At your request, I met with Albert Johnson, a businessman, who has just returned from Bolivia. (U)

Johnson met with Garcia Meza. The latter sent the following verbal message. He wants US support soon. He would accept a special envoy to talk about reopening US-Bolivian relations. He would also appreciate a US Ambassador. He would like to negotiate a friendship treaty with the US. (C)

Johnson has already seen Ambassador Enders and repeated the same message. (U)

Johnson is a member of the Board of the Houston Oil Technology Corporation and his company is interested in tertiary oil recovery in Bolivia, and has already initiated talks with the Bolivian State Oil Monopoly. (C)

#### Comment

The message from Garcia reads like all the other ones he sent via other channels. Nevertheless, the need to have a high level contact soon is one that has already been proposed and seems a useful way to proceed. (C)

Bolivia. It is about to pop. Rumors of coup plotting have been going on since I arrived at the OEOB. The State Department has always believed the Garcia Meza regime would last only two weeks. Finally, State may be right. The whole system is now askew. Hugo Banzer has publicly declared war on the regime and the rest of the generals are very restless. Meanwhile, Garcia Meza has turned away his real tough guy, Lucho Arce. The break could come next week. What to do? I'm in touch with the few real Bolivia experts in this town. The consensus is the US has played the waiting game for too long. If the coup attempt succeeds, we should, after a short, decent interval, send a special envoy to Bolivia -- perhaps General Sumner -- and have him say specifically what we want from the new government in preparation for full recognition and resumed relations (meaning our Ambassador). If the coup fails -- we should still do the same. Judging from the cable traffic, the Garcia Meza regime still isn't quite sure what we want -- and more importantly -- how much we want it. Again, a special envoy would help enormously on this matter. I can spell all this out in greater detail next week if you wish. (S)

Lt. Col. Lanza's second coup attempt in 2 weeks was a repeated failure. A virtual carbon copy of the first golpito, Lanza failed because no other units joined his CITE airborne battalion stationed in Cochabama.

The news stories and embassy reporting played it cautious and straight, but Ia Paz radio stations as reported by AFP were wildly inaccurate.

What now? Nothing in Bolivia is simple, and Garcia Meza is hardly secure. Quite aside from Bolivian political normality, i.e., always expect the unpredictable, two things suggest Garcia Meza may not be with us for long. First, coup attempts (even failed ones) always threaten the military as an institution. The La Paz exasperated generals may simply ask Garcia Meza to go quietly. Second, we did not hear over the weekend from Natusch Bush. Was Lanza's golpito a mere diversion while the real coup is being put together for a go next weekend?

In Bolivia this suggestion isn't even Byzantine.

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Dear Roger:

Per your request, here is a short resume of the three Bolivian officers you are interested in, plus one other. This is a personal assessment, written off the top of the head. I know Cayoja, Ayoroa and Rico Taro extremely well, and Anez fairly well. Please look upon this as a Larry Tracy-Roger Fontaine unofficial communication, so as to not rattle bureaucratic chains.

Humberto Cayoja. Considered as one of the better professionals in the Bolivian Army. He could have been President in 1971 as he was the major planner/executor of the Banzer coup, and Banzer was in prison at the time. He deferred to the more senior Banzer, however. Shortly thereafter, he was sent to the U.S. as a student at Fort Leavenworth and then a Military Attache. While here, he pursued an MA at Catholic University, plann on writing a thesis on U.S. involvement in Vietnam. I don't know if he finished, but this is indicative of an intellectual curiosity and academic bent rare had the reads English fairly well.

After returning to Bolivia (1975) he was the Army G3, a key post for a junior colonel. (Currently this job is held by a BG.)
After 8 months, he was sent to Chile as Attache. He is convinced Banzer sent him off twice because Banzer was concerned that Cayoja would move against him.

He is not, understandbly, a big fan of Banzer. I cannot say how wide a base support he has in the Army. Many officers do not trust him, for reasons unclear to me. He divorced his first wife, who was very active politically against the Leftist Torres Government, and married a much younger, very attractive, very ambitious

woman. They met and were married here in Washington. (She was with the Embassy, I believe.) Cayoja was Minister of Education in the Ferch Government. Should Cayoja move to the Presidency, we could work well with him. He is a graduate of Fort Leavenworth, very pro U.S. and I know of no involvement with drugs. He's about 50.

#### Juan Ayoroa Ayoroa

Leader of a military family, dubbed the "Ayoroa Clan." He was Minister of Interior under Ovando Candia. He was fired by Banzer as Command of the Command and Staff School in 1975 for criticism of the Government's policy toward Chile (Banzer had resumed relations, broken since 1962) and Banzer's tendency to keep the military in politics. He remains the most respected senior officer (he's about 57-59). He has Command stuck to the line that the military should not play a direct political role. He and I have had many lengthy discussions on this subject, and I believe he is sincere in wanting to create a professional military that does not Notator itself by constant political intrigue. He is the leader of a retired officer group (Topator) - named after a famous battle in the War of the Pacific) and has excellent ties with the LTC's and junior officers 45 Wall,

I believe as President he could bring private sector, senior officers (all on active duty are junior to him he graduated in the class of 1945, two years prior to Banzer's graduation from the Argentine Academy) as well as the unit commander.



I met LTC Medina (Tararaca Regiment, the strategist unit in bodia uc.) A comment the Army) through Ayoroa. He and others have great respect for Ayoroa. He has been recalled to active duty, but I don't know what specific post he now holds. Inherently wealthy (old money), no hint of corruption/drugs.

#### BG Luis Anez

Newly appointed Chief of Staff (No. 2) in Army. He is an engineer, with no strong opposition as far as I know. He is not known as a political comer, however, And, I don't believe he could really muster wide support. He is a good No. 2 man, would make a good Cabinet Minister, especially one that is technical (Communications, Transportation). Well respected by private sector.

COL Faustino Rico Toro, new Commandant of the Military
Academy.

Probably has best, most devious political mind in the Army.

Excellent charismatic commander, with

good following among young officers, Very ambitious. He was
aide to Ovando. Speculation has always been that he was responsible for shooting down Barrientos helicopter. He was tried but
aquitted. Close ties with Argentina. He is graduate of Argentine
Command and Staff School, and son is in last year at the Argentine Military Academy.

He was Military Attache to U.S. 1979-80. He was one of chief architects of Pescala coup (July 1978) and then served as Minister of Interior until Padilla coup (Nov 78). He wants to be President, and would be under certain circumstances, very

ruthless. He has told me that Bolivia is a target of international Marxism, and a blood bath may be inevitable as a means of determining which system will prevail. As Commandant of the Military Academy, he will have 500 well-trained, disciplined cadets, all armed with automatic weapons, and excellent light infantry battalion (by Bolivian standards).

Garzia Meza has now been forced to resign effective August 6
--Bolivian Independence Day. He was eased out by a consensus of senior military officers who wanted to bring the turmoil within the Armed Forces to an end in order to preserve the chain of command. (Two revolts within a month led by a Lieutenant-Colonel is unacceptable). The new government has yet to be assembled. The preliminary indications are positive. (More on this later). If men like Humberto Cayoja form the new leadership after August 6, then the U.S. should move quickly to recognize the new government. We have two months in which to make the preparations -- there is no reason why we can't be in place on or about August 6.

### 3. BOLIVIA: LIGHT AT THE END OF THE TUNNEL?

The growing discontent prevalent in the armed forces against the Garcia-Meza government has compelled the regime to move toward a peaceful, face-saving change in leadership. President Garcia-Meza has announced a reorganization of armed forces hierarchy and called on his military colleagues to choose a successor by mid-July. He proposes to relinquish the presidency on August 6, Bolivian independence day.

Garcia-Meza's position had become increasingly untenable:

- --The regime was badly tainted in the eyes of its civilian and military constituencies by the alleged involvement of many high-level military and government officials in cocaine trafficking.
- --Efforts to curb the drug trade and eliminate official involvement had been only partially successful and the narcotics stigma prevented full normalization of diplomatic relations with the US, some Latin American neighbors and several Western European nations.

Garcia-Meza's dwindling cadre of supporters and those in the establishment who oppose him are wary of the dangers of dropping the facade of unity. They fear a fratricidal conflict that could destroy the armed forces and allow the organized left to gain a foothold in Bolivia. Their apprehensions improve prospects for a peaceful change of command.

Garcia-Meza may still have some cards up his sleeve. He has announced that he was assuming the position of Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces, a slot abolished after the July 17, 1980 coup. It is unclear whether he will relinguish this job along with the presidency on August 6. Moreover, Garcia-Meza has named two trusted colleagues to the positions of Army Commander and Army Chief of Staff, either of whom could succeed him as President.

Civilian politicans, as well as labor and student leaders who have consistently sought a return to democratic rule, will find the new arrangement frustrating, despite vague pledges of an eventual return to constitutional practices.

SUBJECT: July 4th Congratulatory message from Bolivian President Garcia Meza to President Reagan

Bolivian President Garcia Meza has sent an Independence Day message of congratulations to President Reagan. In normal circumstances, a response by President Reagan would be customary. In this instance, however, such a Presidential response would receive wide publicity and be used by Garcia Meza as evidence that normalization of relations had been achieved.

This week the Bolivian armed forces are scheduled to decide whether Garcia Meza should be extended in office or be replaced by another military officer. Our interests are best served by not providing Garcia Meza with anything which he might be able to use to strengthen his position.

The Department recommends that in lieu of a presidential response, the Charge in La Paz be instructed to express appreciation for the GOB's congratulatory message. A draft cable is attached.
