I. PURPOSE

To meet with the Cabinet Council on Legal Policy and hear policy options presented on two issues: The Task Force on Legal Equity for Women; and proposed legislation for victims of crime. Also, an interim report on the Task Force on Family Violence will be presented.

II. BACKGROUND

Task Force on Legal Equity for Women

In Executive Order 12336, signed in December 1981, you directed the Attorney General to undertake a comprehensive review of Federal laws, regulations, policies and practices that discriminate on the basis of sex. The most recent installment made toward fulfilling your directive is the Fourth Quarterly Report by the Attorney General on Legal Equity for Women. It was submitted to the Cabinet Council on Legal Policy in late December and reviewed in a meeting on January 16.

The report is a compilation of the findings of 26 executive departments and agencies on their efforts to identify and amend regulations and policies that discriminate on the basis of sex.

The Task Force on Legal Equity for Women was likewise established by Executive Order 12336 and is directed, by your orders, to implement changes in discriminatory regulations and policies that are exposed in the Attorney General's review. In view of the impending completion of the Attorney General's review effort, the Task Force's role in correcting sex-discrimination in Federal activities will assume increasing importance.

Options concerning the Attorney General's review and a proposed list of persons to be named to fill vacancies on the Task Force are provided for your consideration. Candidates to chair the group are still being discussed.

Victims of Crime Legislation

Last fall the Department of Justice completed a study of the treatment of the victims of crime in America's social and judicial systems. The study was the product of the Task Force on Victims of Crime and its findings were presented to you during a meeting of the Cabinet Council on Legal Policy.

The recommendations of the Task Force have been translated into legislation for your consideration. The central issue of concern is the establishment of a Crime Victim's Assistance Fund - its composition and sources of revenue. OMB is opposed to establishment of an assistance fund in its current form. Options are provided for your consideration.

Task Force on Family Violence

Assistant Attorney General Lois Herrington will present an interim report of the major findings of the Task Force since its establishment last fall. The Task Force is reviewing the nature and scope of family violence in America and the fallout it has upon society as a whole.

Attorney General Smith will be prepared to lead discussion on all agenda items. He will defer to Assistant Attorney General Lois Herrington and others where appropriate.

The Fourth Quarterly Report of the Attorney General on Legal Equity for Women, and a discussion on the Task Force on Legal Equity for Women will be first on the agenda. A review of proposed Victims of Crime legislation and an interim report on the Task Force on Family Violence will follow as second and third items on the agenda.

- o In view of the impending completion of the review process, I have made a number of appointments to the Task Force on Legal Equity for Women, (and would like to announce the group's new Chair).
- o The importance of legal equity for women in America can not be overstated.
- o It is also important to recognize that this effort is only one component in a broad effort to provide greater equality of opportunity to women in America.
- o Administration efforts to provide greater economic equity.
 - Child Support Enforcement
 - Increased tax credits for child care
 - Removal of the marriage tax penalty
 - Ensure pension equity
 - Spousal IRAs
- o Appointments/placement in government - more women in policy making positions than any previous administration.
- o I know that in each of your departments and agencies that you have special initiatives in place on behalf of women.
- o Be mindful of these accomplishments. Promote them.

To give the President an opportunity to review current domestic and foreign questions which might be raised by the Sperling Breakfast on Wednesday morning.

II. BACKGROUND

The event Wednesday morning is an expanded version of the Sperling Breakfast Group, which holds regular sessions with prominent Administration officials and Members of Congress. The President met with the Sperling Group on February 23, 1983.

FOREIGN

U.S./ Soviet

1. How do you size up the new Soviet leader?
2. Do you expect a change in U.S./Soviet relations?
3. Why didn't you go to Andropov's funeral?
4. You've said you would be willing to have a summit, if there were an "agenda" of substantive issues to talk about. Isn't there such an agenda?
5. Why not offer some new gesture or initiative, to get the arms talks going again?

Lebanon

1. How can you make progress with Hussein and Mubarak on the Middle East peace process with Lebanon still unresolved?
2. Is Hussein any nearer now to entering the peace process?
3. Do you think Lebanon has been a "national obsession," detracting us from success in the Middle East peace process?
4. Have we now "lanced the boil" in Lebanon so that we can move on to the overall Palestinian issue?
5. When will the Marines be redeployed to their ships?

TALKING POINTS

FOREIGN

U.S.-Soviet Summit

- No change in our desire for a meeting.
- It should allow for the participants to do more than just get acquainted.
- Should have an agreed agenda of carefully prepared issues.
- Negotiations should precede the meeting, so that issues are far enough along to have a reasonable promise for resolution.

Marine Redeployment

- Consulting with MNF and Lebanese now about redeployment.
- It is feasible to have all Marines now at airport back on ships 30 days after redeployment begins.
- No final decision on when to start, or timetable. Expect to make a decision on that in next few days, after receiving Secretary Weinberger's recommended timetable.
- Our aim is to make support for Lebanon more effective.

POLITICS

1. Why go to Iowa on caucus day? Democrats say it's bad form, unpresidential; interferes with their process.
2. Planning trips to other early primary states? Going to New Hampshire?
3. Is Mondale locked-in now? Who would you prefer to run against?

QUESTIONS

DOMESTIC

1. The Democrats are saying they won't negotiate on the deficits unless the next meeting is dedicated to cutting defense spending. Are you willing to cut defense?
2. Your economic advisers have implied that this budget is meaningless and all that really matters is the Downpayment Deficit negotiations. If this panel fails, what will happen to your budget? Will you support it?
3. Is there any way to achieve a balanced budget without raising taxes after the election? Will you do that?
4. Some Conservatives have implied that monetary policy might be too tight to support the recovery, especially in the face of large deficits. Do you agree?
5. The major social/economic issue of the campaign appears to be fairness. Do you believe your programs are fair to the poor, the elderly and others who depend on government help?
6. Everyone agrees that there are some people who live on grates that refuse shelter for one reason or another. But this group is such a small part of the population, aren't you concerned that your comments on them only signals an insensitivity to the poor and the homeless in general?
7. Rumors are that William Clark and others are urging you to bring Joe Coors into the White House to represent conservative issues the way Ed Meese does. Is this true?
8. Your press relations have had some difficult periods as a result of the Grenada invasion, a lack of press conferences, and your comments that appear to question the patriotism of the press. Now Charlie Wick has a black list of Americans who are unfit to speak for America abroad and most of them are press. Do you think the press is antagonistic to your Administration?

1. If your campaign strategy is to remain "Presidential", why are you going to Iowa on February 20 when all the Democratic candidates are there?
2. Will you campaign in the early primaries? Which states will you go to?
3. Which of the Democratic candidates would you most prefer to run against? Would you be willing to debate?
