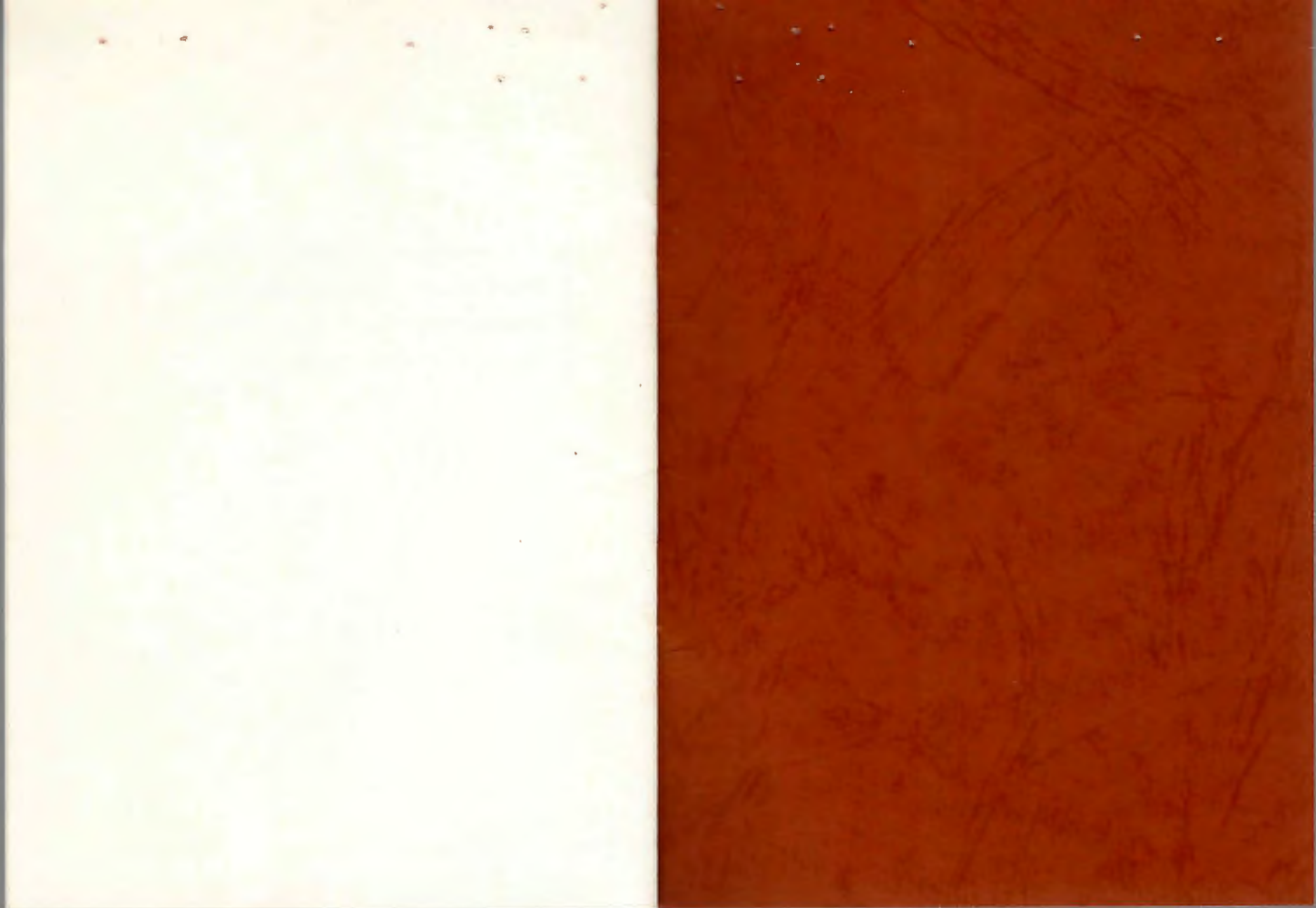

## Landrey from 1-A

The globalists think in the big terms of geopolitics. Henry Kissinger and others have argued that the United States should choose a time, a place and an issue to demonstrate to the Soviet Union and its Cuban surrogates that the United States will henceforth oppose their Third World takeovers.

What better time than the beginning of a new Republican administration? What better place than right next door in our hemisphere, a couple of hours across the Gulf of Mexico from Florida? What better issue than a secret communist operation to supply arms to guerrillas to overthrow a government more or less under the patronage of the United States?

This, as much as anything, seems to account for Secretary of State Alexander Haig's obsession with El Salvador as the first order of international business — not only for itself but for the signal it sends to Moscow.

**I DON'T ENTIRELY** discount such gestures. But the difficulty arises when you begin to look at El Salvador, a country highly overcrowded by a population about half that of Florida's. The per capita income is around \$700 a year, but most of the people get only a small fraction of that.

The regionalists point out that El Salvador would have its troubles with or without the communists or Cuba or the Soviet Union. When a small group of families composing no more than 2 percent of the population corners 60 percent of the land, there is bound to be a call for change.

When, furthermore, this minority has ruled for years through right-wing military dictatorships that have overridden almost every election and shot down peasants by the thousands, then there are bound to be uprisings.

The regionalists go on to point out that massive American military aid to fight "communism" may simply backfire in support for the guerrillas against American intervention, especially when the aid doesn't seem necessary in the first place.

**FINALLY**, oponents argue, El Salvador is a very shaky case for a demonstration of American resolve and for a test of allied friendship. There is little support for it from anywhere in Latin America. Europe is highly divided, with important noncommunist parties supporting the Salvadoran opposition.

Against this background, these are the latest developments:

Haig and White House press secretary James Brady both warned Wednesday the United States would oppose a right-wing coup against the present military-civilian junta headed by civilian Jose Napoleon Duarte. The junta itself has moved steadily to the right since it overthrew the last old-line military dictator in October

1979. But the threat came from one of the real "crazies" in the equation, retired Maj. Robert D'Aubisson, who tried two coups in 1980 that were aborted by the Carter administration and now talks of another try next month. Duarte ordered his arrest Tuesday, but there was no word about his being in custody.

In El Salvador, Duarte said he has no immediate plans to open negotiations through intermediaries for a political settlement with the anti-government leftists who enjoy wide support in Western Europe and Latin America. In principle, Duarte has, however, welcomed an offer by the Socialist International last week. It suggested former West German Chancellor Willy Brandt as an intermediary. It's hard to tell where, if anywhere, this all stands.

Also in El Salvador, Defense Minister Col. Jose Guillermo Garcia, whom many see as the real power, said Tuesday his armed forces had "smothered" the leftist uprising. On Wednesday, gunmen believed to be right-wingers fired 10 to 15 shots at the U.S. Embassy from a passing car.

The leaders of the Catholic Church in the United States urged a halt to the Reagan administration's escalation of military aid to El Salvador on the grounds that it increases the risk of wider military intervention, identifies the United States with widespread killings of peasants in El Salvador and jeopardizes any constructive American role. The administration announced earlier this week it would expand military aid by \$25-million (in addition to \$10.4-million promised by President Carter) and send 20 more advisers to join 25 already there — non-combat advisers.

U.S. officials in Washington said Wednesday the administration is also considering an increase in economic aid to El Salvador from the current \$63-million to more than \$200-million. Duarte had asked \$200-million to keep the Salvadoran economy from collapsing.

All this gives some idea of the struggle over policy and

## **Why the stand in El Salvador? The pros and cons**

Even with all the hullabaloo over El Salvador, a lot of people still seem to be confused about what is happening there and why such a tiny, poor country in Central America is important enough for President Reagan to make it his first priority after the American economy and arms budget.

A dozen other foreign policy areas would seem to be more significant, both in themselves and for the effect they will have on the overwhelming issue of American relations with the Soviet Union. Security of the Persian Gulf and its oil is only one of them. Why El Salvador?

One answer is that El Salvador just isn't all that important. The administration's reply is that El Salvador is the place where the United States must draw the line against any more Soviet-sponsored communist takeovers.

**THIS IS THE OLD** argument between the globalists and the regionalists, between the big-picture strategic thinkers with the world on their minds and the experts who know something about one area, in this case Central America.

# The people cry out for justice

The writer is editor-publisher of *El Independiente*, a daily opposition newspaper in El Salvador that was founded by his father in 1955. He is now living temporarily in Mexico. ■

On Jan. 16, as editor and publisher of *El Independiente* in San Salvador, I was to wire an article that the *Los Angeles Times* had requested, giving my views of the events in El Salvador. First, I had a telephone conversation with an editor at the *Times*. An hour later, the military came looking for me at the nearby office of the *Independent Associated Press* (API), of which I am also director, and arrested the staff. My newspaper again established phone contact with Los Angeles, to report that the article could not be transmitted because the building was being surrounded by troops. My wire operator speculated that "They don't like us to call the *L.A. Times* because Reagan reads that newspaper." Simultaneously, the military went to my home and threatened my wife and 3-year-old son with death. Later we gathered at a friend's home. Meanwhile, troops returned in force to my newspaper and smashed all the equipment.

Learning that the military wanted me "dead or alive," I took my family to the Mexican Embassy, where we were granted political asylum. Now I find myself in exile in Mexico.

**THERE WAS** nothing else to do. My presses were smashed; *El Independiente's* voice could not be heard anymore. I left, not because of lack of the Salvadoran people's support for idealistic journalism, but because, after the takeover of my office, after the capture of my employees and perhaps even the eventual disappearance of my family and myself, there would be absolute silence about the facts. The army would use our office as they wished, and make the classic charge that we are communists; the truth would be camouflaged by the government's propagandists; the outrage committed against us would have the weight of 50 years of lying to satiate an unquenchable thirst for power which maintains a regime that has wrapped our country in a whirlwind of violence.

As I write these lines, I am convinced that our Lord God cannot allow these atrocities to continue against his 5-million children in El Salvador, who are dying like chickens in a slaughterhouse. And so again I will resume the message that I set out to deliver on Jan. 16, and within the limits of this space, answer the question, "What is happening in El Salvador, and why?"

For 50 years, the military has acted as a political party. For 50 years they have promised free elections and reforms. Today, through token civilian President Jose Napoleon Duarte, the military dictatorship once

again promises elections and the participation of all sectors. Nobody can believe that after 50 years of lies.

**MY NEWSPAPER** has been confiscated, in express violation of my country's constitution, because of our weapon: words. Words are also the weapon in an electoral campaign. How can the government orchestrate a dialogue when it is suffocating all ideas? To attack a newspaper is to attack the democratic present and future of a country. The military's takeover of *El Independiente* proves the lack of sincerity on the part of my country's government, in terms of allowing free circulation of all political ideologies at all times.

Personally, I don't want a Stalin in my country, but neither do I want a Napoleon Duarte as a benevolent mask for the murdering military. The Salvadoran people today know of no other system than that of torture and brainwashing, like that attributed to Lavrenti Beria, who did the dirty work for Stalin.

The Salvadoran people are fighting an army that has always oppressed them, and their right to insurrection is backed by the Salvadoran Constitution. The people of the United States would have been up in arms long ago if they had experienced the horrors that the Salvadorans have suffered for 50 years.

I have been a journalist more than 20 years, as were my father and grandfather. I have fought for the principles of Western democracy in my country. I have fought for a social justice that would bring peace and tranquility to my country. Now I am convinced that justice cannot exist while an army also exists to carry out a policy of extermination. (I wish to note that democracy has flourished in Costa Rica, where there is no army.)

**NOW THE FORCES** of reason and democracy increasingly are giving their political support to those who have taken up arms, regardless of what their label might be. The guerrilla forces include Christians and

non-Christians, but all are courageous people who, one way or another, do not want a dictatorship based on assassination, fraud, lies and corruption. The political support behind those in arms is broad-based, comprising Social Democrats, Christian Democrats, priests, even honest military people, such as Col. Ernesto Claramont. He won the vote in 1977, and if it had not been for electoral fraud, he would be the legitimate president of El Salvador today. Taking into account all these types of people who are opposing the current regime, it is ridiculous to call them leftist. They represent the spirit of the whole country.

Dictatorship or participatory democracy — there is no other option for the Salvadoran people. If they are not supported, there will be a radicalization of the crisis and the social cost will be high.

If the army were the cause of so many frauds and assassinations in the great democracy of the United States, the chasm would be as wide as the one that led to the Civil War to liberate the slaves and restore the Union. How can the United States support the military in El Salvador, after having spent thousands of lives in the fight against military fascism in Europe? The medals my journalist grandfather won for supporting the Allies during World War II would be fit only for the garbage heap if I were to fight fascism abroad and remain speechless before the fascism our country has experienced for 50 years.

It must be understood that the governing army in El Salvador is neither the right nor the left, let alone the middle. It is a group of murderers and thieves corrupted by lust for power.

**WHEN THE** right-wing government of Gen. Carlos Humberto Romero was overthrown in October 1979. The new junta cited the murders and disappearances that had been carried out during his regime. The junta proclaimed that justice would be done for the families of those people. But justice never arrived. The criminals and torturers of Romero's regime remained in the army. A year and a half later nothing has been done.

Never once in 50 years has there been even a brief interlude for democracy in my country. Is it any wonder that the people of El Salvador are convinced that they cannot find the path of their own destiny by way of elections?

Now the people see the instrument of their repression for 50 years armed by the U.S. government. Now the sum of 50 years of hoodwinking and murderous banditry gives credence to the words of those who contend that it is necessary to fight force with force. Now, out of the shadows of night, come the people who would end this dictatorship, and every day they grow in number and strength. Thousands and thousands of millions of dollars cannot silence the voice of people who, after 50 years, once again ask for justice.


